

Police Break Up Antidraft Foes

 Antidraft demonstrators in New York and Cincinnati were hauled away by no-nonsense police Thursday on the fourth day of a planned week-long nationwide campaign.

Demonstrators organized another round of protests today in New York.

Thousands of New York police were ready and waiting Thursday to prevent demonstrators from marring the visit of President Johnson and Vice President Hubert Humpfrey, who attended funeral services for Francis Cardinal Spellman.

Demonstrators were rounded up as fast as paddy wagons could cart them away. About 300 were picked up and about 140 were charged. The others were released after streets were cleared.

About 100 longshoremen staged a counter march, carrying small American flags and singing choruses of "God Bless America." There were isolated minor incidents between longshoremen and the antidraft demonstrators and disgruntled onlookers.

All week, the demonstrators have tried unsuccessfully to blockade New York's Selective Service induction center.

Protesters sat down Thursday in front of the induction center in Cincinnati and 73 were arrested. Two were charged with assault and battery against a policeman after a patrolman said he was spat upon.

A mass meeting was scheduled for today in Los Angeles at the California State College, with the theme of "victory over Dow. Revolutionary power. Freedom and peace now."

The Students for a Democratic Society, sponsors of the rally, are demonstrating against the draft and use of campus facilities by job recruiters from the Dow Chemical Co., a firm manufacturing napalm.

About 200 Ohio State University students at Columbus surrounded two Navy recruiters Thursday but the protest turned into a debate when an opposing faction of students protested in turn.

Picketing and marches took place at Indianapolis Ind., and at Ithaca, N.Y., where a Cornell University faculty member and 10 students turned in what they said were their draft cards.

Fulbright Blasts President For 'Unnecessary War'

Fighting in Vietnam Immoral Senator Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. J. William Fulbright opened a new attack today on President Johnson's Vietnam policies, charging that it is "an immoral and unnecessary war" in which the only thing America is proving is its willingness and ability to kill people.

Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said even if the war is won, this country could not take pride or satisfaction in the outcome because it could have been avoided.

"We still would have passed up opportunities which would have spared us and the Vietnamese the present ordeal," the Arkansas Democrat told the Senate in a speech prepared for firing up new war debate.

Taking issue with Fulbright on the morality of the war was Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., one of the Senate's war "hawks." With advance notice that Fulbright planned to speak, Dodd said in his prepared text that critics like Fulbright fail to say where they would draw the line against Communist expansion.

Insisting the United States is committed to a "moral cause," Dodd pleaded: "Let us not seek an easy way out, because there is no easy way out."

Fulbright called for "an honest effort" to end the war, either through international machinery or by negotiations between the South Vietnamese government and the Communists.

In his speech, Dodd challenged war critics to say "precisely what countries they propose to abandon and what countries they propose to defend" in the face of Communist expansion.

But Fulbright lashed out at the administration for "needless intervention of Vietnam," and he spoke scathingly of what Dodd called "the extravagant degree of freedom that the Johnson administration has accorded to dissenters."

"For my part," Fulbright said, "I should like to make it clear that I am not the slightest bit grateful to the administration for my freedom of speech. That freedom is an inalienable right which the American people reserved to themselves when they established a constitutional government... when the government abstains from suppressing dissent, it is doing nothing more than complying with one of the explicit conditions of its constitutional trust. That is not a gratitude which is owed."

AT 4 P.M. TODAY McPhillips Inducted As City Postmaster

Raymond W. McPhillips Jr., a letter carrier in the Pampa Postoffice for the past quarter century, was scheduled to be sworn in as acting postmaster at 4 p.m. today in the postmaster's office.

Postal officials, carriers and friends from Amarillo, Borger, Lefors and other surrounding towns were arriving early this afternoon for the ceremony.

Harold W. Richey, postal inspector from Amarillo, was here today to transfer postal funds and accounts and to induct McPhillips into the office at 4 o'clock.

Glenn M. Hodges, field director for the Dallas Region of the National Association of Letter Carriers, said yesterday he hoped to be in Pampa in time for the ceremony unless other business conflicted.

McPhillips' appointment was made known Wednesday in The Pampa News after it was learned his appointment had been recommended by Sen. Ralph Yarborough and confirmation had been given by the President.

McPhillips will succeed Carl V. English who has been serving as assistant postmaster in charge since the death of acting postmaster Lynn Boyd in November of 1966.

English will again become assistant postmaster, the post he held under Mr. Boyd and O. K. Gaylor, who retired in 1965.

Plot Thwarted To Assassinate Gov. Rockefeller

SAN ANGELO, Tex. (UPI) — An underworld plot to assassinate Arkansas Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller because of his crackdown on vice and organized gambling has been thwarted, police acknowledged today.

Police Chief Melvin James said the plot was "real, true and authentic."

James' terse comment followed two days of intensive interrogation of a prisoner by state police in Texas and Arkansas.

The suspect, Zakar Garogian, 34, was returned here Thursday after he was whisked "out of state," presumably to Little Rock, for interrogation.

Garogian has been charged with burglary involving a bottling company and a west Texas bank.

James refused to describe the plot.

Rockefeller's new state police director, Lynn A. Davis, personally conducted the raids against Winthrop, Ark., health spa.

His life has also been threatened, said Davis, who is free on his own recognizance after he was jailed Thursday for contempt of court.

Davis was ordered to jail for refusing to identify a confidential informant who supplied him with information for the four raids.

The crackdown by Rockefeller on gambling and vice began in August when he appointed Davis as director of the state police force.

Part of the governor's campaign was to clean up Hot Springs.

Davis personally led the first raid in which \$70,000 in gambling equipment was confiscated from five clubs.

In early October Davis hit repair shops and seized hundreds of thousands of dollars in hard-to-replace gambling equipment parts.

Davis estimated some \$500,000 to \$1 million in gambling devices had been destroyed.

AGGIELAND NOW ATOMLAND Joke's Not on Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UPI) — Texas A&M University has grabbed off some of the choicest educational programs of the space age while other universities in the state have been collecting Aggie jokes.

The plums include:

- A new \$7 million cyclotron (atom smasher).
- The new Olin E. Teague Research Center to which the National Aeronautics and Space Administration gave a \$1 million grant.

The finest activation analysis laboratory in the free world. Activation analysis uses atomic radiation to determine chemical composition.

-A nuclear reactor.

The only undergraduate nuclear course in the state.

-An oceanography school.

-An advanced IBM 360-65 computer system, as sophisticated as any in the Southwest and one of the finest university systems in the country.

Texas A&M has come a long way since the days it was more agricultural and mechanical and when, according to legend, students shot deer in the campus shrubbery and skinned them in the showers.

Now, one out of every three students in the total enrollment of 12,629 is majoring in engineering and one out of four is specializing in some area of liberal arts.

The enrollment of the college of agriculture is third, behind the college of engineering (No. 1) and the college of liberal arts (No. 2).

Graduate Dean Wayne C. Hall says A&M has the largest percentage of graduate students in the state.

Pampans Urged To Join 'Share-In'

Capt. Jess Duncan of the Salvation Army today urged Pampans to join the Army's annual Christmas "Share-In" for the city's needy.

The "Share-In" conducted through contributions to the Salvation Army kettles and by letters, containing cash or check donations, makes it possible for needy children, poverty-stricken families and shut-ins to have a merry Christmas.

Captain Duncan said there are now on the Army's lists some 653 children, 150 shut-ins and more than 100 families in Pampa whose holiday enjoyment depends on these Christmas contributions.

Money derived from the Christmas kettles and Letter Appeal of the Salvation Army goes to pay for toys already purchased and for food and clothing for the needy.

Volunteer Salvation Army workers are busy, Captain Duncan said, stuffing stockings, preparing candy boxes, dressing dolls, making table favors and wrapping gifts. These volunteer workers also will assist in food and toy distribution just before Christmas.

Red Made Arms Taken by Israeli

United Press International — Israeli troops killed six Arab terrorists and captured an arsenal of Communist-made weapons in a pitched battle in occupied Jordan, Israeli officials said today.

An Israeli government statement in Jerusalem added that "a considerable number" of El-Fatah terrorists were captured in the battle Thursday at a cave six miles southeast of Nablus. There were no Israeli troops reported killed.

Meanwhile, the rift between Israel and France widened with a report that France will supply Iraq with some of its most modern weapons.

Arab foreign ministers began arriving in Cairo to plan their Saturday meeting that will map an Arab summit meeting later this month at Rabat.

The battle with the terrorists developed when a group of El-Fatah men took refuge in the cave following a chase by Israeli security patrols, the statement said.

Among the captured weapons were Russian-made rifles and submachine guns and Communist Chinese recoilless rifles and ammunition, officials said.

In Paris, French government sources said Thursday France is ready to sell weapons to Iraq. They also said other Arab states would be welcome to buy French arms. The comments were made as Gen. Hassan Sabri, Iraqi deputy chief of staff, continued an official visit to France that included talks with President Charles de Gaulle.

Water Official Given Citation For Proficiency

Tony R. Anderson, assistant water superintendent, has been awarded an official State Health Department citation for work proficiency.

Mae Wofford, director of public utilities, said today the citation is an aftermath of tests and examination taken by Anderson Nov. 7 in Lubbock.

Along with the certificate of competency, officials of the Texas Water & Sewerage Works high rating reflects the regard in which he is held by state water officials.

It is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Anderson's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

Municipal Bond Rating Analyst In Pampa Today

City, county and school officials from Pampa and Borger attended a luncheon this noon in Coronado Inn at which Hy Grossman of New York City, account executive for Standard & Poor investment rating firm, was to speak briefly.

The luncheon was sponsored by three leading investment houses in Texas — Southwest Securities and Columbia Securities, both of San Antonio, and R. A. Underwood & Co. of Dallas.

Joe Smith and Bob Davis represented the San Antonio firms and R. A. Underwood was here representing his Dallas company.

City Manager Jim White was emcee at the luncheon and introduced members of the three Texas investment companies.

Grossman was in Amarillo yesterday. He met with members of the city commission there. He is on a routine trip through the southwest gathering information on the area which is used to rate various cities on the sale of municipal bonds.

Grossman is Standard & Poor's representative for Texas and four other states in the Southwest.

City Manager White said approximately 25 to 40 persons were expected to attend today's luncheon.

Reagan to Probe College System

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Gov. Ronald Reagan Thursday ordered an investigation of California's college and university system following disorders that closed the sprawling San Francisco State campus.

Controversy grew around the handling of the riot Wednesday by San Francisco State President John Summerskill.

Reagan, visiting at Yale University, cancelled a GOP dinner scheduled Saturday night at Columbus, Ohio, to attend a state college trustees emergency session that night in Los Angeles.

The San Francisco State campus where 28,000 students attend classes here was quiet Thursday. Classes resumed following the shutdown triggered by a small band of militant students and off-campus agitators.

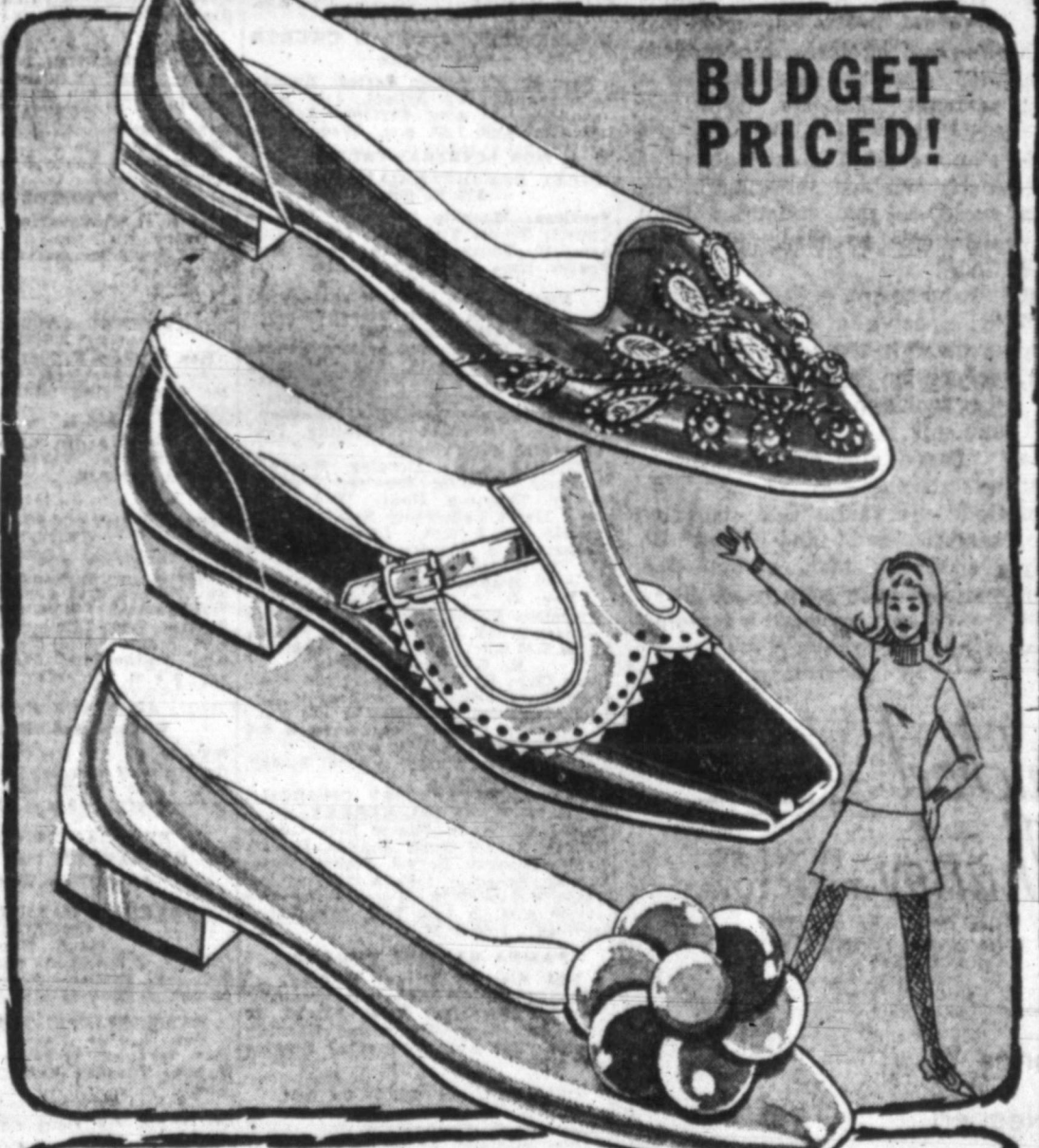

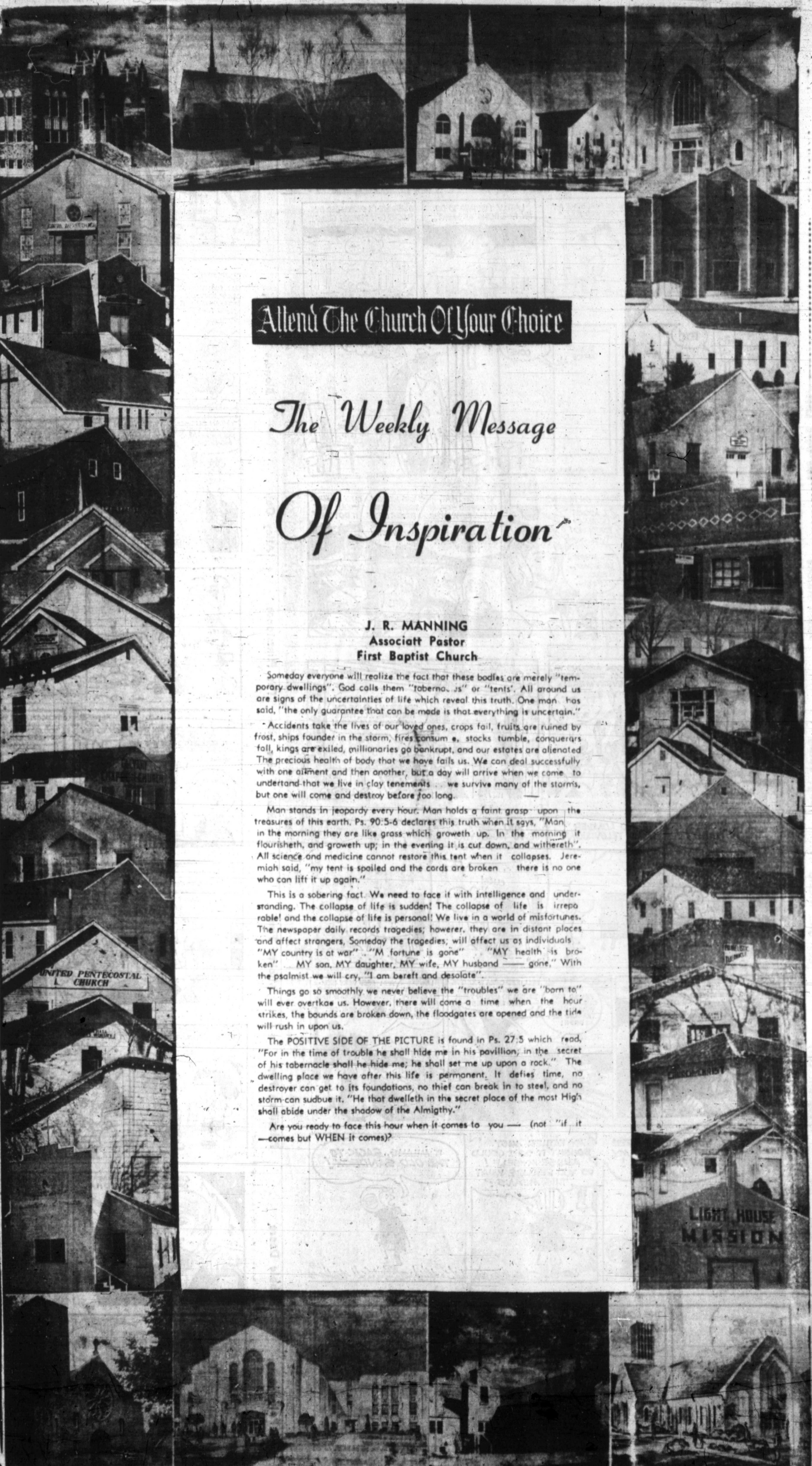

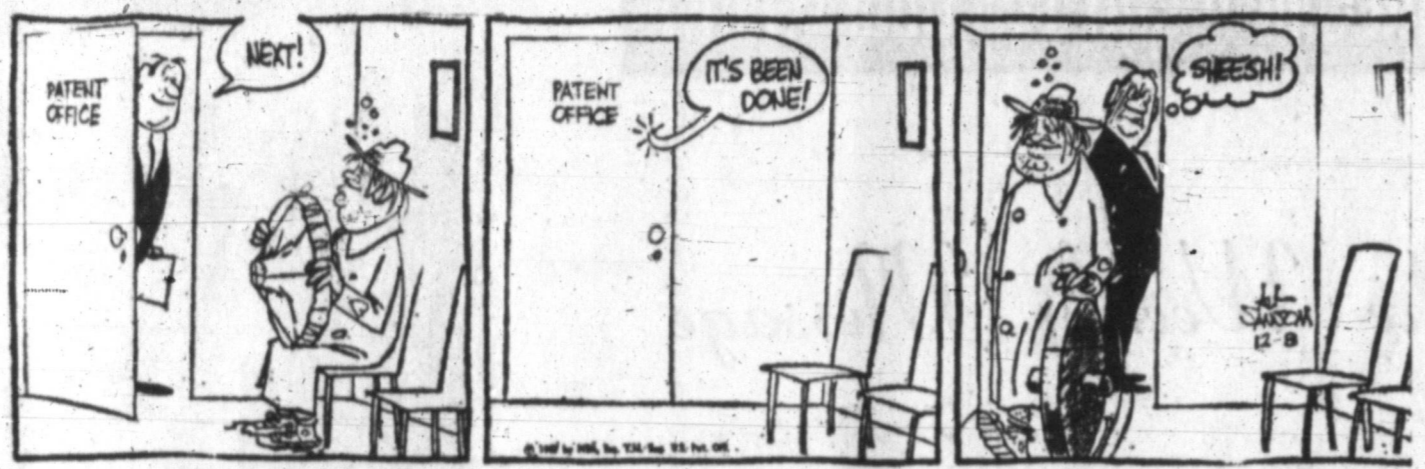

Harvesters Open Conference Play Tonight

Palo Duro, who wasn't given much of a chance, but has been tough as always and Pampa, who has given every chance and has done as expected, collide tonight at 8 p.m. in the District 3-4 conference opener for both teams in Pampa Fieldhouse.

With pre-conference play over the Harvesters will be working

on a six game winning streak and will be wanting to jump off to a 1-0 start in league play and push their season record to 8-1. Palo Duro, who has not scored as much as Pampa and has given up more points per game, will bring a surprising 5-1 record into the league affair. The Dons and Tom Gilley, who always play Pampa as tight as a new pair of pants,

were rebuilding this year around three returning lettermen. Thus far Palo Duro is averaging only 58.3 points per game on offense and 32.7 per game on defense. The Dons are short on experience but long on Hustle. Their rebounding is only fair but their shooting is just above average. They have been helped by the transfer of three players from

Carver School. Gilley had only 6'1 guard Lenord Major's, 6'0 guard Don Pierson and 5'11 forward Travis Brown returning this year. Pampa coach Terry Culley's Harvesters were the pre-season pick of the coaches to win the District title and thus far have been making the selectors look good. The Harvesters have better

than average height, good rebounding, can shoot the eyes out of the basket and have good speed and experience. With good shooters like George Bailey, Bo Lang, Jim Hollis and Beau Bond and good floormen in the persons of Johnny Carlos, Jim Cornett, Alvin Achord and Johnny Epperson, the Harvesters have been nearly unbeatable.

Pampa has clobbered Winters, Quariah, Childress, Burkburnett, Canyon, Elk City, Okla. and Phillips while suffering but one loss, that to San Angelo. Bailey is the leading point maker with an even 26 point per game average, Lang is carrying a 12.2 average, Bond, a 10.3 average and Hollis, who has appeared in only six games has

a 9.3 average. The Pampa Shockers will tip off at 8:30 p.m. against the Palo Duro Junior Varsity. Coach Bill Brown's cagers will be seeking their eighth win in nine outings. The Shockers are averaging 69.3 points per game and have given up an average of 49.7 points per contest.

Louis Brantley is pacing the Shockers in scoring with a 15.1 average while 6'4 Ronnie Lang has a 14.1 average and 6'6 Jim Gallman is carrying an even 14.0 average. Other District Niners will be seeing league action tonight with Lubbock hosting Amarillo and Tascosa playing host to Caprock.

Top Teams Win In Cage Games

That's the story of the University of Houston so far this season and judging from the Cougars' schedule much more success will follow. The third-ranked Cougars have spiced this year's schedule with a number of weak sisters and have opened their campaign successfully against three of them. Houston whipped Sacramento State and Abilene Christian in their first two outings and Thursday night crushed North Dakota State 121-88 for victory No. 3. NCAA semifinalists last year, the Cougars must play defending champion UCLA in the Astrodome later this season but in the meantime they figure to get fat on some of the nation's weaker teams. Centenary of Louisiana, West Texas State, Nevada Southern and Arizona are all on the Cougars' schedule in the next month. Elvin Hayes was Houston's leader again Thursday night with 38 points and 15 rebounds, but the "Big E" had to take a back seat to the sensational 50-point performance turned in by North Dakota State's Ron Schlieman. Schlieman connected on 67 percent of his field attempts as he canned 24 field goals and two of three free throws for the second best individual effort this season. Niagara's flashy sophomore, Calvin Murphy, scored 37 points Wednesday night. There were very few games on the schedule Thursday night and no others that involved any of the top 10 teams. Bradley ran its record to 3-0 with an 80-52 victory over Memphis State. Arizona State turned back Creighton 87-81.

New York University beat Texas 75-67 and Manhattan edged Rhode Island 66-65 in major games. Joe Allen's 24 points sparked Bradley's victory as the Braves handed Memphis State its first loss in four outings. The game was the first for Memphis State in the highly competitive Missouri Valley Conference, in which it is competing for the first time. Hero Dettler tallied 26 points to spark Arizona State's victory; Jim Miller scored 20 as NYU outlasted Texas and Bill Goodfellow tossed in 19 to pace Manhattan's upset of Rhode Island. In other games, Holy Cross was forced into overtime before edging Dartmouth 73-70; Virginia topped VMI 84-79, St. Louis routed Hardin-Simmons 107-80, Florida downed Florida State 95-87 and Georgia Tech tripped Georgia 86-78.

Soccer Groups To End Feud

NEW YORK (UPI)—A major sports war that threatened to overflow into the courts with multi-million dollar law suits appeared averted today as a Soccer Association and the National Professional Soccer League. The consolidation document was readied late Tuesday night, but copies of the agreement had to be sent to all clubs before a formal announcement could be made. A further meeting was set for Chicago Dec. 13 to determine the cities for the two-sectional operation. There will be six teams in 1967 and the USA will add six more in a separate National Division. Dick Walsh, commissioner of the USA last season, said a news conference was called Thursday because "we felt it advisable to set the record straight in view of the many and varied reports appearing in the press during the previous 24 hours." The NPSL operated with 10 teams in 1966 and the USA with 12. Each league had a team in New York, Boston, Los Angeles, Chicago, Toronto and San Francisco-Oakland. Under the new alignment, there will be just one team in New York and Los Angeles. The rest of league complement will be announced next week.

Football Dreams End On Sad Note for Walker

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—Mel Walker was the promising sophomore defensive halfback for the University of Wisconsin who many people came to watch in Memorial Stadium on Nov. 25 when the Badgers played Minnesota. At 21 Walker, an all-state football and basketball player from his native West Virginia, led Wisconsin in pass interceptions this year in five and was the team's top player in breaking up passes and stopping touchdowns. He recovered two fumbles and ranked seventh on the team in tackles. He was an "enthusiastic" football player, according to his assistant coach, Roger French. But it was in the first quarter of that game in Minneapolis that enthusiasm on the football field turned into a fight for his life. The play happened so fast that no one was sure how it occurred, but Walker's left leg was injured, seriously. He was rushed to the University of Minnesota Hospital. Surgeons at the hospital tried to repair the damage to his knee that day, but two days later blood circulation problems developed. They operated to remove a blood clot at 3 a.m. Nov. 28. Later, Walker was taken to Hennepin County Hospital, which has one of the few hyperbaric chambers necessary for treatment to get oxygen into leg tissues. One day after the operation, doctors discovered that Walker had "become toxic." Immediate surgery was required to remove his left leg below the knee. It won't be easy for Mel Walker to sit on the sidelines watching his old teammates next year, but he will probably be there just the same. Although he was still listed in serious condition late Thursday, his

enthusiasm for the game of football had transcended his fight for life. He was in "good spirits," French said after a visit with Walker Thursday night. And he "can't wait to be on the sidelines next fall."

Winger Dies After Stroke

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI)—Professional golfer Francis (Bo) Winger died here Thursday of complications which developed from a stroke he suffered Nov. 20 while visiting friends and relatives. Once one of the most debonair golfers Oklahoma ever produced, Winger's present home was Las Vegas, Nev. The 45-year-old golfer had been under intensive care in an Oklahoma City hospital, and doctors said earlier in the week that the pro would probably be partially paralyzed as a result of the illness. Hospital officials had reported that Winger was improving, but his physician said he developed an acute complication to the stroke early Thursday and died during the afternoon.

Biggest Crowd Ever Set To See Camellia Bowlers

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—The largest crowd in the Camellia Bowl's seven-year history was expected to turn out Saturday to see if pass-happy San Francisco State College can upset national small college champion San Diego State. Game sponsors say brisk advance ticket sales indicate a crowd near 20,000. Last year, a record 15,740 watched Coach Don Coryell's, San Diegans dump Montana State, 28-7, in the bowl contest. Coryell said thaty far the biggest problem facing his No. 1 ranked Aztecs is stopping San Francisco quarterback Bob Toledo, who rewrote the NCAA's passing records this season in leading the Gators to a Far Western Conference title. The 5-10, 180-pound signal caller completed 211 of 396 passes for 3,513 yards and 45 touchdowns. All are records for the NCAA college and university divisions. Coryell said his defense was hurt considerably when the NCAA ruled ineligible for the Camellia Bowl six starting Aztecs, including safety Nate Wright, tackle Fred Dryer, signal caller Mike Meagher and halfback Marty Stieger from the defensive team. Two San Francisco State players, fullback John Cummins and end Joe Hebel, were ruled ineligible for the game. San Diego, ranked by United Press International as the top

Packers First of Four Must Games Rams Face

By United Press International The Los Angeles Rams will go for broke Saturday at the start of a venture even the legendary "Bet Million Gates" wouldn't back. The Rams will meet the Green Bay Packers in a game they must win to keep alive their chances to win the Coastal Division championship in the National Football League. The Rams will go into the game with a 9-1-2 record which leaves

them second to the 10-0-2 mark of the Baltimore Colts. But the Packers game is only the beginning—and the fact that the Rams are favored by five points is small consolation to them. Because, in order to make the Super Bowl, the Rams must not only beat the Packers on Saturday but must follow that victory with consecutive triumphs over the Colts, Packers and either the Dallas Cowboys or the Century Division champion "Bet a Million Gates" gambled on barbed wire, railroads, women and dice but it's doubtful if he would have backed a four-part parlay such as the Rams face. Should the Packers beat the Rams in the nationally televised game scheduled to start at 4 pm EST, the Colts can clinch the Coastal title by beating the New Orleans Saints on Sunday.

The Colts are favored by 19 points over the Saints, who have a 2-10 record. In other games on Sunday, the Chicago Bears are nine-point favorites over the Minnesota Vikings, the Cleveland Browns are three over the St. Louis Cardinals, the Cowboys are eight over the Philadelphia Eagles, the Washington Redskins are four over the Pittsburgh Steelers, the New York Giants are six over the Detroit Lions, and the San Francisco Forty Niners are five over the Atlanta Falcons. The key to the Rams' Coastal title hopes is that they played a 24-24 tie with the Colts in their first meeting of the season. Consecutive victories over the Packers and Colts would give the title to the Rams because they would have scored more points in the two head-to-head meetings.

Texas A&M fought off a final period rally by West Texas State and defeated the Buffalos 89-63. Ronnie Peret scored 19 points to lead the Aggies. Jimmy Hill scored 39 points for the Buffs. Gets 20 Points New York University sped past Texas 75-67 with junior Jim Miller scoring 20 points for the Violets. The Longhorns were constantly harassed with smooth ball-handling and tight defensive play. Gary Overbeck topped the Longhorns scoring with 25 points. The St. Louis University Billkens defeated Hardin-Simmons 107-80 on the 30-point shooting of Rich Niemann. Hold Lead Briefly Leroy Watson hit two points early in the game and made it 6-4, which was the only time the Cowboys held the lead. St. Louis held a 19-point advantage at the half. Beathard Will Have To Be at His Best Sunday

Lemm, whose surprising Oilers take on the mighty Oakland Raiders Sunday at Houston in the American Football League's top game, says Beathard is "moving the club real well...just as we expected he would after learning the system." 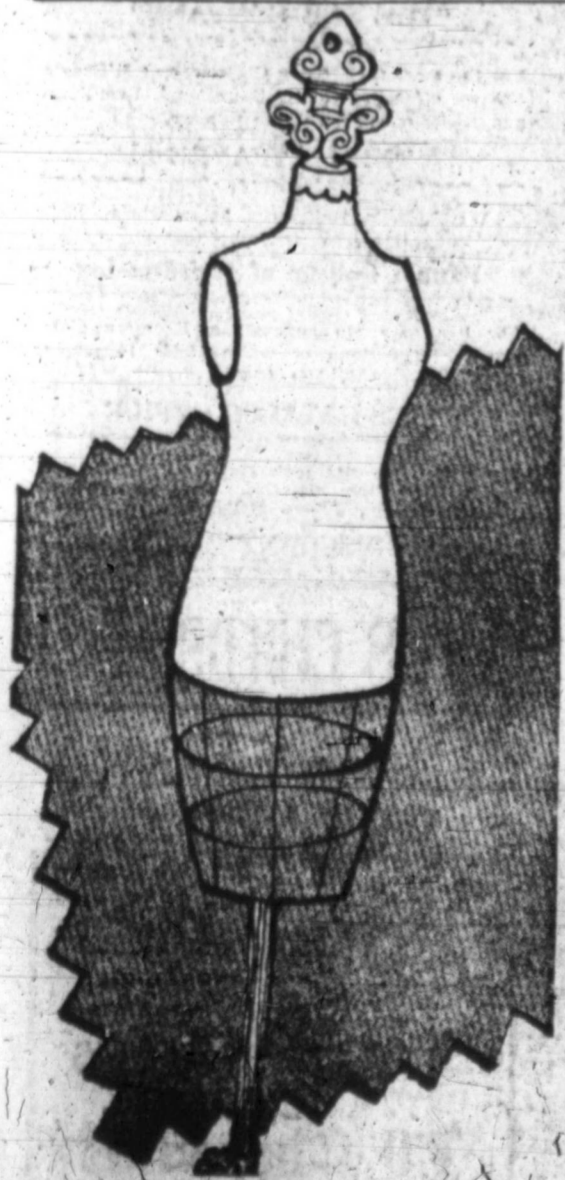
