Death Slow for Young Tennessee Volunteer

By LEON DANIEL TRUONG LAM, Vietnam

(UPI)-A man is not asked in this war to volunteer for a mission that automatically makes him a human bullseve. Somehow there are always volunteers. A young man from Tennessee

-the Volunteer State-took a firm grip on a rope Thursday. and lowered himself into a well In this tiny village 300 miles northeast of Saigon.

His mission was deadly simple; see if any Commu-

nists are hiding in the blackdepths and get them out if they

He was armed only with a flashlight, a .45 caliber pistol and the kind of personal courage most men command only in their dreams.

He slid slowly down into the well. Ten feet ... twenty ...

At 30 feet, almost the water level, a desperate Communist guerrilla fired twice at pointblank range from a crevice in the well wall.

The bullets ripped into the

belly of the Tennessee youth. He did not scream, His grip on the rope remained firm.

The two muffled cracks spurred soldiers on the surface. to haul quickly on the rope. Seconds later the young man lay on the dusty earth before us

with the two small red holes in the pit of his stomach. He moaned softly and steadily as a medic tied a bandage round his wounds. I had seen men wounded like that.

I was sure he was going to

It is a horrible thing to see a man "gutshot."

There is the sinking realization he probably will not live. There is the knowledge he may suffer infinitely in his last minutes of life. There is the awareness that

the young man from Tennessee is very young and very brave.
Lt. Col. Robert Stevenson of Ponca City, Okla., spoke for all of us gathered around the well. He rushed to the shaft, stared down and yelled in a voice quivering with rage: "Charlie

(Viet Cong) you're dead, boy!" Minutes passed and the anger waned. Stevenson ordered the enemy who had probably killed his man to be taken alive. It was an admirable study in integrity and the ethics of

professional soldiering." Stevenson is commander of the 2nd Battalion of the 5th Cavalry.

Rifles trained on the well opening, they waited for the trapped Communist to surrender while vast quantities of the tear gas were poured into the

We waited 90 minutes. Then Stevenson and I left in a helicopter. The wait could have been indefinite.

The "tunnel rats" born of this war are proud men. I have yet to see one who was not a volunteer. To say they are courageous is an understate-

Our blessings must be appreciated. The following words tell the story better than I can.

"Today upon a bus, I saw a lovely maid with golden hair. I envied her — she seemed so gay — and wished I were as fair. 

NOW THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

That a nearing shall be given to the owners and to all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Pampa. Texas hereinafter named, claiming any interest in or lien upon any such abutting properties, and within the limits hereinafter set forth (including all railways owning or including the owners of any such railways, and including all railways using occupying or crossing any of such streets or avenues, and all persons claiming any interest in any of such streets or avenues, and all persons claiming any interest in any of such streets and attorneys, and to all other interested parties, their agents and attorneys, and to all other interested parties, their agents and attorneys in owners and all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abuts any of such streets or avenues or portions thereof within the owners and all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abuts any of such streets or avenue, regardless of whether such a street or avenue at that point lies wholly within, partially within and partly without or outside the City of Pampa, and all other parties interested in any of such properties, including their agents and attorneys, before the City Commission of the City of Pampa. In each unit, except Units 16, 29, 30 and 30, there is included in the estimated amount per front foot proposed to be assessed against abutting properties and the owners thereof approximately \$1.77 per front foot for curb and gutter. In the event there is adequate existing concrete curb and gutter abutting any one or more of the properties being improved, which curb and gutter can be utilized without reconstruction or realignment, such curb and gutter abutting such properties shall be utilized and no assessment will be levied against such properties or the owners thereof for curb and gutter. The City Commission has determined that the strict application of the

front foot plan or rule in apportioning the cost of the improvements will result in injustice or inequality in those instances where some or all of the abutting lots in a unit do not front the street or avenue being improved, such lots being hereinafter referred to as "side lots." unless the City pays a greater portion of the cost for the paving improvements abutting such lots than it pays toward the cost of the paving improvements of lots which front said streets, such lots being hereinafter referred to as "front lots." It has therefore proposed that a different rate per front foot be established for the paving improvements on each such street or portion thereof abutting side lots than that established for the paving improvements on the streets or portions thereof abutting front lots. For this reason the proposed amount to be assessed per front foot is shown in two separate columns below, one such column reflecting the amount to be assessed per front foot against side lots, and the owners thereof, and the other the amount proposed to be assessed per front foot against front lots and the owners thereof.
