## Saigon Police Battle Rioting Students Again

SAIGON (UPI)—Riot police used tear gas and clubs today to break up an antigovernment student demonstration as the National Assembly neared its showdown vote on whether to throw out Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu's election as president of South Vietnam.

The police charged into the group of about 200 student marchers almost before they got started. Several of them had their heads bloodied. So did two CBS-TV newsmen. A third newsmen was assaulted, but less seriously hurt.

The battle broke out shortly after the 117-member assembly began its third and final day debating the recommendation of its special election watchdog committee that the election of Thieu and Prime Minister Nguyen Cao Ky, who was elected vice president, be invalidated because of "many irregularities."

The assembly has until midnight tonight (noon EDT) to reach its decision.

Meanwhile, there were unconfirmed reports that a high ranking militant Buddhist leader planned to burn himself alive in a fiery protest to the election.

Reports swept the city that Thich That Trang, deputy chairman of the militant United Buddhist Church, planned to sacrifice his life. Several church officials refused to comment on the reports. But one of Trang's aides said he "knew nothing" about any such plans.

The reports said, however, that the monk might immolate himself in front of the U.S. Embassy as an embarrassment to the Americans, who many dissent students and Buddhists claim "rigged" the election to legalize the present military regime.

This has been a favorite tactic of the Buddhists in the past. U.S. Marine guards and security men were alerted at the embassy, it was understood, and had wet blankets near the gates in case an immolation might be attempted near the mission.

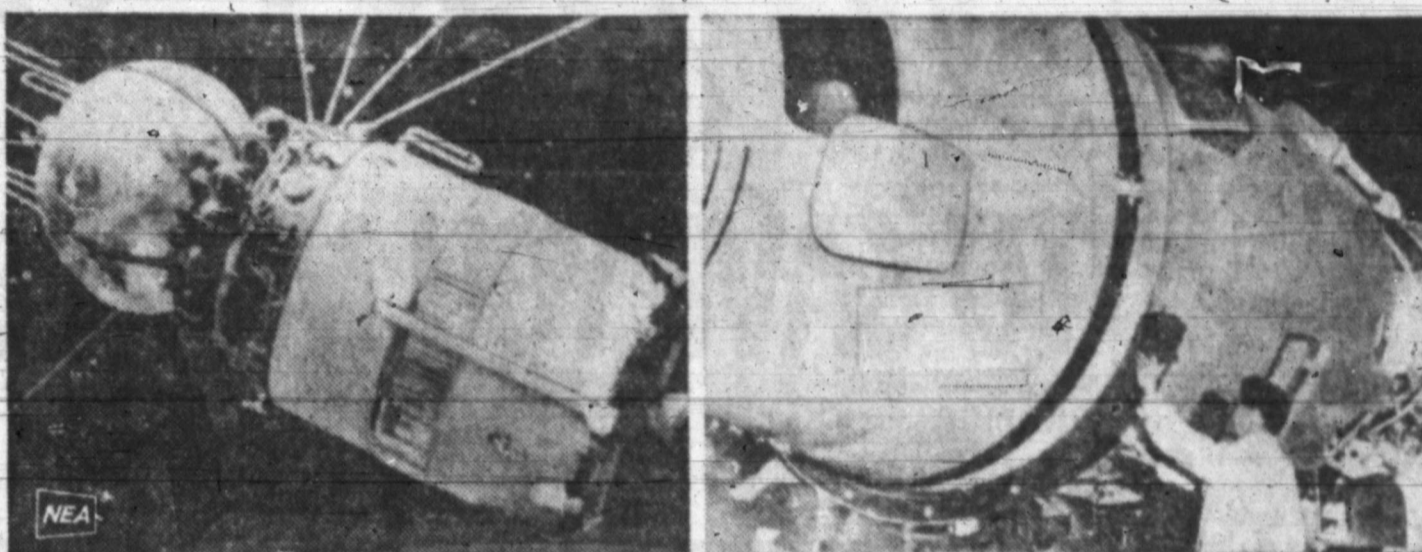

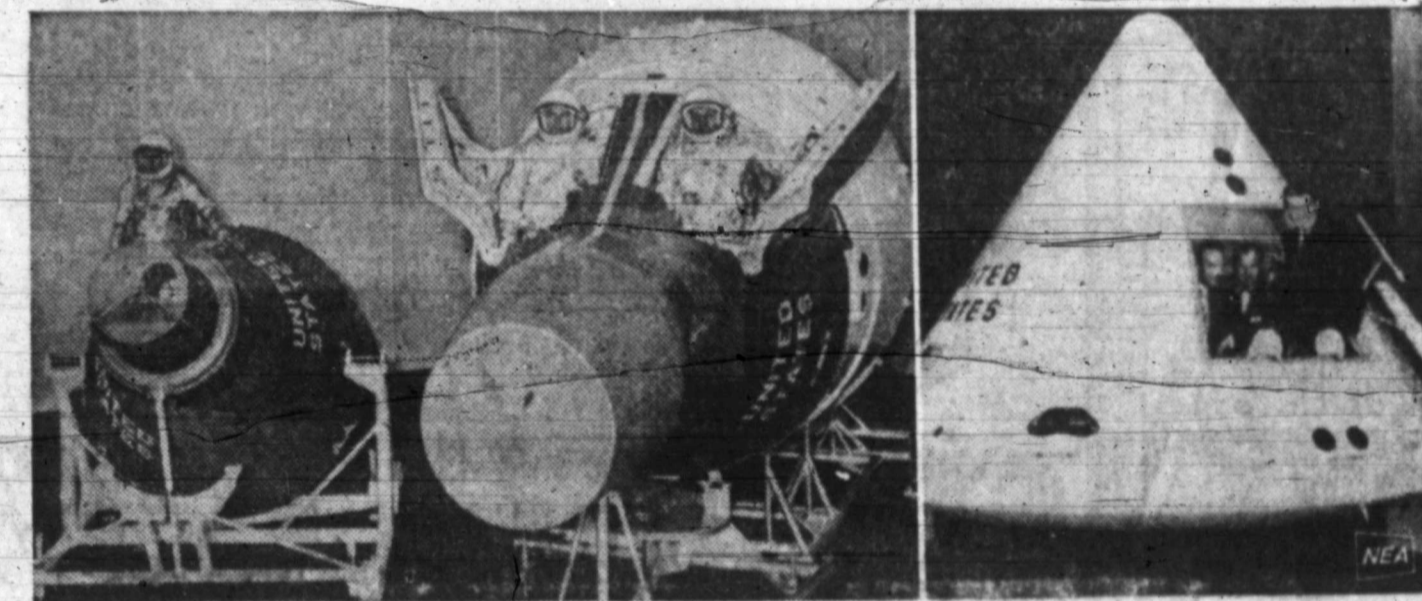

## Peace Candidate Wanted by GOP

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Mark I. Hatfield, the leading Republican dove, said he would like to see the GOP nominate a "peace candidate" like Gen. James M. Gavin in 1968.

Gavin said, however, he has neither the money nor organization needed to mount a presidential campaign and does not see how he could wind up in the 1968 picture.

"I have only ideas and convictions," Gavin said, "and I don't think these are adequate these days."

The talk of a Republican peace candidate comes against the background of mounting discontent over President Johnson's policies in Vietnam.

The latest Gallup Poll shows that Johnson is no longer even the most popular candidate within his own party, trailing Sen. Robert F. Kennedy of New York 39 per cent to 37 per cent.

Hatfield, in a "television interview Sunday (Face The Nation—CES), said he did not believe the Republican party would "nominate a hawk" at its 1968 convention.

"I think the Republican party realizes that it has to present to the American people in 1968 a choice and not an echo," the Oregon lawmaker said.

"I believe that General Gavin, who is a very deep thinker, a man who is a military expert, a man who combines intellectuality with military expertise, is certainly a man to be listened to."

"I believe that if he should make a bid or his friends should promote him, into the actual nominating activity, that he would be the type of person that I could well and happily support," Hatfield said.

Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., meanwhile, accused President Johnson of being "incapable of ending the war in Vietnam."

## U.S. Bombardment Stops Commie Shelling

SAIGON (UPI)—The heaviest conventional bombardment in the history of war has all but silenced North Vietnamese guns hammering U.S. Marine outposts along the Demilitarized Zone, a U.S. military spokesman said today.

The Communists, apparently short on high explosive shells, have switched to shooting propaganda leaflets into Leatherneck camps which say: "Hey, hey, LBJ . . . How many kids have you killed today?"

The report of the new Communist tactic came as a U.S. Marine spokesman in Da Nang reported that only one explosive round hit Leatherneck outposts along the buffer zone all day Sunday. But that one wounded two Marines.

**Hell Invasion**

For the past month, however, Communist rocket, mortar and artillery fire have averaged from 500 to 1,000 shells per day on the battered Con Thien outpost straddling a key infiltration trail from the DMZ. The Communists would like to free the route for the 33,000 troops reportedly massed in the area for an invasion thrust.

Over North Vietnam, meanwhile, American warplanes for the third straight day streaked back through heavy anti-aircraft fire to bomb MIG fighter bases in the Haipei area.

U.S. spokesman said there appeared to be two reasons for the dramatic drop in shelling near the DMZ—other than the propaganda leaflet shells.

One, he said, was probably a shortage of ammunition resulting from American bombing raids on highways, bridges, rail lines and convoys in North Vietnam—and the intense bombing and artillery barrages against the guns in and above the Demilitarized Zone in the past few weeks.

In a report on the effectiveness of raids by the Strategic Air Command B52 Stratofortresses, a U.S. communique said their bombs touched off 66 secondary explosions and 66 raging fires on the ground last week.

## Indonesian Mob Beats Red Diplomats

HONG KONG (UPI)—The Communist Chinese regime marked its 18th anniversary with a massive rally in Peking Sunday but the festivities were marred by violence on the country's borders and new dissension and turmoil within the Communist ranks.

The rally in Peking and developments elsewhere combined to underscore the internal and external threats to Mao Tse-tung's governments as it embarks today on its 19th year of rule.

In Jakarta, an Indonesian mob sacked the Chinese Embassy, severely beating nine Chinese diplomats and destroying embassy property.

At the same time Indian troops guarding the tiny Himalayan protectorate of Sikkim fought a day-long artillery and mortar battle with Chinese border troops.

At the national day rally in Peking, Soviet and East European diplomats stormed off the rostrum after Chinese Defense Minister Lin Biao denounced the Kremlin's brand of communism.

The absence of several high-ranking Chinese officials from the rostrum pointed up the power struggle within the government.

The missing Chinese officials have been denounced but not eliminated by Mao's supporters. Peking Radio failed to mention them in its accounts of the rally and reports from persons in Peking said the officials were not present.

The Chinese defense minister hinted in a speech to the hundreds of thousands of Chinese at the rally that some of the leaders of the anti-Mao movement have been destroyed.

Claims Opposition Smashed

"Under the leadership of Chairman Mao and the central committee the nation's revolutionaries masses have smashed the headquarters of the bourgeoisie to nothing," Lin declared.

However, Lin added, "a handful of top party persons" were still in power and opposing Mao. He urged the nation to support efforts to "overthrow" the remaining anti-Maoists.

Mao made one of his rare public appearances to attend the rally. But he did not speak. At least three American were on the rostrum. They were Anna Louise Strong, an 81-year-old writer from California; Robert Williams, a former official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Monroe, S.C. and Williams' wife.

Miss Strong has lived in China for many years. Williams and his wife defected to China via Cuba in July 1966.

## Congress to Work Slow on Proposed Increase in Tax

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's call for speedy action on his proposed 10 per cent income tax increase is likely to go unheeded in Congress unless he cuts spending by more than the \$2 billion he has offered.

That was the word today from Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways and Means Committee, the most influential tax-writer in Congress.

Johnson warned during a news conference at his Texas ranch Saturday that the longer the lawmakers delay in granting his request for a tax increase the closer the nation moves toward "burdensome and dangerous inflation."

"This is a responsibility of Congress," the President said. "We think that the small request we have made to avoid the evil effects of a more burdensome tax, a weakening of the dollar, increased interest rates—with a big blow to our homebuilding program."

But Mills, in a copyrighted interview in U.S. News & World Report said, "There is not going to be a tax bill passed by this congress so long as there is a prospect for a rate of spending totaling well above \$140 billion. It's just not going to be done."

"The White House is most anxious to get a tax increase. They have assured us that they will cut expenditures."

## Police Search for Man Doctoring Soup With LSD

WESTMINSTER, Colo. (UPI)—Authorities said today they still were looking for a man whose "luke-warm chicken soup" started a 19-year-old youth off on a "trip" that put him in Colorado Psychopathic Hospital for two weeks.

The youth, David Brianza of Westminster, said the "trip" began Aug. 21 when he met a man who showed him a portable bar in his car. When he went to the vehicle, the man gave him some chicken soup which Brianza said apparently contained a huge overdose of LSD.

For the next few days—before being hospitalized—Brianza said he felt things slipping around to holler to someone and ask where she came from, but then she was gone. I'd never seen her before in my life."

**Wall Street Chatter**

NEW YORK (UPI)—Thomson & McKinnon says an inflation psychology apparently is overriding the concern over the proposed income tax surcharge. The analyst says primary trends remain upward with possible "technical unsettlement" immediately ahead before the "underlying forces of strength" reassert themselves.

Faulkner, Dawkins & Sullivan says the basic overall trend of stock prices still appears headed up, but notes that some leading growth issues seems to be under pressure. The company suggests that market watchers remain fully invested and concentrate mainly on the more attractive cyclical stocks, many conservative growth issues and some aggressive growth issues.

Stanley Heller & Co. says that in view of the intensified speculative atmosphere, a growth number of stocks apparently are in the process of quiet distribution. The company says such indications may not preclude a major correction but it anticipates a more selective market developing on the near term.
