

City Manager Says State Laws Make Collection Expensive Item

A report released today by City Tax Assessor-Collector Aubrey Jones shows the City of Pampa had collected up to Feb. 1 a total of \$707,542.88 of the \$759,260.16 city tax levy for fiscal 1966.

On the current tax roll this would mean that 93.19 per cent of current collections had been made as of Jan. 31 this year. Taxes after that date became delinquent in the amount of \$51,717.28.

The report showed delinquent taxes collected in the report period October 1966 through

January 1967 amounted to \$8,586.60. Of that total, \$6,796.15 was for real estate and \$1,792.45 for personal property.

The current collection is slightly above the percentage for the three previous years. One year ago the percentage was 93.08, two years ago it was 92.60 and three years ago, 91.64.

Of Pampa's \$759,260 total tax levy for the 1966-67 fiscal year, \$606,619 was on real estate and \$152,640 on personal property.

An audit of city tax records by Nensiel & Doggett, public accountants, reveals that Pampa has a total of \$230,328.29 in de-

linquent taxes dating back to 1927.

Of that total the audit shows, \$9,110.91 in unpaid taxes prior to and including Dec. 31, 1939, never can be collected because of legislation adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1965 which forever bars collection of delinquent taxes prior to that date.

This would reduce the amount of Pampa's legally collectible delinquent taxes to \$221,217.38.

Why isn't something done about collecting nearly a quarter million dollars in delinquent taxes?

City Manager Jim White has

an answer to the question. He says collecting the delinquent taxes presents an expensive legal problem that in many cases actually would cost more money than the city would realize from the tax recovered.

"The delinquent taxes still on the rolls have accumulated in the last 40 years," White said. "Much of it is on vacant property where the owners and heirs are unknown. Much of it is property of no value. Then, too, the publication of legal notices and the work connected with attempting to bring abstracts up to date would, in

many cases, run into money that would be more than we could collect in back taxes."

The city manager pointed out that much of the \$51,717.28 delinquency for the current period will be collected between now and the end of the fiscal year in September.

That \$51,717 tax delinquency for 1966 is broken down into \$41,266 on real estate and \$10,450 on personal property.

White said practically all cities are "in the same boat" with Pampa on the collection of delinquent tax money.

The city manager said much of the delinquent tax problem is due to inadequate legislation at the state level.

"Tax legislation needs to be updated," White said, "allowing a city to collect back taxes by putting property on the auction block under a much less expensive process and improving titles after property has been sold."

"As it is now, on small accounts it is too expensive for the city to file individual tax suits and pay for all the other legal work that goes with it," White said.

The city manager pointed out, however, that every means now feasible will be used to collect delinquent taxes.

He said Pampa's bond rating is affected by the amount of the delinquent taxes showing on the tax roll.

"Although some of it has been cancelled out by the State Legislature and much of it is financially not feasible to try to collect," he said, "the full amount, dating back from 40 years ago, always is brought forward in the current totals when tax reports are filed each (See TAXES, Page 3)

LBJ Says Bombing Is Fulfilling U.S. Aims

McNamara Disagrees; Infiltration Continues

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson believes that the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam is fulfilling allied aims, despite a report from Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara that it has not slowed down infiltration.

Administration sources said that the Chief Executive does not feel his position on the bombings conflicts with what McNamara recently told a Senate committee hearing.

Vessels, Evans Returned to Cells In County Jail

Thomas Ray Vessels, 21, convicted Pampa rapist, and Zane Leonard Evans, indicted for a store robbery last June, were back in Gray County jail today.

The pair was brought back yesterday afternoon from Amarillo after spending 12 days in Potter County jail where they were transferred following discovery of a plot to break out of the county jail here.

Vessels and Evans were two of four prisoners involved in the alleged jailbreak plan. Terry Nichols and Charles R. Blumrich, convicted in 31st District Court on robbery charges three weeks ago and sentenced to five years each in the state penitentiary, still were in the Carson County jail at Panhandle where they were removed after the plot to break jail in Pampa was uncovered.

Gray County Sheriff Rufe Jordan said today Vessels and Evans were placed in the same maximum security cell in the local jail where the prisoners had cut off a hinge to an emergency door and partially removed a steel plate at the top of a shaft housing plumbing fixtures. The sheriff said repairs had been made in the cell and (See VESSELS, Page 3)

Troops Suffer Heavy Losses

SAIGON (UPI) — A company of U.S. infantrymen was attacked by Viet Cong guerrillas today and sustained heavy casualties in a battle so fierce Americans fired upon their own tanks to drive off Communist soldiers who were climbing up the sides.

The company, usually about 200 men, received "heavy" casualties spokesman said. This means the number of dead and wounded was so considerable the unit no longer could accomplish its mission.

The Communist attack smacked of vengeance. The guerrilla unit, of undetermined strength, was presumably part of a Viet Cong force which had sustained heavy losses to the U.S. infantrymen in Operation Sam Houston. There was no estimate of Communist casualties in the attack.

More than 150 miles to the south of the area, U.S. B52 bombers staged four successive raids early today on suspected enemy concentrations in War Zone C—a Cambodian border region believed to be national headquarters of the Viet Cong.

Recently when the Stratofortresses struck a single region with such force, it signaled the part of a major ground campaign by U.S. and Allied troops. American infantrymen in the war zone concluded one operation, Gadsden, at midnight Tuesday.

Mao Foes Steal Secret Papers

HONG KONG (UPI) — Reports from Red China today indicated that foes of Mao Tse-tung have been stealing top secret state documents, possibly to use in the struggle against the aging party chairman.

Japanese newsmen in Peking said wall posters warned Mao's enemies that the Army and secret police will be called in "if persuasion fails to prevent" further stealing.

Management of document rooms (in all government offices) should be revolutionary rebels "pro-Mao groups," the posters said. Guilty parties were also urged to return what they had taken from state offices.

The wall newspapers did not say what kind of secret documents were missing, but today's report followed recent disclosure that highly classified information dealing with Red China's nuclear program had been stolen from the state council building.

The atomic documents disappeared after Red Guards and other Peking demonstrators had ransacked the official offices. It was the first reported case of atomic espionage in China.

Shortly after the incident, Peking leaders warned Red Guards and others to keep their hands off government buildings, but today's reports indicated the warning fell on deaf ears.

In another development, Peking Radio said the ruling party's central committee has ordered Army troops into the countryside to help the peasants with the important spring planting.

Sukarno Gives Up Struggle To Retain Office

JAKARTA (UPI) — President Sukarno today gave up his struggle to retain a vestige of command in Indonesia and turned over all executive power to army strongman Gen. Suharto.

Information Minister B. H. Diah read newsmen a statement containing Sukarno's capitulation.

In it, Sukarno said he had decided to give up the powers of the presidency after "realizing the current conflict."

Sukarno's position had been crumbling since the abortive Communist attempt in October, 1965 to overthrow the government. He had been largely a figurehead president for several months, with power centered on Suharto as leader of a three-man triumvirate.

More recently, he had come under increasingly heavy pressure to step down because of his alleged connection with the Communist coup attempt.

Sukarno's statement, as read by Diah, said he realized that "the current conflict must be ended for the sake of the people, the nation and the state."

Suharto's government had been plagued for weeks with the problem of what to do with Sukarno, who retains a large following among the Indonesian people.

Eight Committee Members Decide On Powell, Ninth Not Convinced

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Eight members of a congressional committee trying to decide what to do about Adam Clayton Powell worked today to reach agreement with the ninth.

Five Democrats and four Republicans on the special panel met today and will continue "until we are through," in the words of their chairman, Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y.

By Thursday midnight the committee must submit its recommendations to the House on whether Powell should be restored to the seat from which he was temporarily ousted on Jan. 10, and whether he should be subject to any punishment.

The House is to act on the recommendations next Tuesday. The lone holdout against a unanimous decision was reported to be Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., who said Tuesday that Powell's offenses were so serious he should be seated and then expelled.

SWPS Enlisting Aid To Bring In New Industries

A "Prosperity Through You" program is being launched by the Southwestern Public Service Company to enlist the aid of the electric company's customers and employees to attract new industries to Pampa and other communities in which they live.

The customers and employees will receive a "Prosperity Through You" prospect card with their March electric service statement. In Pampa, if they have any information at all on an industry that would be interested in locating here, they are requested to fill in the blanks on the card and bring it to the local Chamber of Commerce office in the Hughes Bldg. or to the Southwestern Public Service Co. office, 315 N. Ballard.

Industrial development has many times resulted from the actions of one individual. Larry Milner, SWPS industrial development manager, said, "Just the slightest rumor has led, on many occasions, to the establishment of an industry which was economically important to a community. This type of approach will obviously lead to some blind alleys, but it is equally obvious that, with the cooperation of all of us, it can also produce some valuable industrial prospects."

Plans for following up on the leads provided by the "Prosperity Through You" program call for an evaluation of the tip by local business leaders and then some type of contact with the prospect suggested by the local resident.

Southwestern Public Service Company announced establishment of a new industrial development department last fall. Since that time, the department has been accumulating economic information about communities in its service area in order that it will be able to provide industrial prospects with factual information. Prosperity Through You is the first program in what will be an expanded industrial development effort.

Connally Completes Draft of Drink Bill

AUSTIN (UPI) — Gov. John Connally has completed a draft of his liquor by the drink bill and may have it introduced in the house today, sources indicated.

Several names are being mentioned for the possible author of the controversial legislation, including Rep. W. C. Sherman of Fort Worth and Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah. However, Healy is a confirmed dry and has opposed liberalizing liquor laws in the past.

U.S. Sen John Tower addressed a joint session of the legislature today. Tower recently returned from a tour of the war area in Vietnam, and was expected to touch on some of his observations there.

GM Begins Shutdown Of Plant

DETROIT (UPI) — General Motors Corp. began shutting down its automotive operations today, because of a wildcat strike at one plant. The shutdown could idle more than 100,000 employees by Friday.

Nearly 30,000 workers at 11 plants were laid off beginning Tuesday night. At least 12,000 more were scheduled for layoff tonight, perhaps the numbers would spread to thousands more.

The layoffs spread rapidly through the factory system of the world's largest manufacturer, which employs about 700,000 persons. Plant after plant ran into a parts pinch touched off, the company said, by a wildcat walkout at a Fisher body parts factory in Mansfield, Ohio.

The strike appeared no closer to settlement than when it started last Wednesday. The 2,300 striking workers, member of a United Auto Workers Union local which ignored pleas from UAW President Walter P. Reuther that they return to their jobs, voted unanimously Tuesday night to continue their strike.

"GM has refused to talk or sit down to discuss the situation," said Robert Hall, president of the local. "We are going to stay off until they show good faith."

GM countered that since the strike was illegal—a position seconded by Reuther—no negotiations could be held until the men returned to work. The result was a stalemate which crippled the big company.

News Censorship Is Hit in Speck Trial

PEORIA, Ill. (UPI) — Richard Franklin Speck's trial on charges of slaying eight young nurses may be interrupted even before a jury is selected because of controversial news coverage restrictions.

The Tribune Company, publisher of the Chicago Tribune and other newspapers, filed suit Tuesday with the Illinois Supreme Court, charging Judge Herbert C. Paschen's news coverage "guidelines" amount to "judicial censorship and prior restraints upon freedom of speech."

A resolution condemning the restrictions was being prepared for consideration by the Illinois legislature today.

"Washington's birthday will be a good time to take up the resolution which launches a defense of American freedom of the press," said House Majority Leader William E. Pollack.

Paschen, who came with the trial when it was moved from Chicago to Peoria, refused comment and kept jury selection proceedings going. Three jurors were tentatively chosen by day's end Tuesday.

The suit asks the Supreme Court to summon Paschen for a hearing. A member of the high court said he expected the tribunal to "act promptly on the matter," probably in the next few days.

Arkansas Inmates Will No Longer Be Whipped

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — Prisoners at Tucker Prison Farm will no longer feel the lash of a leather strap for punishment. Thomas O. Murton, 38, who took over as assistant prison superintendent in charge of the farm Monday, said the whip would no longer be used to punish inmates. He said he planned to take away their privileges in-

stead. Murton, a former associate professor of criminology at Southern Illinois University, was hired last week to replace Pink Booher, the assistant superintendent whom Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller fired recently along with three wardens.

He said he realized the prisoners had few privileges, but he would use what they did have as a lever to control trouble-

makers. Rockefeller, who called the prison system one of the worst in the nation in his inaugural address, later released a state police report describing tortures and other mistreatment of prisoners.

Murton said most of his first week would be spent studying the operation of the farm. "It will take most of the week to find out how many worms there are in the can," he said.

News reports received here quote a newspaper in Moscow as quoting wall posters in China as declaring that "love is a petty bourgeois prejudice, a vice of capitalism."

A Waste of Time
According to these reports, the Red Guard is urging the Chinese to stop "wasting time on daydreams and sentimental conversations and put it to greater use by studying the words of chairman Mao."

This obviously is what is causing so much opposition to the cultural revolution. It imposes impossible conditions on courtships.

I mean, a guy certainly isn't going to get very far if he tries to woo a girl under the light of a full moon.

Or, say they are alone together in his apartment. The lights are low and he turns on the radio for soft music. As they settle down on the sofa, China's No. 1 crooner sings: "Can it be the trees that fill the breeze with rare and magic perfume? Oh, no, it isn't the trees. It's Mao in bloom."

Kill The Romance
If that doesn't kill the romance, the next number "Mao is a Many Splendored Thing" will.

In the unlikely event that something does develop, the fact that he doesn't make much money won't matter. They can always get married and live on Mao.

The Red Guard also recommends that married couples "develop a struggle of two ideologies" and a "permanent atmosphere of criticism," rather than striving for wedded bliss.

This shows how far behind the Chinese have fallen under Mao's leadership.

National Window

Nebraska is the most populous of 15 states in the federal Union which are in jeopardy of being frozen out of any significant influence in presidential elections.

This freezeout would be accomplished more often than not if the smaller states of the Union fail to reject amendment of the Constitution to provide for direct presidential elections.

Political pressure is building for such an amendment. The 15 states most urgently interested are: Alaska, Arizona, Delaware, Idaho, Hawaii, Maine, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming.

Many other states, about half of them, have cause to distrust the direct presidential election procedure. For example: the presidential vote of any one of the 13 least populous states could be nullified by the packaged mass voting power of any one of the five most populous U.S. cities.

These states and their populations are: New York, 7,780,260; Chicago, 3,250,404; Los Angeles, 2,479,015; Philadelphia 2,002,512; Detroit, 1,670,144.

The most populous of the 15 states listed in the foregoing is Nebraska, 1,411,330. A president or presidential candidate could not probably be indifferent to the interests of small states, small towns.

To belabor the point that direct presidential elections would diminish the significance of rural and small town voters while increasing the already swollen political muscle of the urban masses, consider the political potential of four of the five counties or boroughs comprising the city of New York. The five are: Manhattan, 1,725,000; Bronx, 1,460,000; Brooklyn, 2,640,000; Queens 1,955,000; and Richmond, 260,000.

Any one of the first four compact city boroughs could outvote in a direct presidential election any one of the 15 least populous states or even several of the lesser states combined.

It is obvious that the mass packaged votes of the great cities would elect a substantial majority or, at the very least, a dominant minority of the House of Representatives. Make senators be chosen at-large nationally and the urban masses would possess the Senate as well.

The 15 least populous state, anyone of which could be politically emancipated in presidential politics by any one of the four most populous New York City counties, should not have to stand alone against this proposed rupture of constitutional procedure and tradition. Many the states have an instant, vital interest.

The trend, of course, has been for years toward urban domination of U.S. politics, notably presidential politics. This has been accompanied by a consistent deterioration of the great cities toward frightening depths.

Academy Award Nominees Picked

HOLLYWOOD — Richard Burton, who has never won an Oscar, and his wife Elizabeth Taylor, who has, both were nominated today for Academy Awards for the 39th academy presentations in April.

This year's nominations include more international flavor than any in Oscar's history. Nominated for best picture of the year were "Alfie," "A Man For All Seasons," "The Russians are Coming," "The Sand Pebbles," and "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?," in which the Burtons co-starred.

In addition to Miss Taylor, nominated actresses were Anouk Aimee, "A Man and a Woman"; Ida Kaminska, "The Shop on Main Street"; Lynn Redgrave, "Georgy Girl," and her sister, Vanessa Redgrave Morgan.

It is the first time sisters had been nominated for the same award in the same year since Olivia de Havilland and Joan Fontaine were proposed in 1941. Miss Fontaine won that year for "Suspicion."

Nominated for best performance by an actor, in addition to Burton, were Alan Arkin in "The Russians are Coming." Best supporting actor nominees were Mako — "The Sand Pebbles," James Mason — "Georgy Girl"; Walter Matthau — "The Fortune Cookie," George Segal, "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" and Robert Shaw, "A Man For All Seasons."

Best supporting actress nominees were Sandy Dennis in "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?," Wendy Hiller — "A Man For All Seasons," Vivienne Lagerde — "Hawaii, Vivian Merchant — "Alfie," and Geraldine Page, "You're a Big Boy Now."

SMU Smells Sweet Scent Of a Crown

Southern Methodist can almost touch its third straight South-west Conference Championship. One more step will do it.

And the Mustangs hope to make that step Saturday night over the Rice Owls.

SMU moved within one game of at least a tie for the SWC crown Tuesday night, defeating Arkansas 69-66 at Dallas.

That put the Mustangs at 9-2 in conference play, two full games in front of Texas Christian with only three contests re-

maining. TCU kept its chances for the title alive with an 83-47 victory over Rice in Fort Worth.

But Texas, which had gone in to Tuesday night's activity tied with TCU for second place, lost its second straight game—this one to Texas Tech 88-78. Texas A&M upset Baylor 71-69 in the other SWC encounter at College Station.

Denny Holman showed SMU the way Tuesday night, hitting 28 points. The Mustangs turned in a nearly flawless performance at the foul line, and needed to because Arkansas twice overcame an 11-point deficit to make a close game of it at the end.

Holman broke the game open with three quick field goals in the last 42 seconds of first half, giving SMU a lead they never gave up.

TCU, in drubbing Rice, set a Daniel-Meyer Coliseum rebound record, picking off 44 wayward shots. The game was loaded with turnovers, 21 for Rice and 19 for TCU, but the Frogs rebound superiority gave them a giant boost.

The Frogs led by as much as 21 points in the second half. Texas Tech broke open a close game with three minutes left on its home court, and dashed the Longhorns' title hopes.

The Raiders held a slim two-point margin with 2:51 left, and then built it to six on a pair of free shots and Vernon Paul's layup. Texas then committed a string of fouls trying to regain possession of the ball and Tech made eight straight free shots.

Terry Trippet was the big hero for Texas A&M Tuesday night. He drove in for a layup with five seconds left to give the Aggies their two-point win over Baylor.

The Bears had built a nine-point halftime lead and upped their margin to 17 points with 13 minutes remaining. But Baylor suddenly folded.

Other action in Texas Tuesday night saw Pan American control the backboard and run away from Corpus Christi 116-84; Trinity shoot out in front and drub Texas Lutheran 99-58; and Arlington State make six free throws in the last 56 seconds to defeat Abilene Christian 82-78.

NFL Makes Rule Against Blocking After Fair Catch

HONOLULU (UPI)—National Football League club officials have taken action to keep the punt receiver from getting a "cheap shot" at onrushing tacklers.

Mark Duncan, supervisor of the officiating, said that if a receiver who calls for a fair catch "initiates contact with an opposing player," he will be charged with a personal foul.

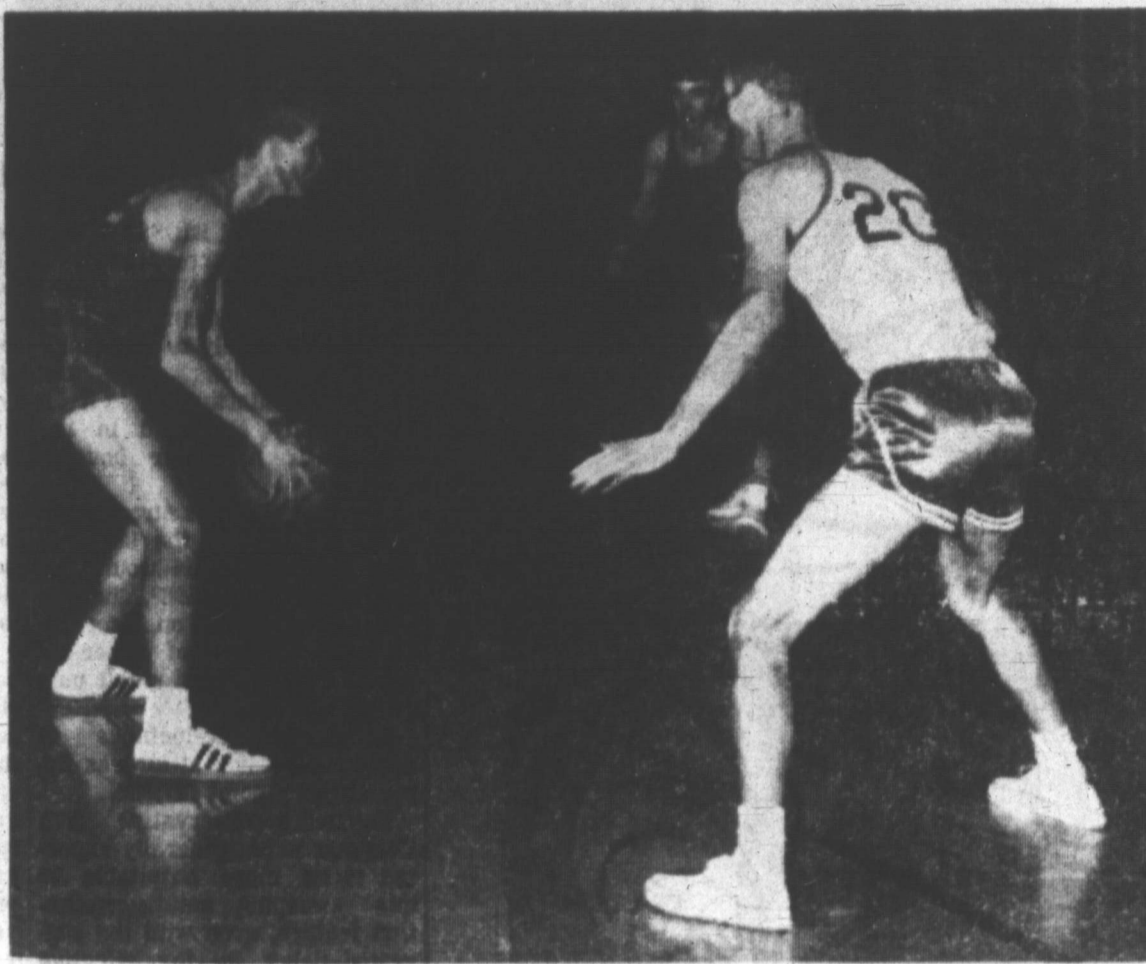
The rule, he added, would eliminate "the cheap shot" by players calling for a fair catch at onrushing opponents who have just "relaxed" after seeing a receiver waving his arms.

Celtics Rooting For Royals In East NBA Race

The Boston Celtics probably are the biggest rooters for Cincinnati to overtake New York in the race for the Eastern Division's third place playoff position.

There's a method to the Celtics' train of thought. Boston currently is eight games behind Philadelphia and most likely will wind up second at the current rate of progress. If New York finishes fourth in the division race, the Celts then meet the Knicks in the National Basketball Association playoffs.

Boston's thinking becomes more logical when it is realized the Beantown Boys have won 16 straight from New York, including Tuesday night's 143-114 victory that was settled with a spectacular 43-point second quarter. The loss cut New York's lead over Cincinnati to 2½ games.

Detroit clipped St. Louis 112-109 and San Francisco nipped Los Angeles 136-133 in the only other NBA action.

New York thought it had a good thing going with a 29-28 lead early in the second half. The roof fell in, however, with the explosive Celtic attack that started with a 13-2 tear. Sam Jones, major contributor to the onslaught, scored a game high of 27 points and Larry Siegfried tallied 25 for Boston. Dick Van Arsdale became the fourth Knick to go over the 1,000-point mark this season when he netted 24.

Two quick steals by Eddie Miles and Chico Vaughn provided Detroit with its upset over St. Louis. Miles, who scored 37 points, swiped the ball from Rod Thorn in the waning minutes to put Detroit in front and Vaughn's steal boosted the margin. Lou Hudson and Bill Bridges each scored 24 points for the Hawks.

AAU Makes Peace Move With NCAA

NEW YORK (UPI)—The AAU cleared the way for a major settlement in its long-time feud with the National Collegiate Athletic Association when it lifted the suspensions Tuesday of 11 foreign athletes.

Col. Donald F. Hull, executive director of the AAU, said his organization would make it possible "for the athletes to compete in all authorized competition without jeopardizing their amateur status."

Just hours before Hull's announcement, the Senate appointed sports arbitration panel created to settle the feud announced it would hold final hearings on the dispute April 6-7.

Theodore Kheel, chairman of the panel, further stated that he would issue a binding ruling within 10 days after the hearings.

Although the AAU took the very important first step, Hull warned that the "continued conduct of unsanctioned competition by any organization may get U.S. athletes as well as foreign student athletes permanently barred by the International Amateur Athletic Federation and the IAAF member in the countries concerned."

Hull stated that he was making the concession at the direction of AAU president David A. Matlin of Los Angeles. Matlin further instructed that the IAAF be notified that the permission to the restricted athletes to compete was being given on an "emergency basis" because several of the countries involved had not yet responded to the AAU.

"The AAU is again giving the athletes the benefit of doubt in order to continue the development of track and field in the United States as it—the AAU—has done for 89 years," Hull said. "We are continuing and shall continue to exercise our responsibilities under our authority as the IAAF member in the United States."

Boston College Eagles Anxious for NCAA Try

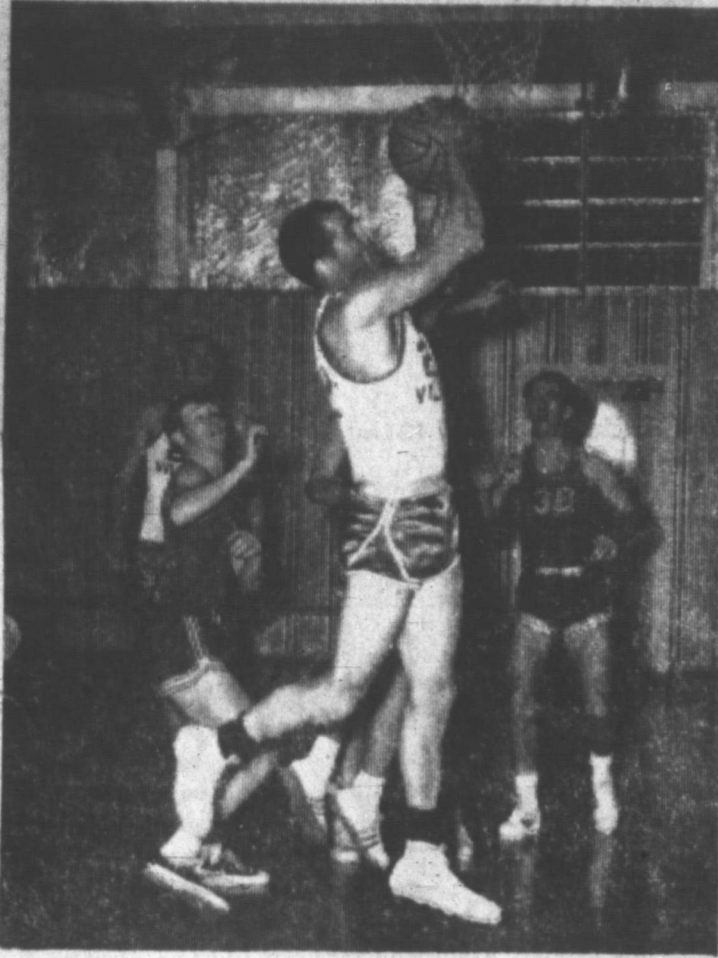

MIAMI (UPI) — Jim (Mudcat) Grant is about to beat the lion in his own den.

Make that two lions—Calvin Griffith and Sam Mele.

Grant has made up his mind to become the first modern major leaguer to wear a beard while playing ball during the regular season.

Frenchy Bordagaray, a former Dodger zany, once brought a moustache to spring training, then hurriedly shaved it off.

Mudcat means to go all the way, though. He intends to wear his mandarin-type Van Dyke beard all year and he wants to see someone stop him.

Grant, you may remember, is the real cool cat from Laccochee, Fla., who vowed he'd hold out last year until all Bogalusa froze over or at least until Griffith, his boss with the Minnesota Twins, thawed out and peeled off \$50,000 from his bankroll.

Well, it turned out to be a cold spring for Mudcat last year and he had to settle for substantially less.

He already has signed his contract this year but he's still a holdout. Insofar as his beard, anyway. He insists he's going to keep wearing it.

"There's no rule in the book that says I can't," said the Minnesota right-hander, sipping a soft drink after fighting his way around in '66 strokes Tuesday in the third round of the national baseball players' golf championship.

"Will they let you wear it?" someone wanted to know.

"I haven't gotten the word

from Mr. Griffith or Mr. Mele yet," he answered.

"And what will you do if you get the word?"

"Ain't but one thing for me to do," laughed Grant, like a guy who knew which side his bread is buttered on.

Bill Russell, the Boston Celtics' playing coach, introduced the beard to the NBA and has something of a rooting interest in Grant's.

"We have a private bet, Bill Russell and I," said Grant still grinning. "He says I won't be able to pitch with this beard. I say I can."

For the next installment in this heart-pounding drama, consult one of the local barbers in Orlando, Fla., when Grant reports there for the opening of the Twins' training camp later this week.

Mudcat wound up 13-13 last year and they didn't shake the tambourines for him as they did the year previous when he was 21-7 and helped pitch the Twins to the American League pennant.

"I know I pitched as well as the year before, maybe even a little bit better, but there were other considerations," said Grant, obviously not wanting to blow the whistle on the Minnesota hitters.

"Like what?" he was asked.

"Well," he fenced, "You know I was 3-12 the first half of last season. We just didn't have a good ball club the first half. When I say 'we' I mean us, not them. I mean me, too. The second half we finally realized we were the champions last year. Nobody knows why it takes a half season to learn something like that. You suddenly realize, hey, the World Series is over with."

Grant, a ballplayer who speaks up, agrees wholeheartedly with teammate Jim Kaat's disapproval of the departure of pitching coach Johnny Sain. Kaat wrote an open letter last October criticizing the Twins for letting go of Sain, who subsequently was hired by the Tigers.

"When I heard what Kaat did, I felt, man, he had a helluva lot of guts to come out and say what he did," commented Grant. "I feel that same way Kaat does. No doubt about it, we're going to miss Sain. A man of his caliber and ability doesn't come along every day. John Sain has been worth \$25,000 to me personally in two years I think," said Grant slowly. "That explains how I feel about him."
