





That may not be good law but it is better than no law at all. Unions do not like it. Their 17 leaders are winding up oppose legislators who helped enact the legislation.

That appears to be what frightens Johnson, that he may lose votes in 1968 if he collaborates in an effort to protect the national interest against irreparable damage.
