

# Nasser's Dream of Annihilating Israel Dies in Small Village

EDITOR'S NOTE: Joseph W. Grigg, who has covered wars since Adolf Hitler's blitzkrieg into Poland, reported action from all fronts during the Israeli-Arab war. As a cease-fire silenced the guns, Grigg flew to all key battlefronts as in the following dispatch reports what he found at the end of the road of war.

GEBEL LIVNI, Sinai Desert (UPI)—Egyptian President Ga-

mal Abdel Nasser's dream of annihilating Israel died here. It began dying at dawn's first light on Tuesday, June 6, when Israeli forces ambushed 20 Russian-built Egyptian tanks and began one of history's greatest armored battles. Gebel Livni was never a beautiful place. Its only human sign was a few huts at a primitive airstrip at this blistering landscape in the middle of the map of Sinai. "With its rolling sand dunes, stony and waterless flatlands

and its jagged brown mountains, Gebel Livni would do credit to the far side of the moon. The battle that lasted from Tuesday to Thursday made it worse. A graveyard of Russian-built tanks is at the end of the road of Nasser's once proud desert army. It was tank against tank—American-built Shermans and British-made Centurions in mortal combat with Nasser's Stalin T34, T54 and giant T55 armor. The best of Israel's young

## B52s Renew Viet Bombing

SAIGON (UPI)—Allied forces today reported killing 119 Communists in heavy fighting in the threat of Communist provinces. To help them B52 bombers struck just south of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) dividing the Vietnams, defying the threat of Communist missiles which had kept them away from the area for six weeks.

At least six Americans were killed and 84 injured in the northern fighting and in a North Vietnamese mortar, rocket and artillery bombardment of U.S. Marine positions near the DMZ. Many of the Americans were accidentally hit by their own shells.

**Disables 10 MIGs**  
Officials today said American jets destroyed or damaged 10 Communist MIG fighters in weekend raids on the Kep air base near Hanoi. The raids in the Hanoi-Haiphong area Saturday and Sunday cost the United States four aircraft, officials said, bringing the total of American planes lost over the north to 581. Three pilots were listed as missing and three were rescued by daring helicopter forays into the North.

Power plants in Hanoi and near the port city of Haiphong were hit. The high-flying but relatively slow B52s had been striking almost daily along the DMZ until six weeks ago when Communists had smuggled Russian-supplied Surface-to-air Missiles (SAMs) into positions just north of the border.

## Raiders' Leader Due Arraignment

SANTA FE, N. M. (UPI)—Reies Lopez Tijerina, the self-styled Spanish-American leader who was the object of the most intense manhunt in modern New Mexico history, is scheduled to face an arraignment today.

Tijerina, who is accused of leading a raid on the Rio Arriba County courthouse last week, has been jailed at the state penitentiary since his capture Saturday morning.

While Tijerina sat in his cell awaiting action on kidnaping and assault charges, state police sought three of his comrades. They are Tijerina's brother, Cristobal, Moises Morales and Balthazar Martinez. Police said Martinez, considered the most dangerous, sports a red berand was said to have dynamite strapped to his chest. Tijerina is the leader of a Spanish-American organization called the Political Confederation of Free City States. The members believe they are rightful heirs to millions of acres of land in the Southwest under ancient Spanish land grants. State Police Chief Joe Black said the hunt for the last three men would be "intensified." He said he believed the three were hiding in Northern New Mexico, in the area where the courthouse attack took place.

# Russians Charge Israel In Armored Column Move

## Soviets Say Incident Cease-Fire Violation

The Russians charged today that an Israeli armored column supported by paratroopers dropped during the night had reached the Syrian town of Sheikh Miskin, 31 miles inside Syria, in a major violation of the cease-fire. Israel reported only that scattered firing and small scale firefights marred the truce. It said snipers were being mopped up in captured Syrian towns, that some clashes took place along the Suez Canal with Egyptians fleeing home and that Israeli troops wiped out a band of Jordanian soldiers which "got into Israel."

## Shooting Erupts As Carmichael Is Jailed

PRATTVILLE, Ala. (UPI)—Nearly 200 National Guardsmen and state troopers surrounded a 5-room house jammed with 25 frightened Negroes early today and ended the five-hour battle of Happy Hollow. Four men were reported wounded in the fighting. The troops, ordered to shoot to kill if attacked, were sent in by Gov. Lurleen Wallace when snipers opened fire on police after black power leader Stokely Carmichael was arrested for disorderly conduct. They surrounded the concrete block house in the heart of the Negro section known as Happy Hollow and ordered the occupants to come out. Police said the house was the center of resistance and a shotgun blast from it wounded three men. One Shotgun Found But when the Negroes filed out, led by the owner of the house, Dan Houser Jr., they claimed they were only taking cover and had not participated in the shooting. None was arrested, but Sheriff Philip Woods said a shot gun was found in the house with one expended shell and a "loud smell of powder." Troops of Company A of the 105th Bn. Quartermaster Corps, armed with carbines, went through about a dozen houses on the sparsely settled

## Court Abolishes Negro-White Marriage Laws

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court today struck down state laws prohibiting marriage between Negroes and whites. The 9-0 decision came in a Virginia case. Fifteen other states have similar anti-miscegenation laws, however. The are Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and West Virginia. The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) took the issue to the Supreme Court on behalf of a white construction worker, Richard P. Loving, and his Negro wife, natives of Caroline County, Va. They were married in the District of Columbia in 1958 and returned to Virginia to live in violation of state law. Chief Justice Earl Warren, speaking for a unanimous court, said: "We have consistently denied the constitutionality of measures which restrict the rights of citizens on account of race. There can be no doubt that restricting the freedom to marry solely because of racial classifications violates the central meaning of the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment."

## Negroes Battle Florida Police

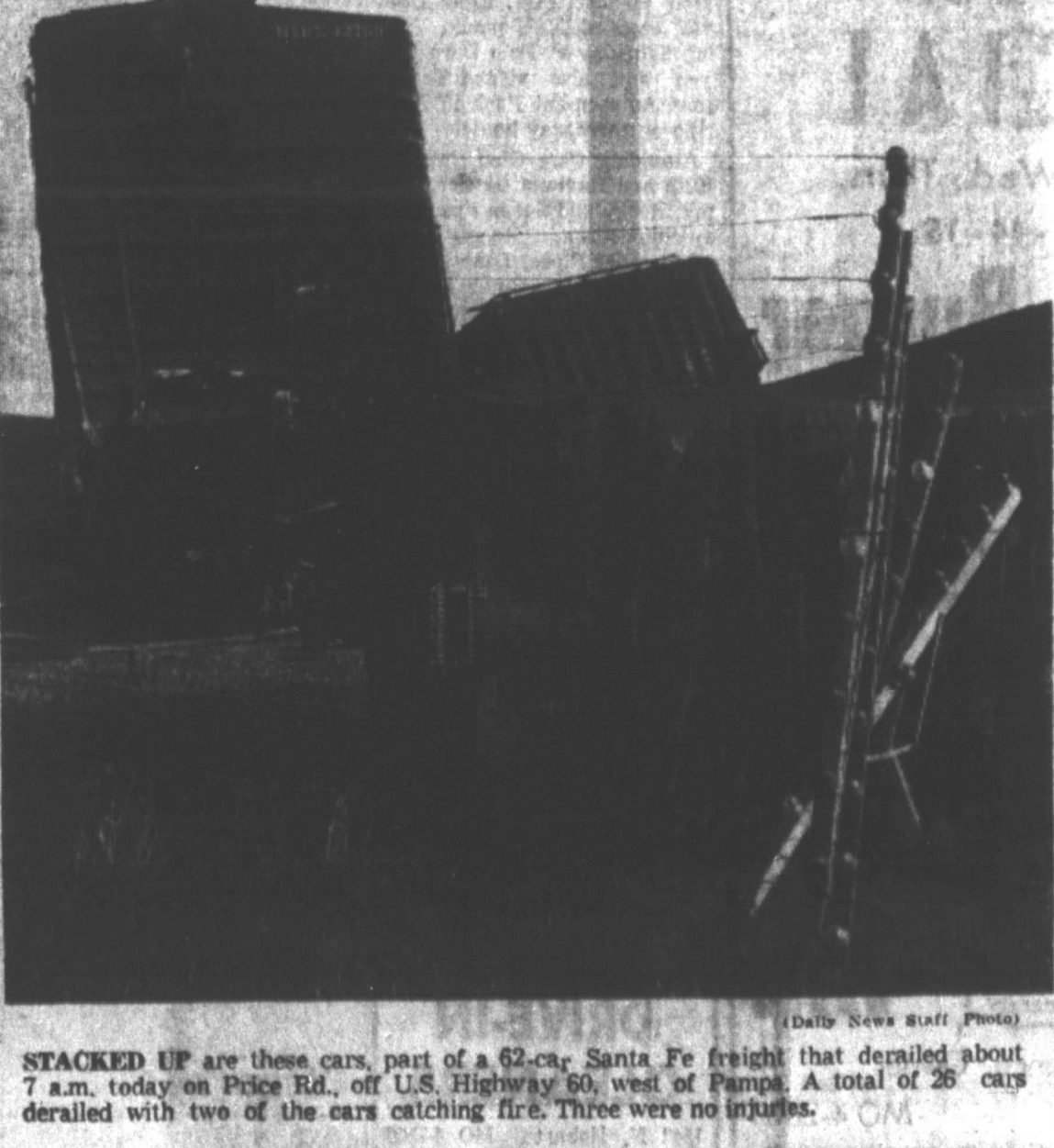
TAMPA, Fla. (UPI)—Hundreds of Negroes fought police with rocks and sniper fire and burned and looted stores in downtown Tampa early today in a boiling protest to the slaying of a Negro youth by police. One officer died of a heart attack in the melee. Gov. Claude Kirk flew in from Tallahassee and spent two hours conferring with Mayor Nick Buccicci and other officials. He returned to Tallahassee announcing he was "disturbed by the events of the night" but would not comment on the meeting. Fires lit the Tampa skyline and heavy smoke billowed over the city. ## Administration To Keep Mideast Promise of Aid

MIDDLEBURY, Vt. (UPI)—President Johnson's top international troubleshooter today held out the promise of U.S. aid to Israel and her Arab neighbors if they resolve their bitter conflict and join in regional cooperation. Walt W. Rostow, the President's national security affairs adviser, expressed the hope that a "new desire to achieve dignity and stability for all through regional cooperation" may emerge from the chaos in the Middle East. It was the Johnson administration's first formal policy declaration on the Mideast since the cease-fire took effect. Rostow, in a speech prepared for commencement exercises at Middlebury College, said the Middle East is the last "region in the non-Communist world where regional institutions and spirit have not yet begun to emerge. "During the whole post-war generation, that region has been bedeviled by a multiple split and quarrels; not only between the Arab states and Israel, but also by divisions among the Arab states and between certain Arab and certain Moslem states." Urging Israel and the Arab nations to "create a spirit of determination to face and solve problems by regional cooperation," Rostow said:

## Congress Extends Draft to '71; Guarantees College Deferrals

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress was set today to extend the military draft until 1971, while guaranteeing college men four years of uninterrupted study. Both the Senate and House planned to act on a compromise measure they worked out and send it to President Johnson by nightfall. He was expected to sign it within a few days. Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., intended to wage a fight in the Senate to eliminate the bill's ban against a draft lottery, but he was not given much chance of success. The measure, which brings to a close a year-long national debate on the draft laws, removes much of the uncertainty now facing young men. Can Complete College Benefiting most will be college undergraduates, who will be assured four years of uninterrupted education regardless of their grades or the prestige of their school—as long as they are able to stay in some kind of college. Gone would be the student classification tests and the controversial practice of universities sending the class stand-



## 26 Cars Of Freight Train Derail Here

Twenty-six cars of a 62-car Santa Fe freight train derailed about 7 a.m. today two miles west of Pampa at a crossing on Price Rd. There were no injuries in the derailment but a unit from the Pampa Fire Department was called to put out a fire in two of the cars, both refrigerated and carrying vegetables. Telephone lines and poles were knocked down when three cars toppled off the tracks and truck them. B. L. Pritchard, Santa Fe District Engineer, said shortly after 11 a.m. today that "Damage will be considerable but things are so hectic right now that we can't estimate it." Pritchard also said that the cause of the derailment was uncertain but that it was not used at a switching point as alleged earlier. Two Santa Fe employees were injured in the caboose and said the train was hit by a "terrible jolt." "The first we knew something was wrong was when the engine (See TRAIN, Page 3)

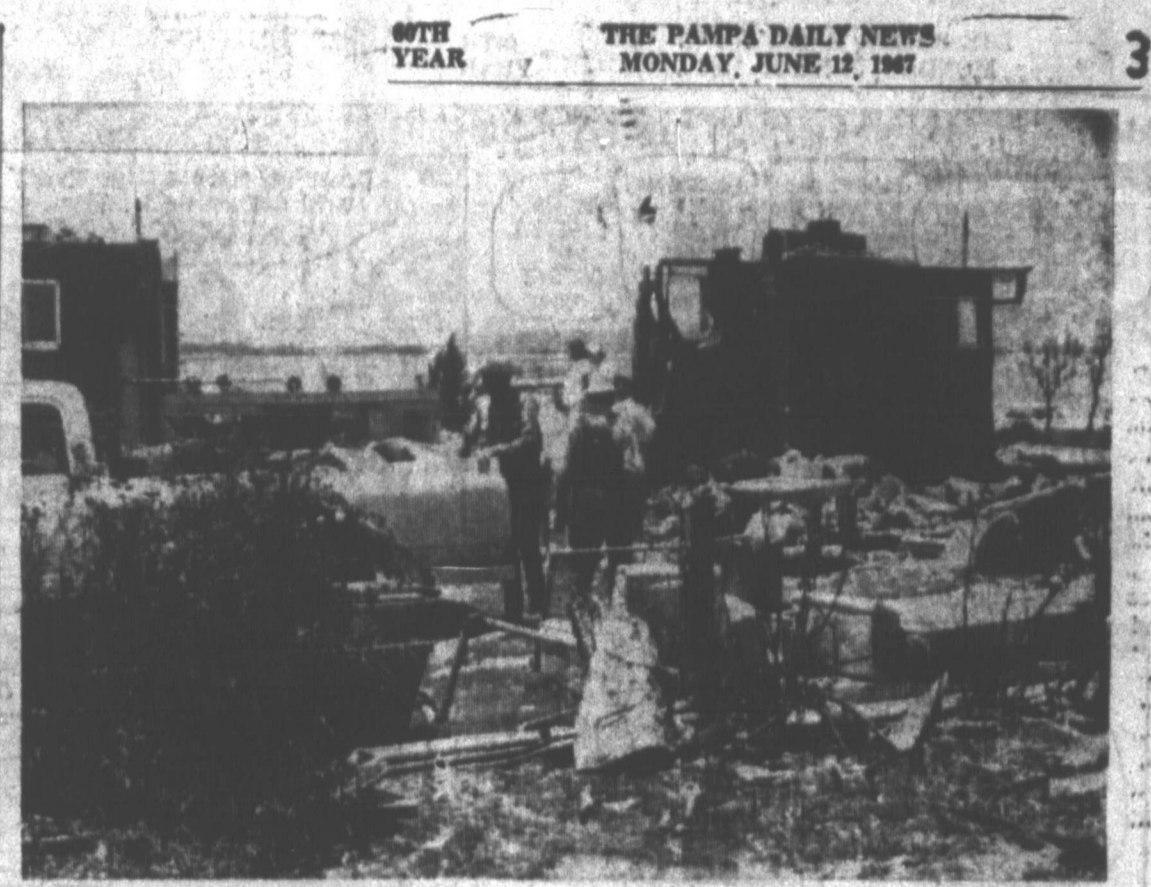

## Boros Wins Third Title

GRAND BLANC, Mich. (UPI)—Julius Boros has had a lot of rest, a little practice—and now he's hoping history will repeat itself.

Boros became the first PGA golfer to win three titles on this year's tour when he shot a three-under-par 69 to wrap up the 10th annual \$100,000 Buick Open Sunday.

Boros already had the Citrus Open and the Phoenix Open winnings in the bank.

His 69, after steady earlier rounds of 72, 72 and 70, put him in the winner's circle at the Buick Open for the second time in five years.

His closest competition was a trio which he left three strokes behind. Bert Yancey, of Tallahassee, Fla., R.H. Sikes, of Cleveland, and Bob Goalby, of Palm Springs, Calif., tied for second-place money with 286 totals for the 72-holes.

The first time Boros, now playing out of Mid Pines, N.C., won the Buick Open was in 1963—when he set a tournament record with a 274 score. Two weeks later, he grabbed the U.S. Open title and he's hoping to do it again this year.

"I've had a lot of time off recently," Boros said, after pocketing the winner's check for \$20,000. "I think I've rested five of the last seven weeks. I needed the practice, and I think it has done me a lot of good."

Boros will join the rest of the nation's top golfers for the U.S. Open this weekend at New Jersey's Baltusrol Country Club course.

The 47-year-old veteran shot ahead of the rest of the field on the first nine Sunday with three birdies, interrupted by a lone bogey, and added another birdie on the 14th hole.

## Involuntary Servitude

One of the most devilish schemes government has concocted in its highly successful endeavor of extracting life blood from the nation's economic stream is that of forcing businessmen to serve as tax collectors.

It enables the full-time tax collectors, those on the government payroll, to spend more time checking up on the amateur collectors and on the golden goose who is sometimes referred to as the taxpayer.

It also reduces the businessman's profits (and, in turn, his ability to pay better wages because of the loss of the time and effort he must put into tax-collecting and the accompanying mountains of paper work which could have been spent increasing his production, and profits.

Of the estimated over-all \$131 billion the federal government received in the fiscal year ended last June 30, approximately \$11 billion, or better than 75 per cent, was turned in through or by business. That's a pretty good percentage for involuntary, part-time help.

As Tax Foundation, Inc., points out, businessmen also serve as tax collectors in every state with a sales tax. Virginia

this year became the 42nd state to impose a sales tax. And, of course, it applies to every state with respect to federal income and "social security" taxes.

But don't get us wrong. We are not suggesting a law to permit the businessman tax collector to get a cut of the take and, thus, become a partner to plunder. Our intent, rather, is to point up the fact that taxes hurt everyone.

Taxes, in fact, are going up on every corner, and the effects of increased taxes and inflation are demonstrated rather graphically by Tax Foundation. For instance, a married man with two children who earned \$5,000 in 1956 must have earned about 18 per cent more in 1966 to be "as well off" as he was 10 years ago.

If he earned \$100,000 in 1956, he needed 7.6 per cent more earnings last year to stay even. On the other end of the earning scale, a man who earned \$3,000 in 1956 needed \$3,655, or 22 per cent more, last year to stay even.

So you can see that on a percentage basis it is the little guy who's getting hurt the most. And he's the same guy the government professes to be so interested in helping.

## The Villain in the Play

The only people who benefit from inflation are those who owe money. As dollars depreciate in value, debts become easier to pay off. The federal government, with the biggest debt the world has ever seen, is preparing to ask for a second raise in the debt ceiling this year to some \$340 billion. It is by far the greatest beneficiary of inflation, and it does nothing to correct its deficit spending policies which are the primary cause of inflation. No retrenchment measures are mentioned—just higher taxes and more debt.

Public worry over rising prices which pinch every family budget often results in criticism being directed against retailers who can do nothing but pass on to consumers the effects of inflation. In the local grocery store, this process is easily seen and widely felt, but kicking the man behind the counter makes no more sense than a dog biting the stick that his hind rather than the hand that wields it.

The validity of criticism directed toward the food industry over price increases must be

considered in the light of its accomplishments. The record shows that mass production combined with competitive retailing in a free market has done an exceptional job of protecting the consumer's interest. Among the nations of the world, many of which enjoy the blessing of government restrictions as contrasted with the free market, the United States heads the list for low percentage of disposable income spent for food—around 16.4 per cent for the average family. By contrast, in France food takes 30 per cent, in Japan, 43 per cent and in the Soviet Union, between 50 and 60 per cent.

The chain food retailing system in the United States operates on the principle of volume selling at low mark-up. Profits usually run around 1.3 per cent of sales. If that was eliminated, the average shopper would hardly notice the difference in his grocery bill. In seeking the villains in the story of inflation, remember that government has the most to gain from the process. Retailers like all the rest of us are the big losers.

## Wiping Out States' Rights

Last year, Congress extended coverage of the wage and hour law to more than 9 million workers. Included in the new coverage were many employees of state and local government. By lumping these state and local employees together with the 8. million additional workers that have been brought under the federal statute, Congress has raised a states rights issue.

Twenty-four states have joined in a law suit to prevent the federal government from

setting minimum wage rates for employees of state and local governments. According to U.S. News & World Report, "The states contend that the Tenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibits action by the federal government to fix wages in state and local government. This Amendment reserves to the states all powers not delegated to the federal government. It also is contended that states will be unable to plan their own budgets if the federal government can intervene to establish salary levels."

Union leaders have joined with the federal government in seeking dismissal of the suit. If they are successful, the day may arrive when they will regret their action. The rights of labor have advanced steadily under the American system of governmental checks and balances. Essential to the perpetuation of that system is the integrity of state government.

## Backstage Washington

Senate Subcommittee Wants to Know What's Happening To 'Undisbursed Balances' of Aid to Arab Belligerents

WASHINGTON — The Senate Subcommittee on Foreign Aid is delving into one facet of the envenomed Middle East conflict about which the Johnson Administration is suspiciously saying nothing.

This is what is being done about unspent millions of dollars in economic and military aid allocated to the five Arab belligerents—Egypt, Jordan, Syria, Iraq and Lebanon.

These so-called "undisbursed obligations" apparently exceed \$23 million.

Few outside of high inner officials are aware that considerable amounts are still credited to these Arab countries on the foreign aid books. This isn't known even to members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee—now in the process of "marking up" the President's proposed \$3.126 billion foreign aid budget.

But the Senate investigating subcommittee, headed by Senator Ernest Gruening, D-Alaska, published figures that raise sharply pertinent questions. Foremost among them are:

Have these undisbursed balances been cut off, or are payments still being made?

What policy, if any, has the administration formulated on further large-scale aid to the warring Arab countries?

Both questions are of key moment in what Congress does about the pending multi-billion dollar foreign aid budget. There is wide sentiment for barring more aid to these nations.

In the past 15 years the U.S. has given nearly \$2 billion in economic aid to Egypt, Syria, Iraq, Jordan and Lebanon. Of this total about \$1.5 billion was handed out between 1961 and 1966—in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations.

No country has done more for these Arabs than the U. S. No country has gotten less in return and been more viciously denounced and maligned. Throughout Congress, it is indignantly felt that if ever there was a glaring instance of "biting the hand that feeds," this is it.

BACKSTAGE DETAILS—So far Senator Gruening has made little headway in learning what the administration is doing about these "undisbursed obligations."

Unless satisfactory answers are forthcoming, he will hold hearings and summon State Department and other officials for thorough questioning. In preparation for that possibility, his staff has uncovered the following significant complications:

As of April 30, 1967, \$12,223,000 in "commodity assistance" (surplus food) was still in the pipeline for Jordan and Iraq—\$10,061,000 for Jordan; \$2,162,000 for Iraq.

As of March 31, 1967, \$6,337,000 in grants for specific projects was still being disbursed as follows:

Egypt, \$2,268,000 for ground communications training center, agricultural development, civil aviation development, nation-

The Indian government is very jittery over President Johnson's delay in authorizing the shipment of another 1,500,000 tons of surplus grain. In view of India's warm support of the Arabs in the Middle East crisis and Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's effusive birthday greeting last month to Ho Chi Minh, the White House is in no hurry to rush more food to India. The feeling in the administration is that the Gandhi government is basically unfriendly to the U.S.

Despite reports that Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin is returning to Washington, it will be some time before he leaves Moscow. . . . Mrs. Frances Howard, sister of the Vice President, is writing a book tentatively titled, "Growing Up With Hubert." It is scheduled for fall publication.

## The Doctor Says:

Vitamins Are Important To Both Child and Adult  
Q—What symptoms would a vitamin deficiency cause? Could it cause soreness of the tongue, dryness of the mouth, pains in the fingers and toes or nosebleeds?

A—A deficiency of vitamin A may cause night blindness and dryness of the eyes; of vitamin B-1 (thiamine) may cause nervous irritability, leg pains, wasting or atrophy of the muscles and water-logging; of vitamin B-6 (pyridoxine) may cause nervous irritability; depression, severe dandruff with seborrheic dermatitis and a sore tongue; of vitamin B-2 (riboflavin) may cause cracking of the corners of the mouth, sore tongue, pain in the eyes on exposure to light and blurred vision; of vitamin B-12 (cobalamin) may cause anemia; of niacin

may cause mental aberration, diarrhea and a skin rash; of vitamin C (ascorbic acid) may cause bleeding gums, nosebleeds, brittle hair, dry skin, pain in the joints and slowness of healing of wounds; and of vitamin D may cause rickets in children or osteomalacia (softening of the bones) in adults. No one of the vitamin deficiencies, however, would cause all the symptoms you mentioned.

Q—I have heard that to be effective vitamin B-12 must be given by injection. If that is so, why is it included in multivitamin pills?

A—Vitamin B-12 promotes normal growth in children. For this purpose, it may be given in tablets along with other vitamins if the child cannot get a balanced diet. The vitamin is also a specific cure for pernicious anemia. For this purpose, injections into a muscle are most effective. Once the disease is controlled a maintenance injection is needed only once every six or eight weeks. If, for any reason, it must be given by mouth it must be taken daily.

Q—How does vitamin D poisoning affect a person? What can be done to cure it?

A—Vitamin D poisoning may cause a loss of appetite, nausea, weakness, headache, inordinate thirst and a feeling of general peppiness. The condition will clear up if you avoid cod liver oil, fortified milk, salmon, tuna fish, eggs, multivitamin tablets and exposure to direct sunlight or ultraviolet lamps.

Q—An X ray showed softening of my bones. Could that be a side effect of taking prednisone? I have been taking it for six years for arthritis.

A—Yes. Drugs of the cortisone group should not be taken continuously.

## Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—John W. Schultz of Wolfe & Co. says a recovery from the four week decline could spark a second major uptrend that might well break through the previous 900 recovery peak of May 8.

The market's ability to remain above the 840 Dow Jones support level during the Mid-East crisis, he said, has enhanced its "almost incredibly strong position."

Value Line Investment Survey expects the steel industry's shipments and earnings to decline this year.

Foreign Commentary. United Press International. Outlook from the foreign cables desk: NASSER AFTERMATH: U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser's decisive defeat at hands of the Israeli army will cause a lot of re-thinking not only in the Kremlin but among all the Arab nations he tried to weld together into a powerful force. It could upset French President Charles de Gaulle's thinking too. There were widespread Arab manifestations of support when Nasser resigned on Friday and calls for his return to leadership which he obeyed the next day. But diplomatic observers in London expressed doubt his leadership would ever again go unchallenged because of his handling of the war. Nasser's defeat appeared to have caught the Russians by surprise, and the Kremlin is expected to do some hard thinking before it considers its next move. Paris reports said De Gaulle had planned to make the United Arab Republic the pivot of France's policies in the Arab world with an exchange of state visits planned by De Gaulle and Nasser.

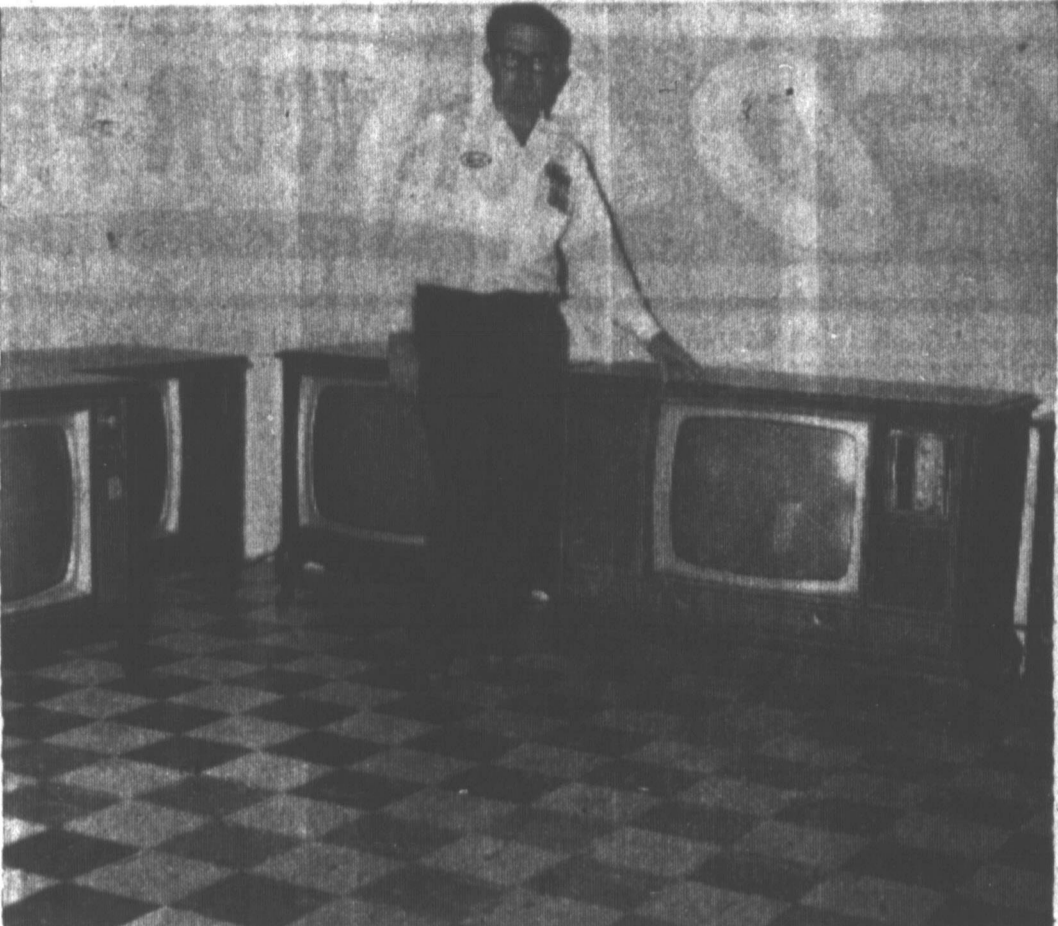

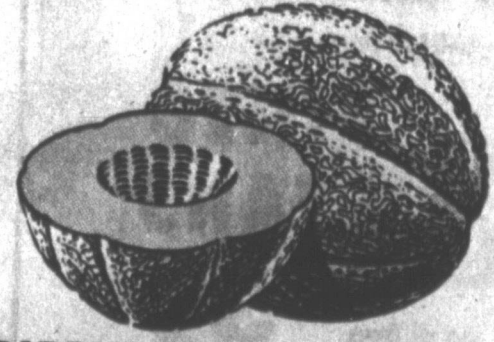
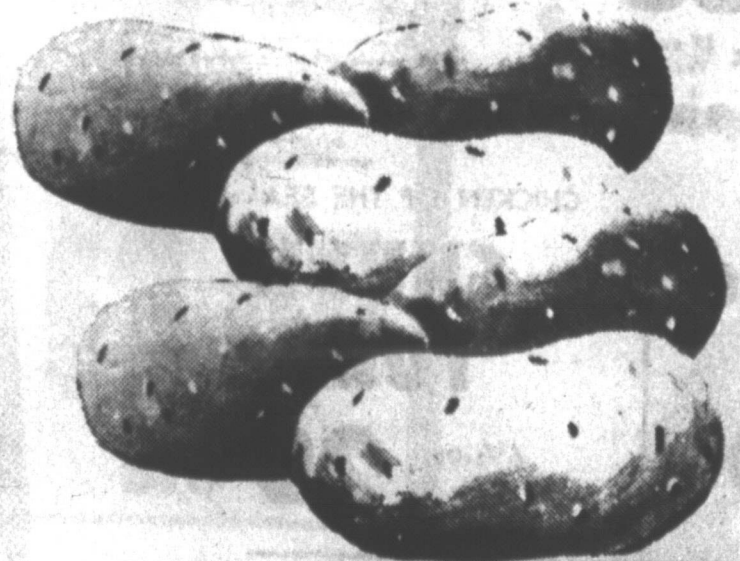
