Legislators Will Place Greater Emphasis On Needs Of Cities

DALLAS (UPI) — The 62nd legislature which opens Tuesday will have a more liberal outlook and put greater emphasis on the needs of the cities, according to Sen. Oscar Mauzy, D-Dallas. "We've become an urban, industrialized state—the Fourth most populous state in the nation—and our legislation has got to begin to reflect this," Mauzy said Sunday. "Dallas and Houston are both among the 10 biggest cities in the country. This session shapes up to be the most historic, the

most important, in the history of Texas," he said. Mauzy feels the key issues the legislature must face are consumer has not been given the protection he needs by the state government," the senator said. "We need a public utilities commission, reform of the insurance industry, ecological protection and laws against deceptive trade practices." The legislature must also redraw the state's congressional districts according to the results of the 1970 census. "We should redistrict from the population centers outward, not from the rural areas inward, which only results in nibbling off the cities," Mauzy said. Mauzy predicted voters would approve eliminating the \$30 million constitutionally imposed ceiling on the people of Texas are given the true facts about the situation instead of demagoguery. And we need greatly improved health care for the needy." The senator also said taxes "should be more equitably distributed. In a nutshell, taxation should be based on the ability to pay."

He said 95 per cent of the upcoming legislative session will be spent in these four areas.

Lambright, in the 900 block of Ripley caught fire at 2:45 p.m. Sunday. Gas fumes came out of the overflow of the truck and caught fire from a hot-water heater. A barn owned by H.G. Watson of Hoover burned at 7:35 p.m. Sunday. Heat being applied to water lines in a hog shed caused the fire, according to a fire department official. The resulting fire burned the barn, destroyed grain and killed three hogs. A trailer house owned by Donny H. Davis burned at 6:05 a.m. today in Crow's Trailer Park. There was heavy damage to the trailer.

Police were notified shortly after 7:30 a.m. Sunday that the school had been broken into. Investigation revealed that thieves had broken the glass of the northeast door and attempted to unlock the door from the inside. Unsuccessful in this attempt, force was used to break the chain and padlock used to secure the door. After entry to the building was gained, cafeteria doors were forced open and soft drink machines rifled of coins. James Quary, of the Coca-Cola Bottling Co. here estimated damage to the company owned machines at \$1,000. No missing items had been reported by the school early today, and police are continuing to investigate the area for finger prints.

Plant Operator Wins Citation For Proficiency

John W. Bennett, pump-operator at the city water plant, has received an official citation from the Texas Health Department for work proficiency. City Manager Mack Wofford said today the certificate of competency awarded to the local water plant operations specialist is given only to utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management. To qualify for certification, Wofford said, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

Wounded Pampan In Fair Condition

A Pampa man, John Fuller, 49, 1024 S. Clark, was in fair condition today in the intensive care unit of High Plains Baptist Hospital where he was taken with gunshot wounds following a shooting incident in South Pampa Saturday night. George Haynes, 50, 1030 S. Clark, charged with assault with intent to murder, in the incident, was released from county jail at 1:30 p.m. yesterday, after posting \$3,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace E.L. "Ed" Anderson, when he was arraigned early Sunday morning.

Police said the charges were filed following the questioning of the suspect who reportedly shot the victim after Fuller had threatened him with a large knife. Haynes and his wife, Rose Lee, were visiting in the Fuller home at the time of the shooting, according to police reports. Fuller is reported to have received wounds from a .38 caliber pistol in the left chest, left shoulder and left abdomen.

Many Pampa Teenagers Take Part In Boy Scouts Of America Program

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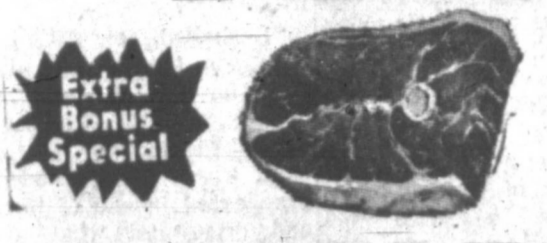
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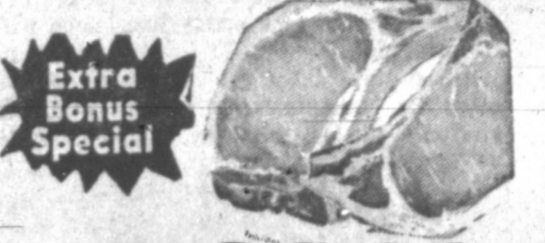

# SMOKELESS GENERATIONS WHY NOT?

"Let's make their a smokeless generation" is the battle cry of the National PTA's dynamic ongoing Smoking and Health Project. In the fall of 1966, the National PTA launched a major campaign, supported by funds from the United States Public Health Service, to produce America's first generation of non-smokers. Since then, almost 10 million copies of *His First Cigarette May Be a Matter of Life or Death*, the project brochure addressed to parents and designed for distribution on a parent-to-parent basis, have been distributed internationally through state and local PTAs, and the European Congress of American Parents and Teachers.

A second brochure, *Smokeless Generations: Why Not?*, recently was added to the Smoking and Health Project's collection of materials available to PTA members. "It was designed to give 'do-something' suggestions for the continued promotion of the project," said Mrs. Carolyn Hendrick, project director. Mrs. Hendrick, who is nationally known for her efforts in the fight against smoking, recently was elected to the executive committee of the National Intergovernmental Council on Smoking and Health.

During the period January 11-16, 1971, the National PTA



has urged its members to participate in the observance of National Education Week on Smoking. This week will mark the seventh anniversary of the U. S. Surgeon General's report on Smoking and Health released in 1964.

For the separates devotees the way to dress up is to team a narrow jersey top with a gemetric-patterned skirt.

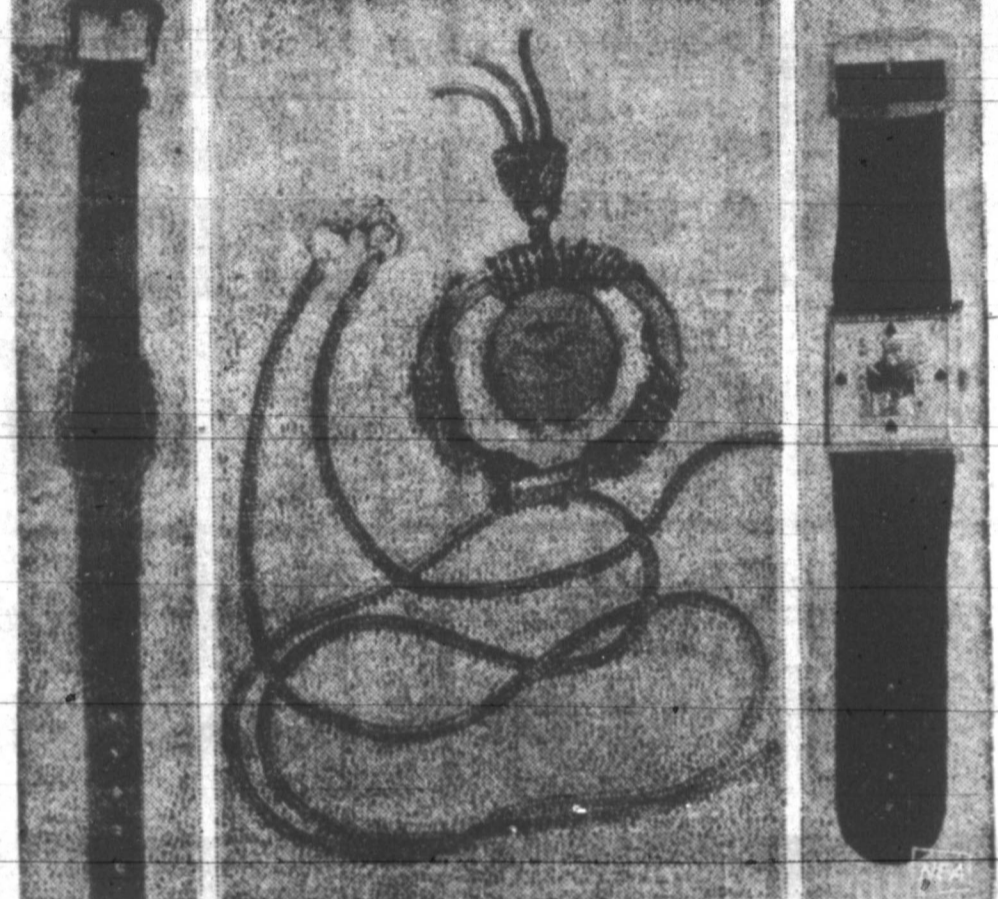
There are many kinds of evening shoes but most interesting is the sandal that reaches up to the knee in circles of rhinestone-dotted suede in black or pastels.

A resident of California, Yvette is the daughter of a French-born father and a Mexican-born mother.

"I think in Spanish," she said, "but I can think in French."

Miss Mimieux, early in her career, was a set designer. She had no plan to become an actress.

"I studied set design at a workshop theater and did the sets for the nine original productions we did in one year," she said.

"It was only by chance that I appeared in one of the plays and discovered what a thrill acting can be."

Yvette has done several films and was once nominated for an Academy Award. But she is frustrated with film work because she likes being totally successful and in films she doesn't seem to achieve great impact.

She loves the stage and has narrated, with full orchestra, a Stravinsky oratorio. In '71 she will do "Joan of Arc at the Stake" in Houston.

Clothes are important to her but not because of a preoccupation with fashion per se—except for hats.

"Hats are wonderful," she said. "They can change the mood of any outfit. They're groovy."

But other than headgear, clothes to Yvette are a projection of her interest in drama.

"On my TV show," she explained, "my designer does all my clothes. For the rest of the cast it's a matter of shopping for the right thing."

"Clothes really tell stories. They set a mood. They are part of acting—a extension of yourself."

If this kind of thinking were applied to everyone's day-to-day dressing, the street scene might be a bit more attractive than it is.



## POLLY'S POINTERS Use Saline Solution To Set Dye Colors

**DEAR POLLY:** I suggest that Jean sets the colors in articles she dyes by soaking them in a salt solution that covers the garment. I add about a handful of salt and dissolve it before putting the garment in. I leave mine for about half an hour. My mother used this method to set colors in garments before they were washed the first time. Rinse well after such a soaking.

She will find that putting a cup of vinegar in two gallons of water and then adding the dyed article will set the colors. Rinse with clear water until there is no trace of color in the water. I find this works very well.

Two of the most popular brands of dye on the market have the statement on the front of their boxes that the dye mixture contains salt. **Board To Study PHS Vocational Building Needs**

Pampa School Board will meet in special session at 7 p.m. Wednesday to discuss building needs of the vocational, technical training program and kindergarten enrollment.

The school district has money in its bond issue to finance building a metal structure to house a new vocational and technical training program. Supt. Dr. James F. Malone said.

Cost of the building could be no more than \$100,000 for auto mechanics, vocational agriculture, building trades, and the Coordinated Vocational Adjustment Education for handicapped students, he added.

"Matching state funds would give us no more space, only a brick building, and at this time we have no indication when matching funds will be approved," Dr. Malone said. "It might be another year."

Other agenda items will be discussion of present enrollment, anticipated kindergarten enrollment for next five years, and staffing of the kindergarten and vocational technical programs, he said.

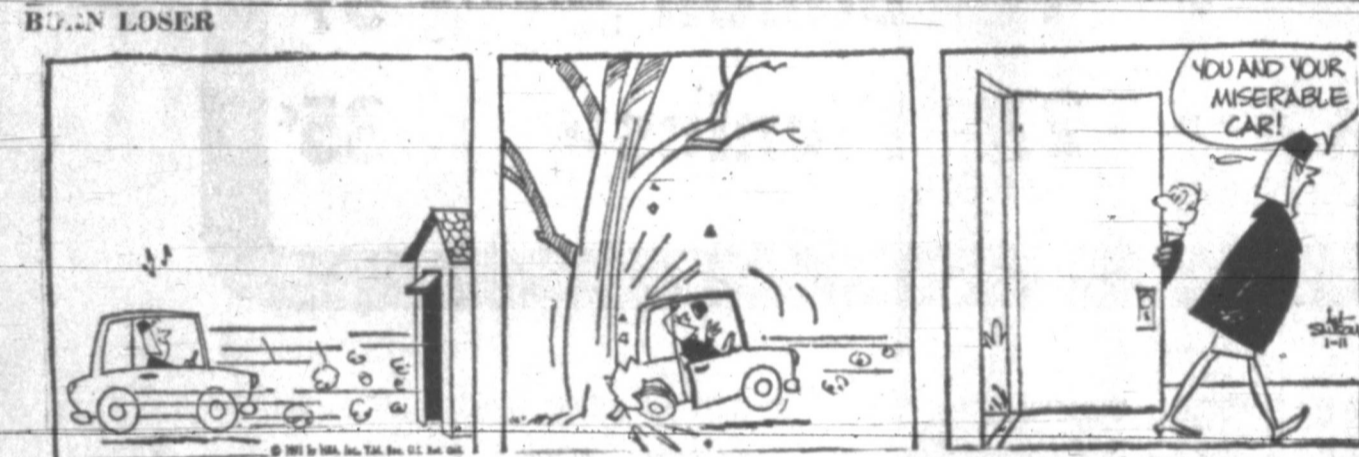
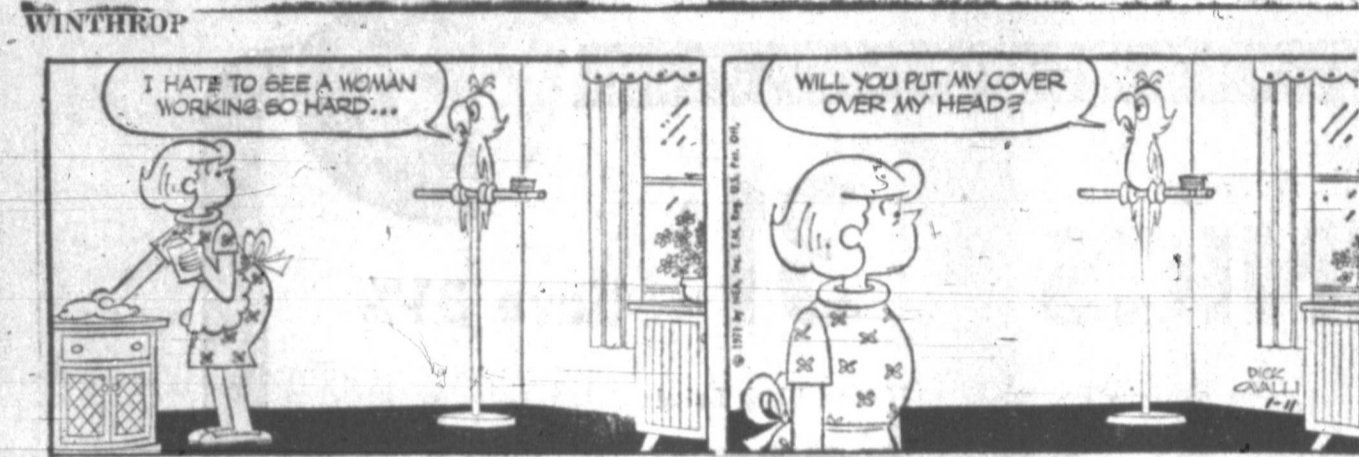

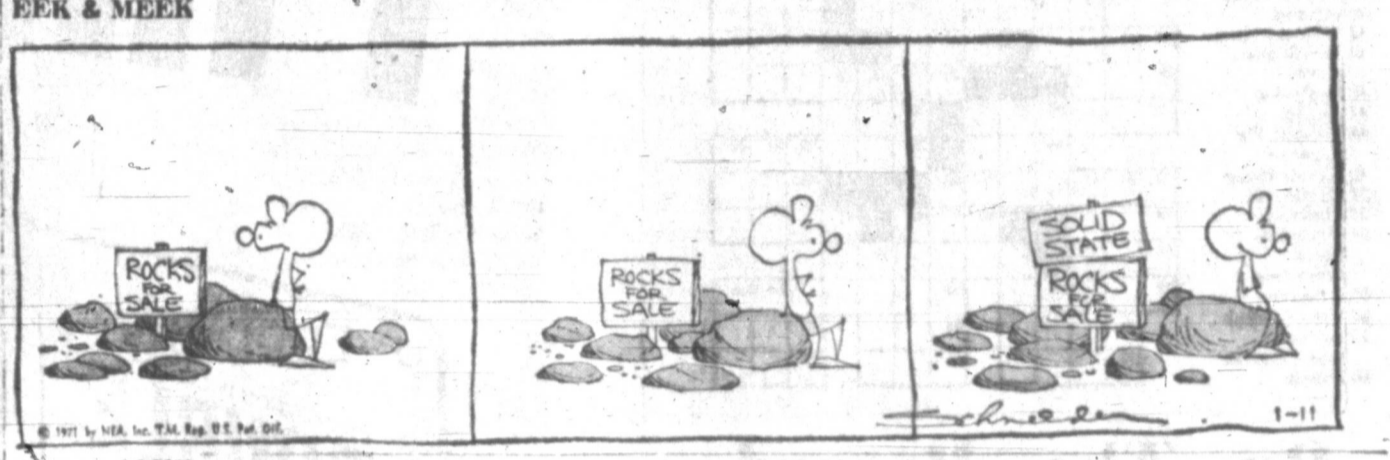
