Commissioners Court Opposes Food Stamps

Inadequate Funds Cited By Judge

★★★ Bailey County Designated Disaster Area

From the time of the original proposal in the summer of 1969 for Bailey County to institute a commodity food program or food stamp program in the county for needy families, the Bailey County Commissioners Court has worked on preliminary plans for the program.

A request was made by the Texas State Department of Welfare for Bailey County to join the program. Bailey County is one of the 89 counties in Texas presently without some type of welfare food program.

Commissioners have declined to accept the program and through a series of letters and telephone calls have informed welfare officials that with annual budget of a little more than \$400,000 the county could not stand the extra expense involved in such a program.

For the Food Stamp Program, the county would be required to pay an estimated \$10,180 yearly, and would have to provide a total of six employees, travel expense for two of the employees, office supplies and warehouse facilities, plus other expenses.

Under the Commodity Food Program, additional county personnel would be required; two warehouses and office space; office equipment; utilities; miscellaneous supplies; cold storage facilities; transportation for commodities; lumber for building damage for holding supplies and an assessment to meet administrative costs as set by the Texas Department of Welfare.

County Judge Don Cihak said no decision has been reached by the Bailey County Commissioners Court as they are awaiting the outcome of a Federal District Court decision on December 30, 1969.

The Judge explained that the suit had been filed in Federal District Court in Dallas against the United States Department of Agriculture and the Texas Welfare Department.

Federal District Judge W.M. Taylor Jr. issued a judgment declaring that "The United States Department of Agriculture, together with the other Federal defendants, . . . shall Cont'd on Page 2, Col. 3

Castor Bean Price Support Announced

WASHINGTON (Special)--Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock announced Tuesday that the Agriculture Department had set the support price of castor beans for 1970 at four and a half cents per pound.

He said that in addition to the increased one-half cent support loan, the rules relating to the planting of castor beans on diverted acres have been relaxed.

The representative said that he had joined the industry in recommending a five-cent support price and would like to have had that figure, but a four and a half-cent price would be helpful. He pointed out that this was a small step toward diversification of crops.

The High Plains area produced about 90 percent of the approximately 20,000 pounds of castor beans produced domestically in 1960. This yielded about 18 million pounds of oil.

Census Worker Applications Being Accepted

Clarence E. Mason has announced that applications will be accepted from 45 county residents to work as census takers in Bailey County.

The workers will contact county residents for the 1970 census and fill in report forms for the government.

Mason said all applicants should be available to work 30-40 hours per week and a phone and car are both mandatory. Those chosen will be paid \$2 an hour and the county crew chief will be paid \$2.50 per hour.

Monday noon is the deadline to apply for a position as 1970 census taker. Contact Clarence E. Mason at 925-3448 or Vic Benedict at 272-3222. A written test will be administered all applicants.

James Wedel New Member On Grain Board

James Wedel of Muleshoe has been named to represent Bailey County to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board.

He will join 28 other county representatives to form a 29 man advisory committee which will be making recommendations to the board concerning problems which face the grain farmers in their county and projects they feel the board should sponsor.

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board was established in a referendum last October 6 for the purpose of developing research and promotional projects aimed at increasing the net profit of five cents per ton paid by the producer which is collected at the first point of sale or processing.

Muleshoe's Scouts To Join Celebration

Sixty years ago today, the nation's largest youth organization, the Boy Scouts of America, came to America. Fifteen years later, the South Plains Council was organized. Next week, both anniversaries will be observed with a week-long observance of the annual Boy Scout Week which is from February 7-13.

Over 10,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers, and adult leaders in the South Plains Council will join in a series of special events to mark the occasion.

Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts in Muleshoe will be observing several activities in conjunction with Boy Scout Week. Two Blue and Gold Award Banquets are slated during February. Pack 622 will hold their banquet at Richland Hills Cafeteria on Monday.

February 23 and Pack 620 will have their banquet the following night, February 24 in the high school cafeteria. Ken Cole, District Scout Executive, George White District will be guest speaker for Pack 622's banquet.

Rev. Walter Bartholf of the First Christian Church is Neighborhood Commissioner of the local Boy Scouts. Rev. Bartholf has been actively engaged in scout work for the past 34 and one-half years.

He will accompany scouts from Troops 633 and 634 to Tres Ritos Camp on August 2, where he will act as camp commissioner during the encampment. He is also the only Wood Badge holder in the community.

Dedication-Open House Tomorrow

Tomorrow, Monday, is a big day for Muleshoe. Dignitaries will be arriving throughout the day to take part in the open house and dedication activities for the new City Hall and Bailey County Law Enforcement buildings.

Arriving around 3:45 p.m. Monday at the Muleshoe Airport will be Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, who will present the principal dedicatory address. He will join Representatives Bill Clayton and Ralph Wayne and Senator Jack Hightower, who will all be in Muleshoe for the celebration.

The full red carpet treatment will be accorded the special legislator guests when they arrive. The red carpet will be unrolled to officially welcome the guests to Muleshoe.

Robert Hooten and Jack Young are chairmen of the committee slated to meet Barnes at the Muleshoe Airport when he arrives at approximately 3:45 p.m. Monday afternoon. Hooten and Young asked businessmen to take cars to the airport as they would like to have a caravan of at least 60 cars to escort the lieutenant governor into Muleshoe. Texas Highway Patrolmen Gene Sisemore and Joe Young will lead the caravan.

The caravan will come into town and turn east past the Mule Memorial site. It will travel down Main Street to Avenue D, turn right at Avenue D and go to West Second Street, where it will conclude at the parking lot on the southwest corner of the courthouse square.

A large truck and speaker system will be set up on the parking lot and Barnes will address the group from the truck. Approximately 80 members of the Muleshoe High School Band, under direction of Bandmaster Jim Harvey, will provide musical entertainment at the dedication.

The truck and two buildings will be decorated by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce. They will also be at both buildings to help with hosting and serving refreshments.

Chamber of Commerce President Don Harmon suggested that all business places possible close between the hours of 3:45 and 5 p.m. or as long as possible so that all employees in Muleshoe may visit the new facilities.

City Manager Albert Field said invitations to attend the dedication have been mailed to mayors, city council members, city secretaries and city managers in areas surrounding Muleshoe. He and his staff will be aided by members of the Muleshoe City Council at the open house for the New City Hall and Chamber of Commerce offices.

Members of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce will be there to help with tours of the building.

City Secretary June Smallwood will be official hostess at the open house at City Hall.

Former county commissioners and county judges will join the present county commissioners, Matt Dudley, Loyd Stephens, R.P. McCall and W.H. Eubanks and County Judge Don Cihak.

Greeting visitors and conducting tours of the new Bailey County Law Enforcement Center will be Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements and Muleshoe City Police Chief Harrold White. Sheriff Clements mailed letters to former sheriffs of Bailey County, area law enforcement officers and officials. Deputy Sheriff Irene Splawn will be hostess for the open house at the law center and will assist in serving refreshments.

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Water Meeting Set For Lubbock Soon

Two of the leaders in the field of water resource planning and development will address the third annual Water, Inc., membership meeting February 17, in Lubbock said K.B. 'Tex' Watson, president of the group.

Keynote speaker for the day-long meeting slated at the KoKo Palace will be James Smith, Washington, assistant Secretary of the Interior for Water and Power Development, The Bureau of Reclamation comes under the supervision of the assistant secretary.

Luncheon speaker for the membership meeting will be Lt. Gen. Frederick Clarke, also of Washington, Chief of the Corps of Engineers.

More than 800 persons are expected to be on hand for the membership meeting which will be climaxed with a business session. Those attending will select six directors-at-large to serve on the organization's 41-member board of directors. Mailout ballots for 14 district directors will also be tabulated and the results announced at the session.

Following adjournment of the general business session, the board will convene to elect officers.

The meeting will mark the first time the annual meeting has been held in Lubbock.

Water, Inc., was formed at a meeting in Lubbock in mid-1967. Last year the meeting was conducted in Amarillo, and the first annual session was convened in Plainview.

Watson said Water, Inc., is a membership-based, non-profit organization working in the field of water resource planning, development and conservation. It lists more than 2,000 members in West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and in the Oklahoma Panhandle.

VETERANS Q's and A's

Q-- I was wounded in Vietnam and am supposed to be separated from service at a military hospital. Will I receive counseling or information about veterans' benefits before separation?

A-- Yes. A VA contact representative will visit you at the hospital to advise and assist you in filing applications for benefits.

Q-- When I am discharged, I plan to start a small business in my home town. May I use the GI Bill for this purpose?

A-- No. Business loans are

available only to eligible World War II and Korean veterans, and not authorized under the new GI Bill. Try the Small Business Administration.

Q-- Can the Veterans Administration pay burial allowances for former members of the defunct Women's Army Auxiliary Corps?

A-- Yes. Contact your nearest VA office.

Q-- Presently, I receive a VA pension under the "old law." Could I change from the "old law" to the "new law" and then back to the "old law" later?

A-- No, once you change from the "old law" to the "new law," you cannot later change back to the "old law". However, the VA will help you determine whether it is to your advantage to be under the "old law" or "new law".

Quarter Horse Racing At Midland Downs

Midland Downs Race Track has received their official dates from the American Quarter Horse Association for 1970. This is a first for the Midland Race Track and means that quarter horses racing at Midland Downs during the approved dates, which are set in February and September, will be eligible to receive official recognition for their efforts.

The February dates will be held the second and third weekends, on February 14-15 and 21-22. "We're proud of our track and I believe the track itself has the best surface in the state of Texas", states Bill Chancy, owner of the West Texas track. "We want our horses to grade with fast times, but we are just as interested in providing a track that won't cause horses to break down recording those fast times."

Midland Downs has been used during the past three years as a training track for local and area horsemen, Chaney points out that. "Under present racing

conditions in Texas, our tracks are mainly proving grounds for horses wanting to move on to the states that support quarter racing. However, we run under the same American Quarter Horse Association rules as Ruidoso including testing horses and photo finishes."

"What we want to do at Midland is to provide good racing for racing fans and furnish a place to help horsemen find the many champions our West Texas area produce each season." Highlighting the February meet will be the first running of two Stakes Races: THE TALL CITY FUTURITY and THE CHALLENGE UP.

The futurity will feature some of the nations top two-year-olds coming from five different states to compete at 300 yards for an estimated purse of some \$16,000.00. Trials will be held on the first Saturday of the meet, February 14th.

The Challenge Cup, a maturity for three-year-olds and up, is expected to reach that.

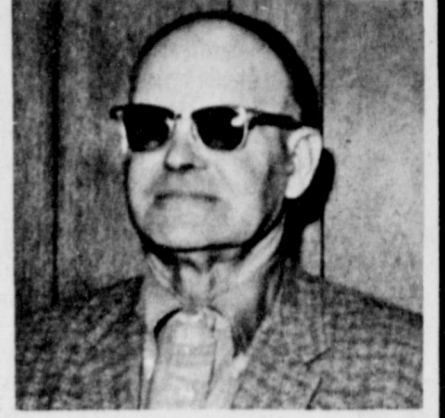

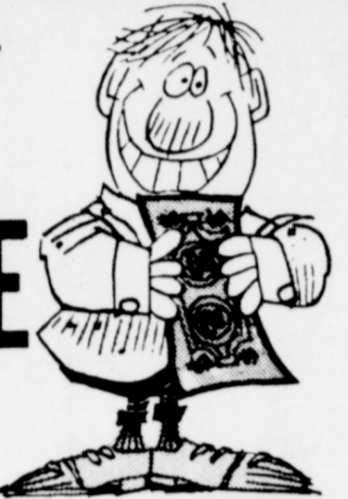
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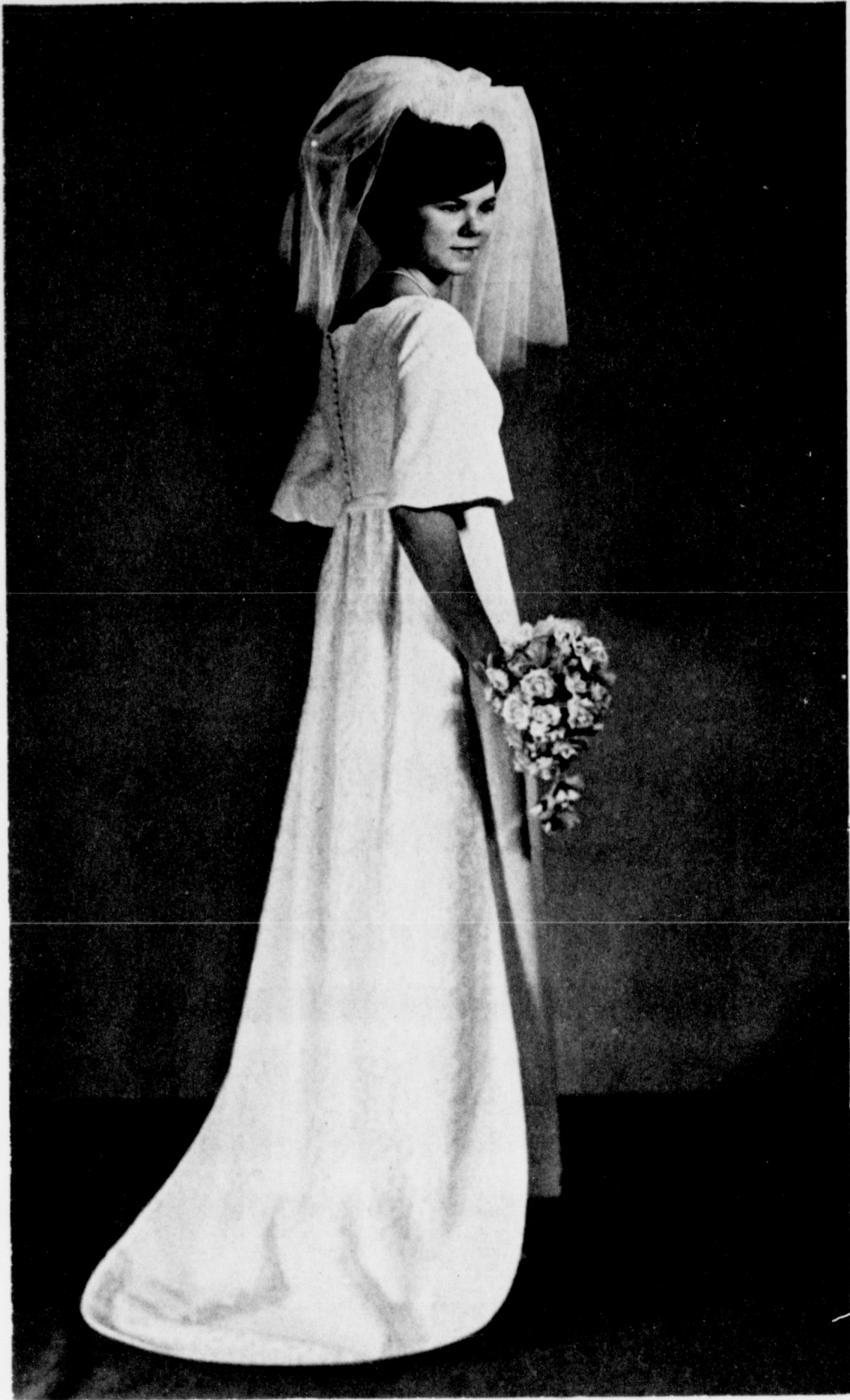
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Brides, Brides To-Be

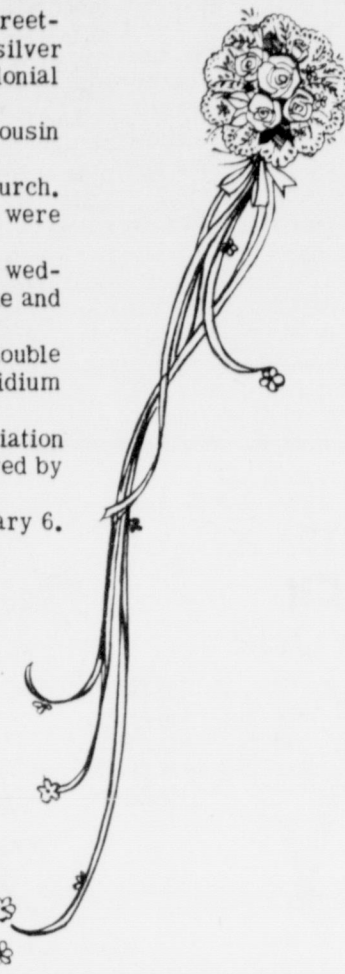

A rehearsal dinner was held at the Corral Restaurant at 8:00 p.m. Friday, February 6.



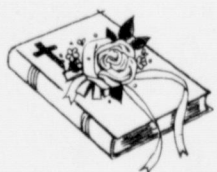

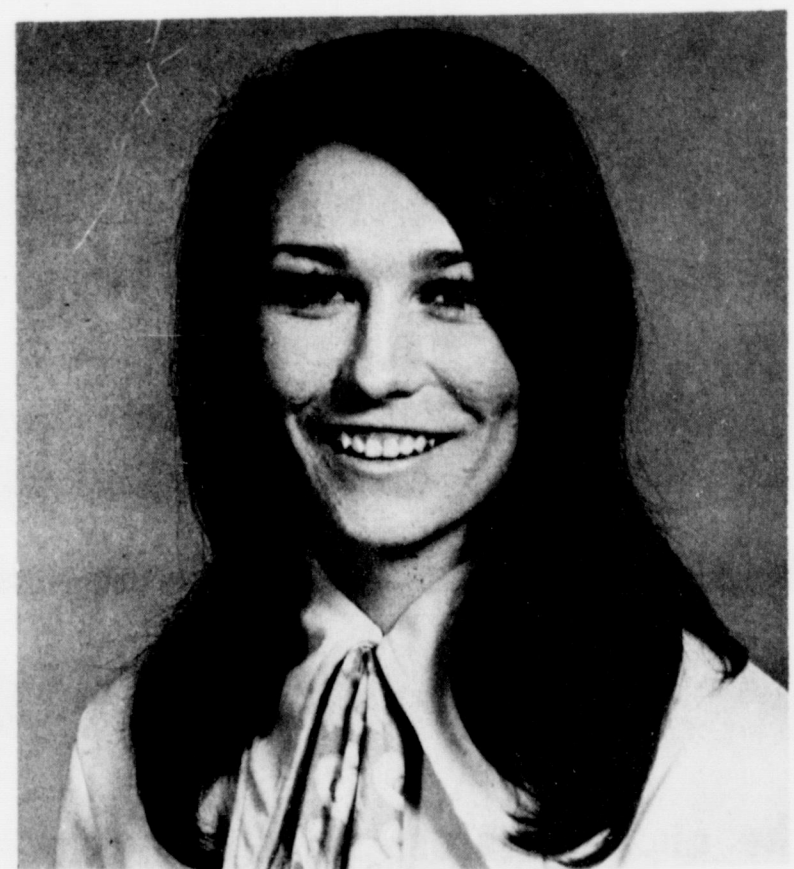

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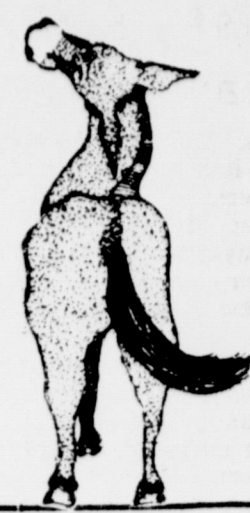

MHS Youth Has 'What It Takes--Guts'

Raymond Guzman Overcomes Trouble

Determination with plenty of "guts" enables Muleshoe High's Latin American student, Raymond Guzman, to keep smiling, keep making those periodic trips to the Institute for Rehabilitation and Research at Houston, and to keep his attendance in school where he is working toward his high school graduation.

Coming to the United States from Mexico in 1961 with his parents, Raymond attended local area schools knowing nothing about his future handicap. At the age of 15 while attending school at Farwell, the school nurse noticed a curvature of his spine when giving Raymond his yearly checkup along with other children. Her interest and investigation into the matter led Raymond to Lubbock where he was thoroughly examined. Immediately he was sent to Houston where it was discovered that surgery was needed. At that time Raymond was told that his chances to ever walk again were slim. Later, he returned to Houston for the operation that was proposed to offer him a chance to walk.

After surgery, he was placed in a body cast and allowed to return home shortly. Remaining in bed for the next six months was a trying period for Raymond; he was to have no active exercise whatsoever. Slowly, he was allowed to move around on his own, sit up in bed provided he could, then to gradually stand and try to walk if possible. Yes, it was possible, but only because of his determination to do so. With some assistance, he began walking for almost an hour per day.

Checkups have been continuing for the past five years since his first operation. Only lately was it decided that further surgery was necessary. With a smile, Raymond accepted the ordeal and again vowed that he would rehabilitate himself. Presently, Raymond attends classes regularly at Muleshoe High School; he does not sit anywhere in the room -- he rolls his wheelchair into the room and sits at the front of each class. During breaks of classes, a friend

pushes his chair down the hallway to his next class. Students of MHS marvel at his cheery disposition and attitude -- always smiling, always talking to anyone who has a comment to make.

The last operation, December 2, 1969, was to correct the curvature of his feet. This Monday, Raymond will go to Lubbock to have his present casts taken off and have others put on. Then, during the month of March, he will make another trip to Houston for a general checkup about the foot operation. As to the results and when Raymond will walk again remains not only with the decisions of his doctors, but again with his undefeatable determination.

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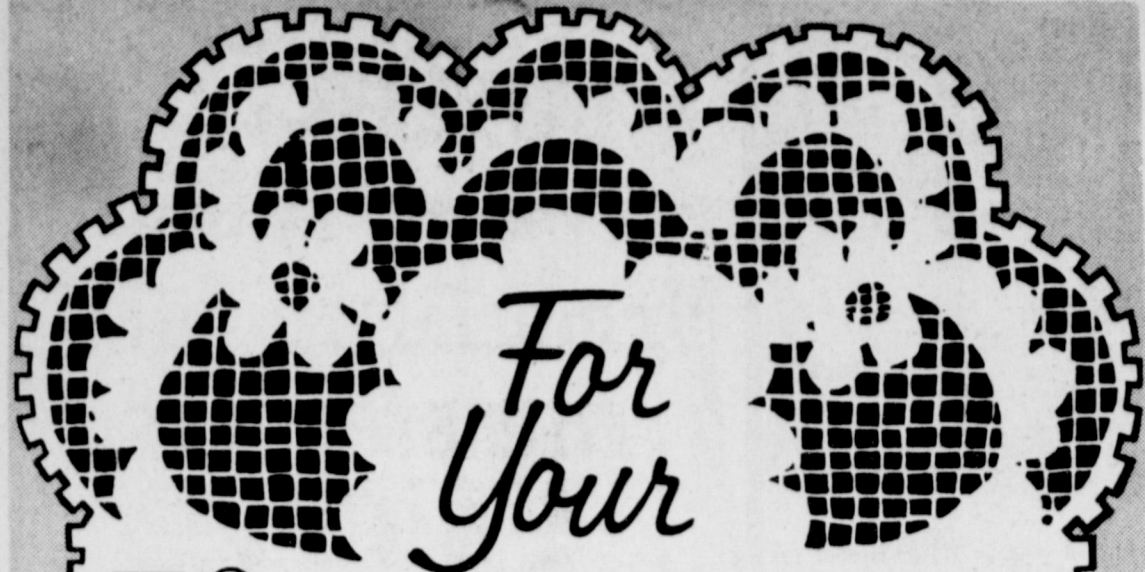


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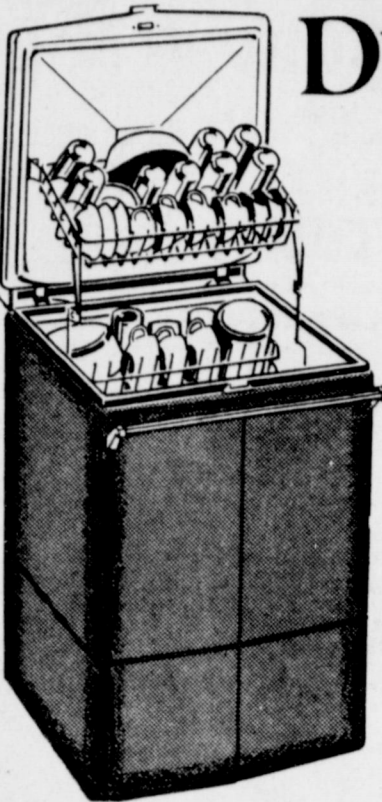
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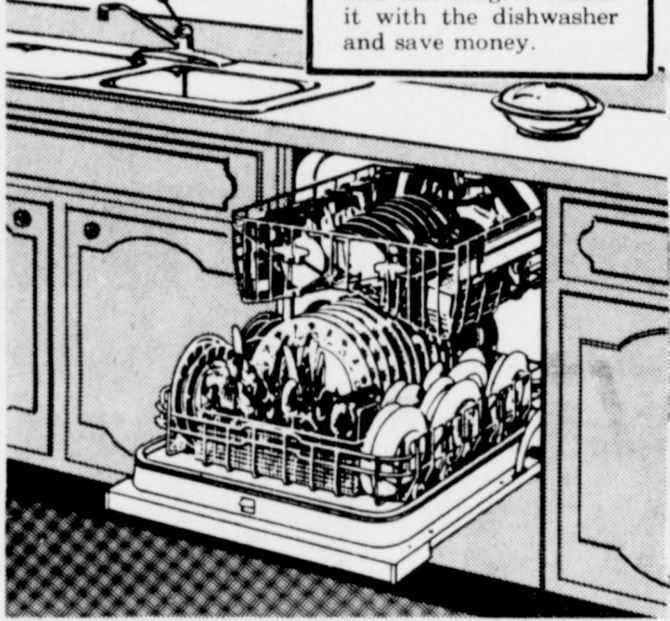
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Bula News

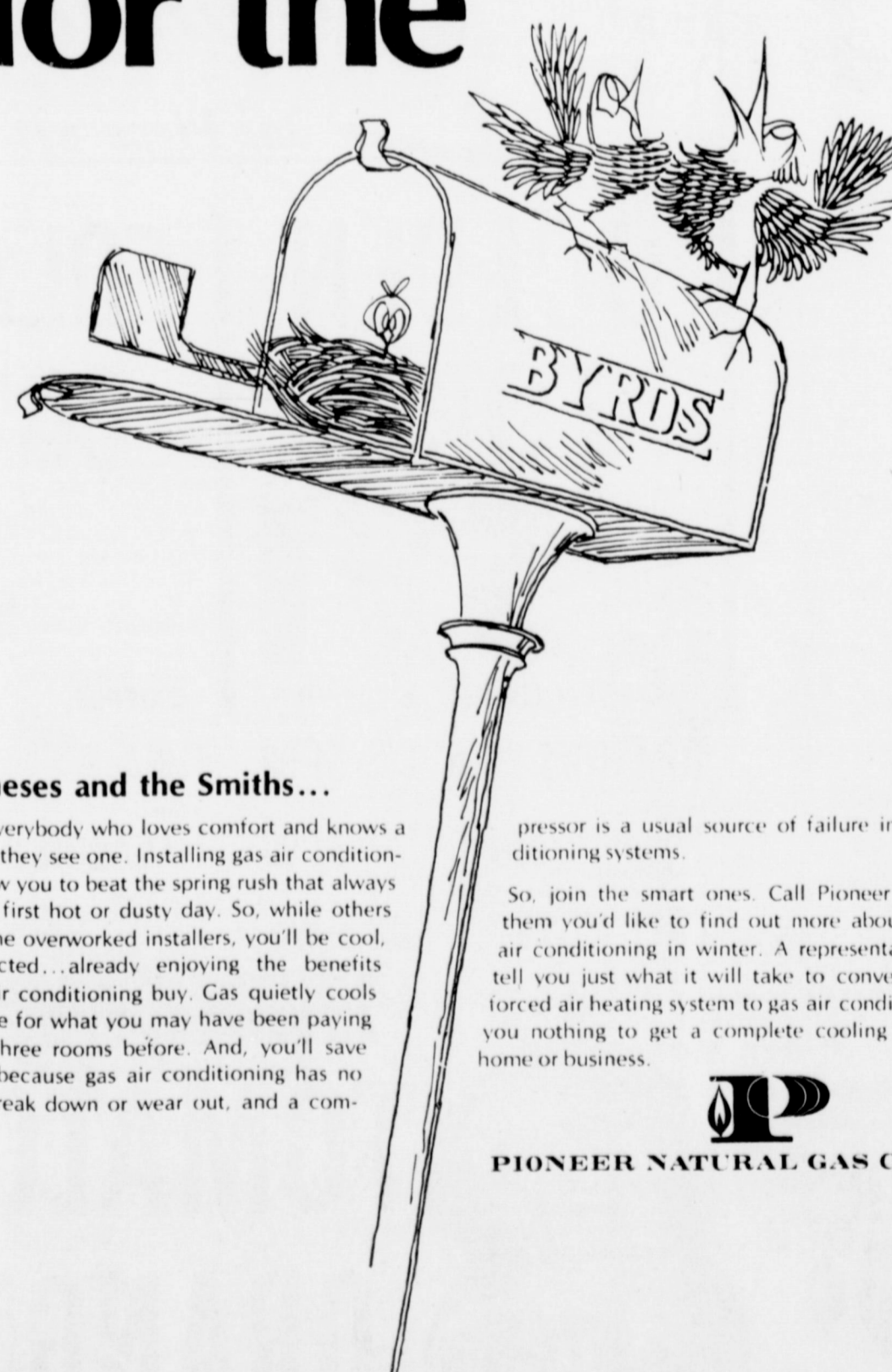

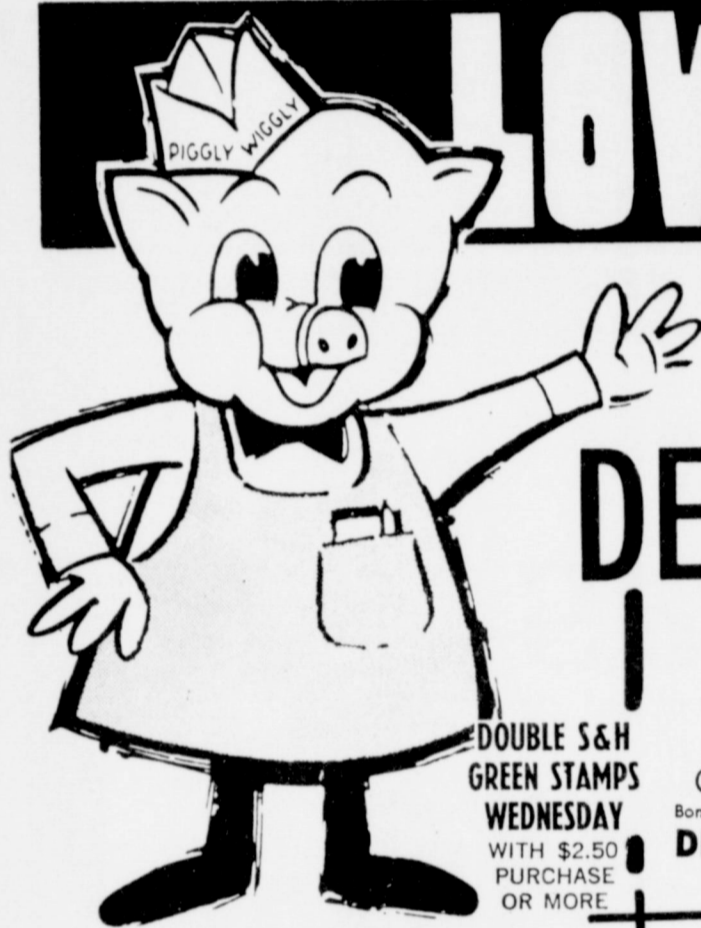
