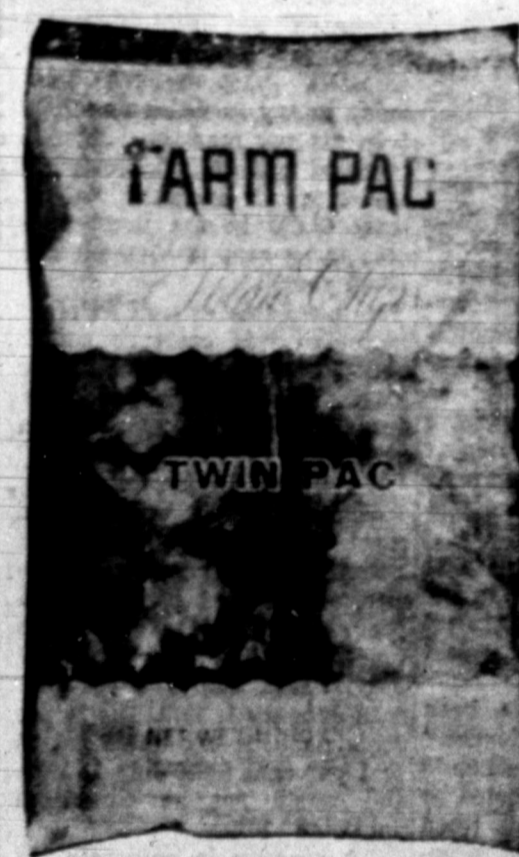

## Grill Pork Chops For Summer Meals



Pork chops from the grill fit right into summertime meal plans. In fact menu plans geared to balance flavor, variety and good nutrition will certainly include pork. Today's pork has tenderness, consistent leanness and wonderful flavor. Besides the high quality protein which meat provides, pork is the richest food source of thiamine. Pork also has unexcelled digestibility.

Rib or loin pork chops should be cut at least one inch thick if they are to be broiled over charcoal or in the oven. Distance of the meat from the heat should be adjusted to allow for slow broiling and thorough cooking. To test for doneness, make a slit in the meat near the bone and observe the color. Pork chops should be cooked just until pinkness has disappeared. Pork chops cut less than one inch thick are best cooked in a skillet with a cover. Fresh pork designated as tender and lean at the meat counter is assurance of greatest eating enjoyment.

Fruit accompaniments are especially pleasing with pork. A spicy apricot conserve is a

bright one in flavor and color. Coarsely chopped walnuts give it a bit of crunch too. Hard rolls, molded vegetable salad and corn on the cob are easy to manage go-wits-for-the-grilled pork chop dinner.

**CHARCOAL BARBECUED PORK CHOPS**  
(Yield: 6 servings)  
6 pork rib chops cut 1 to 1½ inches thick  
Salt and Pepper  
Cut edges of the pork chops to prevent curling. Place over low charcoal heat so that the chops will cook slowly and brown without burning. Turn once. Cook just until pinkness has disappeared when a cut is made near the bone. Season with salt and pepper and serve hot with Spicy Apricot Conserve.

**SPICY APRICOT CONSERVE**  
(Yield: 2 cups)  
1 cup (8 ounce package) dried apricots, cooked and chopped  
½ cup white seedless raisins  
¼ cup water  
1 Tablespoon grated orange rind  
½ teaspoon ground ginger  
¼ teaspoon ground mace

## Jamboree Scouts Will Enjoy Soup

The 12th Boy Scout World Jamboree, the first ever held in this country, will open up Farragut State Park near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Aug. 1-9. About 15,000 boys will attend but only 5,000 will be from the United States.

The difference in food habits of Scouts from so many different lands poses commissary problems. But an advance survey revealed that no matter where they come from, most of the boys like soup. Therefore, the meals planned for them to cook over their own camp grills frequently include canned soup, either as is, or as an ingredient.

**FARRAGUT CORN CHOWDER**  
1 can (10½ ounces) condensed Cheddar cheese soup  
2 cans (10½ ounces each) condensed cream of potato soup  
2 soup cans milk  
2 cans (12 ounces each) corn with green pepper and pimento, drained  
1 cup water  
Blend soups; gradually add milk and water. Add corn and pepper. Heat; stir now and then. Do not boil.

**SLOPPY JOES**  
2 pounds ground beef  
1 cup chopped onion  
½ teaspoon salt  
Dash pepper  
1 tablespoon shortening  
2 cans (10½ ounces each) condensed tomato soup  
2 tablespoons prepared mustard  
12 buns, split and toasted  
Brown beef with onion, salt, and pepper in shortening; stir to separate meat particles. Add soup and mustard. Simmer 10 minutes. Serve on buns.

½ cup coarsely chopped walnuts  
Combine all ingredients, except walnuts in a saucepan. Cook over medium heat 5 minutes. Add walnuts. Serve hot with pork chops. Note: If desired, 1 teaspoon of honey may be added for a sweeter conserve.

## Food Buying Guide

The following guide to the nation's food buys for the weekend was prepared by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Interior for United Press International.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—This weekend's food shoppers will find their favorite food counters peppered with a good sprinkling of plentiful. Vegetables, especially,

are in stores in abundant array. The vegetable list of those in ample supply is headed with lettuce, cabbage, corn, onions, cucumbers, beans and in some areas, tomatoes. Seasonal fruits such as lemons, limes, oranges, and in a few places, peaches, are abundant.

Among meats and other protein products, watch for possible good buys on beef roasts and steaks, broiler-fryers, and peanuts and peanut products. In the fish realm, canned tuna, fish sticks and portions are plentiful on a national scale. Prepare refrigerated pizza dough and sauce as directed on can. Top with tiny meat balls and shredded Mozzarella cheese. Bake; cut into small squares. Garnish with stuffed green olives, each on a wooden pick. Serve hot.

# WDB To Step Up Water Pollution Fight In Fall

AUSTIN (UPI) — Texas will see a big acceleration in efforts to combat water pollution problems after the new fiscal year starts Sept. 1, Joe Moore, head of the Water Development Board, said yesterday.

Moore, who also is chairman of the Water Pollution Control Board which will be succeeded on Sept. 1 by the new water quality board, said a recent tour of the state's pollution problems areas emphasized the need for a speed-up in controlling them.

"For the first time, we have been provided with a staff financing by the state where we can really get after these problems," Moore said.

### Separate Agency

The 60th Legislature created the water quality board as a separate agency, gave it an executive director and a staff of 62 and \$2 million to help cities develop water-treatment facilities. Full-time workers devoted solely to anti-pollution problems now total four.

Moore and several other state officials involved in water and water quality made a five-day tour of the state about a month ago with members of the Federal Water Pollution Control Advisory Board.

They started in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, flew over the Possum Kingdom Lake area, across Central Texas, then toured in the San Antonio area, the Lower Rio Grande Valley, and wound up in the heavily industrialized regions of the upper Texas coast.

Moore predicted that the accelerated anti-pollution pace by the state beginning next month probably would result in some court cases against long-time polluters.

### State Using Caution

The state has moved cautiously during the past six years since it first entered the anti-pollution field in a serious and wide-scale basis. Much of this time has been spent in preliminary organizing and setting quality standards.

Now Moore feels with the new board coming into being and a full staff to work on the problems, things will pick up.

Moore said he believed one of the things to come out of the recent inspection trip by federal and state officials was a conviction by industry in the state that they should back Texas in the field of pollution control rather than let the federal government move in.

### Swindle by Fake Death Certificate Is Suspected

SAN ANTONIO (UPI) — John Quinlan, assistant district attorney, said today he will take to a grand jury the case of the mysterious death certificate for which no body has been found.

Quinlan said Justice of the Peace Laura Boenig signed a death certificate on the death of a schoolteacher Jan. 13. The burial was supposed to have been Jan. 19 at La Vernia, but Mrs. Boenig said she suspected something was wrong when there was a misspelling on the certificate.

Quinlan said he and two highway patrolmen went to the cemetery and found the last burial had been long before Jan. 19.

A finance company said it paid off a \$1,500 death claim on a 1964 automobile after a man claiming to be the deceased's brother came into the office and made the claim. The claim was paid on the strength of the death certificate.

The doctor's name was on the certificate but authorities have been unable to locate a doctor by that name, Quinlan said.

### GHANA FREES 169

ACCRA (UPI) — The Ghana military rulers Wednesday ordered the release from prison of 169 persons seized after a vain coup attempt in April and one woman held since former dictator Kwame Nkrumah was ousted in February, 1966. Another 200 persons were reported still held in protective custody.

## Foreign Commentary

Pierce sandstorms erode and drift across Khartoum's newly-paved streets. Sand seeps beneath the doors and window sills of the refurbished Palace of the Republic and the luxury hotel set aside for Arab leaders planning the liquidation of Israel.

Meeting in preparation for a log-delayed Arab Summit — which may never come-off are the foreign ministers or men of equal rank of all 13 members of the Arab League, plus the secretary general of the league and the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO).

It is an incongruous meeting at an incongruous site. Khartoum is the capital of Sudan and not long removed from the days of the whirling dervishes, Lord Kitchener and Gen. Chinese Gordon, memorialized now in a school of medicine and a college respectively.

Divided and Poor It stands at the confluence of the blue and white Niles and is a one-time slave trade center

which still evokes bitter memories among the country's four million southern black tribesmen and divides them from the nine million Arab Moslems from the north who are the rulers.

It is a poor country, barely merged from a civil war of its own, with border troubles with non-Arab Ethiopia.

But for the Arab summit, the Sudan government declared an "open budget" in order to receive its guests in suitable splendor.

This is the setting. And these are among the participants. The United Arab Republic and Saudi Arabia, who fight an undeclared war of their own in Yemen where evidence of the use of poison gas has been produced against Egypt. Despite their mutual interest in the extermination of Israel, there seemed little likelihood that King Faisal would be willing to sit at the same table with Nasser.

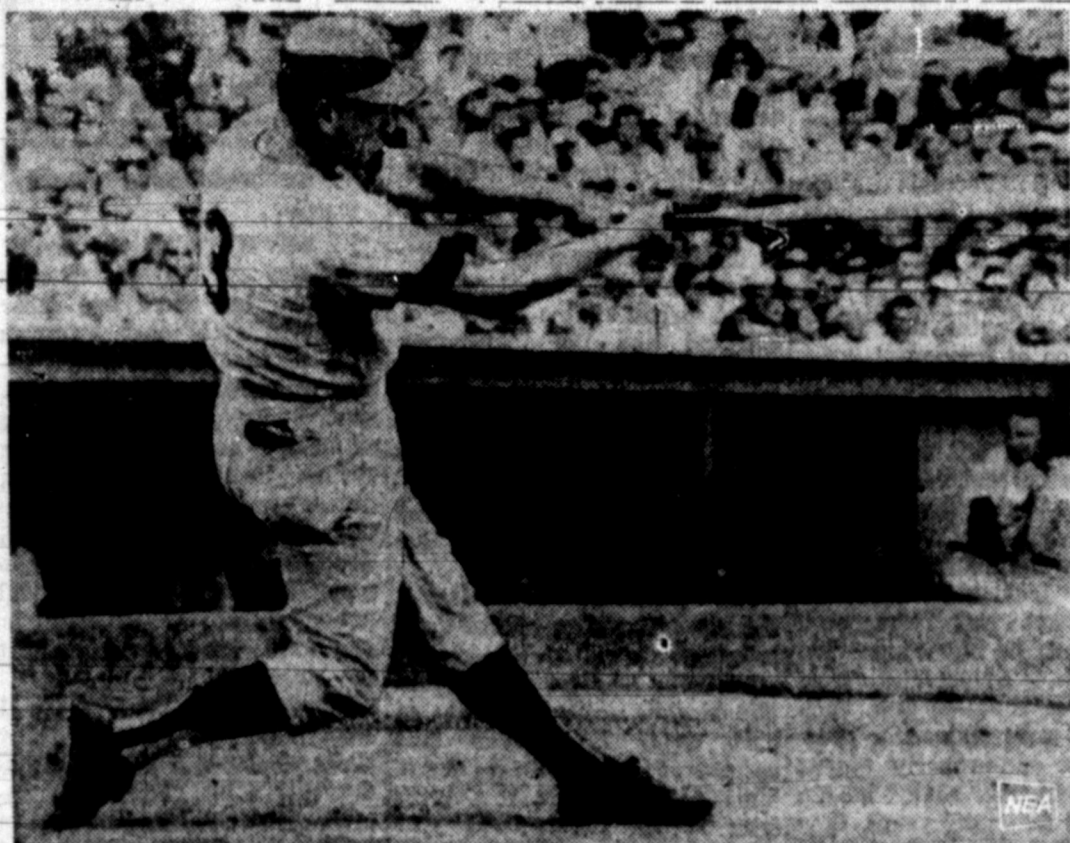


# Lou, Flood Sink Chicago

 Twice in the last eight years the St. Louis Cardinals hung out the sign and both times they proved it pays to advertise and shop.  
 The first time was in 1953 when Bing Devine's first general manager turned up Curt Flood, property of the Cincinnati Reds, playing for Omaha of the American Association.  
 The next time was in 1964 because of the need for a replacement for Stan Musial. Again it was Devine shopping and this time it was Lou Brock, a flop with the Chicago Cubs, whom he acquired.  
 Devine has since left St. Louis but the echoes of his shopping spree were never louder than Wednesday when the Cards defeated the Chicago Cubs in the double-header 4-2 and 7-1 as Flood and Brock combined for

11 hits and the Cards took a 5½-game National League lead.  
 Elsewhere in the National League, San Francisco outscored Pittsburgh 7-2; Houston downed New York 5-2; Cincinnati bested Atlanta 7-3 and Philadelphia edged Los Angeles 3-2 in 10 innings.  
 Brock had six hits in the two games and Flood weighed in with five hits and together they contributed to every one of the Cardinals' scoring innings. For the four-game series (St. Louis won three), they collected 18 hits and accounted for 14 of the Cardinals' 22 runs.  
 Flood collected 10 hits in 17 trips to the plate in the series, scoring four runs and batting in two.  
 Two home runs by Pete Rose, his seventh and eighth of the season, and Le May's eighth homer powered the Reds to their victory over Atlanta. Ted

Abernathy's 2-2-3 innings of scoreless relief pitching preserved Milt Pappas' 10th triumph in 17 decisions.  
 Willie Mays contributed his 15th homer of the season, his second in as many days, and drove in three runs in the Giants' defeat of Pittsburgh.  
 Gaylord Perry brought his record to 8-12 with a nine-hitter.  
 Rookie Doug Rader, brought up from Oklahoma City last week, tripled and scored the first of three eighth-inning runs which broke a 2-2 tie and gave the Astros their eighth victory in their last nine games.  
 Mike Cuellar hurled a six-hitter for his 11th success in 17 decisions.  
 Richie Allen's 10th inning single scored pinch runner Billy Cowan with the winning tally. It was Allen who sent the game into overtime when his throwing error allowed Gene Michael to score in the ninth inning.

 Then Bob Hall, Houston Bellaire's 6-8 center, and Steve Niles, 6-11, a member of last

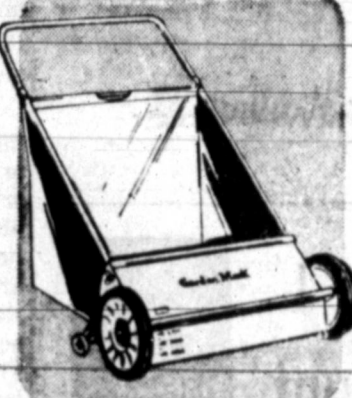
year's Class A WAA San Antonio Lee champions, kept their club ahead on rebounds for the rest of the first half.

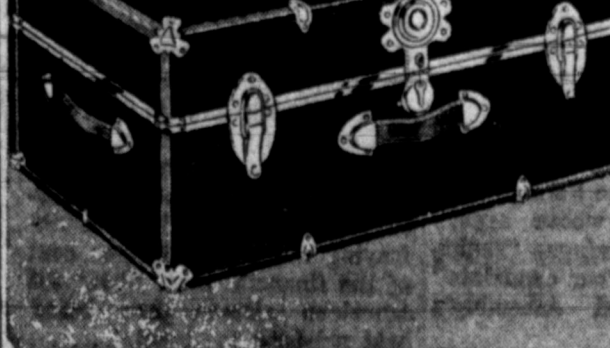
