Astronauts Expect To Bring Back Most Revealing Photos Yet Attempted

astronauts expect to bring back from their lunar expedition some of the most revealing photos of the Moon ever taken.

Using a modified aerial reconnaisance camera for the first time, the command module pilot, Stuart A. Roosa, will photograph candidate Apollo landing sites as his spacecraft swoops within 10 miles of the central highlands near the crater Descartes.

The pictures should show the

feet resolution. With such resolution, it should be possible to recognize boulders and craters as small as about six feet. This resolution is ten times greater than that achieved by previous Apollo lunar flights.

Later, from 70 miles up, besides making additional pictures of the central highlands Roosa hopes to photograph the lunar module (LM) as his crewmates, Apollo 14 Commander Alan B. Shepard, Jr.,

From this height the camera can provide resolution of about 15 feet. This is just about adequate for recognizing objects as small as the LM. Sun reflections off the silvery spacecraft and its long earlymorning shadow on the Moon should help the camera to spot

Roosa will attempt to get pictures of the fresh, man-made craters blasted into the lunar surface when the Apollo 12 LM ascent stage and the Apollo 13 Saturn rocket third stage were crashed west of Fra Mauro, to cause measurable Moon quakes, after completing their missions. If the Apollo 14 third stage hits the Moon, as planned, he will



Mission Will Be Most Difficult

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)-Officials watched for possible weather complications Saturday but reported the astronauts and everything else were "go" for Sunday 2:23 p.m. CST launch of Apollo 14 on the most demanding, expensive and promising moon mission yet.....

"We're now ready to proceed with our next flight to the moon," reported Apollo program director Rocco A. Pe-

Mission commander Alan B. Shepard, America's first man in space and at 47 the nation's oldest astronaut, wound up the crew's hard training by drilling once again on next Friday's planned landing between two rocky ridges of the moon's uplands

The astronauts' wives and families were here to watch the blastoff, which is expected to be viewed by up to 500,000 other

"Perhaps the only thing right now on the horizon is the possibility of some weather tomorrow," said Mission Director Chester M. Lee.

Forecasters said there was a band of showers and thunderstorms moving east from the Gulf of Mexico, followed by a cold front.

There is even more mystery because the plane was a member of the controversial F111 family which has been involved in politics and congressional infighting since before the first one was built. The F111 has been grounded twice and was taken out of service once in Vietnam.

missing plane. None has checked out.

Last Tuesday, the search for the plane was suspended. Nobody in the Air Force believes there is any chance the plane still is whole or that Stocks, 38, and Gentry, 36, are still alive.




