### Blood Banks In Louisiana Lack Needed Supply

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Blood bank officials say Louisiana, like most other states, faces a crucial supply of the precious substance unless blood donors are awakened.

And ironically, according to medical director Dr. Leslie Bryant of the New Orleans Blood Bank, as insurance and Medicare cover more and more of the costs for blood, fewer and fewer donors show up to give it.

The reason blood donations are falling off, Bryant says, is a psychological one.

Before Medicare and improved medical insurance began covering most of the cost for transfusions, relatives and neighbors would willingly go to the blood bank and replace blood needed for their friend's or relative's operation.

But now that medicare and medical insurance pay for the blood, donors feel less obligation to replace it.

Bryant says the only charge for blood is for the expense of handling and replacing it. If blood is replaced, the only expense is its handling.

Earthquake Felt In Frisco Area

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Bay area was rattled by an earthquake early today. Dishes and windows shook, but no damage was reported.

The tremor struck at 5:39 a.m. PDT (7:49 a.m. CDT) and was apparently centered in the Sunset and Westlake districts of San Francisco near the San Andreas fault.

A Sunset resident reported that he and his wife were awakened by two jolts, each about 15 seconds.

"The house shook, but nothing broke," he said. Police got hundreds of calls, but no word of damage or injury.

(Continued From Page 1) 510 more than the week before. At least 36 Marines were slain in today's pre-dawn action but the Leathernecks eventually sent the Communists into retreat and pursued them as dawn broke.

Battlefield reports reaching Saigon said at least 152 Marines were wounded in the clashes 365 miles northeast of Saigon in an area where American forces have been trying to crush Viet Cong units threatening the vital positions.

In the air war, American B52 heavy bombers today dropped hundreds of tons of explosives on Communist infiltration routes in the A Shau Valley, a major supply funnel for pouring troops and war goods into South Vietnam's northern provinces.

The eight-engine Stratofortresses Wednesday made two raids on Communist outposts northeast of Con Thien and in the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) dividing the two Vietnams.

U.S. warplanes ranged over North Vietnam Wednesday, hitting a string of rail lines linking Hanoi and Communist China. The strikes in northwestern North Vietnam were between 113 and 133 miles north of Hanoi and about 50 miles from the China frontier.

'Long Hair' Tries School Enrollment

Long hair and the wrong school spelled T-R-O-U-B-E for two students who attempted to enroll at Pampa Junior High School Tuesday.

The two came walking into the auditorium and wanted to know where to register "and what do do."

"One of the first things you have to do is get a haircut," Principal Paul Wayne told them. "They just turned around and stamped off," the principal related.

An hour later they returned, still with long locks, to try again. They walked off again—this time with instructions in hand, after discovering that they had come to the wrong school in the first place.

### Miss Wainscott Gives Pampans Flour Warning

Beware of instant flour. When baking with instant flour, take two level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe, says Jimmie Lou Wainscott, Gray County home demonstration agent.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product, she said. "Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for making gravy," she explained.

In baking, instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid. For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agricultural Research Service suggested improving taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggest extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

### Magazine Suggests Party Sandwiches for Any Age

NEW YORK (Sp) — Make Dillies by the dozens and you'll win compliments by the score. What's a Dilly? It's a pin-

wheel sandwich, filled with anything from salami and cream cheese to cinnamon and sugar, then dipped in egg and fried till puffy and crisp. For large parties, you can fry them ahead and just keep them hot, according to the September "Seventeen." Or you can make them on the spot — like the room some Saturday night — for small Dilly feasts.

One loaf of unsliced white bread makes 10 big Dilly rolls. Make a miniature version of the Dillies when you're not having a party and there's only you — or a friend or two snacking after school — by using regular sliced white bread. Just use as many slices as you need. The choice of Dillies is almost unlimited. Pick a Dilly filled with ham and cheese, Cheddar cheese or bacon and cheese spread, cream cheese and onion or clam dip, dill dip mixed with sour cream, or just about anything else you can invent. For a sweet treat, fill a Dilly with jelly.

Directions for pinwheeling, dipping, frying and making party Dillies and Mini-Dillies follow:

**BASIC DILLY**  
1 loaf unsliced white bread  
Choice of fillings  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup milk  
Cooking oil

Trim all the crusts from bread and cut loaf lengthwise into thin, one-quarter-inch slices. (You may be able to buy it sliced this way at your local bakery. If you use packaged unsliced bread, use a very sharp knife or, better yet, an electric knife.) Cover sliced loaf with a damp cloth or paper towels and refrigerate two hours — for easier rolling. Then roll each slice with a rolling pin to flatten it; add filling.

To roll Dilly: start at one end of bread and roll gently lengthwise, jellyroll fashion. Secure with toothpicks. This can be done ahead and the rolls wrapped in plastic film and refrigerated. When ready to cook, pour enough oil into frying pan or saucepan to cover rolls (about two inches deep). Heat oil to 375 degrees. Combine eggs and milk and beat thoroughly. Dip rolls into egg mixture, making sure that all exposed surfaces, especially ends, are coated with egg. Drain, lower into fat with slotted spoon or two forks and deep-fry until golden. Drain on paper towels. Remove toothpick and serve whole or sliced into half-inch rounds. For a party, slices may be kept warm in slow oven one hour. Makes 10 rolls or about 50 slices.

## Livestock Show Revised Ruling Is Announced

Sifting of fat steers and calves will be done on a percentage basis in future Top O'Texas Junior Livestock shows, according to Rex McAnelly, chairman of the agriculture committee of the show. The ruling is one of several new revisions of the rules and regulations for the show recently published by the committee.

Upshot of the ruling is that an estimated 70-75 calves and fat steers will be sold as opposed to 90-100 in the past. McAnelly pointed out, however, that the figure is not definite and that percentages will be determined by the show superintendent prior to the show.

Dates for the show have been set for March 4-5-6. Revisions of the rules and regulations have been sent to vocational agriculture teachers and county agents in Gray, Roberts, Carson, Wheeler, Hemphill, and Ochiltree counties.

## Reagan Plans 5-State Tour

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Gov. Ronald Reagan touched off a new wave of presidential speculation today by unveiling plans for a five-state speech-making tour next month.

The Republican governor said he was making the tour—to Kentucky, Iowa, Kansas, Texas and Illinois—with some reluctance.

He acknowledged that the new round of speeches, primarily at GOP fund-raising events, would raise further questions about his presidential aspirations.

"This might be," he told a Tuesday news conference, "and for some time I almost became neither a hawk nor a dove but a chicken in this, and didn't want to face the speculation and said 'Let's not do it.'"

But he said he was urged to increase his speechmaking activities by U.S. Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., and Rep. Bob Wilson, R-Calif., chairman of the Senate and House campaign committees.

"I just decided it was ridiculous to let this speculation—which is not going to stop anyway—keep me from doing the party chores which I think should be done."

Reagan has repeatedly denied he is a serious contender for the GOP presidential nomination next year. But he plans to run as a "favorite son" in his home state of California and will not pull his name from the ballots in open primary states such as Oregon, Nebraska and Wisconsin.

## DeGaulle Seeks Closer Relations With Communists

WARSAW (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle arrived in Warsaw for a week of talks and traveling he hopes will bring closer relations between France and the Communist bloc.

Warsaw's streets were decorated with banners proclaiming Polish-French friendship in World War II and newspaper editorials praised the visit as a boost for peaceful coexistence.

His visit will take him to northern and southern Poland and into the disputed Western territories beyond the Oder-Niese. He is expected to support Poland's claim to the former German territories.

De Gaulle was greeted at Warsaw's Okęcie Airport by his host, President Edward Ochab, and Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz. Polish party leader Wladyslaw Gomulka also was on hand.

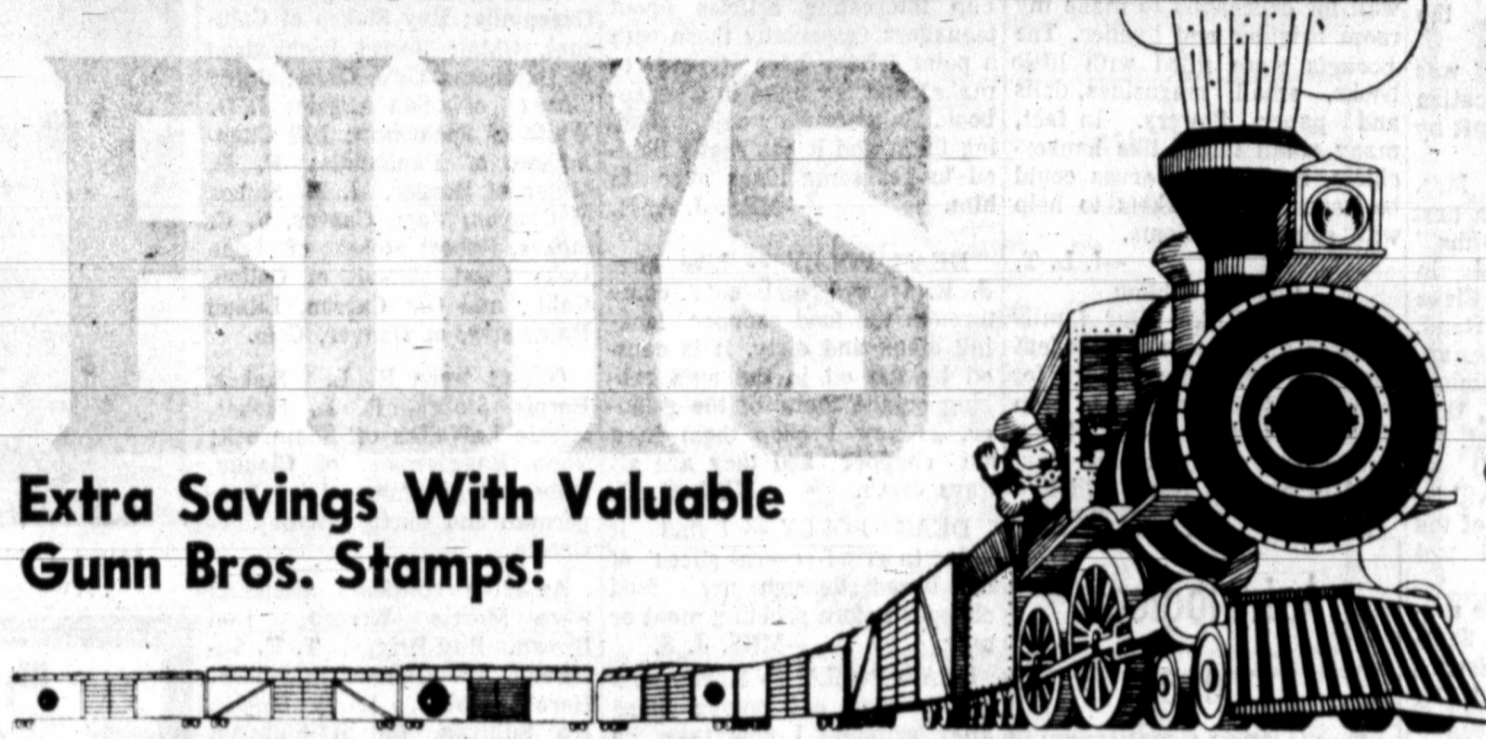

7 Desalted Water May Irrigate

South Texas Crops In Future

FREEPORT, Tex. (UPI) — Sometime in the future, Rio Grande Valley and South Texas crops may be fed on water that was once saltwater, an engineer said Tuesday.

But Charles Grua, resident engineer at the U.S. Saline Water Conversion Plant at Freeport, said much work is still to be done on perfecting desalting processes for municipal water. Then research can turn to the farm water problem, he said—and the possibilities are greater in South Texas.

The chief hurdle is the cost. The Freeport desalting plant turns saltwater into usable water at a cost of \$1 per 1,000 gallons, Grua said.

There are plans for a plant in the Los Angeles, Calif., area that could produce 50 million gallons a day at 30-cents per 1,000 gallons.

Grua said the goal is to have desalting in the Rio Grande Valley that can be done at a cost of 25 to 30 cents per 1,000 gallons.

"I know of no one who is presently engaged in desalination for agriculture research in this area, but I could see that maybe in the next five or 10 years desalination plants could be used in agriculture,"

Young Dems Urge Denver to Impress Vice President

DENVER (UPI) — Craig Barnes, president of the Denver Young Dems, urged fellow members to impress upon visiting Vice President Humphrey this Friday the group's discontent with the Vietnam war.

"Let us all try, through every channel we know, to reach the vice president and to warn him of the consequences of the present policy for us and our party in this state," Barnes wrote in "The Vanguard," the group's newspaper.

Barnes, who called the administration's Vietnam policy a "miscalculation," said Humphrey appeared to him to be "suffering the torment of a trapped man" about the war.

"Republicans will sweep into office at every level of government because people tend to vote dissent all the way down the ballot," the Young Dem

He made no suggestions as to how the vice president should be made aware of the group's feelings. The vice president will speak in Colorado Springs Friday at the International Typographical Union convention and the travel to Denver for a speech before the National Baptist Convention later in the day.

'Buster Brown' Is Native Resident Of Austin, Texas

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — He once traveled the country as Buster Brown, but 54-inch Johnny Clifton has long since left his dog "Tige" and turned to a quiet family life.

Clifton, 78, lives with his 48-inch-tall wife and family in a sprawling home in a quiet Austin neighborhood.

Small chairs and cut-down couches decorate the living room, and they like to tell of their "king" sized bed, which is normal size to their normalized neighbors.

Clifton toured the country from 1913 to 1925 with a dog "Tige," dressed in the clothes that made the old Buster Brown comic strip famous. A shoe company paid his salary.

Wife Ends Travels

It was his wife who brought an end to his continent-wide travels after he met her in Clovis, N. M., while traveling through the area.

"That traveling was not a family man's life," the 65-year-old Mrs. Clifton said.

They were married and settled in Austin, producing a family that has brought researchers from as far away as Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

Their daughter, Mrs. Clarence Swensen, is also a midget, and she too carried the "little people" forward by having two midget daughters. The offspring of midgets usually are full-sized.

The Cliftons and Swensens spent a week at the Baltimore hospital last year undergoing numerous tests in research to determine the causes of midgets. They said they were asked to return this year for more testing.

Family Life Happy

Their size, which keeps them from leading an absolutely normal life, has not stopped either family from being successful or happy.

After their marriage, Mrs. Clifton opened a sandwich shop near the University of Texas. A few years later, they sold out and opened a dry cleaning plant.

Except for three years of traveling in the summer with "Midget City" from 1934 to 1936, the Cliftons have stayed in Austin.

# Pampa Underdog In Friday Game Against Rangers

Pampa, tabbed a six-point underdog against Perryton Friday night in the season opener for both teams in Perryton, might surprise a lot of people, at least coach Eural Ramsey thinks so.

Ramsey, with pessimism breaking out all over him, thinks his Harvesters are going to surprise quite a few people this season.

"A lot of people (most of them who weren't there) think that just because Tullia scored five times against us we don't have much of a defense," Ramsey said.

"But, the coach added, take into consideration that we recovered two fumbles and intercepted two passes and, since we were in a scrimmage had to give the ball right back."

But gone from that club is everybody with the exception of halfback Dickie Henley, who started on defense until he ran into a broken arm in Pampa's fifth game of the season and Donnie Snapp, a guard turned tackle, who'll have to take it easy on a bad foot.

The Harvesters have four sophomores up from the E squad to give them added depth and all five probably will end up playing quite a bit.

Perryton has been waiting a year to take another crack at the Harvesters. They appear to be ready.

Don Smith has begun his first season as the headmaster of the Rangers and has plenty to unload on Pampa.

The Rangers have back five defensive starters and four offensive veterans plus eight other lettermen.

Speed, size and depth are the basic strengths of Perryton and they don't need many more

Eight Top O' Texas area football teams will answer the start-up whistle Friday night when the 1967 football season gets underway.

The game getting top billing Friday will unfold at Lefors where Jack York's Pirates play host to J. T. Hill's Wheeler Mustangs in a battle of a class B team hosting a tough class A team.

Wheeler, a 26-0 winner last year, looks strong as usual, although they return only four fulltime starters from 1966.

They do have, however, the prize of the Panhandle and the Top O' Texas area's leading scorer last season, fullback Fred Goad.

Goad, a 175-pound senior, reportedly is running stronger than ever.

Besides Goad, the Mustangs have back halfback Don Rives, a 190-pound junior halfback, who tallied 46 points last year.

The other two returning starters are All-District candidate Mike Holt, a 167-pound senior tackle and Richard Sechrist, 153-pound senior who has been switched from guard to end.

The Tigers return only two starting linemen but bring back three starting backfield men. If you've never seen an eight-

man football game and you like your gridiron stuff with a lot of running and passing then Miami is where you'll want to be Friday night.

The Warriors, under new coach Roger McFarren, play host to Tyrone, Okla. in an 8-man contest.

Back are four starters and eight lettermen who saw plenty of action in the 8-man game last season.

Groon, under Richard Eddleman, starting his second season, hosts Vega in a game that ended in a 6-6 tie one year ago.

The Tigers have been picked to successfully defend their 5-B title although they are expected to get plenty of opposition from Lefors and Follett.

Eddleman is facing a depth problem (the Tigers have none) but has built his team around four returning starters and one part-timer.

The biggest assist is Keith Fields, being boomed as a possible All-Sat candidate.

Field, 195-pound senior tackle, is being counted on heavily by Eddleman to give his line a much needed boost.

Mike Helton, 160-pounder returns at quarterback as does 180-pound Ken Burger at fullback.

Canadian opened the 1966 season by drubbing Miami 52-0. Friday the Wildcats journey to Booker where the 5-B Kiowas play host.

Canadian has been tabbed by many to unseat unseatable White Deer from the District 1-A throne.

"Cat coach Dwayne Currie is still undecided about who'll start where, but this may turn out to be a good problem.

Canadian lost their top five backs and two starting linemen but still have a host of experience and size.

The crying towel, as usual by this time each year, has been wrung dry 50 times by White Deer coach Sherrill Bottoms.

They lost a lot including All-State fullback Vernon Marlar, speedy Randy Elliott and a host of linemen, but the Bucks look strong as always.

Spearheading the Buck attack is All-State candidate Mike Hawpe, who was an All-District tackle in 1966 but will play fullback this year.

The Bucks, who smashed Boys-Ranch a year ago, 49-6, open there Friday night.

Bottoms doesn't see as good a backfield for the Bucks in 1967 but feels his defense will be stronger.

If this is so then the Bucks opponents will have no offense.

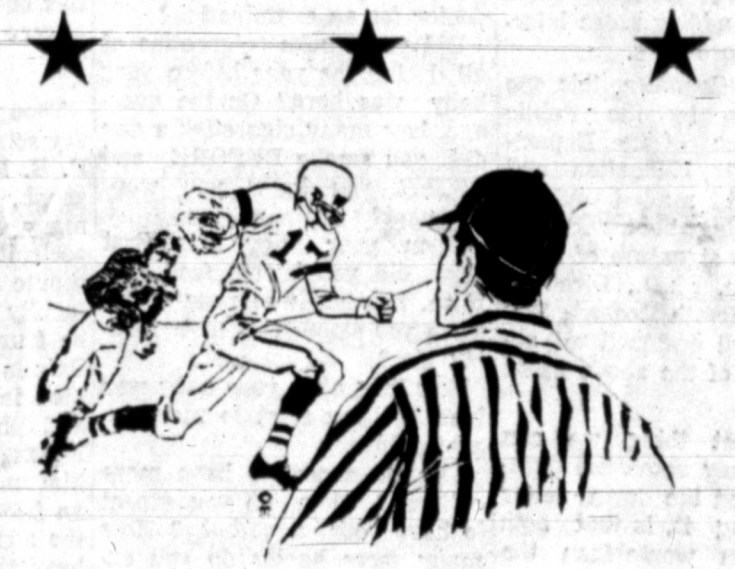

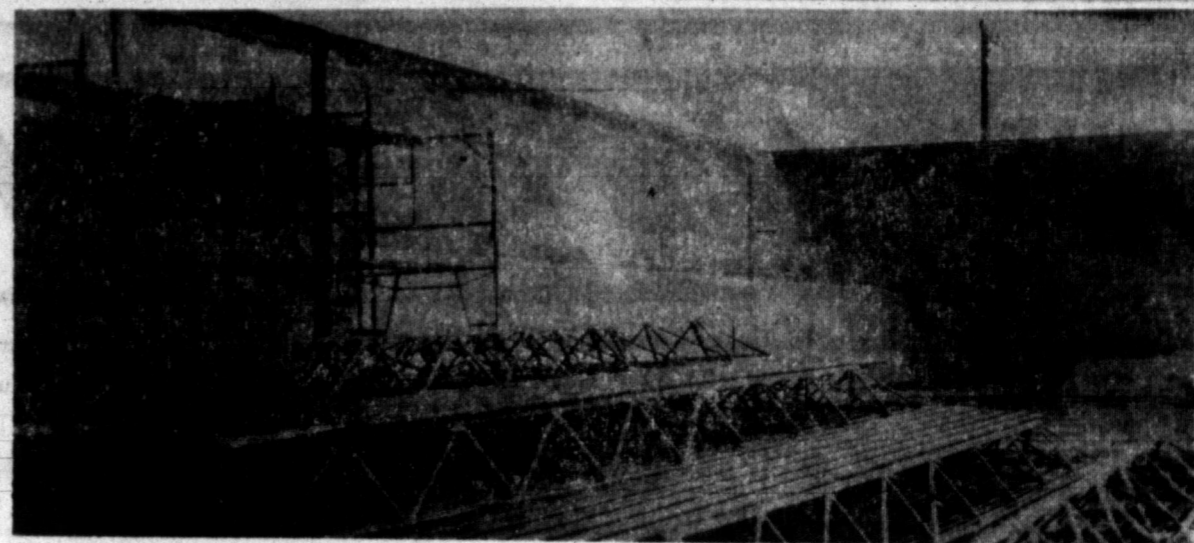
