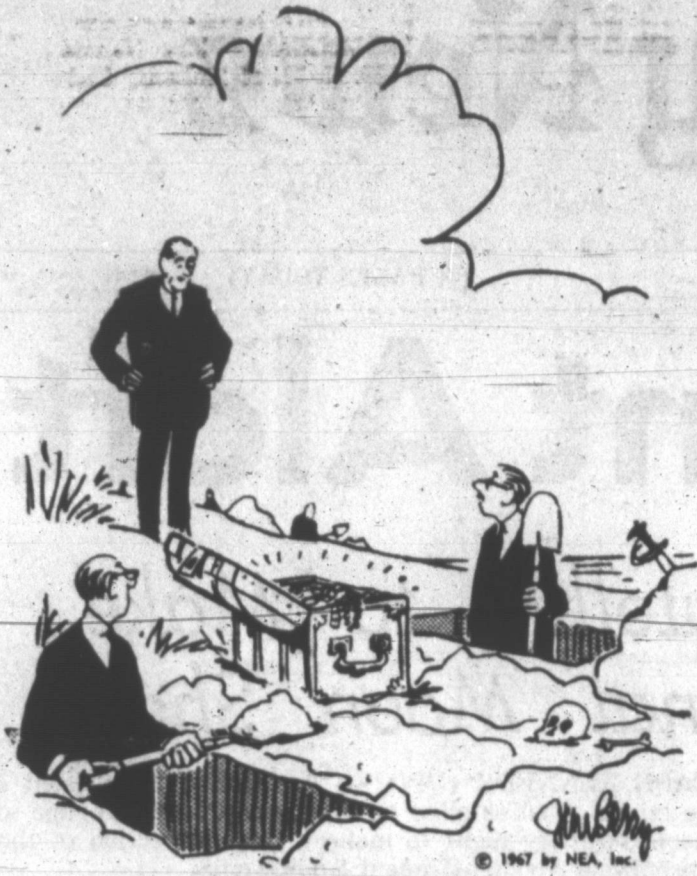

Washington Report

From Congressman

The office has been very busy since my last report. I introduced two pieces of legislation on Jan. 26 and have been preparing other bills for introduction in the near future. My House Joint Resolution 224 proposes an amendment to our Constitution which would put the American people on record in favor of allowing prayer in schools and other public buildings. Contrary to the belief of many people the Supreme Court decision of several years ago did not outlaw prayer in schools. The justices stated that school officials could not give the students a prepared prayer to recite.

As I stated in my last newsletter, however, I will fight for passage of this amendment to make sure that some future court does not prohibit all prayer in public buildings.

The other resolution was introduced in connection with my assignment to the House Agriculture Committee on Jan. 25. House Concurrent Resolution 105, "expresses the sense of Congress that in the public interest the administration should (1) cease and desist in its efforts to enforce selective economic discrimination against American farmers and ranchers by deliberately depressing farm prices, and (2) use the various legislative authorities at its disposal to improve and enhance farm prices."

In regard to my appointment to the Agriculture Committee, I have requested assignment to three subcommittees. The subcommittee on livestock and Grains, which handles legislation involving meat production and wheat, maize, and soybeans, was my first choice.

My other choices included: Cotton, which is a major crop in the 18th District. There are more than 600,000 bales annually produced in our area. My other choice is Conservation and Credit which involves small watershed programs as well as

dealing with Farmers Home Administration and Federal Land Bank problems.

I will be announcing the members of my advisory committees on agriculture in the near future. I expect to have about 60 Panhandle farmers, ranchers, and businessmen on several committees.

I have received numerous letters in regard to the war in Viet Nam and the United Nations economic sanctions against Rhodesia.

I am still in favor of blockading the Port of Haiphong and bombing air fields and industrial plants in North Viet Nam in order to bring this conflict to a speedy and successful conclusion.

Also, I am opposed to the United States' honoring any economic sanctions against Rhodesia as long as our so-called allies continue to trade with North Viet Nam.

I suppose there are some insects who don't care what they eat as long as it's nourishing. But they appear to be in the minority. By and large an insect sticks to his favorite dish.

Not being an entomologist, I do not know the reason for this. It is my theory, however, that it has to do with the way insects are reared.

Human beings exhibit similar characteristics when they are children. When a kid takes a liking to something, say peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, he is as single-minded as a corn borer.

Might Last

Were it not for his parents, he probably would go on subsisting on them for the rest of his life.

His parents will insist, however, that he occasionally force down a bite of broccoli. Pretty soon his tastebuds are so confused he doesn't know what he likes.

A baby boll weevil, on the other hand, is allowed to opt for the same menu, meal in, meal out. Hence his life-long appetite for cotton.

So what is so great about that? Well, for one thing it cuts down on the amount of socializing in the insect world.

A boll weevil doesn't go up to a corn borer and say, "How about coming over to my place for dinner tomorrow night?" for which the cotton farmer can be truly thankful.

And grain farmers certainly have enough troubles without having boll weevils in the corn field.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bache & Co. says the market has developed a familiar pattern this week with early weakness followed by a late recovery wave. The company says the pattern arises from the need for consolidation of January's sharp gains and the determination of investors who missed the initial market move to begin their buying program at the first sign of weakness. The company believes this pattern could continue for a number of sessions before a clear-cut correction develops.

Standard & Poor's says a period of consolidation or mild correction would not be surprising on the short term but feels the influence of the credit ease as a major market force has not been exhausted. It recommends selective buying on

any price dips. Newton D. Zinder of E.F. Hutton & Co. says a large amount of capital probably remains on the sidelines anxious to take advantage of any price concessions. The analyst feels that if the market were to react here, there is considerable technical evidence the decline could be held within the boundaries of the 820-830 zone on the Dow Jones industrial average.

TRAVEL BOOST

WARSAW (UPI) — Parliament will hear proposals Feb. 14 for new passport regulations, it was announced Saturday. The regulations would increase passport validity from one to two years and transit visas from two to three days.

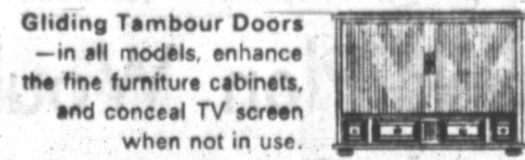

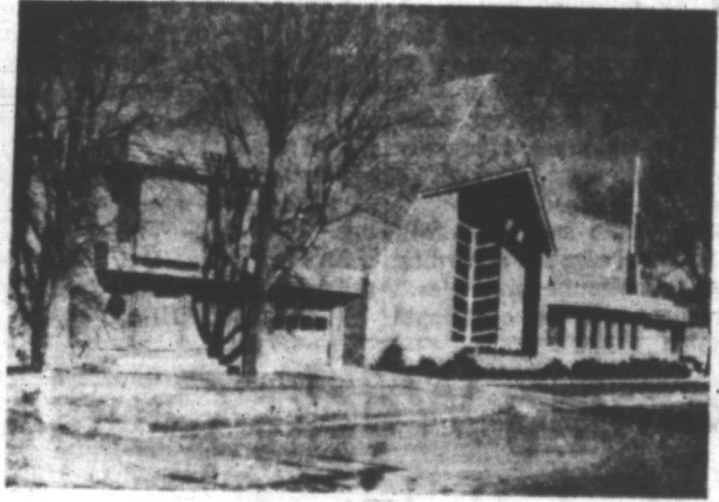

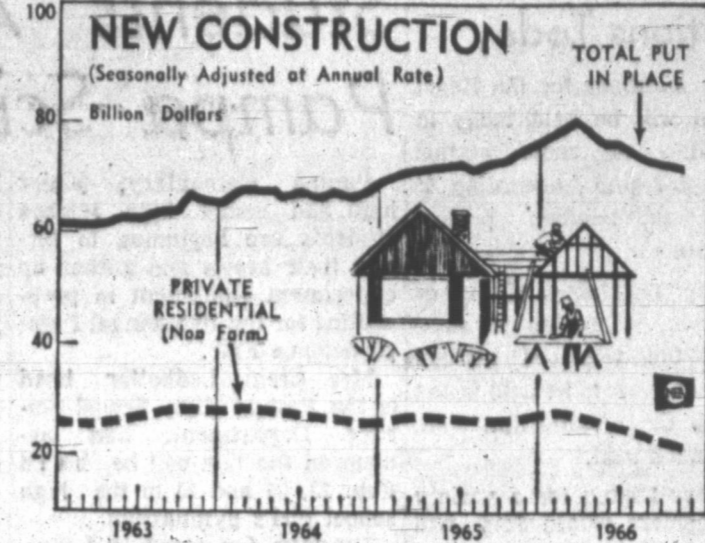
"Jackknife John" — Frank B. Hanes; the story of a quarter horse.

Art Workshop Scheduled For Elementary Teachers

Elementary teachers from Pampa Independent School District will attend an art workshop on Feb. 7, 8, and 9 in Stephen F. Austin Elementary School, according to Dr. John Damron, superintendent of schools.

The workshop will be conducted by Mrs. Pat Huddleston, who has taught extensively and holds a master's degree from Texas Woman's University. Approximately 50 teachers will spend 15 hours of their own time learning about modern creative art education and some of its materials and tools. They will learn by doing, rolling up their sleeves and trying out the techniques presented by Mrs. Huddleston.

These techniques will include some of the uses of crayons, water colors, poster paints, finger paints, colored chalks, and modeling clay. Simple craft techniques will also be shown, giving teachers an opportunity to work with paper, paste and other materials to gain three-dimensional effects. All art workshop activities will be experiences which the teachers can relate to their own classroom teaching. The educational service is provided by Binney and Smith, Inc., manufacturers of Crayola crayons and other art supplies.

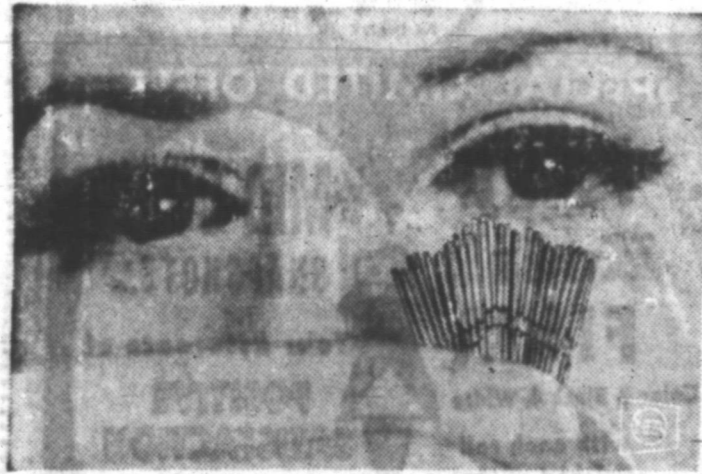

Texas House Lauds Senator Yarborough

State Rep. Malouf Abraham of Canadian joined with two other Republicans and all the Democrats in the House of the Texas Legislature in unanimously adopting a resolution commending U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough of Texas for introducing the Big Thicket National Park bill.

Yarborough's measure would bring about creation of the national park consisting of some 75,000 acres of land in the southeast portion of Texas.

The Texas House resolution, authored by Rep. Glenn Vickery of Harris County, also lauded Yarborough for his work on the Padre Island National Seashore project and Guadalupe Mountains National Park. The resolution was adopted 139 to 0.

A Good Place to Expend Energy

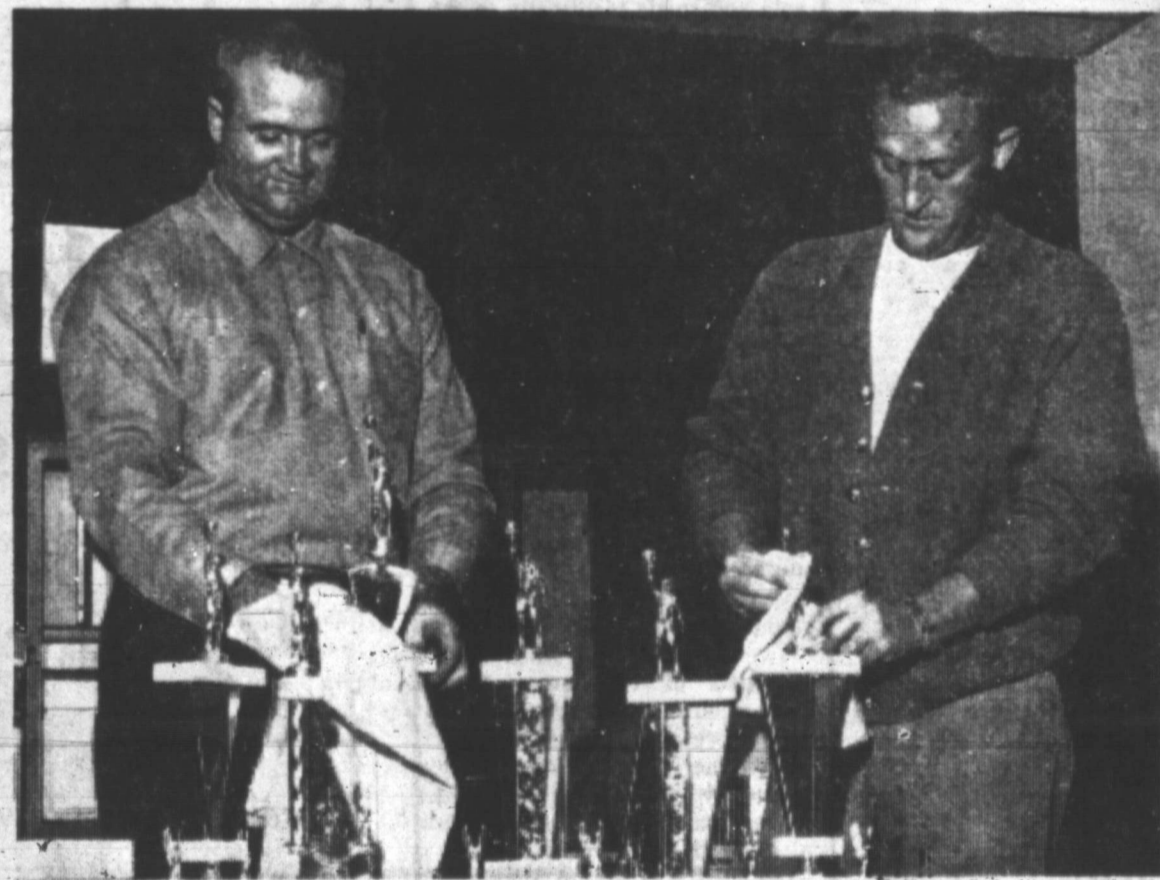

'Miracles from Melodies' Discussed For Civic Culture Club Members

Mrs. A. C. Houchin presented the program on "Miracles from Melodies" at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of Civic Culture Club held in the home of Mrs. J. W. Duke.

In presenting her subject Mrs. Houchin said "Only recently has the study of the effects of music on emotional and psychic illness been undertaken. It is known as music therapy. It studies the different ways that music can influence mental health. The National Association of Music Therapy, which presents hundreds of trained therapists and teachers, is responsible for a course of study with a major in music therapy now available in many universities and colleges.

"More people are hospitalized in the U.S. for psychic disorders

than physical ones. During the past ten years the number of graduate musical therapists has quadrupled, yet the requests from sanitariums and hospitals for help cannot be supplied. The aim of the therapist teacher is not to develop professional musicians, but to help people who need adjustments. Music therapy, if it is properly utilized, will exert an expanding influence on the successful treatment of mental illness. Music teachers are realizing their role is two-fold to teach its technique and appreciation, also to teach music as a means of understanding.

to consideration various elements, such as vision, touch, hearing, play and imitation.

"Movement is the language of a child before he learns to talk, and playing exercises or musical games will teach him both mental and physical control of his body. For example, the game 'Going to Market' is an exercise in poise and concentration. Each child balances a basket on his head to help improve his posture. Sometimes songs are sung with the words being what you want the child to do, and when they understand they respond.

"No one expects any single creative factor to be effective on more than a small number of cases, but anything that can be done early may head off a catastrophe later. The mentally ill are being treated earlier than they were even ten years ago and are more understood and accepted. Families who 25 years ago would hide odd members of the household, now bring them to be cured. The development of tranquilizing drugs is a very important factor in the growing success of the treatment and with the inclusion of music therapy as a regularly accepted means of treatment, accounts for much of the improvement," concluded the speaker.

Podiatrist Says Foot Troubles Sound 'Danger Signals' for Senior Citizens

Do you suffer from foot pains in the morning? Tingling toes? Aching arches? Cramped legs? For most of us these are temporary discomforts soon—and safely—forgotten. But for men and women past 45 they may be "danger signals" of illnesses that cripple and enfeeble millions of older people, a foot specialist warns.

Dr. Benjamin Kauth, prominent podiatrist and director of the American Foot Care Institute, noted that tingling toes, pain or cramps may be a sign of circulatory diseases or advancing arthritis. Foot sores or blisters which fail to heal in a reasonable time, he added, may be an early symptom of diabetes. "People past middle age should routinely visit the family podiatrist for a foot check at least twice a year, he cautioned, or often if pain or other symptoms persist.

"Author of the recently published volume, "Walk And Be Happy" (John Day Co.), Dr. Kauth has this advice for senior citizens who want to continue standing — and walking — on their own two feet: "Walk daily for exercise, bathe your feet nightly for hygiene, and wear proper shoes."

In the selection of proper footwear — "an area in which the senior citizen unfortunately shows least wisdom" — Dr. Kauth suggests that an all-leather shoe provides daylong support where foot muscles no longer function with peak efficiency. Older men and women should select shoes of soft leather uppers and firm but lightweight leather soles to minimize tiredness.

"Don't make the mistake so many oldsters make when their feet swell or ache," Dr. Kauth said. "Don't buy canvas — top sneakers under the illusion that they are softer. Sneakers collapse inward and rub and chafe your feet, a great discomfort and danger for aging and dry skin."

Another practice of older people that Dr. Kauth decried is the wearing of arch supports sold by stores or mail order. "Arch supports like these are as bad as store teeth or dime-store glasses," he said. Have your foot specialist decide if you need arches. If you do, he will have them fitted from plaster-of-paris casts of your feet.

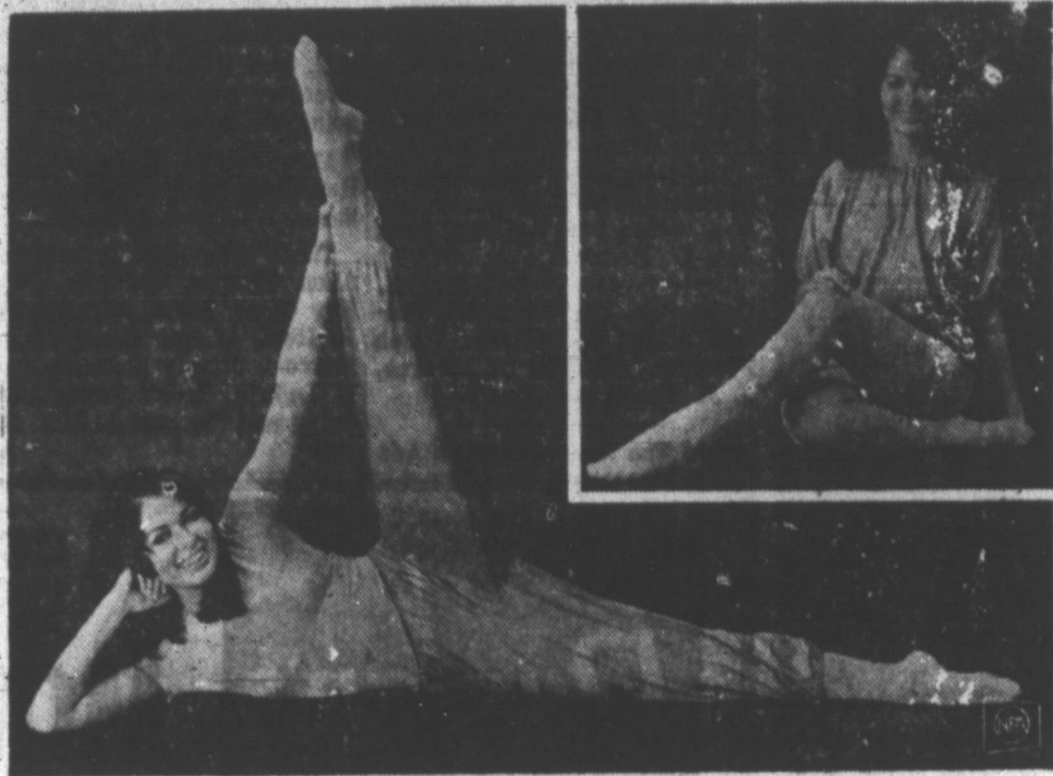
