Player Changes, Decides to Relax

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — Gary Player is an Indian giver. He practically gave up his entire life for golf; now he's taking it back.

Always intense and preoccupied heretofore, the 31 year old, little South African muscle-builder now ranks as possible the most relaxed entrant in the heterogeneous 84-man masters' field.

"My values have changed," he smiles. "My values have changed a great deal."

Winning used to mean everything to him. Now, Player hasn't won a tournament in 22 months and it doesn't disturb him at all.

How could it possibly bother a man who already has won the U.S. Open, the Masters, the British Open and the PGA? How could it possibly bother a man who had only a nickel in his pocket when he won the U.S. Open two years ago and then turned over his first prize check of \$25,000 to charity?

When Player first came over to these shores 10 years ago, the only thing in his life that mattered was golf. It was his whole life, in fact.

"I was practicing at Greenbriar one day and this radio announcer came over to me," Player recalled. "He said, 'Young fellow, you look as if you have a whole lot of desire. How long do you intend to keep this up?'"

"Until I drop, I told him." That was the way Player used to go at it. No more.

He still enjoys the game tremendously but prefers to limit his appearances on the tour and spend his time with his wife and children in South Africa, instead. They mean much more to him than golf.

Player, a Masters' winner in 1961, knows his chances aren't as bright as they once were when he tees off in the first round Thursday. It doesn't annoy him at all. He knows how a man's game can fall apart if

he doesn't stay at it.

Like Marriage
"Golf is a lot like a marriage," he said. "You're excited about it the first day. You hold hands, you feed each other and all that sort of thing. Six years later, though, what have you got? Two newspapers at the breakfast table."

"That's the way a marriage can go on the rocks. The same applies to golf. If you don't work on your marriage, it goes on the rocks. And if you don't work on your golf, the exact same thing happens."

Player's game hasn't gone that far back, of course. On any given day he's still capable of beating the best of them. Somehow, though, the whole business doesn't seem to mean that much to him. Not like it once did, anyway.

"I've seen one of these ex-champions," Player said, being careful not to mention the man's name. "All he ever cared about was playing golf and practicing. He still does."

TRACK TO NOWHERE

Horses Rest Amid Strike

By United Press International. NEW YORK (UPI)—Aqueduct was a track leading to nowhere today as the thoroughbreds were forced to take the day off amid speculation that a horsemen's strike would curtail action for the rest of the week.

The racing secretary's staff was available, however, just in case of rapid settlement made necessary the immediate filling of the entry box for a Thursday program.

"Decent purses for decent fields" has been the cry of the horsemen in recent years as they attempted to get an increased part of the action with a demand for one per cent more of the betting take.

Purses have not been raised on New York ovals in 15 years, finally causing racehorse owners and trainers to demand their share be elevated to a parity secured at some of the other major strips in the country.

Members of the New York Benevolent and Protective Association voted Monday night to Benevolent and Protective Association "strike" if their demands were not met. The horsemen's move was prompted when the State Assembly adjourned without passing a bill which would have allowed them an additional one-half percent of the mutual handle.

An affirmative vote in the New York Senate was countered

by a negative response in the Assembly just before the legislative session ended Sunday and nothing was done to answer the HBPA's plea for more money. The Senate had passed the measure by a 54-2 vote, but the Assembly failed to heed Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's warning that failure to authorize the earmarked one-half of one per cent of the betting for additional purses would be disastrous.

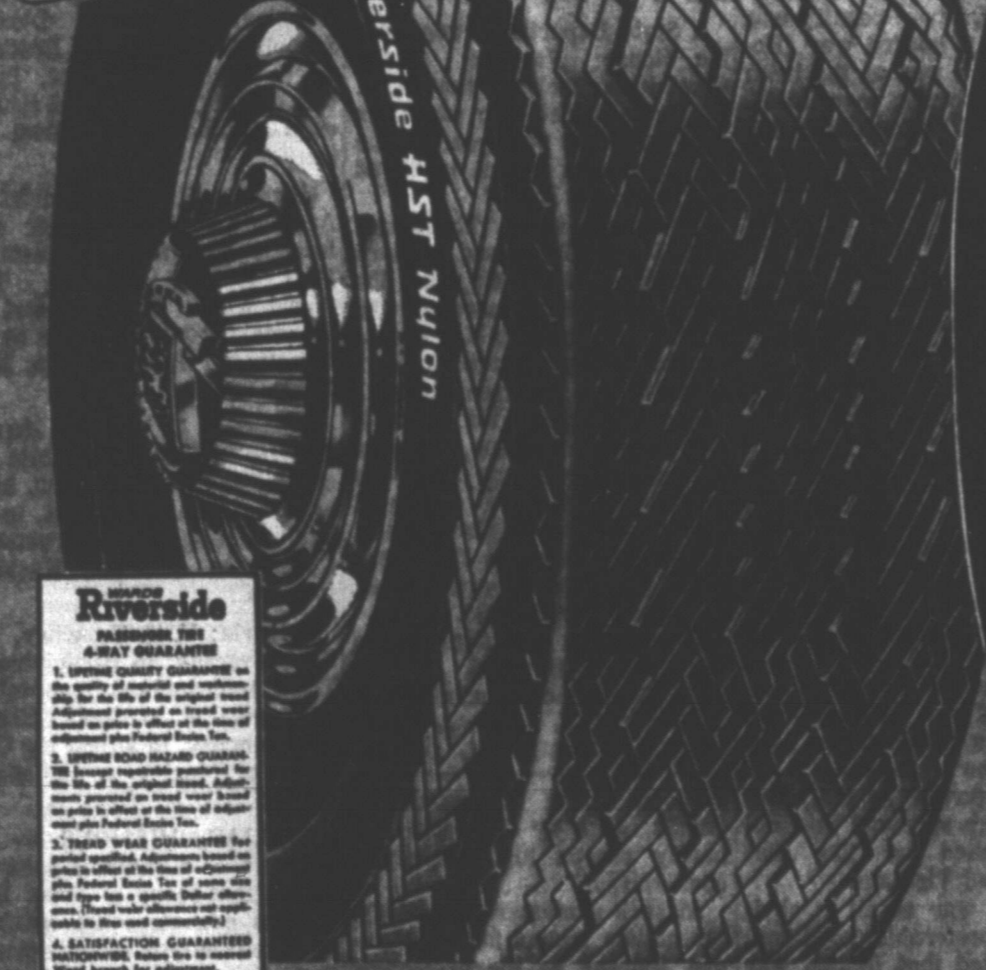
The HBPA thus refused to enter any horses when the entry box opened Tuesday and there was nothing in the till when it closed 7 1/2 hours later at 2:30 p.m. CT.

Instead, the HBPA went back to its original demand for one per cent, doubling the figure members would have accepted if both legislative houses had passed the bill.

The state will lose an estimated \$347,000 daily because the betting windows are closed. Attempts to open them may require a recall of the legislature for an emergency session.

The Jockey's guild has thrown its support in the strike. Frank E. Mackie Jr., president of the HPBA, has promised the full backing of the national body in efforts by the New York division to gain its ends. The organization represents 97 per cent of the owners and trainers in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

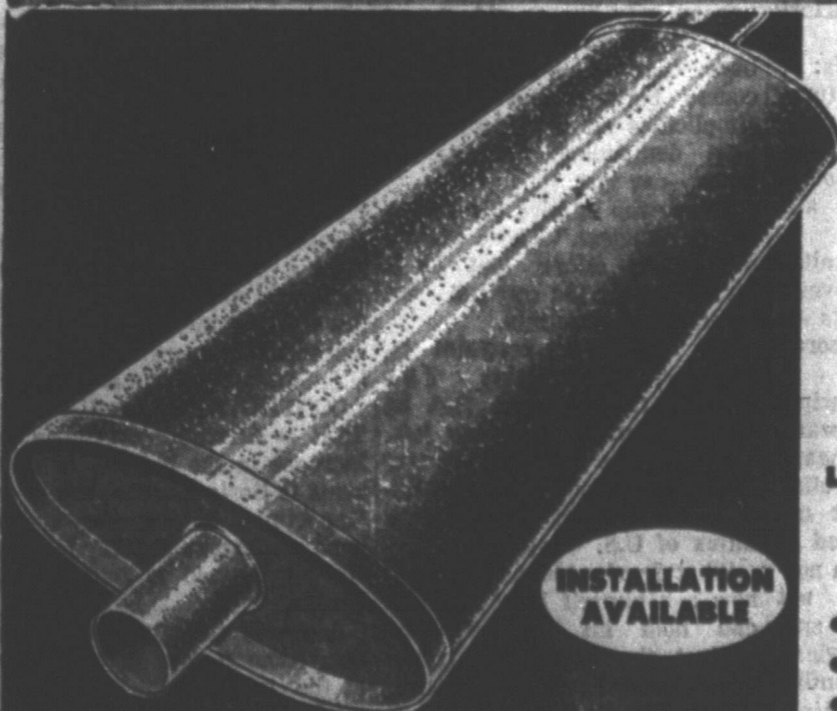

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Foreign Commentary

MOSCOW (UPI)—Recent affirmative developments in American-Soviet relations have led diplomatic observers to wonder whether peace is slowly breaking out between the two nuclear super-powers.

Senate confirmation of the USA-Soviet consular treaty and the beginning of American-Soviet talks in Moscow on President Johnson's offer to limit anti-ballistic missiles have pointed up the thaw in diplomatic relations between the two countries.

Other previous straws in the end were conclusion of a long delayed airlines agreement; extension of the cultural exchange treaty; and release of a young American sentenced to three years in a Soviet labor camp.

Of special significance has been the appointment of the Moscow Embassy of Llewelyn G. Thompson, America's top government Soviet affairs ex-

perts and one of Washington's most skillful negotiators.

Recalls Past
 The development would have been of almost routine character if normally friendly relations prevailed between Washington and Moscow.

But it should be recalled that only a year ago Soviet party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev said that the war in Vietnam had frozen relations between the two countries.

And Premier Alexei N. Kosygin then was accusing Johnson of hypocrisy for simultaneously professing good will towards the Soviet Union and "waging aggression" against a Soviet ally.

Moscow last year also cancelled a scheduled Soviet-U.S. track meet in Los Angeles and a Soviet tour of the American musical review "Hello, Dolly!"

Though relations were steadily sliding to new lows, each side studiously avoided slamming the door on eventual accommodation.

Kosygin was telling the Supreme Soviet that problems of the moment must not be allowed to influence long range policy and Johnson never failed to urge ending the cold war and relations.

No Joint Action
 The bombing of North Vietnam a little more than two years ago while Kosygin was visiting Hanoi and further escalation since have failed to bring the Soviet and Red Chinese together for joint action.

On the contrary, the split between the two Communist giants has reached such proportions that, at least in Chinese propaganda, the Soviet Union has replaced the U.S. as "public enemy number one."
