

The cost of the war in Vietnam is the key factor in rising federal budgets and deficits revealed in the President's State of the Union message. With war spending expected to be some \$10 billion more during fiscal 1967 than was forecast by the President last January, the adjusted expenditure figure for 1967 is \$126.7 billion and the deficit \$9.7 billion. Estimated federal income of \$126.9 billion for fiscal 1968, which begins July 1, depends upon congressional approval of the 6 per cent surtax requested by the President to finance the war and continue his Great Society





It would be one thing if the Government really proposed to sell to the public its portfolios of mortgages and other loans; then it might qualify as a gobetween. The loans, though, are instead grouped in "pools," which in effect serve as collateral for the certificates that are sol to the public.

Of Vital Importance

A fundamental need of this country is to be lifted to the level of a sound currency and prudence in fiscal affairs.

A sound currency would involve institution of a gold standard with all nongold money redeemable in, or convertible into, gold at the present statutory rate of \$35 per fine ounce of gold, and with all debts payable when they mature.

Prudence in fiscal affairs ends to prevail -when a current cy, redeemable in standard gold, exists. With a gold standard and pru-

dence in fiscal affairs, the amount of our monetary gold stock should increase, our nation should experience greater strength and safety, an improved quality of prosperity, better grounds for optimism and furtherance of appropriate reach for higher standards of thics and morality, a better basis for peace. 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



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
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
