



At the present time, samples are processed as soon as they arrive at the laboratory and test reports are mailed within ten days. This schedule should benefit since prompt service in an important requirement for an effective soil-testing service, Whaley points out.

"Sampling well in advance of planting offers the advantage of allowing time to obtain the fertisizers needed. In many instances, wet soil may be encountered during the winter and cause a delay in sampling, therefore, sampling now is advisable.

Shipping weights can be reduced by allowing the sample to dry a day or two at air tempersture. Samples, should not be heated since high tempera ures cause potassium to be fixed in some soils in such away that it cannot be removed by chemical procedures. Whaley advises.

"If reliable information is to be obtained from a soil test, it is necessary for the sample to be as nearly representative of the field on which information is desired as possible. 
