Viet Peasants Warned to Leave DMZ

SAIGON (UPI)—North Vietnamese peasants living near the Demilitarized Zone were warned to flee to South Vietnam if they want to save themselves and their children from a "rain of death and destruction" in massive E22 bombing raids, a U.S. spokesman said today.

Suicide Ruled In Jump Death Of Skydiver

ROCKLEDGE, Fla. (UPI)—John Wasik was a compulsive skydiver. "It was just something I had to do," he explained.

When he married pretty Rickey Wasik, 22, last year, she also became a skydiver. "She took it up just to please me," Wasik said.

Last month, Wasik was one of the horrified spectators when Rickey, her parachute rigging tangled, plunged to her death in a cow pasture. Wasik took the same route to death Sunday.

After the shock, Wasik, 27, who had four children by a previous marriage, seemed to be himself again. He returned to his job as aerospace writer for the Melbourne (Fla.) Times and continued jumping with his skydiving club, The Falling Stars.

Sunday, he went up for the sixth jump since his wife's Aug. 20 death.

"He seemed to be in a good mood. He was joking with everyone," friends said.

Jumpmaster Terry Alford was the first to notice something unusual.

"When we got over the spot and I told him to go, he hesitated for four seconds," Alford said. "It was quite a long time because normally when I tell somebody to go, they go immediately."

"When he exited the aircraft, he immediately went into a ball position, pulling his feet up underneath him, his hands in front of him and made no attempt, in my eyes, to pull the ripcord," Alford said.

Ground observers watching Wasik through binoculars said the falling man held his hands in a praying position and appeared relaxed.

Wasik hurtled 3,200 feet into a palm tree in a thickly wooded area, a few thousand yards from where his wife died.

The death officially was listed as suicide.

Brevard County Sheriff's Deputy Charles Brown said the ripcord on Wasik's parachute had not been pulled and three notes were found on his body. One asked that Wasik be buried beside Rickey.

Today would have been the couple's first wedding anniversary.

Texans Flee Flooded Homes

Waters Break Diversionary Dam

HARLINGEN (UPI)—The flooding Rio Grande poured over a smashed diversionary dam today and water rose four feet an hour in a 30-mile-long area between Harlingen and Mercedes, Tex. But state officials said no new deaths had been reported and all residents of low-lying areas apparently got out.

The Rio Grande, struggling to carry off the torrential rainfall of Hurricane Beulah, was running at the highest level since 1934. But it has fallen since Sunday and the International Boundary and Water Commission said it expected levees to hold downstream at Brownsville, Tex. already ravaged by Beulah's winds.

The river crested at more than 60 feet at McAllen, Tex., today.

Six other Texas rivers, flooding for three days with Beulah's rains of more than 20 inches, were falling along most of their length. The Nueces 20 miles up the coast from the Rio Grande still flowed at a record high but was reported down for the first time in earlier flooded areas. The river had yet to crest at Calallen, near Corpus Christi, but officials said the additional rise there would be slight.

A team of congressmen and federal officials was to survey the area today to survey the damage to the valley, and Texas Gov. John B. Connally planned an aerial inspection of the valley and of the Three Rivers, Tex., area, where the Nueces River surged to three miles wide and more than 1,000 persons fled their homes.

Hurricane Beulah, which has caused almost \$1 billion in damage, struck the Texas coast near Brownsville last week. The storm was blamed for at least 40 deaths—the 11 in Texas and 29 in Mexico and the Caribbean. Thousands were left homeless. The heavy rains sent rivers throughout south Texas out of their banks. Some were as much as 22 feet over flood stage.

About 70 teen-aged volunteers and farm laborers worked through the night beneath arc lights to fill sandbags to shore up levees along the Arroyo Colorado.

The Texas Department of Public Safety suggested that persons in Mercedes, Harlingen, La Feria, Rio Hondo, Lozana and areas east of Mercedes get ready to leave their homes.

Mayor George Young of Harlingen went on television Sunday night to appeal to residents not to panic.

"If you see water tapping at your property then go ahead and pack up," he said. "But let us take things easy."

Actually, the highways north to high ground were under four feet of water.

Maj. Orville Salmon of the Salvation Army's disaster operations in the valley said 11,000 refugees were housed in Rio Grande City alone.

Among the thousands of homeless housed in refugee shelters in Rio Grande City were two Mexican women who gave birth to children Sunday.

The babies, because they were born on the north side of the border, automatically became U.S. citizens.

Investigative Survey Of Flooded Area Extended

CORPUS CHRISTI (UPI)—Rep. Bob Jones, D-Ala., extended for another day today a Public Works subcommittee on the spot investigation of Hurricane Beulah's damage to South Texas.

After a briefing by high military officials, Jones reported it was necessary to lengthen the inspection tours.

Today three helicopters took part of the party of about 30 Washington officials up and down the Rio Grande Valley.

Another party boarded two copters to inspect damage to the north.

Ambassador Raymond Telles reported he had set up meetings with his Mexican counterpart Jose Vivanco and with Gen. Manuel Gomez Cuevas.

Telles and Vivanco are chairmen of the Joint U. S.-Mexican Border Development Commission. Cuevas is heading rescue workers on the Mexican side of the border.

The Washington delegation also included executive agency officials and U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex.

Lt. Gen. L. J. Lincoln, commander of the U.S. 4th Army, and Rear Adm. Robert A. MacPherson, commander of all Naval installations in Texas, told the lawmakers the areas of Beulah's devastation was so wide it would take at least five survey parties to cover it.

Lincoln said his command could spare five multi-passenger helicopters for the tour. Two of the copters were to fly over the northern and western sectors of the damage area. These will cover more than 20 miles.

Commissioners OK \$1,040,195 Budget

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Open housing demonstrators, unshaken by a near confrontation with counter-demonstrating whites, were prepared to stage their 29th consecutive daily march today.

The militant demonstrators who have, on occasion, been pelted with rocks and stones by irate whites, narrowly missed an eyeball to eyeball meeting with white power advocates Sunday night.

Two groups of open housing advocates, almost 1,200 persons, crossed Milwaukee's "Mason-Dixon" line to the hostile Polish-American south side Sunday night.

A thin column of 100 white power militants staged a brief foray to the predominantly Negro north side in a counter-demonstration.

The major open housing column of about 1,100, bulwarked by clergy and laymen of various faiths from throughout the nation, missed by minutes meeting the small band of white marchers at a key intersection just north of the 16th Street viaduct that separates the north and south sides.

There was some heckling and at one point 60 whites gathered to watch the demonstration, but there were no major incidents.

The Rev. James Groppi, the fiery white Roman Catholic priest calling the shots in the marathon demonstrations for a city open housing and entertainer Dick Gregory headed the Negro marchers.

Opponents of open housing were led by another white group.

Equipment for the County Clerk costing \$2,600 was approved, as was \$2,250 for statistical tax roll service.

Salary increases were approved for all salaried county employees not elected or appointed, justices of the peace in Precinct 1 and Precinct 5, and a \$4 a month raise for each of Gray County's three constables.

Justices of the Peace in precincts one and five will have their salaries upped to what the other JPs are currently earning, \$5,011.20 yearly.

Also approved was a \$1,600 yearly raise for the District Attorney.

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GOP May Okay LBJ's Proposed Tax Surcharge

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A key House Republican indicated today the GOP might go along with a Johnson administration compromise to break the deadlock over the President's proposed 10 per cent tax surcharge.

Rep. John W. Byrnes, Wis., ranking GOP member of the tax-writing House Ways & Means Committee, declared that a tax increase was unavoidable and proposed that Congress couple it with a ceiling on nondefense spending.

He said the federal spending cuts and the revenues from the proposed tax increase should be planned to reduce the anticipated \$29 billion federal budget deficit for this fiscal year by half.

Byrnes' proposal, contained in a speech to be delivered to the American Bankers Association today in New York, indicated that the committee and the administration were moving close to an agreement on the tax issue.

Treasury Secretary Henry H. Fowler floated a similar trial balloon last week. He said the administration would go along if Congress wanted to link a tax increase directly to cuts in spending.

The President's proposal, a 10 per cent surcharge on personal and corporate income taxes, is designed to bring in about \$7.5 billion in revenue.

Byrnes' demand that the anticipated deficit be cut in half would mean, under present forecasts, that the spending reductions would have to total about \$7 billion.

Currently, the Ways & Means Committee is bogged down in a stalemate with the administration over the tax increase. The committee wants the President to spell out spending cuts before it asks House members to vote for a politically unpopular tax increase.

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Movie on Slaying of JFK Takes Longer, Costs More

COLORADO SPRINGS (UPI)—The man who plans to produce a feature-length film recreating the assassination of President Kennedy now says it will take longer and cost more than he had planned.

"We knew this was an important picture, but we didn't realize that there would be so much interest," said Robert Larsen, head of a TV commercial filming business here.

Larsen said since news of his proposed film, "Countdown in Dallas," was released, mail has flooded in from all over the world.

"We've doubled the budget in the last 30 days and we've spent almost as much time going over the script again as we did in the original writing," he said.

Larsen, whose firm also does special documentaries, said he planned to use the principals portraying themselves wherever possible. President Kennedy will not be seen on the screen and

Heaters Going On In Surveyor 5 Moon Probe Ship

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—Scientists have ordered America's Surveyor 5 moon probe to turn on its heater in preparation for the two-week-long lunar night during which temperatures drop to 250 degrees below zero Fahrenheit.

Controllers at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) here betan shutting down the spacecraft Sunday. When the sun rises over the lunar horizon next month, scientists may attempt to reactivate the hardworking spacecraft to take more pictures of potential manned landing sites.

The three-legged craft has returned 8,006 pictures from its perch in the Sea of Tranquility since it landed on the moon Sept. 10.

The 600-pound craft also has analyzed the moon's soil to determine the amount of radiation on the surface. Results of the test are expected to be announced shortly.

Youth Survives 4 Days In Rugged Mountain Country

AZUSA, Calif. (UPI)—A 3-year-old boy, who survived four days in rugged mountains without food or water, may be the only witness to the mysterious deaths of his mother and brother and the apparent suicide of his police officer father.

When a sheriff's rescue party found little Michael Berg Jr. Sunday in San Gabriel Canyon, he was unable to talk because

of exposure, dehydration and abrasions.

After he was treated at a hospital, however, he told detectives "Mommy and Daddy were fighting" before the car with his pregnant mother and 1-year old brother inside plunged over a 300-foot cliff one-half mile from where he was spotted by rescue workers.

Young Michael, the only survivor of the family tragedy,

was clad only in blue jeans and a lightweight shirt. When the rescue party found him sitting on a rock, "like a little doll," he immediately asked for water through puffed lips and then began calling for his mother.

His mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Berg, about 25, and his brother David, were found nearby last Saturday in the wreckage of their small car. Investigators at

first thought it was an accident, but sheriff's detectives later said, "The woman's clothes were torn in a way that did not jive with a car wreck."

When it was learned that Michael was missing, 25 sheriff's deputies began searching the area around the wreckage on the assumption he was in the car when it went over the cliff. After the bodies were discovered, investigators went to the Berg home in Pico Rivera, Calif., where they found the body of patrolman Michael Berg, 24, slumped in a chair. A .38 caliber revolver was found nearby.

# Teacher Speaks to Las Pampas Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution

Las Pampas Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution heard an address from Howard Graham, Pampa High School history teacher, during its recent meeting in Jackson's Cafeteria.

Mrs. Henry Merrick, regent,

presided. Mrs. W. S. Dixon, vice-regent, introduced Graham, who spoke on the history of the constitutional convention held in Philadelphia, Pa., in 1787.

"The convention was called to strengthen the Articles of Confederation" and not to form a constitution. May 24, 1787, was a hot steamy day when 55 of the 75 elected state delegates convened in Pennsylvania State House, which we call Independence Hall. Rhode Island was the only state which refused to send delegates," Graham explained.

The men, which included Madison, Hamilton, Franklin, and Washington, met behind closed doors and windows and held their deliberations in secrecy, to confront the problems presented in the Articles of Confederation, he said.

"The Confederation, which rested on good faith, had no power to collect taxes, defend the country, or pay the public debt, let alone encourage trade and commerce. These were challenges facing that body of statesmen who represented their states," Graham said.

Graham explained in debating the propositions, the men questioned "What should be the type of government, federal or national? Roger Sherman of Connecticut proposed a departmental government. A Bill of Rights was proposed and rejected. Article after article was considered and altered. It was Fall, Sept. 17, 1787, before the constitution was ready to sign.

"Madison had recorded all the proceedings which were read to the 38 delegates present in the statehouse for the signing," Graham said.

Mrs. Merrick, the chapter regent, presented the charter which listed 30 charter members. The chapter has 34 members to date.

Members were asked to take good, used clothing to the October meeting to be sent to the Kate Duncan Smith School on Gunter Mt., near Grants, Ala.

Mrs. A. D. 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## New Proposals Draw To End Mideast Shooting

 Chief U.N. truce supervisor Gen. Odd Bull flew from Cairo to Jerusalem today, armed with new proposals for ending sporadic gunfire along the Suez Canal that threatens the shaky ceasefire.  
 But even before he had arrived, the Israeli government had announced firm plans for sending Jewish settlers to build permanent communities on land captured from the Arabs in the June Middle East war, a move sure to bring cries of outrage from Arab capitals.  
 In another Mideast development, it was reported in Cairo that three separate trials will be held for those who are charged with the "negligence" that led to Egypt's defeat in June.

## Pope Disappointed Over Failure to End Viet War

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI expressed bitter disappointment Sunday that peace had not been achieved in Vietnam, and wondered if "humanity is incapable of saving itself."  
 Sources in the Vatican said the Pope's disappointment resulted from the recent arms agreement between the Soviet Union and North Vietnam, the U.S. announcement that it would match the Soviet antiballistic missile buildup, and the apparent failure of efforts to begin peace talks through the United Nations.  
 In his first major statement since becoming ill a month ago, the 69-year-old pontiff said in a voice strained with emotion that recent days had been "full of hope" for a Vietnam peace.

 Jones interrupted the group's itinerary to read a telegram from President Johnson. He quoted the wire as saying Johnson was "pleased to know the Public Works Committee will make an on-the-spot survey of hurricane damage in Texas. Your efforts will surely be assisted by local officials concerned with this calamity."  
 After the flights, the subcommittee members returned to Corpus Christi. They scheduled a public hearing in the federal courthouse for Tuesday, and Jones said he expected that session to run all day.  
 Wednesday the subcommittee will take to the air again for further inspection.  
 Wright said the purpose of the subcommittee's visit was threefold:  
 -To appraise the damage of the hurricane, the tides, the tornadoes and the rains.  
 -To evaluate the work of the federal agencies charged with assisting in natural disasters.  
 -To determine if additional legislation was needed.

## OAS Calls For Economic Block Of Red Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Organization of American States (OAS), condemning Cuba for "acts of aggression" against its neighbors, has called for an economic blockade of the Communist island.  
 The foreign ministers of the 21-nation organization also voted Sunday to ask the United Nations to hear its charge that Cuba is exporting revolution to other nations in the hemisphere.  
 The OAS called on all friendly countries to halt trade with Cuba until the Castro regime abandons its policies of aggression.  
 The organization also recommended that sanctions be imposed against ships engaging in Cuban trade, including boycotting them and denying them fuel.  
 Twenty of the 21 nations—with Mexico abstaining—voted for the trade embargo. All 21 nations supported the move to carry the Cuban issue to the United Nations.  
 The extraordinary show of unanimity, though many of the resolutions had to be watered down, came after three days of sump to sundown deliberations.  
 Secretary of State Dean Rusk declared that the strong backing for the resolutions demonstrated that the hemisphere was "more unified than ever" against the policies of Premier Fidel Castro.  
 However, the OAS countries shied away from proposals to blacklist ships carrying cargo to and from Cuba, and to recommend subregional defense pacts to combat Castroite guerrillas.  
 The final condemnation accused Cuba of "repeated acts of aggression and intervention in the internal affairs of Bolivia and other American states."

## Suit Against City Dismissed

A suit filed by Albert Phillips, 36, of 416 N. Sumner St., against the city of Pampa has been dismissed on the joint motion of the parties, according to records in the District Clerk's office.  
 Phillips had filed suit in 31st Judicial District Court against the city of Pampa for alleged negligence in the upkeep of its equipment and subsequent injury to Phillips and asked damages in the amount of \$10,000.

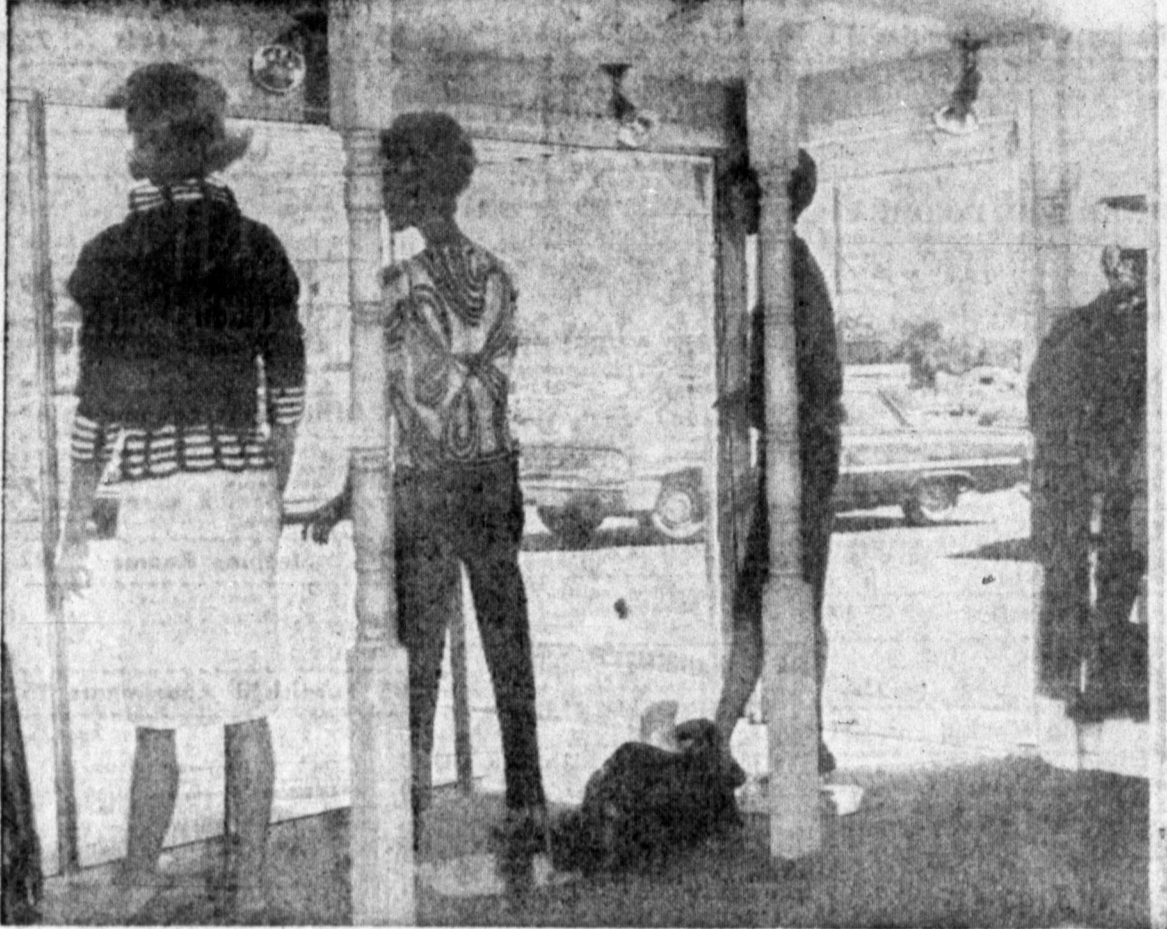

The analyst says the market is seeing the "healthy, popular skepticism" needed if the bull market is to continue without interruption.

E.F. Hutton & Co. Inc. says most trader and investor interest is on the "buy" side and market declines are welcomed as opportunities for new purchases. The company says it would be reasonable to expect some further consolidation at this point, possibly as a sideways pattern with some specialty issues still moving higher.

Graham Loving & Co. says the market is now in an intermediate uptrend which still has more distance to travel. It says, however, that if the market declines somewhat between now and the end of the month, investors should find themselves faced with another buying opportunity.
