# Viet Assembly Official Assassinated by Duo

## Victim Top Critic Of Ky Government

SAIGON (UPI)—A prominent politician being boomed for the presidency of South Viet Nam's civilian government next year was assassinated today in a hail of bullets fired by two men on a red motorbike. Police captured one of the assassins, and he said later in a news conference that he was a Viet Cong agent who had a specific mission to assassinate the politician, Tran Van Van.

# Johnson Burdened With Missile Threat

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—The 25th anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack found President Johnson wrestling with the burden of another war—Viet Nam—and the threat of a big Soviet missile buildup. Intelligence had forecast that McNamara wants it understood that the Russian long range weapon buildup has "no basic impact" on American strategic force requirements.

## Vessels Death Penalty Appeal Awaiting Lawyer

Action on death penalty sentencing of T. R. Vessels, convicted rapist, is pending in 31st Judicial District Court in order to give his family time to acquire an attorney to present the case to the Criminal Court of Appeals in Austin.

Vessels filed a handwritten motion of appeal for a new trial and a request for appointment of counsel on Nov. 7 in the district clerk's office. The request for court-appointed counsel was denied by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich. According to Texas law, it is necessary for the handwritten motion for a new trial be presented by an attorney to the Court of Appeals.

Judge Goodrich said yesterday he plans to give the family until Dec. 15 to employ an attorney. He said the step-father of Vessels had informed him "they almost had enough money to hire a Fort Worth attorney."

"If they need additional time," Goodrich said, "I'll grant it." Vessels was given the death penalty on Oct. 29 by a 12-man jury following a one-week trial. He was convicted of the April 28 rape of a Pampa housewife.

## Wichita Falls Site of New Ruby Trial

DALLAS (UPI)—Jack Ruby, the night club operator who killed President John F. Kennedy's assassin, will have his second trial in Wichita Falls, probably in February.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals overturned Ruby's 1964 conviction and ordered a new trial in a city other than Dallas.

Pretrial hearings will be held in Dallas. The state, which succeeded in getting the former strip-club owner sentenced to death for shooting Lee Harvey Oswald, will try again for the death penalty.

Ruby's lawyers said they hope the jury will sentence Ruby to no more than five years in prison for murder-without-malice.

Criminal Dist. Judge Louis T. Holland met with Dallas Dist. Atty. Henry Wade and defense lawyers for almost two hours Tuesday before announcing where the new trial would be held. He said he would set a definite trial date within 30 days but indicated the trial would be held "possibly in February."

## New US Hero Accepts Medal From Johnson

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—America has a new hero on this Pearl Harbor anniversary, a pint-sized ex-Marine warrior who accepted the nation's highest honor with a grin for the President and kisses for the girls.

He is Robert Emmett O'Malley, a tough former Marine sergeant who gunned down at least eight Viet Cong fighters in a rice paddy on Aug. 18, 1965, refused orders to leave and continued fighting until his men were evacuated although he suffered serious wounds three times.

For his valor, O'Malley received Tuesday the Congressional Medal of Honor from President Johnson here and joined the ranks of war heroes like Audie Murphy.

But O'Malley, the Marines' first Medal of Honor winner for Viet Nam fighting, proved himself a different sort of hero than many World War II GI's. This 23-year-old member of the "cool generation," a happy ex-warrior as poised as the Chief Executive himself, even stole the show from his commander-in-chief.

O'Malley won the reputation as a "fighting and kissing" Marine when he planted affectionate kisses on wives of a score of dignitaries who shook his hand during the colorful ceremonies under bright Texas skies.

## Britain Appeals UN Economic Sanctions Against Rhodesia

LONDON (UPI)—Britain weighed the possibility of financial disaster at home and bloody strife in southern Africa before appealing to the world to join its limited economic war against rebel colony Rhodesia.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson today ignored a stalling move by Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith for an "impartial" commission to make independence recommendations which Smith would be free to reject.

Wilson began a two-day parliamentary fight for approval of his plan to ask the United Nations on Thursday to levy "effective, selective, mandatory sanctions" against Smith's white minority regime.

Opposition Conservative party leaders said they would reject a government motion seeking House of Commons support of Wilson's appeal for U.N. intervention in the deepening struggle to topple the white supremacist regime or guarantee eventual rule by Rhodesia's black majority.

Financial sources said Tuesday's jolt to the London stock market should not be repeated in equal severity today. Announcement of the proposed sanctions staggered the pound sterling, which had to be propped up by the Bank of England. Stock market shares dropped millions of dollars in value.

Parliamentary opposition was not Wilson's biggest headache, however. The proposal for limited sanctions was expected to encounter stiff conflict with African and Asian nations in the United Nations. The Afro-Asian group urges more stringent action—including total embargo and military intervention—against Smith's regime.

The United States is in agreement with Britain on the nature of the compulsory sanctions, diplomatic sources said. The boycott targets have been carefully chosen to strike only at the section of the Rhodesian economy which gives Smith's government income to carry out administrative responsibilities. The economic and social collapse of Rhodesia as a whole was not the goal.

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## Jets Strike Hanoi Again

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. jets returned to North Viet Nam to bomb communication targets and storage facilities outside of Hanoi and Haiphong, military spokesmen said today.

U.S. officials also reported that an Air Force F105 Thunderchief which crashed during raids on the North Monday had been shot down by a Russian-built MIG17. It was the fifth American plane lost in battle with the Communist jets.

The raids Tuesday were spread over a wide area of North Viet Nam. Spokesmen said the fighter-bombers flew 70 missions, striking communications lines and storage depots in the areas of Hanoi and Haiphong, along the southern panhandle and just north of the demilitarized zone.

There were no reported losses of the fighter-bombers, but an Air Force reconnaissance jet was downed by Communist gunfire near Dien Bien Phu. The two men aboard were saved in a dramatic rescue.

In other developments today: Spokesmen reported the sinking of four enemy barges by the U.S. 7th Fleet Destroyers Ingersoll and Keppeler patrolling off the coast of North Viet Nam. Other destroyers blasted enemy targets in central South Viet Nam.

Viet Cong guerrillas attempted another terrorist assault on the huge U.S. airbase at Tan Son Nhut outside Saigon. Two 62-pound explosive parcels were set at a base ammunition dump. The fuses did not operate properly, however, and the explosives were located and disarmed today.

Air Force B52 bombers from Guam today struck a suspected Communist base camp near the central coastal province of Bin Dinh in the south. There were no immediate reports on damage.

An American pilot was killed today when he bailed from his crippled F5 Freedom jet near Bien Hoa in South Viet Nam. His parachute failed to open and he plunged 6,000 feet to the ground. It was not immediately determined whether enemy fire disabled the plane.

Observers said however the morning conference was more likely to focus on charges by hard-line states—namely Syria and the U.A.R.—that Jordan had betrayed the Arab world by not being firm enough against Israel.

The future of (Arab) unity will be determined by the outcome of the meeting, said Sayed Nofal, assistant secretary general of the Arab League. He said the Arab military question was the only topic on the agenda. Most of the conference was being held behind closed doors.

As the meeting began, the situation in riot-torn western Jordan was described as calm. Nablus, the country's third largest city, was under a tight curfew after rioting Monday and security forces made a house-to-house search for weapons.

## Weather Eye Satellite In First Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—A unique weather eye-radio relay satellite whirled around earth today waiting to be parked in a stationary orbit to put space science to work for the man-in-the-street.

The versatile "space handyman" soared into a near perfect preliminary orbit reaching 22,742 miles high Tuesday night. It was sending back a steady stream of reports on its condition and officials said it looked "beautiful."

The satellite's final hurdle was coming up later today when engineers planned to fire an onboard rocket motor to place it into an orbit never before reached by a camera-carrying satellite.

The rocket's 44 second burst of energy was designed to kick the moonlet out of its egg-shaped orbit into a 22,300 mile high circular path where its orbital speed matches earth's rotation and the satellite appears motionless.

## TWO CEREMONIES MARK OBSERVANCE Attack Is Now Symbol of Determination

HONOLULU (UPI)—Perhaps fittingly, the skies over Hawaii were gloomy and overcast this morning, the 25th anniversary of the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. Exactly a quarter of a century ago, at 7:55 a.m. local time on a bright Sunday morning the velvet blue sky over this island paradise became spotted with wave after wave of enemy aircraft.

The droning sound of the swarming Japanese planes, hardly audible at first, heightened until the air was shattered by the deadly impact of powerful 500-pound bombs, the staccato bark of gunfire, and the screams of the wounded. Twenty-four hundred and nine Americans were killed. Eighteen American ships were sunk or damaged, including eight battleships, 188 U.S. planes were destroyed, and 128 more were damaged. The Japanese lost 29 planes, five midget submarines and one large submarine. About 100 of the attackers were killed. Despite the tremendous American losses, however, the attack was a failure of mission since the Japanese were aiming for the U.S. Aircraft carrier force, all of which was at sea that day. This failure resulted in the Japanese defeat at Midway the following June. There, Japan lost her four carriers under a fierce attack from U.S. carrier-based aircraft. That was the turning point of the war.

# Medal Marks 25th Anniversary Of the Attack on Pearl Harbor

Twenty-five years ago today the attack on Pearl Harbor changed the war into a World War. President Roosevelt addressed a joint session of Congress and declared that Dec. 7 was "a date which will live in infamy." "Remember Pearl Harbor" became the battle cry of the nation. A quarter of a century has passed and Pearl Harbor is now remembered as an important chapter of American history.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor has been commemorated on a medal released by Presidential Art Medals, Inc., Englewood, Ohio. The medal is dedicated to those who served during the infamous attack on Dec. 7, 1941.

The "Attack on Pearl Harbor" medal was designed and sculptured by Edward R. Grove of Drexel Hill, Pa. Grove became well known for his artistic works when he was sculptor-engraver at the U. S. mint in Philadelphia. In creating the medal, the sculptor felt an attitude of grim determination was called for in the likeness of

President Roosevelt, tempered by a reflection of belief in final victory — which he did not live to see. More than 50 camera and paintings were studied in preparation for his portrait. The reverse side of the medal captures a dramatic moment during the sneak attack on the morning of the "day of infamy", Dec. 7, 1941. Seriously

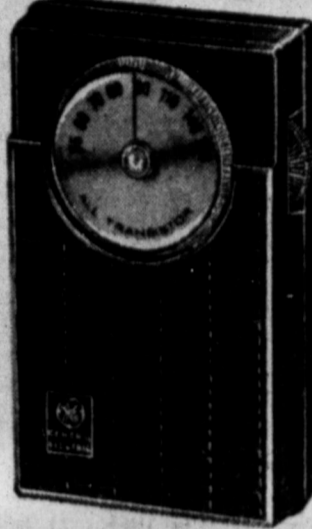

### Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI) —Bregman, Cummings & Co. says it is possible that a decision either way on a tax increase in January could be construed as bearish for the market. If increased, some might think it too late in the economic cycle and feel it would only add to the momentum in profit declines. On the other hand, if taxes are not hiked, many may feel it is a sign that the boom is over and recession underway.

The company says that based on this, it believes a strong year-end rally might take place

but the event would do little to clarify the early 1967 outlook.

Bache & Co. believes the technical condition of the market is generally favorable but that uncertainty over a tax increase will keep the list in approximate balance for the next several sessions. By mid-December, however, the company sees seasonal factors launching the market into higher ground.

### Young Workers Reminded Of Employment Standards

DALLAS — As young workers surged into the field for jobs during the Christmas season, a U. S. Labor Department official here today issued a reminder to them, their parents, and potential employers.

"Note the standards established for hiring of young people under the Fair Labor Standards Act," said Regional Director Wm. J. Rogers of the Department's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions in Dallas.

"Those who are 16 or 17 years of age need be alert only to the law's ban on hazardous jobs, including working on motor vehicles and freight elevators," Rogers said.

Younger workers, 14 and 15 years old, may be hired for many office and sales jobs, he said, subject to limitations intended to protect their health and opportunity for education. Thus they may work only between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., and in hours when school is not in session in the locality.

Youth under 16 may not be employed in the production of goods for interstate commerce, he said, and they may work only 18 hours in any school week, or 40 hours in a non-school week.

Employers should protect themselves against unintentional violations, Rogers said, by requiring that each young worker obtain an employment certificate or proof of age certificate.

# Harvesters Sail By Bobcats; Eye Dons

Pampa ended pre-conference basketball play Tuesday night and began practice today for a league game Friday night with tough Palo Duro in Amarillo.

The Harvesters and Shockers both raced to easy victories over San Angelo's Bobcats Tuesday night.

The Shockers won their seventh in eight outings while the Harvesters remained undefeated in eight contests, rolling to a 66-51 decision.

The Shocks downed San Angelo 63-41 with Mike Sublett pacing the scoring with 14 points followed by Larry Hollis with 13 and Beau Bond with 12.

San Angelo put on a strong zone defense and threatened Pampa several times but the Harvesters, colder than left over Thanksgiving turkey arose to the occasion.

Pampa hit only 32 per cent from the field, their worse night ever but had their best night from the charity stripe, banking in 18 of 22 while hitting only 24 of 75 from the field.

Again it was the 'Big Four' who had to pull it out. George Bailey paced the scoring with 25. Bo Lang, having his worse night from the field, had 17. Steve Williams added 12 and Rick Foster contributed 10 points to the Pampa cause.

Lang, who had been hitting 67 per cent of his field goal attempts found the basket farther away Tuesday night and managed only five of 15 but sank seven of nine charity tosses.

Although there was never any actual doubt who was going to win the Bobcats kept after the Harvesters and had 'em worried as late as the fourth quarter.

Pampa led 20-10 when the first period ended and the closest San Angelo had come was 2-1 early in the game.

Neither team could buy a basket in the second quarter.

Palo Duro will open conference play with a 6-1 record and downed Tulia, 54-46 Tuesday night at Tulia.

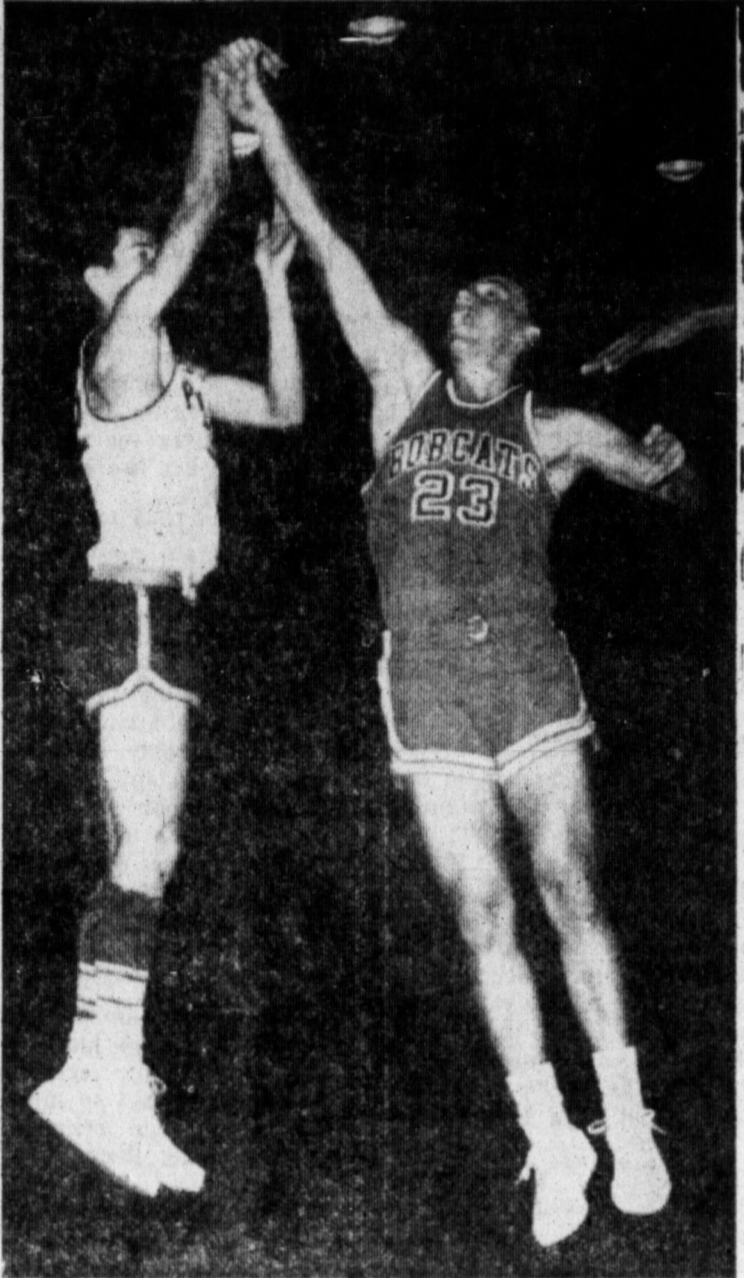

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# 'Tie Policy' Recent Idea

When Notre Dame plays for a tie in the final minute of the Michigan-State game, and millions of Americans argue the merits of the decision, it gives you reason to wonder if the "no-win" policy of our government has infected other areas of our life.

There is no intention here to pass judgment on Notre Dame. Considering the total situation there are sound arguments for and against the course taken. Fans and the press have made that abundantly clear.

But it occurs to me that a decision to accept a tie is much more acceptable today than it would have been 25 years ago, or perhaps only 15 years ago or less. It is plausible to me that the idea of accepting a tie when there remained even the slightest chance for victory, never would have been considered at the time of World War II.

In that era, the idea of settling for less than victory was as foreign to our makeup as burning draft cards. We lived, worked at our jobs, played our games and fought our wars with a total commitment to General MacArthur's profound observation that "There is no substitute for victory."

This week, 25 years have passed since Pearl Harbor. We have fought a war in Korea to a tie, and we are trying to settle for a tie in Vietnam. At a price almost too horrible to contemplate, we have shown we are willing to accept a substitute for victory.

You wonder if we are too concerned with worldwide popularity polls. And, you wonder if this dominating policy of the last two decades has caused our football teams to place the game's popularity polls ahead of total commitment to victory.

The football coach can smile and say that playing a tie game is like kissing your sister. But

there is a trend toward making ties more fashionable, and he is contributing to it, there is no cause for even the slightest element of humor.

There is, rather, cause for us to look around and see what is happening. There is reason to wonder if college football is more likely to quit as soon as he figures he won't make the traveling squad. In college, the tendency is not to try at all unless you start with a football scholarship. Gone are the days when there weren't enough uniforms to go around, and where the freshman squad might number 200 or more, all of them volunteers.

Still, football offers the best opportunity to reverse the trend, if the trend is there. It is the game most like life, and most like war. The beloved Grantland Rice defended it perhaps better than anyone ever has. He wrote that, despite its faults, "It is the soul of college spirit, and the maker of a man."

Granny wouldn't like some of the attitudes displayed on the campus these days. He wouldn't at all like the abandonment of the volunteer spirit.

## WATCH OUT VETERAN HUNTER Don't Get Careless

Hunters talk of deer season and shooting fatalities like the two are synonymous. Most believe that the novice is largely to blame for the hunting accidents.

But many a careless veteran hunter has been involved in a needless mishap simply because he failed to realize that hunting accidents are not the select happenings of a few beginners.

In the typical hunting accident it is not the tyro who is to blame. It is the veteran hunter! Usually the beginner is wary of his weapon and treats it with respect. On the other hand the veteran has hunted too long to be concerned. Familiarity often breeds carelessness.

It also is ironic to know that most shooting accidents do not occur during the deer season. In fact a great majority happen while hunting birds or other small game.

Nationwide statistics reveal that the typical person who

causes a hunting accident is a male over 20 years of age with more than three years of hunting experience. At the time of the mishap he was not under the influence either of drugs or alcohol. Most such incidents happen between the hours of 1:30 p.m. and 4:30 p.m., and in clear weather. Typical weapon is a shotgun. Victim was standing between 11 and 50 yards from the shooter and discharge of the gun was accidental. Only one out of five victims survive.

These statistics debunk a lot of the popular theories about shooting accidents.

Very few accidents happened because the victim was mistaken for game. Most of them were the direct result of careless gun handling.

Often when a veteran hunter brings a weapon into camp or enters a vehicle, the gun is loaded. It shouldn't be! Or he throws it around haphazardly as he slips under a fence—never bothering to check the safety device. Or he props it

idly against a tree or stump or fence post... where it can easily fall... and the jar set off the primed cartridge.

Carelessness is easy to come by. A few years back some Texas nimrods were winding up a dove hunt. A veteran hunter pumped the cartridges from his shotgun. Then he casually pointed the muzzle skyward and pulled the trigger. "BOOM!" went the gun—scaring the daylight out of his buddies.

Sheepishly the guilty one remarked, "Guess I didn't get 'em all out."

He could have been pointing the weapon toward one of his companions... instead of the sky. In that case, someone would have become another statistic and there would be one more needless shooting fatality in the books.

Far too few people realize that no gun ever caused an accident. A gun is merely a tool. Blame rests with the human who guides the destiny of the bullet.

Every hunter owes it to himself and to his friends to acquire safety discipline. He must be on the alert and never guilty of gun mismanagement. Good gun manners are acquired through discipline and determination... plus consideration of the safety of others.

## Draft by Lottery is Proposal Presented by Sen. Edward Kennedy

CHICAGO (UPI) — Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., appears today before a national conference on the draft to promote his proposal for a national lottery to conscript military manpower.

The four-day meeting, which began Sunday night, has system under which "all brought together government officials, educators, religious leaders and military specialists. Their views will be presented to President Johnson's National Advisory Commission on Selective Service, which is expected to recommend changes in the present draft laws.

According to Kennedy's lottery proposal, "no deferments would be made for marriage, fatherhood, dependence or occupational, except in extreme hardship cases."

Several delegates were critical of Kennedy's proposal, including syndicated cartoonist Bill Mauldin of the Chicago Sun Times who said he opposes the lottery because it would lower service morale.

"I'd hate to see any army (made up of men) who consider themselves losers in a monumental crap game," Mauldin said.

Albert D. Biderman, senior research assistant for the Bureau of Social Sciences Research in Washington, said that standards of induction should be elevated rather than resorting to a lottery.
