

GERMANY MAY BE WINNER OF AFRICAN WAR

RICH PROPAGANDA IS GENERATED BY CONFLICT

Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of three dispatches by members of the Associated Press Berlin bureau on the situation in Germany.

BY WADE WERNER Associated Press Foreign Staff BERLIN, March 6. (AP)—Germany, no longer a member of the League of Nations, is nevertheless watching Geneva's attempts to settle the Italo-Ethiopian war with interest as great as though she were directly involved.

Optimists at the Wilhelmstrasse believe that when the war is over, Germany will prove the real winner. The international anxieties involved in this question had a lot to do with Geneva's attempt to prevent the war; and now that all attempts to prevent it or to bring it to an early end have thus far failed, the anxieties show no signs of diminishing.

Official Germany, while stressing from the first its absolute neutrality toward the conflict, has never vigorously denied that in the long run the African war might turn out to have been a good thing for the third reich.

Informal conversations on the subject in government quarters often sparkle with the phrase "Der deutsche drittel"—the laughing third person who walk away with all the advantages of a disastrous quarrel between two others. The "laughing third" in this case would be the third reich.

But all this is "future music," the German equivalent of eggs counted before they are hatched. What, if anything, has Hitler's German already gained from the Italo-Ethiopian conflict?

In the first place, Hitler's regime has gained some of the most effective propaganda material available for internal use since the German came to power. As though in confirmation of Hitler's doctrine that a strong army is the nation's best defense the League of Nations condemned Mussolini's invasion of Ethiopia—and encouraged the Ethiopians to use whatever army they had to throw him out.

It does not still remain a German who does not think that that proves Hitler absolutely right about withdrawing from the league and re-arming, then it is no fault of Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels.

Another rich vein of propaganda material in the Italo-Ethiopian "gold mine," and one vigorously exploited by Goebbels, is the attitude of the Catholic clergy in Italy. Each time a bishop in Italy gave gold in the government's gold drive, the press of Nazi Germany whined, blanketing the country with stories and pictures of the event, and with editorials comparing the attitude of the church of Italy with its alleged anti-government activities in Germany.

Also exploited to the full was the rallying of the Italian people around Il Duce when an article was voted against Italy. That rally, the Nazi press has pointed out with great frequency, showed that in times of stress and danger what a country must have is one leader.

Economically the Italo-Ethiopian war doesn't seem to have been such a gold mine for Germany, at least in official figures. As against exports to Italy of 260,900,000 reich marks in 1934, the 1935 figure was 278,300,000 reich marks—an improvement, but hardly a bonanza.

On the other hand, an increase in Germany's exports to South America may have been partly due to war and sanctions effects on Italy's trade in that market.

Diplomatically the African preoccupations of Mussolini have had at least one effect which might be considered a gain for Germany: The

UNITED STATES WILL ADD TO WEST COAST DEFENSES

By ALEXANDER GEORGE WASHINGTON, March 6. (AP)—Congress has moved toward the greatest strengthening of coast defenses in the Pacific since the end of the world war.

Rigid secrecy obscures the details of this preparedness program, but the house has approved an expenditure of \$8,518,000—a \$7,000,000 increase in appropriations this year—for the improvement of harbor defenses of the Pacific Coast, Panama and the Hawaiian Islands. Senate approval of this and other army fund increases is regarded as virtually certain.

The coast defense program is considered one of the most significant phases of a record peacetime army appropriation. Representative Parks of Arkansas, chairman of a subcommittee which made a special study of our defenses in the Pacific, told congress that the committee had found conditions to be "alarming."

He did not make public, however, the reasons for the alarm, stating "there is no phase of our national defense which is kept more secret."

His committee, which visited San Francisco, Los Angeles, Long Beach and San Diego in the California area, recommended more protection be given that region by long-range sea-coast guns and anti-aircraft guns.

The committee also favored making the important naval base at Pearl Harbor, in the Hawaiian Islands "more impregnable against attack from any quarter." It reported the need there for an additional battery of 16-inch guns and more anti-aircraft batteries.

The great "American defense triangle" in the Pacific, with Hawaii as its apex and with its base extending from Alaska to the Panama canal, has been increasingly emphasized by the military experts as most vital to the nation's security.

Hawaii the Key They point out that inauguration of air service between the United States and the Orient and the increased flying range of military as well as commercial planes makes Hawaii more than ever the key to defense in the Pacific.

Gen. Hugh A. Drum, commander of the Hawaiian department, told the house military committee that "an enemy endeavor to form an iron ring of mutual assistance pacts which the Nazi press points out is being forged around the reich doesn't get much of its iron from Italy. In fact, a recent sudden journey to Berlin by Germany's ambassador to Italy was widely interpreted as having something to do with an Italo-German rapprochement."

Some nazis are confidently expecting that one way or another, the Italo-Ethiopian war will result in a solution of the Austrian problem favorable to Germany. That is, if it doesn't come about through an Italo-German understanding.

It will come spontaneously, if Italian internal difficulties—born of the Italo-Ethiopian conflict—should become so great that his influence in Austria is reduced.

Such nazid hopes and expectations, however, also belong to the "future music" type of volatility, if Italian internal difficulties—born of the Italo-Ethiopian war is really over will it be possible to estimate its favorable or unfavorable repercussions in Germany.

REPUBLICANS TO FLY FDR, NOT HIS AIDES

By LEONARD B. SHUBERT WASHINGTON, March 6. (AP)—Moves for "democratic unity" in Maryland and a decision by mid-west republicans to aim their sharpest darts directly at President Roosevelt instead of at subordinate new dealers attracted political interest today.

Senator Tydings, Maryland democrat who at times has expressed distaste for new deal policies, nevertheless called for support for President Roosevelt. Developments in Maryland are watched with particular interest because often in its history it has been ranked with doubtful states in presidential contests.

Tyding's announcement of support and his prediction of the president's reelection came a few hours after Mr. Roosevelt signed petitions to enter the Maryland, Massachusetts and Ohio primaries.

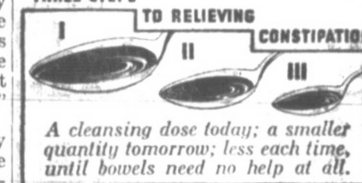
Addressing the state convention of young democrats at Baltimore, Maryland's senior senator said some administration policies were necessitated by the action of the previous republican regime. He expressed belief the president should "substantially modify a number of the emergency activities," and added that there were indications the president "favors such a course."

"We can best serve Maryland and the country," he declared, "by participating in the democratic party council and by diligently working throughout the campaign for the reelection of President Roosevelt."

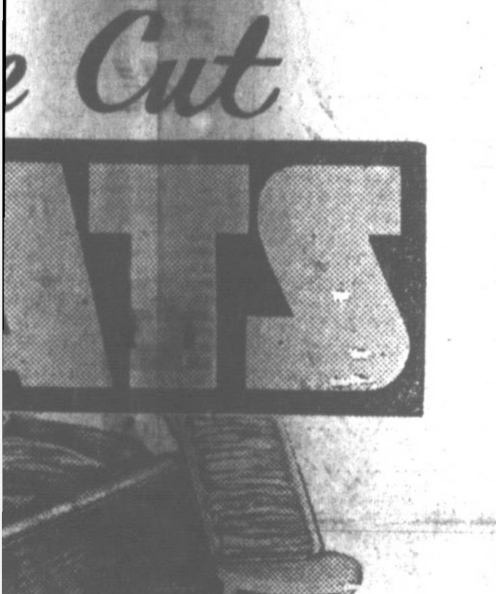

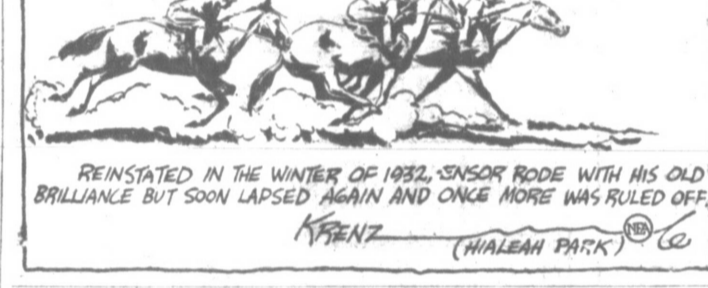

ANY APPLICANTS FOR OLD AGE ASSISTANCE WILL FAIL TO SHOW THEIR ELIGIBILITY

Many of those persons who apply for old age assistance will not be able to meet requirements, it was stated by John B. Hessey, district investigator, in a talk yesterday at Pampa Lions.

Of 3,000 applications received by the Amarillo office from the 20 counties of this district, more than 500 are being returned for corrections. Ten thousand applications are expected from this district. One applicant is 97 years old. Another, a Wheeler county woman, reported that she had 16 living children.

Many persons are confusing the Texas old age assistance plan with the Townsend plan. There is no connection. The maximum state assistance will not be \$15 a month. It presumably will be matched by federal funds. How to raise the money for the Texas payments is a task with which the legislature must wrestle.

Children are not responsible for the support of their parents. But no couple may obtain assistance if either has ample funds for both. As a condition of eligibility, income must not exceed \$360 per person or \$750 per couple, property must not exceed \$5,000 per single person or \$7,500 per couple, or the equity involved and cash or marketable securities must not exceed \$500 if the applicant is single or \$1,000 if married.

Habitual drunkards and criminals may not receive assistance. Assets must be listed and proof of age established. Applicants must be at least 65 years old and citizens of the United States. They must have lived in the state at least 5 years out of the last 9 and in Texas at least one year preceding the date of application. They must not have made voluntary assignment of assets in order to achieve eligibility.

Blanton Charges Horsewhipping of Soldiers in 1918

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—An order purported to have been issued over General Malin Craig's signature in 1918 for horse whipping of soldiers found with stolen goods was dug up today by Rep. Blanton (D., Texas) in his fight against the removal of Maj.-Gen. Johnson Hagood as eighth corps area commander.

Blanton read to the house a memorandum published in the San Antonio Evening News in 1921 in connection with the Watson investigation of cruelty in the world war expeditionary force.

"It has been reported that there has been considerable pilfering of individual property in this command," said the memorandum, signed by Craig as chief of staff of the first corps area headquarters in

France. "Every effort is being made to find property that has been stolen, and any person found with such property in his possession will be publicly horsewhipped."

By command of Major General Dickman. "MALIN CRAIG." "I just want to show," Blanton said, "that the same kind of heart is in a general who would order horsewhipping of somebody just because stolen articles were found in his possession, whether it was shown

he stole them or not, and the general, who would decapitate another general after 40 years' service."

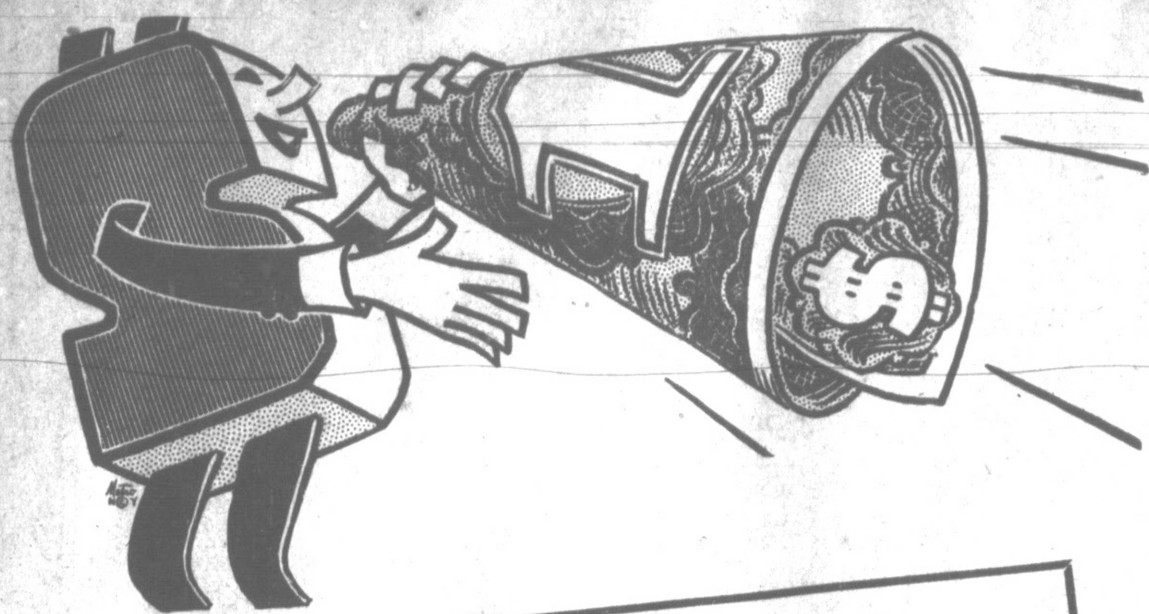

CONSTITUTION IS WANTED BY MANY TEXANS

EVERYBODY IT SEEMS WANTS TO READ DOCUMENT

AUSTIN, Mar. 6 (AP)—If demands on the state library are a true indication, the constitution bids fair to be one of the most widely read documents in Texas this year.

Old men and women, children, housewives, business and professional men, teachers and students have deluged the library with requests for copies of Texas' fundamental law, printed under a legislative resolution.

Since a 50-word announcement that 5,000 copies were available a few days ago, 1,800 have been mailed.

"It beats anything I ever saw," said Miss Doris Connerly, librarian. "It looks as if nearly everyone wants to read the constitution. The requests come from all classes and sections."

The requests are carried in letters and on postal cards, are typewritten and scrawled in rambling pencil script. Several are on tinted stationery.

One woman, writing that her husband's great grandfather was a signer of the Texas declaration of independence, asked two copies to "go around" among her 11 children.

Miss Lillian McKenney of Pilot Point, asking a copy, said that her father, S. A. McKenney, was a signer of the constitution of 1876.

Libraries and clubs wanted several copies. One club studying governmental affairs asked 90.

"I would be glad to have a copy so as to learn more about our state form of government," wrote one man.

A deputy sheriff said he needed more information on state laws, while Anna C. Hamilton of San Antonio requested 10 copies for class work among adults who are applicants for naturalization.

A man who lives in Texarkana wanted a copy sent to him and another to his mother in Wichita Falls "who is an 80-year-old native Texan and will appreciate it greatly." Another explained he came to Texas in 1885.

One cause for the demand is that the new edition contains the constitutional amendments adopted last summer repealing statewide prohibition, abolishing the fee system, authorizing old age pensions and pertaining to commitment of insane persons and suspending sentences.

In an introductory note to the edition, former Governor Pat M. Neff suggested that the constitution be studied during Texas Centennial year.

"It looks as if he would have his wish," Miss Connerly said.

Large Hunting Preserve Sold

KERRVILLE, Mar. 6 (AP)—Texas' largest private deer hunting preserve, the 17,000-acre Paint Creek ranch of the Schreiner family of Kerrville, has been sold to Marrs McLean, Beaumont oil man. The place is located 17 miles from Junction and has fish dams, hunting lodges and is well stocked with deer and wild turkeys. McLean owns several other ranches along the creeks of Kimble county.

The first pre-emptions on this ranch were taken out in 1854 by the late Joe Taylor of Gollad. In the open range days the water supplied by the creek on the place made it valuable. It was owned by six of Capt. Charles Schreiner's descendants who used it as a playground.

SAN JACINTO BATTLEFIELD TO BE MARKED BY 564-FOOT MEMORIAL

HOUSTON, Mar. 6. (AP)—The San Jacinto memorial to be erected this year on the historic battlefield near Houston where Texans won independence from Mexico a century ago will be 564 feet high, nine feet higher than the Washington monument. Elevators will carry visitors to an observation tower 90 feet from the top.

These and other details of the planned monument on the San Jacinto battlefield have been disclosed by architect A. C. Finn.

The building from which the shaft will rise will be erected on the top of three terraces and the floor of the building will be thirty feet from the ground level, Finn said.

The first terrace will be six feet above the ground and 60 feet wide. A broad tier of steps will bring visitors to the building entrance, which will be of sculptured architectural design.

The visitor will step first into the Hall of Honor, a room 44 by 36 feet. Around it will be niches for statues of Texan heroes.

To the right will be a room 36 by 102 feet to house the San Jacinto museum of historical relics and documents. On the left will be a room of the same size to be used as a meeting hall and art gallery.

In the rear of the building will be a submerged amphitheater with two stages for the production of pageants and other dramas.

On the building will be eight spaces for inscriptions reciting Texas history. The spaces will be 25 by 13 feet, with letters eight inches high.

There will be two great plaques, one bearing the names of all those
