Summertime is just around the corner and homemakers are beginning to think ahead to hot days in the kitchen. . . . and wave to cut the cooking time short.

Mrs. Thelma Bray, Pampa, as a working mother agreed to share some of her favorite recipes that have proved quick and easy and a hit with the kids. Originally published in the Pampa Garden Club cookbook, these four recipes will also please your family.

CHICKEN SPAGHETTI
Chicken in bite size pieces from a cooked 5 or 6 pound hen:
6 eggs, boiled and chopped

1 onion, chopped
1 cup celery, chopped
1 green pepper, chopped
Saute onion, celery and green pepper in 1 stick margarine.
1 cup stuffed olives, chopped
1 can pimientos, chopped
Combine all in a large container. Season with salt, pepper, garlic salt and 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce. Add 1 can mushroom soup. Cook 1 pound spaghetti in hen broth. Add to meat mixture. Blend all ingredients well.
Grate 1 1/2 pound cheese. Mix half into mixture. Pour into long, shallow pan. Top with remaining cheese. Bake in hot oven until heated through and cheese is melted.

SPANISH RICE
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 small clove garlic, minced
1/4 cup oil
1 lb. ground beef
Two-third cup uncooked rice
2 tsp. salt
Two-third cup chopped ripe olives
1 green pepper, chopped
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
1 cup water (or more if needed)
Saute onion and garlic in oil for five minutes. Remove from pan and add meat. Cook until red color is gone. Add onion and remaining ingredients and mix well. Cover and cook on low heat 45 minutes, adding

water if necessary or bake in covered casserole at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

MILLIONAIRE PIE
2 cups powdered sugar
1 stick margarine, softened
1 large egg
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. vanilla
2 baked 8 inch pie crusts
1 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup crushed pineapple
Cream together powdered sugar and margarine. Add egg, salt, vanilla. Mix until light and fluffy. Spoon mixture evenly into pie crust. Chill. Whip cream until stiff. Blend in drained pineapple and nuts. Spoon on top of egg mixture and chill thoroughly.

ANGEL BISCUITS
Combine and let soften: 1 pkg. dry yeast and 2 Tbs. warm water.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Although things are "looking up" for the oil industry the "emotional bing" in petroleum stocks "is simply not good news," the Oil Statistics Bulletin says. The Bulletin feels oil stocks are "too overheated for comfort" and they need a cooling off.

"We would strongly urge a policy of extreme caution, with lightening up of holdings generally preferable to running wild after strength," the Bulletin advises.

The stock market picture for the long term leaves "no choice but to remain optimistic," the Dines Letter believes. The letter points out that odd lot pessimism "continues at fantastically high levels" which means the little man is selling

to the big man as prices rise. "And the big fellow is big because he didn't buy when the little fellows were doing," the letter says.

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SANTIAGO (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, who has not visited a Latin American nation in 12 years, may be coming to Chile in two weeks as the personal guest of Marxist President Salvador Allende.

Foreign News

The "soft sell" being accorded visiting-Americans by their Red Chinese host is part a parcel of an emerging Peking strategy worldwide.

It is in sharp contrast with Red China's previously openly declared policy of subversion and support for violent revolution everywhere, and it led the daily newspaper of the Polish armed services to wonder in print:

"What kind of political baggage do Chinese diplomats carry with them?"

One obvious answer as it regards the Red Chinese approach to the American table tennis players is the annoyance it would cause the Soviet Union, especially as it would draw attention away from the recently concluded 24th congress of the Soviet Communist party.

Seems Too Easy
This, however, would seem too easy.

The invitation to the American ping pong team also included three American newsmen covering the world table tennis championship matches in Tokyo. It presented the newsmen with a rare opportunity for objective reporting and suggested a new confidence on the part of their hosts after the violent years of the cultural revolution in 1967-68.

Worldwide the new policy suggests Chinese recognition of the failure of previous hardline tactics, and a new desire on their part to win entry into the United Nations.

Previous tactics had won sharp criticism from such new African countries as Kenya, Niger and Malawi and had led Burundi to sever relations. Remarkably Malawi's Prime Minister Dr. Hastings Banda in reply to Chinese criticism of Malawi's close relations with Britain:

Less Afraid
"I am less afraid of Queen Elizabeth II than I am of that Kabia Khan II in Peking."

The change of tactics, first apparent in 1969, have met with considerably more success.

On April 2, Cameroon recognized Red China, becoming the 60th nation to do so.

Since last fall eight nations have recognized Peking, including in the Western world Italy, Canada and Chile.

The new approach does not mean a change of heart or a departure from original goals. It simply is an application of power in a more sophisticated way.

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—First it was General Dynamics running into financial difficulty on the F111. Then it was Lockheed running into financial difficulty on the C5A. And now it is Grumman running into financial difficulty on the F14.

That sort of thing is bound to be leaving deep scars on the military-industrial complex.

Traditionally, defense contracts have been the mother's milk of the aerospace industry. Giant corporations would leave no lobbyist unturned to land one. But the next time the Pentagon wants a new aircraft, it may encounter some reluctance:

"Good morning, gentlemen. I'm Col. Overrun of Army procurement. We have invited you representatives of the aircraft industry here for an important announcement.

Army Considers Proposal
"As you know, the Army has for several months been considering a proposal to build a supersonic helicopter that can fly straight up faster than the speed of sound.

"I am pleased to report a decision has been made to go ahead with the project. Plans and specifications are being

prepared and we will be letting the first contracts as soon as ...

"Will you gentlemen please return to your seats? I haven't finished with my presentation ... that's better. Did anyone get hurt in the rush for the door? I should have told you it is bolted from the outside and will not be opened until I give the signal.

"Now, as I was saying, the supersonic chopper, which is badly needed to protect American troops in Vietnam while they are being withdrawn, will be built on a crash basis.

"We are asking you gentlemen to submit bids on the ... Gentlemen. Gentlemen!

"Will you gentlemen please stop crowding around the window? The sash is sealed, we are on the third floor and there is no fire escape, so there is no point in ... watch out for that broken glass!

"Getting back to the supersonic helicopter, this is going to be a multi-billion dollar contract which Congress has ... why are you gentlemen tying your shirts together? ... Oh, I see. You are making a rope. Now you're dropping the rope from the window and climbing ...

"Oh, very well. Meeting adjourned."
