

Since no man has put me under that pressure I can only surmise. The question is valid, for we are all under one kind of

The story of Jesus' temptation is the recounting of a man un der pressure. The possibilities of selling out his mission for personal satisfaction, for political pressure or for a testing of the limits of faith are abvious. Had he compromised his mission at this point, his understanding of the grace of God would have

been weakened. Take away that inner resistance and a man crumples under external pressures. History is filled with the stories of institutions, civilizations or personalities which were only empty shells, facades of strength and respectability until some power huffed and puffed and blew the house down.

The way we keep Lent is quite incidental to the fundamental necessity of re-examining our lives, discovering what grace is effective and meaningful, and what inner security can enable us to withstand the fearful pressures to which modern man is subjected. Hemingway once said that "courage is grace under pressure." That is demanded not only of men in battles but of every person who would lead

a meaningful life If business demands that a man travel regularly, leaving a wife to serve as mother-father for the family, there are pressures on the mother, the father and the children.

If gadgets and affluence seem to give a person a sense of importance, then there are pressures which demand a quality



Foreign News Commentary

By ROBERT IBRAHIM United Press International MANILA (UPI) - A spell binding master of political intrigue who has ruled Indonesia for 21 years is being outmaneuvered by a deliberate, unflusterable military strate-

Thus far, military strongman and cabinet chairman Gen. Suharto has resisted both temptation and provocation in his drive to see President Sukarni removed legally and constitutionally.

His purpose is to make certain that there will be no lingering taint of illegitimacy to hamper a new government in its efforts to rebuild the economically shattered nation. Suharto, who has both popular support and military strength on his side, has several times been forced to use his strength in defense of Sukarno to make certain the president survives to be legally destroyed.

It was Sukarno himself who gave Suharto his strongest weapon, and executive order issued last March authorizing Suharto to take whatever measures necessary - including removal of the President - to restore order in Indonesia.

Provides Weapon

Earlier this week, Sukarno gave up his struggle to retain the vestiges of control and surrendered his remaining government powers to Suharto. But he made no mention of resigning from the presidency, an office he has held since 1945. No one knows just when Suharto developed his plan for the legal, if lengthy complex, removal of Sukarno, but he seems to have handled his weapons with skill and judg-

Student demonstrators have been allowed to demand Sukarno's blood but Suharto's soldiers have stopped them just short of getting it.

Demand Ouster Politicians and citizens' groups have demanded Sukarno's immediate removal from office through what would amount to a military coup. Suharto has also allowed them to be heard but not heeded. Sukarno's hand-picked parliament and congress were stripped of their Communist

and pro-Communist members. Supporters of the "new order," including students, were appointed in their places. Both were expanded by nearly 50 per cent and the new seats went to those opposing Sukarno.




