Jets Smash Power Plant

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. Navy jets smashed a key North Vietnamese power plant near Hanoi, military spokesmen said today. In South Vietnam Marines suffered 81 casualties in bitter battle with elite Communist troops, and a rusty old American vessel churned through a guerrilla artillery barrage in a Saigon sea channel.

As intruders from the 7th Fleet aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk Thursday night streaked under low clouds and dumped 1,000 pound bombs on the big Bac Giang power plant feeding Hanoi much of its electricity, spokesmen said. It marked the second time in a week U.S. jets hit the plant, 27 miles east of the capital, in a stepped up air assault against North Vietnam's industrial heartland.

Just below the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) dividing South from North Vietnam, a Leatherneck and a North Vietnamese army platoon met and in a mushrooming jungle battle with both sides pouring in reinforcements, 12 Marines died and 52 were wounded before the Communists ran into the night. Also Thursday in the same area seven other Leathernecks were killed and 10 wounded in fighting that slew 16 Communists.

In the main Saigon sea channel, 14 miles from the South-Vietnamese capital Thursday, Viet Cong ambushers on the banks pumped seven 75-millimeter recoilless rifle shells and small arms fire into the 22-year-old Liberty Ship USS Conqueror. The shells tore gaping holes in the U.S. aid cargo-carrying 10,000-ton vessel. Skipper Edward O'Neill of Carmel, Calif., said, "This old baby just shook all over." But the Conqueror churned to Saigon, suffering two men wounded.

In South Vietnam U.S. Air Force B52 Stratofortresses struck three times. They dumped scores of tons of bombs on a Communist troop concentration spotted by U.S. Army troops near the coast 280 miles northwest of Saigon. They plastered a Communist base camp area near the Cambodian border 80 miles north of Saigon. They struck a troop concentration along the northern coast.

Dodd Testifies On Own Behalf At Senate Inquiry

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Thomas A. Dodd took the stand in his own defense today and blamed most of his tangled financial woes on an unfriendly state Democratic organization in Connecticut.

Testifying before a Senate Ethics Committee on his use of campaign funds, the white-haired lawmaker declared: "I have had to go it alone as best I could."

Dodd made the statement when asked by Chairman John C. Stennis, D-Miss., to explain a series of loans repaid by Dodd in 1965 from the proceeds of testimonial functions. The fundraising affairs have figured prominently in the committee's inquiry into his conduct.

"I got into a hole in 1966 and I never was able to get out," Dodd told Stennis.

Dodd told his colleagues he could not recall specifically whether the loans were for campaign or personal matters.

Then in a soft voice, he told the investigators that he defined the term personal to mean "living matters...all my living matters were political."

"Almost everything I did since 1956 until this moment was intertwined with politics. My life for 11 years has been so political it has been nothing else."

I rarely remember a time when I did anything that was strictly personal...that was rare."

Stennis asked: "You say the time was rare when you used money for personal matters?"

Dodd: "Yes, that's right it was rare. That's the kind of life I led in politics. I don't know any other way."

More Bomb Targets May Be Approved

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's forthcoming Guam conference is expected to produce an order for another turn of the screw intensifying military pressure on Hanoi and the Viet Cong.

According to authorities here, this will consist of adding a few more industrial targets to the list to be attacked by Navy and Air Force planes and plotting the most effective use of troop reinforcements being sent into the conflict.

Suspended Assistant DA Indicted in Probe

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Lee Andrews, a suspended Louisiana prosecutor who told the Warren Commission he had been approached to represent Lee Harvey Oswald shortly after President Kennedy was murdered, has been indicted for perjury.

Andrews, who was free on \$1,000 bond today, was the first person connected in any way with the Garrison investigation to be indicted in the case. He was suspended Wednesday from his post as assistant district attorney of Jefferson Parish (county) and surrendered to authorities Thursday night.

Meanwhile, a preliminary hearing to determine whether Andrews had enough evidence to bring businessman Clay L. Shaw to trial for conspiracy to assassinate Kennedy continued.

Perry R. Russo, 25, a Baton Rouge, La., insurance salesman, ended three days of testimony Thursday. He said he had heard Shaw, Oswald and David Ferrie plot to kill the President. Russo also said Garrison had him hypnotized prior to questioning.

Andrews, in an interview with television station EDSU-TV, said he did not know why he had been indicted by the New Orleans Grand Jury, but added he had expected it.

Andrews had been before the grand jury Thursday and had been subpoenaed before it March 9. The grand jury indicated the alleged false statements were made during these appearances.

"I testified to the best of my ability," he said. "Garrison has an alleged plot under investigation. I have no knowledge of such a plot. I did the best to tell the truth. They just called it the other way."

Andrews told Garrison and the Warren Commission a man who identified himself as "Clay Bertrand" called him shortly after Oswald was arrested and asked that he go to Dallas to defend Oswald. Andrews said he was ill at the time and could not take the case.

Garrison has claimed that Clay Bertrand and Clay Shaw are the same man.

Another figure Thursday entered the increasingly complex atmosphere surrounding the probe. Arthur E. Strout, 26, a Boston dishwasher reportedly flew to New Orleans Thursday night.

The Boston traveler said Thursday Strout had a picture of Oswald and Jack Ruby together in Ruby's nightclub a month before Kennedy's assassination.

Before leaving the stand Thursday Russo testified: "Ferrie had outlined several assassination plots using two or three men. Some of the assassins would, 'of necessity,' have to be sacrificed. Russo reported Ferrie as saying: "—He had no violent feelings against President Kennedy and contributed nothing to the plot.

State Minimum Wage Crusade Now Buried in Subcommittee

AUSTIN (UPI)—The crusade for a \$1.25 state minimum wage, which began with a South Texas union movement and came to Austin in an historic 485-mile Labor Day march, today lay buried in a subcommittee of five unympathetic West Texans.

House Labor Committee chairman Gene Hendryx of Alpine Thursday put the bill in a subcommittee headed by Rep. W. S. Healy of Pecos. Other members are Reps. Richard Slack of Pecos, J. M. Simpson of Amarillo, Daiwin Jones of Lubbock and Ralph Wayne of Plainview.

Minimum-wage supporters did not expect to be welcomed by the legislature with open arms, but they hardly were prepared for the treatment they received.

First the Senate hearing on the minimum wage, scheduled for Wednesday night, was postponed until Thursday morning because the Senate was locked in a filibuster over a city sales tax.

When Thursday morning came, the Senate Labor Committee chairman, David Ratliff of Stamford, was too weary to hold the hearing, so he postponed it indefinitely. The filibuster had ended about an hour after dawn Thursday.

Rep. Barbara Jordan of Houston, vice chairman of Ratliff's committee, tried to go on without him but was stymied. So she held a mock-hearing to let minimum wage backers release some of the enthusiasm built up by a march and rally Wednesday night.

They finally got a hearing Thursday afternoon in the House Labor Committee.

Hendryx called in the Department of Public Safety to make sure there would be no candles, flags or demonstrations while the hearing was going on.

He limited each side to one hour, which kept 13 proponents and nearly as many opponents from testifying.

With a few exceptions, the committee's questions were hostile.

Witnesses for farm and hotel groups testified that a minimum wage would force them to lay off workers.

"Although you would be giving higher wages to a few, you would be putting many out of work," said Gilbert Ellis of Mission, a witness for the Texas Citrus Mutual.

State AFL-CIO president H. S. Brown called these statements "lies," and noted that Texas has more people living in poverty than any other state in the nation.

Irish Celebrating St. Pat's Day Despite Inflated Prices

DUBLIN (UPI)—The sturdy sons of Erin praised St. Patrick and other greats of Dublin's history today with frothy pints of stout that sometimes sloshed on fragile shamrocks as dearily priced as an Irish rose.

As in the days when Lord Nelson's monument towered in O'Connell Street, there was bawling and brawling and balladeering and the names of Joyce and Moore and Burke and Emmet and Kennedy drifted in lilting brogue out of smoky pubs.

Loyd Nelson dominates O'Connell Street no more—a bit of explosive, from the outlawed Irish Republican Army took care of that last year—and one thing more was not a thing changed.

The price of the little shamrock, the national green, was seven cents higher this year.

As if the Irish hadn't troubles enough with rising costs and unemployment this year, the shamrock crop was down.

By the time the usual large quantities were shipped off to America, Europe, Africa and the British Commonwealth to be sported on lapels by citizens whose Irish comes in a bottle, there were relatively few left for the natives.

The celebration of the national feast honors the saint who brought Christianity to Ireland 1,500 years ago—and who made the shamrock what it is today by plucking one from a crack in a castle floor to explain the Holy Trinity to a heathen king.

PROMISES

I am convinced that most people today are acquainted with some of the wonderful promises of God. A promise is defined as a declaration that one will do or refrain from doing something specified. When God speaks to us through his Word, the Bible, we can be very sure that what he said will be.

God promised that the seed of women would give a death blow to Satan (Gen. 3:15). True to his promise, God sent his Son to free us from death and make us heirs of eternal life. (Gal. 4:4-5). God promised that the world would never be destroyed by water again as it was in the time of Noah (Gen. 9:12-17). So it has been.

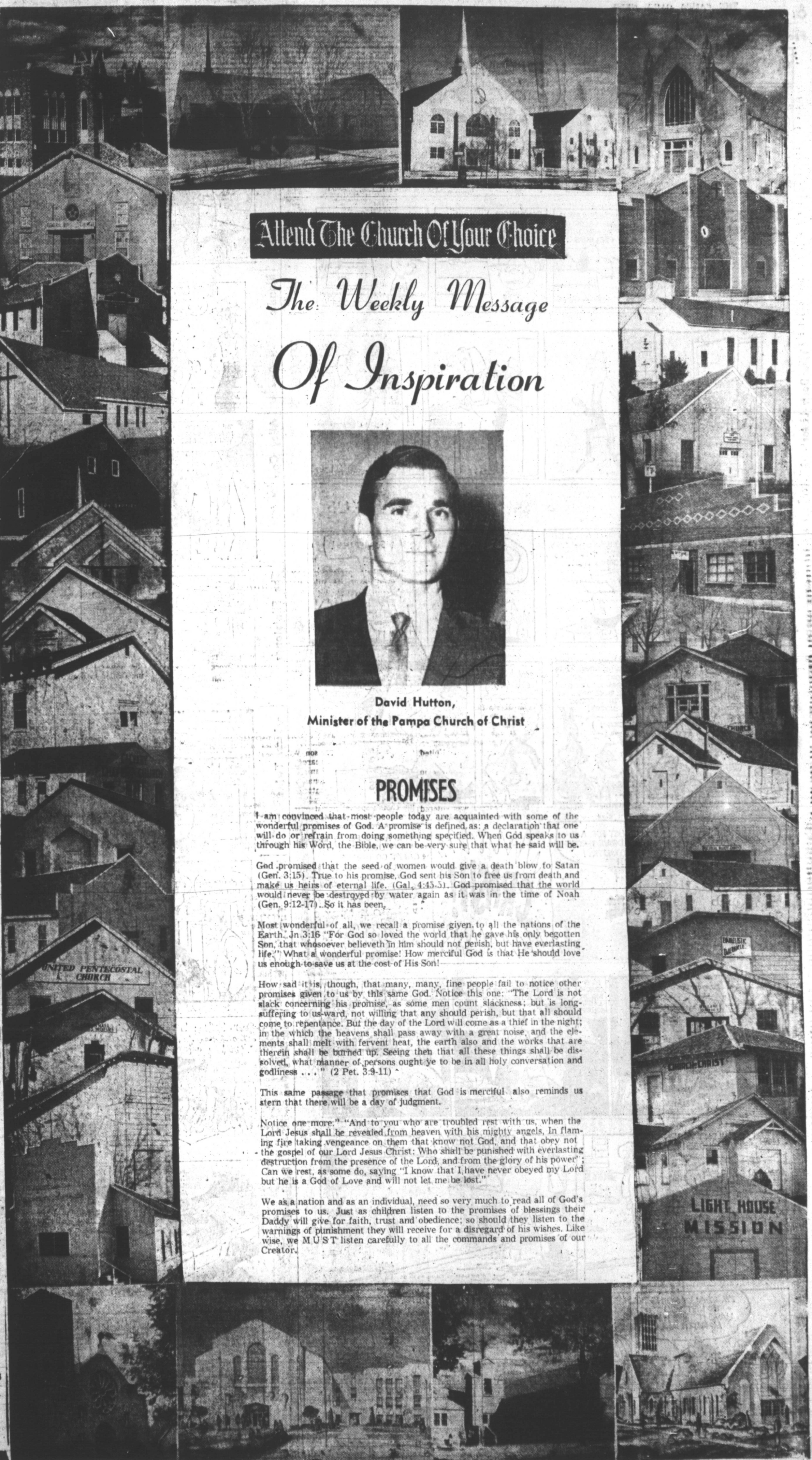
Most wonderful of all, we recall a promise given to all the nations of the Earth. In 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." What a wonderful promise! 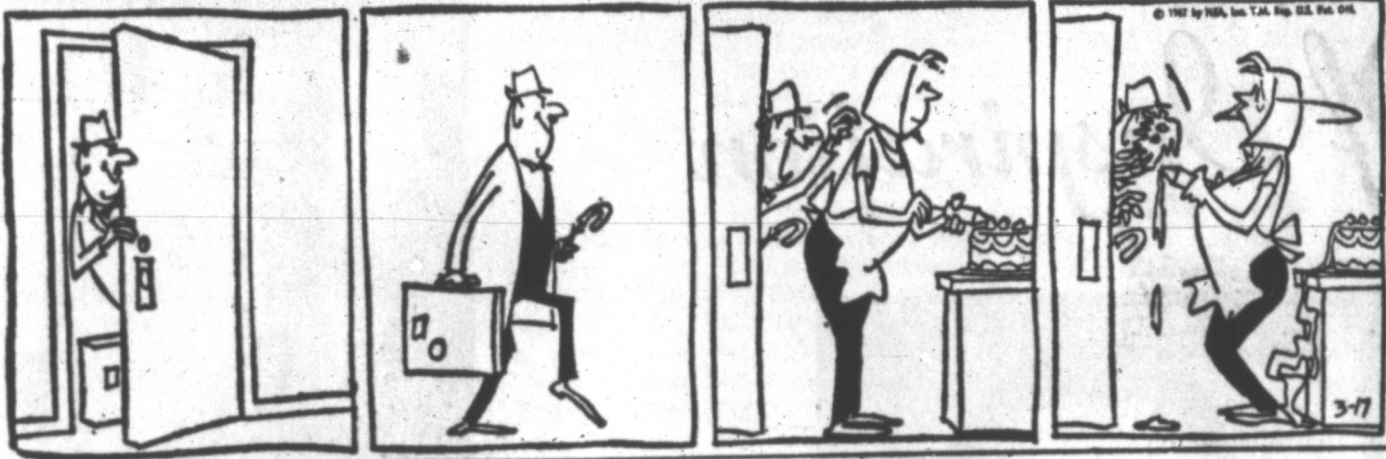

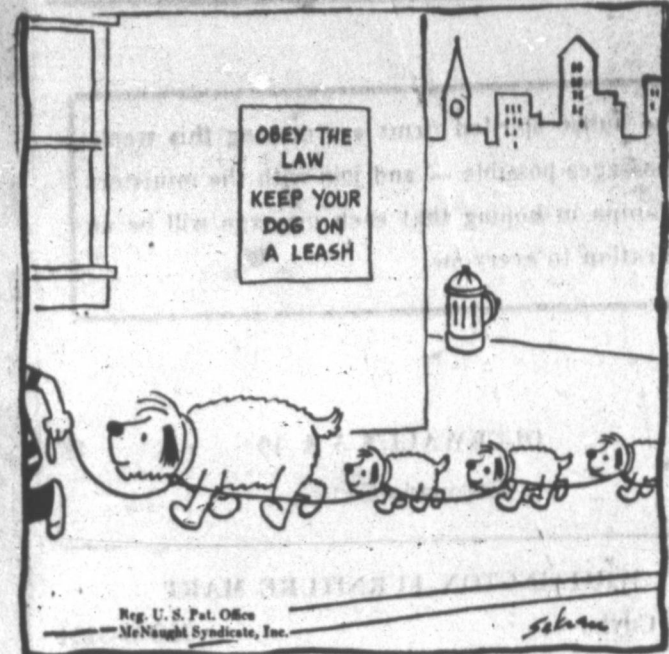

NCAA Basketball

Roundballers After Championship Title

Fifteen of the best teams in the country begin their chase of a living legend tonight when the regional semi-finals are contested in the NCAA basketball championships.

Lew Alcindor, a mere babe of a sophomore, is the giant in short pants who must be cut down if favored UCLA is to be denied its third NCAA crown in four years. The mighty Bruins were unbeaten in 26 games this season and were ranked No. 1 in the nation.

The 7-foot, 1-inch Alcindor was well rewarded for the punishment inflicted upon him by rival players in his first collegiate season when he was named to the All-America team and then selected as the player of the year.

A doubleheader will be played at each of four sites tonight with the survivors meeting Saturday night in the regional finals. The four remaining teams then will get together at Louisville, Ky., next weekend to decide the national champion.

The six top-ranking teams in the country and nine of the first 12 are among the 16 contending squads and it will be interesting to see how well the Bruins, who start four sophomores in their lineup, stand up to the continued pressure of top-flight competition.

UCLA opens tonight with what should be a breather—a Wyoming team which lost 10 of its first 16 games this season and wound up with an unglamorous 13-12 record. In the other half of the Western regional—at Corvallis, Ore., defending NCAA champion Texas Western (2-5) ranked No. 8, meets 16th-ranked University of Pacific (23-3).

The pairings of tonight's other games are:
Eastern regional at College Park, Md.—Third-ranked North Carolina (24-4) vs. fifth ranked Princeton (24-2) and 10th-ranked Boston College (20-2) vs. 11th-ranked St. John's (3-3).
Midwest regional at Lawrence, Kan.—Second-ranked Louisville (23-3) vs. Southern Methodist (19-5) and fourth-ranked Kansas (23-3) vs. sixth-ranked Houston (24-31).
Mid-east regional at Evanston, Ill.—Tennessee (21-5) vs. Dayton (21-5) and Indiana (17-7) vs. Virginia Tech (18-6).

In addition to Alcindor, Westley Unseld of Louisville and Elvin Hayes of Houston were All-America selections. Butch Beard of Louisville and Sonny Dove of St. John's both were named to the second team.

Louisville, with its potent 1-2 punch of Unseld and Beard, is given the best chance of upending UCLA. But the Cardinals first will have to survive the regional playoffs and may even run into trouble against SMU, whose starting five all are averaging in double figures.

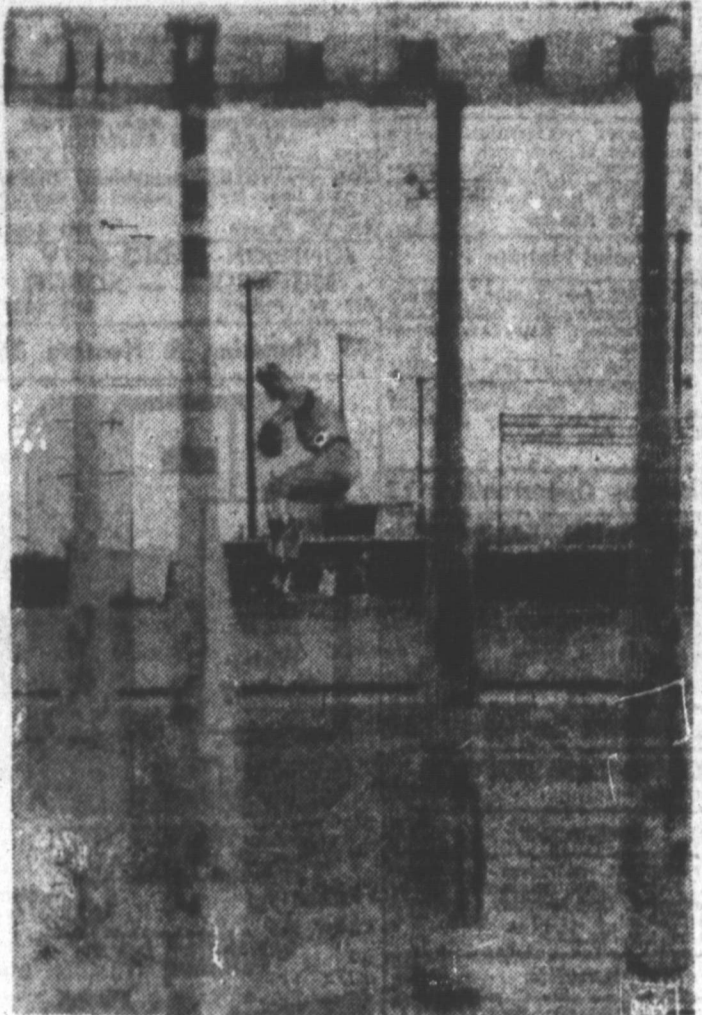
NAIA Clash Ends Tonight
