Snow Snarls Panhandle; Warmer Weather on Way

Forecast Calls For Clearing on Thursday

A fresh blast of Arctic air pushed through the Panhandle early this morning and blanketed Pampa and the Panhandle with two inches of fine, dry snow.

The pre-dawn snowfall started near 3 a.m. and very light snow flurries continued throughout most of the morning. The overnight low was 21 degrees.

Streets and highways were slick and hazardous in spots but were open. The Texas Department of Public Safety urged caution.

Pampa police reported a few minor accidents. The Highway Patrol said no major accidents had occurred in Gray County as a result of the snowfall.

The Amarillo Weather Bureau said the Panhandle snow covered about one time 80 per cent of an area bounded by a line from Muleshoe to Adrian to Gruver, to Canadian to Clarendon, and from Tulia to Muleshoe.

The fresh blast of cold air reinforced an earlier cold front which pushed into Texas late Christmas day and brought a white post-Christmas to a large area of Texas.

The Amarillo Weather Bureau said at noon that the snow flurries would end by tonight but that the cold snap would continue. Low temperature tonight will be in the lower teens, high tomorrow will be in the upper 30s. Winds will be from the north at 15-25 m.p.h. and gusty.

Carried on brisk winds, a cold front swept through the northern part of Texas today, blanketing thousands of square miles of the state with a light snow cover that was white Christmas two days late.

Christmas Day had been mostly clear and mild in the area.

The cold front shoved temperatures below freezing from the South Plains of Texas northward through the Panhandle. The low for Texas overnight was 21 at Pampa. The readings ranged up to the 50s in the Rio Grande Valley and the mildest was 63 at Presidio in South Texas.

Pampa, Dalhart and Amarillo had one inch of snow. The snow clouds spread eastward along the Red River, leaving nearly clear here. See SNOW, Page 3

Postal Rate Increase Due January 7

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect Jan. 7, acting postmaster R. W. McPhillips Jr. reminded postal customers today.

McPhillips defended the increase.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," the acting postmaster said. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

McPhillips pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for airmail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers, and magazines and a 34 percent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate for 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

Exchange Students Like The Life in Pampa, U.S.

For a lanky red-haired Italian and an 18-year-old Paraguayan this may be the most memorable year of their lives.

Mario Zoratti and Carlos Caballero are spending the 1967-68 school year in America through the American Field Service program. Mario's stay in Pampa is nearly half finished. He arrived here last August to make his home with the W. C. Eppersons.

Carlos, however, is only beginning his stay here after arriving a week ago. He is living with Dr. and Mrs. Julian Key.

Mario's home in northern Italy, S. Daniele del Frullì, is a comparatively small agricultural community of 6,000. Gino Zoratti, Mario's father, owns a grocery store. Anita, his mother, is a school teacher. "The schools are about the same in Italy except that we have no activities. We study only lessons," he stated.

Carlos, on the other hand, comes from the city of Villarrica, Paraguay. His father works in a lumber yard. Of his four sisters, one is a teacher and two are studying at the University of Argentina. His other sister is still in high school. "Pampa is a very warm place," he stated. "The people are very friendly."

The American Field Service was formed after World War I. An ambulance corps wanted to do something to promote peace and understanding. They came up with the idea of taking students from foreign countries and sending them to school in America for one year.

Silvia's relatives armed themselves with bottles and went to her rescue. Rogelio's family flew to his defense.

Authorities said that in the ensuing melee chairs and plates were smashed, a guest got his head wedged in a turkey still in the rotisserie and the bridegroom was knocked unconscious by a bottle.

Silvia, her gown tattered, went to the nearby police station and charged her husband and his family with mayhem. Police fined the groom's family and set them free.

NEW GARRISON CHARGE

DA Claims LBJ, Hoover Are Keeping Truth From Kennedys

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—President Johnson "knows very well that Lee Oswald did not pull the trigger," Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison said Tuesday, and charged Johnson and J. Edgar Hoover have kept the truth about the assassination of President Kennedy from the Kennedy family.

Garrison, asserting that at least 15 persons including right-wing extremists were involved in a conspiracy to murder Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963, said Johnson and the federal government are "protecting the assassins every day."

In a day of fast-moving developments in his year-old assassination probe, Garrison said: "Oswald was working as a federal agent in November, 1963, and advised the Federal Bureau of Investigation of a plot to kill President Kennedy in Dallas."

"At least 15 persons were involved in the conspiracy, including right wing extremists. —Communists were not in-

involved in the plot. —He fears the Warren Commission's secret documents may be changed before they are released to the public.

—He finds it unusual that three Democratic governors have interfered with his investigation by refusing to extradite witnesses to Louisiana.

—He did not know whether Gov. Ronald Reagan of California, a Republican, would extradite Edgar Bradley, the second man Garrison has charged with conspiracy in the assassination.

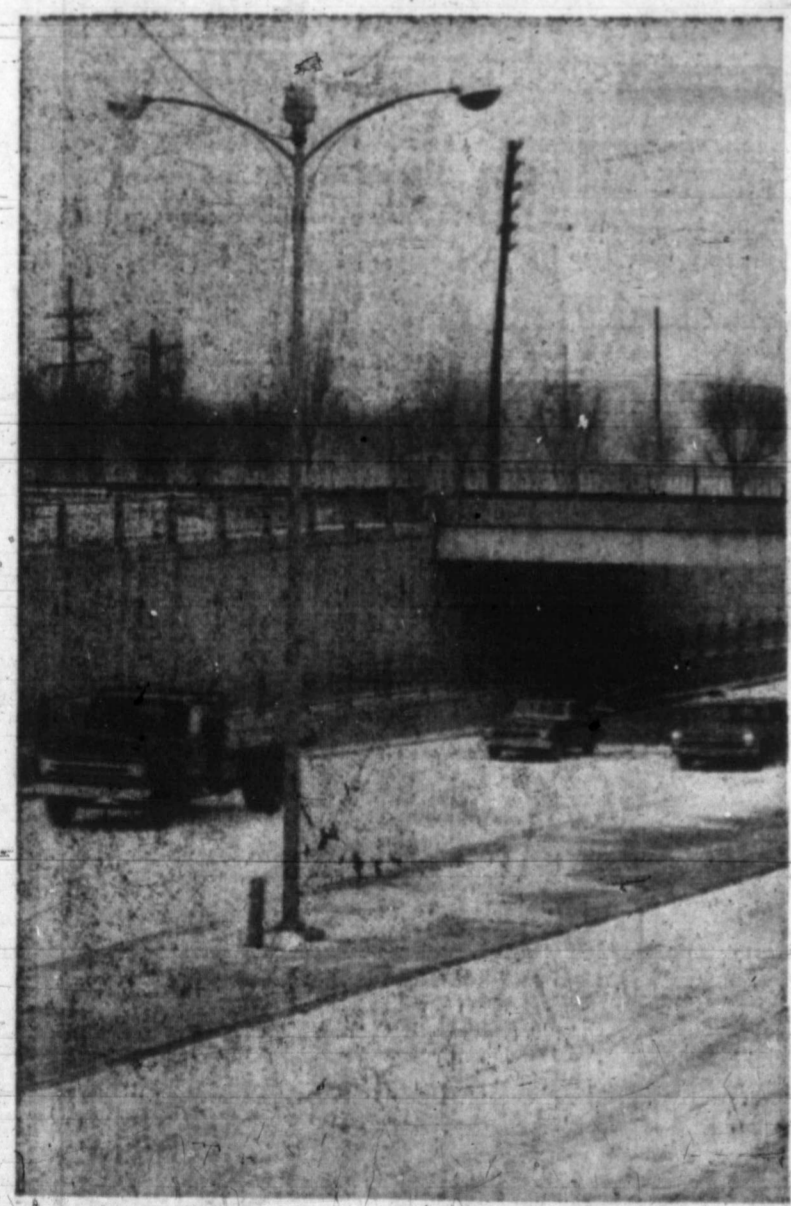
Garrison, blasting away at Johnson for not releasing the Warren Commission secret documents, said the federal government "is protecting the assassins every day."

"It is my feeling that President Johnson was not involved in the assassination, but wouldn't it be nice to know that he was not involved," Garrison said. "We'll never know that he was not involved until he stops concealing the evidence."

Garrison said the Kennedy family was not aware of a federal "coverup" because it was getting its information from Johnson and Hoover, the FBI chief.

In other developments in Garrison's investigation: —The Los Angeles district attorney's office issued a fugitive complaint against Bradley.

—Bradley's boss, conservative radio evangelist Rev. Carl McIntire, said in Collingswood, N.J., that his organization has been able to pinpoint Bradley's activities and show Bradley was nowhere near Dallas Nov. 22.

EARLY DAY PIONEER

C. P. Buckler Is Taken by Death

C. P. Buckler, 82, one of the few remaining early day pioneers of the Pampa area, died at 5:30 a.m. today in Highland General Hospital.

Mr. Buckler, who had been confined to bed at his home, 410 Buckler St., for about ten days, took a turn for the worse late yesterday and the family physician ordered him taken to the hospital at 11 p.m. He failed to rally and died of a heart attack six and a half hours later.

Mr. Buckler had been a resident of Pampa for more than 62 years, having come here from England in the spring of 1905. He was born June 20, 1885, in Surrey County, England, and was 20 years old when he arrived in Pampa.

He and the late M. K. Brown, who died following an automobile accident in September, 1964, became assistants to the late T. D. Hobart in the management of the White Deer Land Co.

Gray County was only three years old at the time and the county seat was at Lefors.

Mr. Buckler described the early day event in one of the last articles he ever wrote. It appeared in "A Time To Purpose," a chronicle of Carson County, edited by Mrs. Ralph Randall of Panhandle and the Carson County Historical Survey Committee. It was published only last August.

In the book, Mr. Buckler wrote:

"When Mr. Hobart was in England, the head-of the law firm which handled the affairs of the estate, spoke to him about one of his clients, Maurice Buckler, and his cousin C. P. Buckler. Mr. Hobart said to send them to Texas and he would find something for them to do. We arrived in Pampa in the spring of 1905 and went to work (See C.P. BUCKLER, Page 3)

2 Jail Escapees Remain at Large

PLAINVIEW, Tex. (UPI)—A two-state alert for the two remaining escapees from the Terry County Jail continued in effect today.

Two of the five men were apprehended Tuesday by police in two states and a third was arrested by Plainview police Tuesday after a gun battle between police and the escaped prisoners. Still at large were Joe Audon Gutierrez, 27, and James Earl Adams.

Oklahoma City police arrested James Thomas Stephens, 24, after a high-speed chase through a residential area. Stephens was apprehended when his car went out of control and crashed into the front yard of a residence.

Plainview police took D. C. Cidoro Villarreal, 29, into custody Tuesday. An officer said Villarreal walked into the police station and gave himself up.

The first escapee to be caught was Charles Cieve Brooks Jr. who was arrested shortly after the gun battle. He was returned to Brownfield where he had been jailed on a murder charge.

Police said Gutierrez and Adams, the two still at large, should be considered armed and dangerous. Gutierrez had been charged with robbery by assault, burglary and with assault with intent to murder. He was already under a 7-year prison sentence. Adams was described only as a fugitive from justice.

Stephens had been held on charges of felony theft and burglary. Villarreal was charged with abandonment.

The five escaped late Monday night. After a brief gun fight with police four of the men escaped on foot. Brooks, who refrained from taking part in the gun fight, was captured in Plainview.

Police said after the men, who were all jail trustees, escaped, they stole a car in Brownfield that had been packed by a hunter for a hunting trip Tuesday. The car contained a shotgun, a deer rifle, pistols and ammunition. It also contained several bottles of liquor and a suitcase.

Police theorized that the remaining two fugitives may be holed up in someone's home to escape the near-freezing temperatures.

Romney Ends Three Day Stay in Viet

SAIGON (UPI)—Gov. George Romney of Michigan today ended his three-day Christmas visit to Vietnam expressing doubts about the significance of conventional U.S. military victories. He said the Communists were winning significant victories on nonconventional battlegrounds.

Romney spent his last day in Vietnam on a helicopter hop to the Mekong Delta to see close up the pacification program. He also got an unexpected bird's eye view of the war, watching U.S. jets strafe a suspected enemy position. Then he returned to Saigon and flew by commercial airline to Jakarta, the next stop on his 13-nation, round-the-world trip.

"I think that by our yardsticks, by the measurements of our military people, we're winning the conventional military actions," he told newsmen before leaving for Indonesia. "But there are military actions that are taking place outside the conventional field and there the enemy is winning some very significant victories."

This was a reference to guerrilla hit-and-run raids and the South Vietnamese government's battle against the Viet Cong's shadow government of political cadre and terrorists.

"I personally am not particularly impressed by the body count measurement of these conventional battles because they've got lots more bodies to lose around here than we do."

"The danger is that our military victories are being won without the accompanying progress in the political and social and pacification areas," Romney said. "The enemy's infrastructure (shadow government) has not been sufficiently weakened or won over to our side."

Romney said there also remains the "problem of the Americans, tending to do too much of the job themselves."

"The portion of the effort and responsibility still must move more to the South Vietnamese, in my opinion," he said.

The governor said the American military and civilian officials he dealt with during his three-day tour that began Christmas Eve had been cooperative and "generally speaking," they had answered his questions with candor. He said he was leaving with "what I feel is a good grasp of the situation."

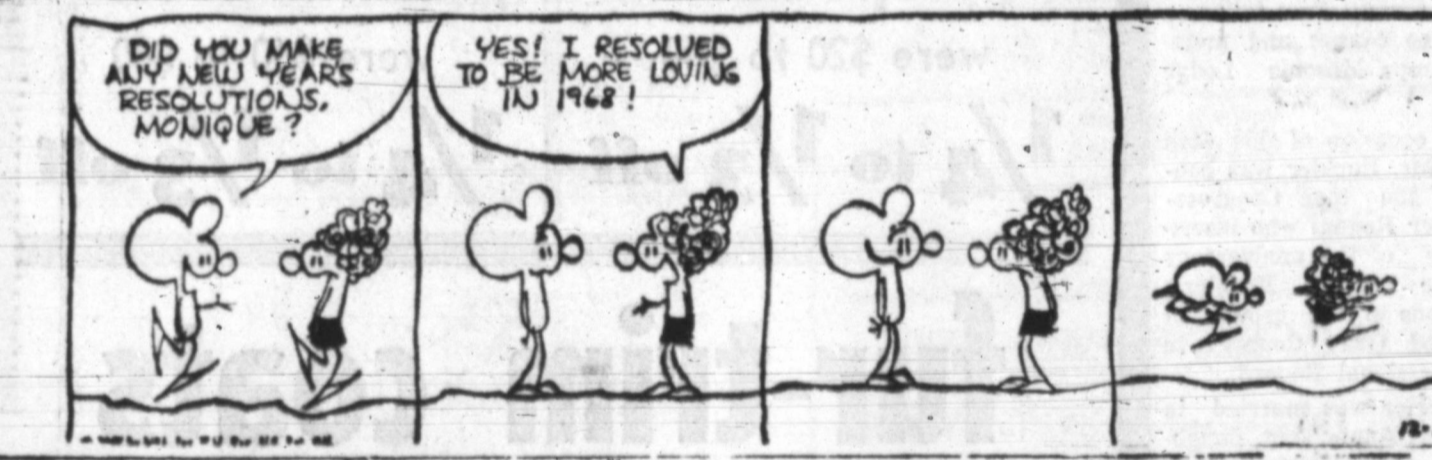

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Method of Selecting Coaches Unsatisfactory

EDITORS NOTE: This is the fourth in a series of articles on the Pampa Sports Committee appointed by the Pampa School Board to do a survey on area schools and their athletic programs. Today's story deals with athletic programs.

The Pampa Sports Committee survey established that the Pampa school system has a commendable number of personnel coaching in the school system at a salary below the standard market ceiling.

The method of selecting coaches is not satisfactory and the general qualification of the members of the present coaching staff, particularly at the lower grade level, is not acceptable to a school system seeking a successful program.

As supported in the charts included in the report, the minor sports in the Pampa system are not aggressively supported, especially track and tennis. The same is true of the non-varsity intramural Physical Education program.

The committee believes that individual physical development is as important as the development of any aspect of mental exercise and every opportunity should be provided for students to regularly participate in a productive athletic physical education program designed to develop the body. Mental and physical exercise compliment each other.

A completely successful athletic program encompasses non-varsity participation as well as varsity level sports because the largest number of students fall into the former category.

Success in this area is considerably more than a particular varsity sports win and loss record. The Monterey school system should be examined to visualize a program of exemplary scope and proportion.

Track is generally considered as a major contributor to athletic maturity and adds to a student's ability to participate in any other sport.

It has not received its proper emphasis in Pampa and has been neglected both to facilities and program participation for several years.

A hard surface track is needed as indicated elsewhere in this report and believed to be better than a cinder track. A hard surface track is considered to be more appropriate to this geographic area due to the high maintenance cost associated with a cinder track.

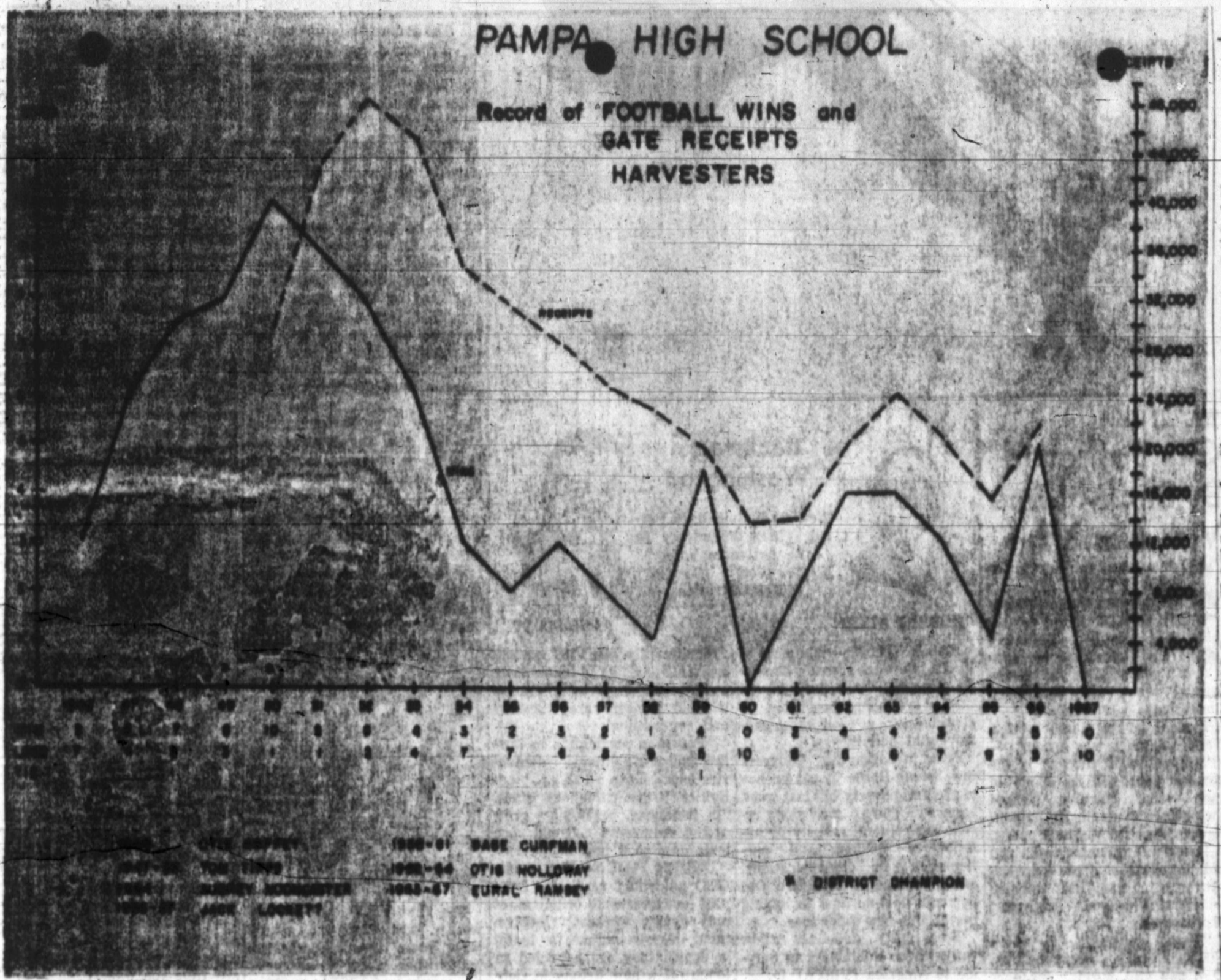
Pampa has no organized swimming program, but then again, very few of the schools interviewed did.

Volleyball is generally a part of the physical education program especially enjoyed and participated in by the girls in Pampa. The Pampa School system is comparable.

Tennis is coached by the assistant basketball coach. There is very little participation and no competitive schedule. The facilities are old and are suitable for only a non-competitive program.

The Amarillo and Lubbock school systems are now encouraging participation in this sport and even have provided separate dressing facilities and a full-time tennis coach for those students who play. Tennis is also generally recognized as contributing substantially to the overall development of a sound body.

Golf enjoys good participation by both high school and junior high students in the Pampa schools although no professional coach is available. An assistant football coach acts in this capacity. Golf is unquestionably one of the better minor sports program in the Pampa curriculum.

Has Man Been Unmanned?

The position of the human male as head of the family unit is a subject that crops up with recurring frequency. We recently encountered an article by Taylor Caldwell, in the December issue of American Opinion, dealing with this subject in a strident manner which is worthy of consideration. Taylor Caldwell is reputed to be the most widely read living author in the world. Her books include "The Devil's Advocate," "Dear and Glorious Physician," with her latest being "Dialogs With the Devil." Our only suggestion is that the reader, before proceeding, now take a deep breath in preparation for her hurricane blast. There was a time even in my remembrance when American men were manly, the head of the house, and respected by their wives and children. They were rugged and hard-nosed and not swamped in soft pink Jello all the time. A thief was a thief to them, and not a "disadvantaged, underprivileged, culturally deprived, weakling." I've seen men beat up another man who attempted to snatch a woman's purse on the public streets, or who kicked a dog or punched a child. To be sure, American men don't seem to be respected, and not loved, in those nostalgically remembered days. They'd have laughed in your face if you had smirked at them. "But don't you love?" They'd have said, "Yes, I love my God and my country, and my family, I respect my neighbor's humanity and won't infringe on his rights—so long as he doesn't infringe on mine. But 'love' him? Are you crazy?" You see, Americans in those days were truly adult, and the men were masculine, the women feminine, and there was no blurring of the sexes as with the women of today who are far more manly than men, and the men who are far more feminine than women. A man's word was law in his house, no matter how shrill his wife and God help the kid who questioned the father's edict. Of course, in those benighted eras of American masculinity, kids didn't become "juvenile delinquents," nor did they smoke marijuana or imbibe LSD, nor were their pockets stuffed with money for vice, nor did they ride around in cars. In short, women were happier then, and so were the kids. Papa wasn't expected to change Baby's diapers nor get its bottle in the middle of the night, nor did he wipe dishes, or run a vacuum cleaner, or be a pal to the children. Papa had nights out with the boys, and if he came home a little beery, and late, Mama knew enough to keep her mouth shut. If a man in those days had said, "I am taking a poorer job with shorter hours so I can spend more time with the children," his peers would have thought he was out of his mind. A large women's magazine lately held a poll among its readers, asking them how they designated their husbands in their minds, and in their "projects." Not a single lady replied that her husband was authority, friend, lover, companion. In fact, no. All of them designated their husbands as "home-owners," "Children's Friend," "father," or "God help us—help us!" In brief, Papa was a sort of surrogate Papa, existing solely to feed Mama's offspring and provide shelter for them. I detected an unconscious contempt in their replies. Now, what has caused American men to abdicate their position as men, as citizens, as protectors of the weak, as many-watchers of Washington, as strong-armed and masculine creatures who were a delight to the eyes, the hearts, and the arms of their womenfolk? Again, who unmanned our men? Who has made so many million of them sickly homosexuals and weaklings dependent on government handouts, and shameless mendicants at the public troughs? Who has "encouraged" them to howl for more Welfare schemes and more schools and more recreation for The Children? Who has turned them from manly lovers of their wives to unmanly lovers of their fellowmen? (I use this in the ordinary context, children, and not the one that is often accepted by psychiatrists and other students of perversion.) My "Liberal" pals always give me their Soft Wide Smiles when I pose this question to them and they say "No, you really believe the Communists are responsible for what you call the unmanning of American men? No, I answer, I believe you are. I tell them, "You are a Liberal" because you are without real heart and spirit, a coward, an envious of real men, a greedy potential thief, a woman in your soul—in spite of your empty pipe and your tweed trousers. You have no manhood, yourself, for if you had manhood you wouldn't be shrilling all the time for more bounty from the pockets of your neighbors, via taxes, and more benefits and more "security." In order to make your beggar's dream come true, it is necessary for you to remove the manhood from other men and you are sure succeeding, it seems. Somehow, when I tell them that, they don't "love" me any longer; but they never deny the accusation, either. For they know only too well that it is they who have "encouraged" one of their more loathsome and presently popular words—women to demand dominance in America and men to submit to that dominance. They have "encouraged" young people to despise their fathers and feel superior to the man who feeds their bottomless stomachs, and who clothes them. They have made fools of our fathers, our brothers, our husbands, our sons. They have given women a pseudo power—to their wretchedness, dissatisfaction, wordless craving, insecurity, despair. If it is true, as is alleged, that more and more women are becoming alcoholics in their sanitized suburbs, it is because they have lost—in the deeper meaning of the word—their husbands. They have lost their authority, their lovers, their companions, their friends. They have lost what God gave them, and may God help them. When men are unmanned spiritually if not physically, such a country becomes depraved filled with unmentionable vices, weak, degenerate, feeble of spirit, dependent, guileless, sick, and criminal. Such a country can never resist the arrogance of power, authoritarian despots, tyrannies, the men on horseback, Communism. All that is left are youthful criminals, despondent and bewildered women, a corrupt government, and whimpering male creatures who have lost the will to fight for their freedom, have lost the determination to preserve their nation, have abandoned their God. The Soft Wide Smile, the womanish smile, of the male "Liberal" has been picked up by other men. The homey-cosy chatter of the effeminate "liberal" is now current in America. Where men prattle about The Children, and go to PTA meetings, and listen humbly to some mannish female laying down the law on the platform, cheering every word. They help to unman their sons. They are more interested in a new refrigerator than in affairs of their country. They trudge obediently to supermarkets—and wheeling carts and prams. They wash floors and dishes, and bow meekly to Mom! They are the scorn of their daughters; they are derided of their wives. They let the "Liberal" do all this to them, the "Liberal" who is trying the emasculator of men—though poor women get that blame. They "love" instead of respect, and demand "love" in return. If they don't get it they are desolate and baffled.

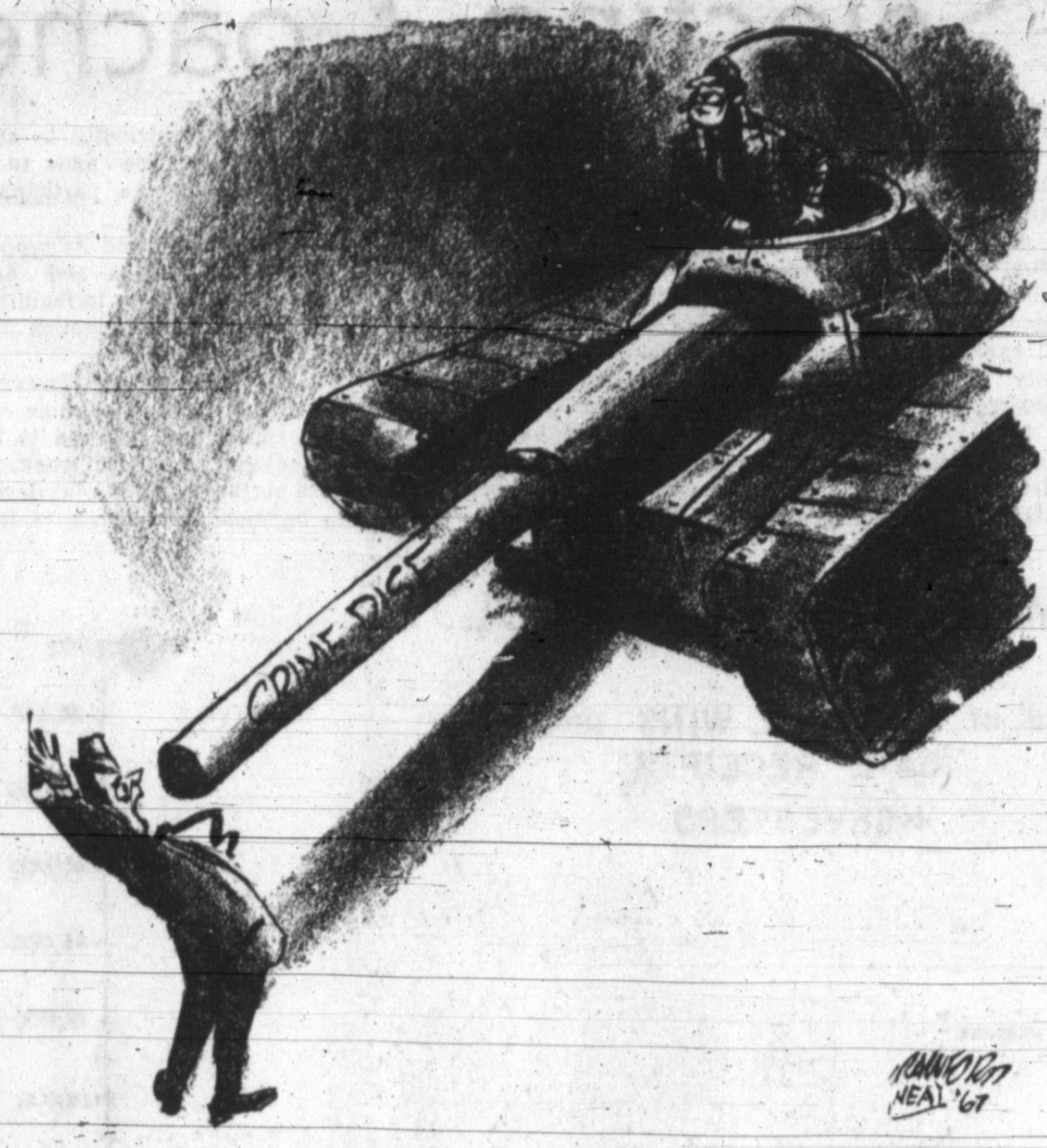

GIs Bothered By Back-Home Views on War

Chaplain's Reply to Viet Critics By RAY CROMLEY

NEA Washington Correspondent WASHINGTON (NEA) — One thing that deeply bothers GIs back from Vietnam is the cynical attitude of some Americans toward what they've risked their lives to accomplish. Typical is the thinking of a Navy Chaplain who writes: "I spent eight months in the combat zone with a group of men who literally worked themselves to death on humanitarian projects. We built roads, a hospital, dug water wells and did countless acts of civic improvement, such as working with Catholic and Protestant orphanages. . . . Then, returning to the U.S.A., I find . . . questions like, 'Are you still burning innocent villages and shooting civilian women and children?' "I'm sick to death of battlefield experts who have never left home, and of mushy Christians who have never been to an area where to believe in Christ means torture and death. . . . Let them go over and talk to the refugees from China and North Vietnam, and I'll talk with them. "May God have mercy on these political and military experts who debate in a classroom and never get more than a hundred miles from home. May God have mercy on us all for condemning so easily and commending so slowly. . . . "What frightens me is that our people are not getting a good and true picture of the Vietnamese conflict, even though I'm sure it is the best-covered news event in history. When I tell people . . . that the Communists . . . savagely blew up our hospitals and maimed our men with ambushes, no one wants to listen. "I hear continued criticism of our presence in Asia and continual harping to withdraw. . . . Why isn't there more condemnation of the raping, looting, burning and the hell the Communists are spreading south of the demilitarized zone? "When I tell folks back here about the work the boys are doing there—building, teaching, healing and clearing—I get a sweet smile, a knowing look, and a reply something like this: 'Oh, yes, it is wonderful what our boys are doing. But don't you think these people are just taking advantage of us, and they really aren't in favor of us being there, and wouldn't they be just as happy and well off under the Communists?' "The first several times I heard this, I was too surprised to reply. Then I was too mad to talk. Now I want to go into a corner and weep! "How stupid can we get? "I know that this war is a terrible thing. . . . I know that. . . . Oh, Lord, how well do I know this—as does anyone who has been there for a few months. "But how would you like to have someone say to you, 'Let them go, don't help, they will be happy under communism!'"

New OEO Guidelines Permit VISTA Volunteers To Be Active in Voter Registration, 'Lawful' Demonstrations

WASHINGTON — Members of VISTA, the fast growing domestic stepchild of the Peace Corps, are being permitted to continue two of their most controversial activities. Prior to passage by Congress of the anti-poverty bill last week watered down provisions restricting political activity by anti-poverty workers and participation in demonstrations, and the Office of Economic Opportunity lost no time in issuing permissive new guidelines. These OEO guidelines allow workers for Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA) to: Be active during 1968 in voter registration projects in big city slums and depressed rural areas, and Participate in lawful peace and civil rights demonstrations and other protests. The 4,200 full-time VISTA volunteers and trainees, now working in 424 projects in 49 states, were barred only from participation in demonstrations of a "political or violent nature." The guidelines, which have gone out to all state and regional OEO offices, state, "All voter registration activities are clearly permitted," but anti-poverty workers must be "particularly careful to keep all implications or expression of partisan politics out of their work." "You may, however," the guidelines continue, "take positions in support of or in opposition to the passage or repeal of laws and ordinances and support or oppose issues which are not specifically identified with a political party."

NORTH VIETNAMESE STRATEGY Recent North Vietnamese documents captured by Americans in Vietnam have revealed important aspects of communist strategy. If negotiations begin, the communists intend to continue fighting and to use the opportunity to increase their control in South Vietnam, in the expectation that the U. S. and South Vietnam would have to agree to North Vietnamese and Viet Cong terms. The most important of these captured documents was written by Lee Duan, North Vietnam's communist party first secretary, and contained instructions to Viet Cong officers. He wrote that since pressure will be brought to bear on the U. S. and South Vietnam to undertake negotiations, the communists should "exact concessions for an agreement to open talks, but without a cease-fire in South Vietnam. While negotiations drag on, every effort will be made to erode the positions of the U. S. and South Vietnamese governments with continued military operations. The objective is to force the acceptance of our peace conditions in the south." Obviously these "peace conditions" would involve effective Viet Cong control of South Vietnam. This new information makes it clear that the United States must not yield to pressure to negotiate with the communists. If we did, the results would be the same as in Korea. The negotiations would be a cover for continued military activity by the communists. The North Vietnamese would prolong the talks until they gained their objectives. It's Up To You

The Public Suffers When Criminals Are Coddled There is much wisdom in the old saying that "a guilty conscience needs no accuser." To obtain peace of mind, many criminals voluntarily confess. On at least three different occasions: "Mallory," "Escobedo" and "Miranda," the Supreme Court has ruled that confessions cannot be used to convict criminals. An evil doer who feels it necessary to confess to relieve his mental condition cannot be convicted on that ground. On the other hand a tough character who demurs in the presence of counsel before he says anything, will avoid conviction because counsel will advise him to remain silent. In that case there will be no confession, and the fact that the criminal demanded counsel and refused to testify, will not be used against him. Confession, or lack of confession, therefore frees the suspect and makes it necessary for our law officers to find evidence apart from any statements made or not made by the suspect. As a result of this perverted concept of justice, many criminals, probably most of them, cannot be punished even though they are known to have committed the crimes. The public suffers and other innocent people are murdered, raped and robbed. Public sympathy seems to be with the criminal rather than with his victims. By what ever means necessary, society must find a way to protect itself against this evil and defenseless idealogy.

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Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—There will be a network television movie in prime time every night of the week starting next fall, it was finally confirmed Tuesday.

The long-expected announcement of this incredible theatrical development was made by NBC-TV, which will inaugurate a Monday night motion picture come autumn.

Thus, in little more than half a decade, network movies have progressed from a mere start to the point where they almost completely dominate video's entertainment programming.

Fill Last Day

At present, there are six motion pictures weekly in network television prime time. NBC-TV currently offers them on Tuesday and Saturdays, CBS-TV on Thursdays and Fridays, and ABC-TV on Wednesdays and Sundays. Only Mondays were open until the latest announcement.

As with the movies scheduled now, the new Monday night series of films will be seen from 9 to 11 p.m. EST. And one of the key factors that encouraged NBC-TV's decision to go ahead was the surprising success of original two-hour films made by Universal Studios to fill the gap created by the increasing shortage of motion pictures.

As NBC-TV put it Tuesday, the ratings potency of these films "have exceeded all our expectations." And, as with other so-called movie nights, the Monday attractions, in addition to motion pictures and two-hour originals, will include "some long-form television series" prototypes, and some specials in the longer two-hour form.

Ups In Popularity

The network added: "Our experience has shown that motion pictures on network television develop one of the greatest audiences in the medium—huge in size and in the number of young adults and substantially higher than the average in income and education."

This all-out endorsement of movies on television, by the way, should put a stop to some of the surprisingly naive statements by various network officials who suggested that once the major motion pictures were shown, ratings would not be formidable.

The fact is that even relatively minor movies do quite well in the ratings, and are therefore much less risk and headache than new series.

Picks Winners

LONDON (UPI)—The London Daily Mail, which annually picks the men and invents of the year around the world, declined today to name an American of 1967 because no one was entitled to the honor. The newspaper chose the all-Negro version of "Hello, Dolly" as its play of the year, "The Confessions of Nat Turner," by William Styron as its book of the year and "Bonnie and Clyde" as its film of the year.

EPIDEMIC CONTINUES

LONDON (UPI)—Twenty-one new outbreaks of hoof and mouth disease epidemic Tuesday brought the total number of cases to 2,112, the Ministry of Agriculture announced. More than 300,000 farm animals have been slaughtered because of the disease.

NEW DELEGATE

CAIRO (UPI)—Former Premier Mohsen El Ainy has been named Yemen's chief delegate to the United Nations, the semiofficial Middle East News Agency said Tuesday night. Ainy resigned as premier last week in favor of Lt. Gen. Hassan El Amri.

THEFT UNSOLVED

OSAKA, Japan (UPI)—Immediately after the 357 members of the Kinki District Police School graduated today they were ordered confined to quarters and questioned individually about the theft of \$30. The thief was not found and the 357 students, all of them veteran policemen taking a retraining course, were allowed to leave.

DIES FROM WOUND

SAN ANTONIO (UPI)—Mrs. Pauline Biscoe, 40, who was stabbed in a barroom disturbance Saturday night and then refused medical treatment, died early Tuesday. Assistant Bexar County medical examiner Ruben Santos ruled her death homicide. He said the original wound was minor but lack of medical treatment caused it to become infected and bacterial blood poisoning set into her liver. Police said no arrests had been made.

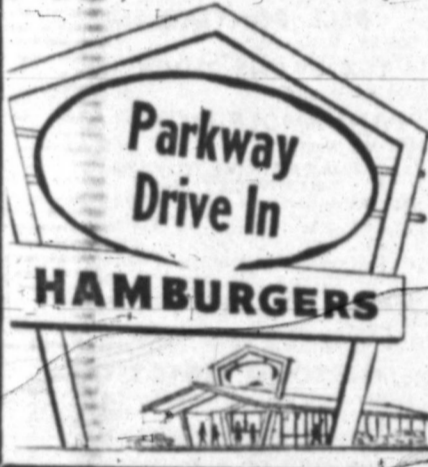
