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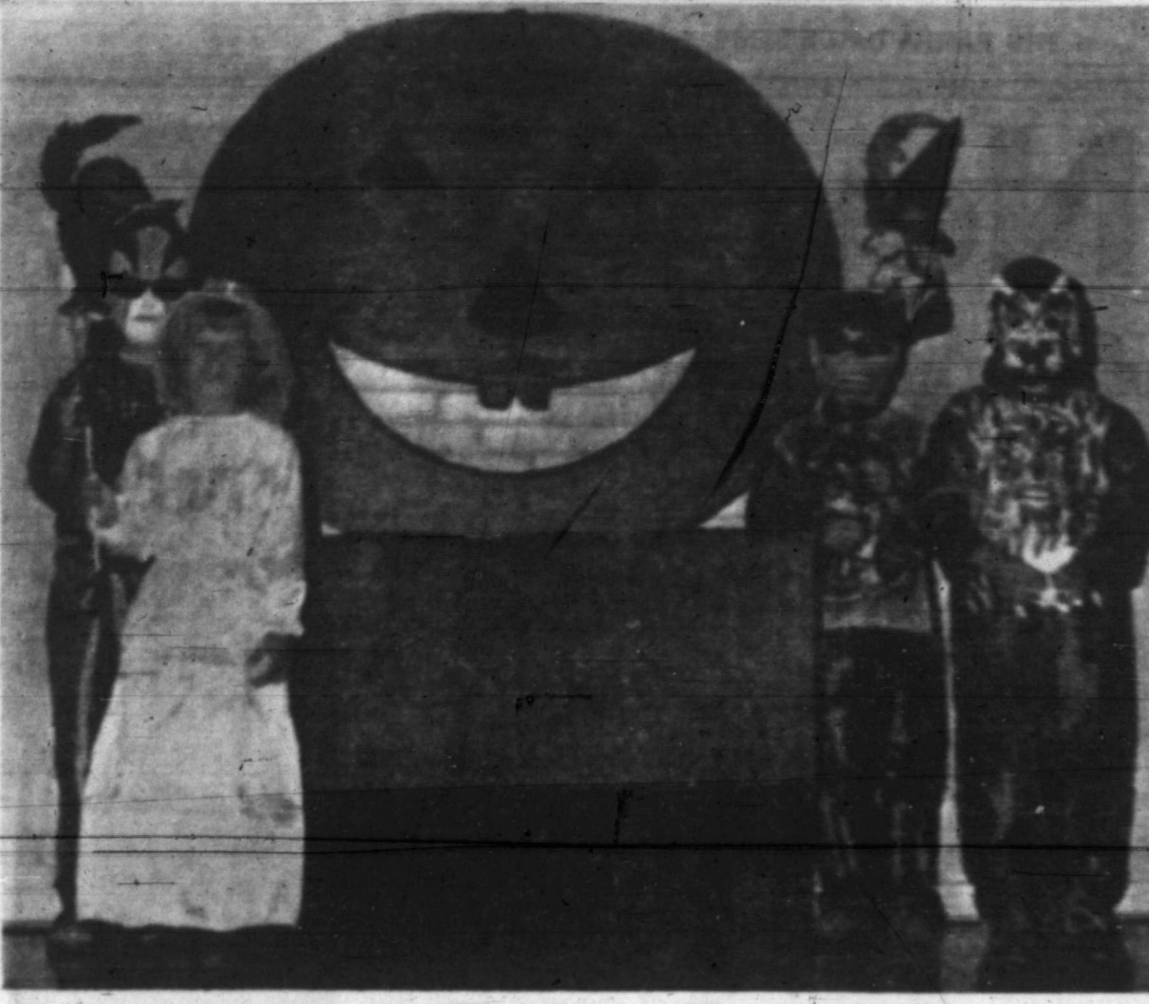

The following items are needed — paper back books, plastic soap cases, writing paper and self-sealing envelopes; plastic tooth brush holders and tooth brushes, dark-colored wash cloths, nail clippers and plastic cigarette case.

Others are mailing size voice tapes, (reels of three-inch tapes, 150-inches long), small tins of nuts and candy, (vacuum packed), windproof cigarette lighters, small plastic snapshot holders, wipe and shine packet of shoe polish, small plastic bags, canned shoe-string potatoes, gum, powdered lemonade or kool-aid.

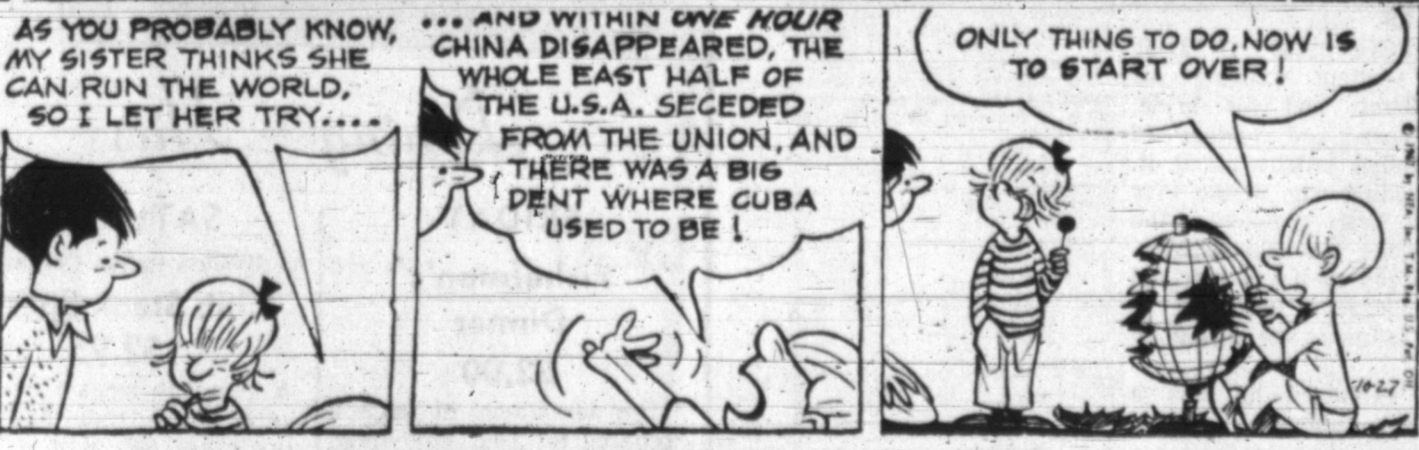

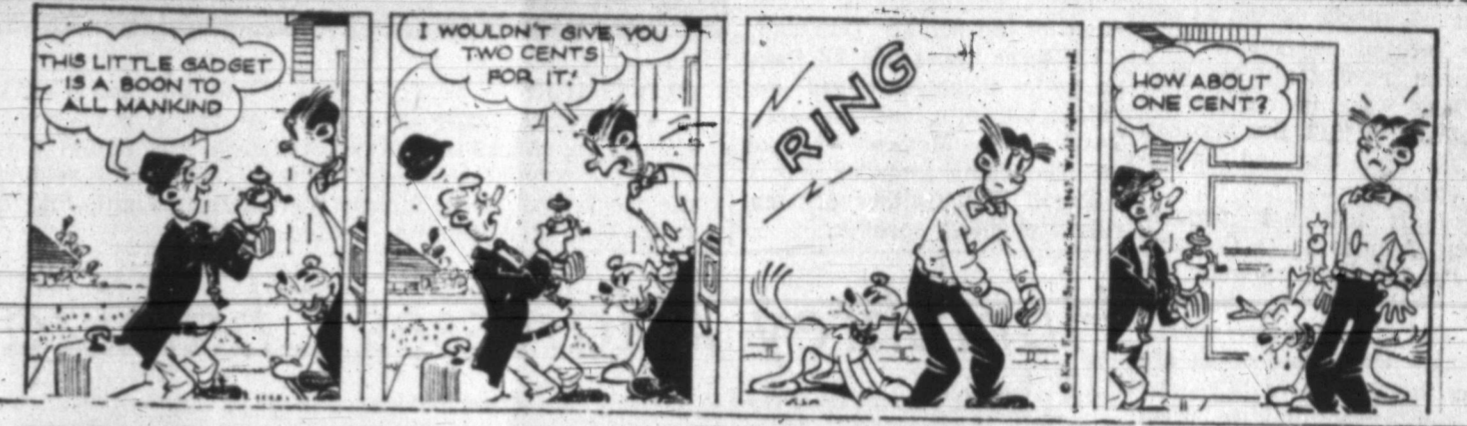

Vacation Dachas and Log Cabins on the Ob River

NOVOSIBIRSK. Western, from virgin forest is attracting Siberia (UPI)—Just outside this the best brains in the Soviet grimy communications hub on Union. Until recent months it was gleaming new science city cut closed to foreigners.

In a campus-like atmosphere of carefully trimmed lawns; in gleaming high rise buildings of silver-gray. Soviet scientists carp out pure research in subjects as wide ranging as nuclear physics and computers to mosquito control.

Certainly in the totalitarian U.S.S.R., where for so many years' men such as geneticist Trofim Lysenko sought to ignore natural laws and bind science in the straitjacket of Marxist dialectic materialism, it is an unheard-of experiment in scientific freedom.

And probably nowhere else in the world has such an intellectual beehive been created.

Live In Luxury—Top academicians live in spacious, individually designed homes set along winding streets.

A modern supermarket set along one side of an open court where a fountain plays provides luxuries in a quantity unequalled except in Moscow's "dollar stores" designed for the attraction of tourists.

The men and women who work here are the new elite of the U.S.S.R., with vacation dachas at their disposal and the luxuries which incomes ranging up to \$60,000 a year can buy.

It is in sharp contrast to Novosibirsk, 24 kilometers away, through whose center rumble the long strings of freight and oil cars eastward bound with war supplies for Communist North Vietnam and a large portion of whose population still must live in log shanties along the River Ob.

Much To Do

In Novosibirsk, newspaper editor Nikolai Vasilyevich Eer-ryadin remarks frankly:

"You will see for yourself the many shabby houses and how much we have to do."

Novosibirsk came into being only about 75 years ago, built by the slave labor which went into the construction of the trans-Siberian railway.

Today it lies at the heart of western Siberia's industrial belt, a rail communications hub for north and south as well as east and west.

The Ob River, flowing north-

ward to the Arctic, is navigable six to seven months of the year, providing further important communication with Siberian riches still being discovered.

Its population had been estimated to reach one million

by 1970. But by 1963 it already had reached 1.2 million and was still growing.

The log cabins and the shanties crawling down the hillsides along the railroad tracks and the river provided

ample proof of editor-Berrayd's still more.

Berrayd's estimated its industry could use three times its present population.

As, in many eyes, the Soviet Union moves closer to the capitalistic system with its incentives and profit motives, Novosibirsk industry acts in another way not unknown to capitalism.

In Novosibirsk the shortage of

skilled labor has led to sharp rivalry among enterprises.

Once a week, as seen nowhere else in the Soviet Union, Berrayd's newspaper devotes a full page to help-wanted ads. And in them, industries vie with one-another with promises of better kindergartens for children, better housing and better all-paid vacations on the Black Sea coast.

Colorado Gov. Love May Give Gov. Romney Nomination Push

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gov. John A. Love of Colorado may give Michigan Gov. George Romney a badly needed push toward the Republican-presidential nomination shortly after Love gives up his chairmanship of the Republican governors in December.

A public commitment from the handsome Coloradoan, a potential vice presidential nominee, is regarded as important to Romney before the crucial March presidential primary in New Hampshire.

May Make Move

Although he has made no firm decision, informed sources told UPI that Love is seriously considering making his own move after the December meeting—and before the New Hampshire primary.

OLD CHURCH BURNS

JASPER, Tex. (UPI)—The 117-year-old Dixie Baptist Church, founded by a slave at nearby Bevilport, burned Wednesday. The church was the oldest-known Negro church in Texas and was awarded a Texas historical medallion last year.

When the Jasper fire department arrived, fire had almost consumed the church and the firemen turned their attention to keeping the flames from spreading to a new church nearby. The new Dixie Baptist Church escaped damage.

MANY SEEK PERMITS

AUSTIN (UPI)—Applications to participate in the annual free deer hunts on seven wildlife management areas increased by 7,500 this year, the Parks and Wildlife Department said today.

A total of 24,950 applications were received by the Monday deadline, compared with 17,345 last year.

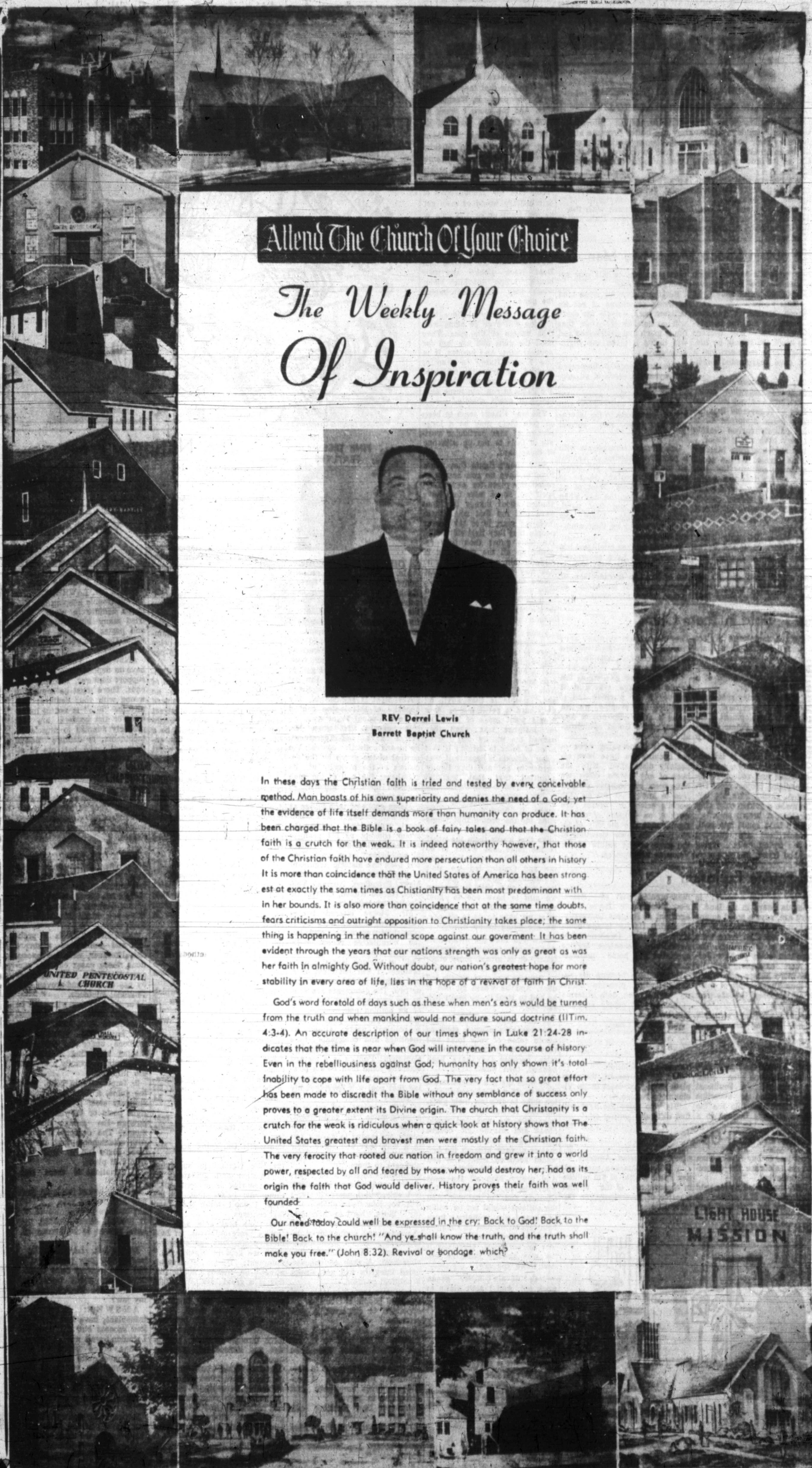

Foreign News Commentary

By PHIL NEWSON

BUCHAREST, Romania
(UPI) — The highway from Bucharest to Sinaia runs more than 100 miles past fields newly plowed for fall planting, through the Ploesti oil fields, along terraced hillsides and then winds steeply upward into the Transylvanian Alps.

From below emerges a panorama of modern factories, a diesel train chugging northward and of sharp contrast between the smoke of industry and peasant cottages surrounded by apple orchards.

This is a composite of a Communist Romania in the midst of wrenching change, seeking almost overnight to transform itself from a backward Balkan nation with an economy based on agriculture to a modern state based on industry.

And confident it can do it, even at the displeasure of the Soviet Union, its largest neighbor and still its largest trading partner.

From the town's Greek Orthodox Church Gheorghe Burian and his wife emerge from the Christening of their new daughter. Despite atheistic communism, religion continues to maintain a hold.

Poses Question
How do you find it after Moscow and Siberia? A Romanian asks.

The question is rhetorical because he knows the answer. In Bucharest, among the economic planners there is grim purpose, but not the purpose without gaiety to be sensed in Moscow.

This is a Communist nation and its leaders intend that it shall remain so, but it looks to the West rather than to the East both for its technology and its culture.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman rejects "positive neutrality" as a definition of Romanian policy.

"Ours," he declares, "is an active policy based on noninterference."

Noninterference is, in fact, the keystone of Romanian foreign policy.

"We did not break relations with Israel after the Mideast war. We do not believe either the Israelis or the Arabs will throw each other into the sea. They should talk."

Keeps Nose Out
China's internal troubles are their own and there should be no interference. We still do business with the Chinese.

"... the Latin countries of South America should be free to develop in their own way, even if they choose the way of the monopolists."

"... West Germany is our greatest trading partner in the West. The fact that we established diplomatic relations with West Germany is a natural result."

These are official positions adopted by the Bucharest government in direct opposition

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Cancellations of television series that don't have big star names to bolster them are beginning to pile up as video movies and specials continue to pulverize regular programming.

"Dundee and the Culhane," a CBS-TV Western with John Mills, has already been marked for axing.

NBC-TV, meanwhile, has canceled—as of January—"Accidental Family," a half-hour series with Jerry Van Dyke as a nightclub comedian who is a widower with a son.

And it is reported that ABC-TV has also canceled "Iron Horse," a Western with Dale Robertson.

All three series are up against weekly movies.

Falls Second Year
"Iron Horse," an hour show that did all right in the ratings last season—its first—when it was seen on Mondays, and against no movie, was switched this semester to Saturdays.

"Dundee and the Culhane" and "Accidental Family" are new entries.

It is also reported, meanwhile, that long-running series "The Man From U.N.C.L.E." is on very thin ice at NBC-TV.

The question of its future is frankly being discussed at the network.

The show's business trade paper "Variety" notes that "U.N.C.L.E." has probably been the victim of too many shifts in the schedule, "seemingly to occupy a new program slot every year."

There are important other exceptions. Among them: Romanian opposition to the atomic nonproliferation treaty as proposed at the Geneva disarmament conference with the backing of the Soviet Union and the United States.

In this they join others such as West Germany and Brazil in rejecting a nuclear monopoly among members of the so-called atomic club.

Demand Definition
They demand precise definitions of the obligation of nuclear states toward others seeking to develop nuclear power for peaceful purposes.

They declare also that issues cannot be solved by ignoring Communist China.

Within the Communist Warsaw Treaty they demand prior consultation of member states. They rejected Moscow's attempt at integration of Warsaw pact military forces and Communist East Germany's moves toward bilateral defense pacts against West Germany.

As a small nation which must export up to 25 per cent of its Gross National Product if it is to achieve real prosperity, Romania looks hopefully toward the day when it can escape the barrier economy of the Communist bloc and attain free exchange for its currency with the Western world.

Electrical Power Shortage
Romania suffers from a critical shortage of electrical power.

Mechanization is spotty and transport backward.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Once upon a troopship I spent several days trying to master a language called "phrasebook French." It was a big waste of time. As was "phrasebook German."

The phrases supplied by these books simply did not cover the contingencies an American GI was most likely to encounter on the continent.

In all the time I was bearing arms in Europe, I never once had occasion to say to a Frenchman, "the pen of my aunt." Or to ask a German directions to the library.

Besides being overburdened with unserviceable entries like those, the books strangely omitted the common phrases a World War II soldier needed everyday conversation, such as, "For how many cocolate bars?" and "Lie down, I want to talk to you."

Modern Development
Well, life is full of little regrets, and what I regret now is that I did not then have available a couple of new paperback phrasebooks just published by Bantam books.

They could have opened up whole new worlds.

One called "The Insult Dictionary" is devoted exclusively to curt comebacks, offensive comments and other cutting remarks that will enable American tourists to "snarl back" at Europeans.

The other, called "The Lover's Dictionary," is a compilation of endearments, rash statements and prevarications for the abatement of romance in four foreign tongues.

With these phrasebooks you can say to a taxi driver in Rome: "Quante altre persone ha ucciso oggi?" ("How many other people have you killed today?")

Insult in German
You can ask a German hotel manager: "Ist hier etwa schon jemand langer als eine nacht geblieben?" ("Does any one ever stay more than one night?")

You can remark to a French dressmaker: "Ca doit etre de la soie—je peux encore voir les trous de vers!" ("This must be silk—I can see the wormholes.")

Or you can strike back at a Spanish waiter by asking: "Mata usted mismo aqui sus verduras?" ("Do you kill your own cabbage here?")
