

Pampa's Pioneer Lady Speaks Out On Current Issues

When Katie Vincent came to the Texas Panhandle with her husband Wiley and their two small sons, Gray County was

barely old enough to call itself a county and Pampa wasn't much more than a few softm houses or dug outs carved out of the prairie.

early pioneering days with a be, green enough to grow an orchard, grapevineyard and Mrs. Katie speaks of those apricot trees on the land

and in 1903 moved to Gray County with their two sons, Cliff and Jack. They camped in Lefors where they met the Wynne and Lovett families at an Old Timers picnic.

The story of the "ghosts" on the N-Bar-N ranch where the young Wiley Vincent and his family lived was described during an Eastern Star Party recently given in Katie's honor by the Pampa Chapter 65, OES.

"Katie's husband was told never to leave his family alone on the ranch because it was haunted," Ruth Sewell, a longtime family friend, said. "Since an old ranch hand had died in the upper room, weird sounds had been heard."

"One windy night when she and the boys were alone at the ranch, she was washing dishes, the boys were asleep and she heard sounds of the 'ghost' upstairs. Just as she was thinking of an explanation of the weird sounds, her husband and two cowboys came in and she told them she heard the 'ghost.'"

"When they asked her what it sounded like, she said 'a long-tailed rat.' That's what it turned out to be, but the cowboys still thought the 'ghost' would come back, Mrs. Sewell said.

The family moved into Pampa in 1902, and lived in a two-room house which has been designated as the Pioneer Cottage or the Historical Medallion Home.

"If it wasn't for the storm houses, or dug outs, we had to live in, we never would have made room in that little house on the creek, because people were always coming from miles around to see us. When we moved here in wagons there weren't any houses at all, we lived in a little tent and then lived in a little cabin that had been a school."

"Joe was born in that little house by the creek (Pioneer Cottage) and later Katherine (Mrs. Dudley Steel) was born there. We bought this house at 303 Atchison St. in 1914."

To hear Mrs. Katie talk about current news events, it's easy to forget she'll be 93 in December, because her blue eyes snap and she pounds her fist on her chair arm when she says "I just can't understand these people going to Washington protesting the government. If the South had tried something like that they would have turned a bomb loose on us."

Like many others who

remember why this country was founded and what it stands for, Mrs. Katie takes the stand of fight, fight, get in there and her Tennessee forefathers, as finish it and I don't mean

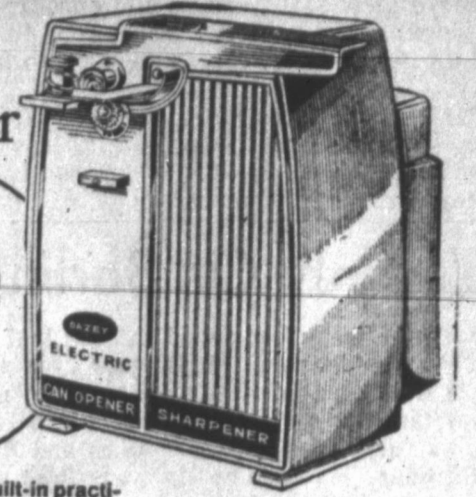

AUSTIN (UPI)—Here's a look at possible candidates for state and congressional offices in Texas in the 1972 elections.

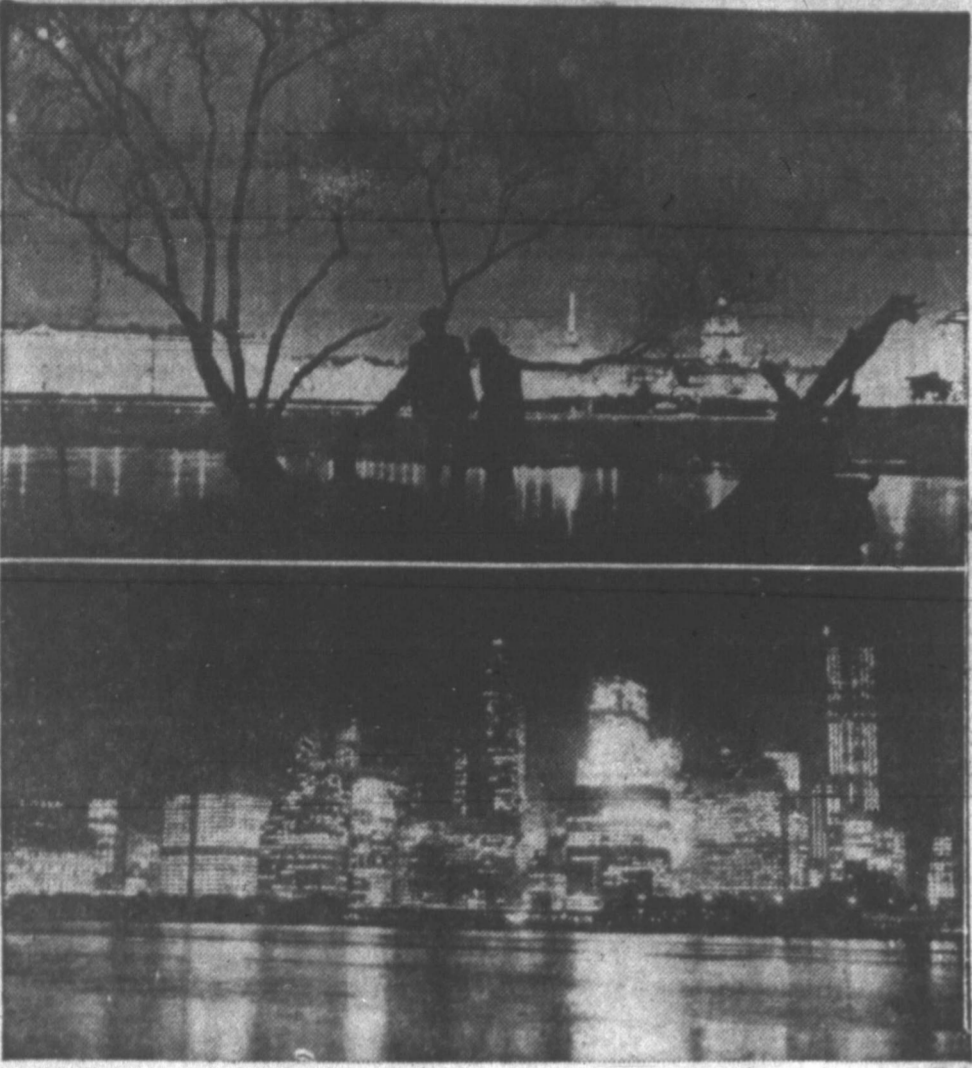
dan, D-Houston, only woman and only black member of the state Senate, is expected to run for a U.S. House seat from Houston. Also Sen. Charles Wil-

Foreign News Commentary

Pakistan's President Agha Mohammad Yahya Khan calls the Pakistan civil war a "man-made calamity."

Indian Prime Minister Mrs. Indira Gandhi calls it a "macabre tragedy."

A follower of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman whose call for East Pakistan autonomy led to the civil war, calls it "genocide." And it is, in fact, all three of these.

India numbers the refugees pouring across her borders from East Pakistan at 3.5 million and says they are increasing at the rate of 60,000 a day. The number of dead can only be estimated. The rebel government which operates under the name "Bangla Desh" (Bengal Homeland) puts it at hundreds of thousands.

Economically, the war which began in March already has brought the country close to ruin.

The government has announced it will ask creditor nations for a six-month moratorium on payments of debts totalling around \$4 billion. Included in the consortium of nations to whom the debt is owed are the United States, Japan, Canada and nations of Western Europe.

Also under consideration is devaluation of the rupee. Added to this must be counted hundreds of millions of dollars which must come from somewhere in coming months to feed the refugees now living amid hunger, squalor and disease in West Bengal and the frontier districts along the 1,300-mile border between India and East Pakistan.

When President Yahya calls the war "Man made" he is correct in that it was led by Sheikhs Mujibar Rahman who rebelled against "what he declared was West Pakistan's treatment of East Pakistan as a "colony and a market." East Pakistan jute provided Pakistan with its greatest single export and foreign exchange earnings. But most of it was spent in the west to finance industry, the army and public works.

When the followers of Mujibar Rahman speak of "genocide," it is a charge they bring against Yahya who speaks of a return to civilian rule but seeks a military solution to the revolt.

Rahman's fate, he says, is of no concern to the outer world since it is purely a Pakistani problem. Rahman is believed being held in West Pakistan on a charge of treason.

Against government claims of a return of order, to East Pakistan are other reports which tell of mounting absenteeism among workers who idolize their imprisoned leader and of continuing sabotage against bridges, highways and other means of communication.

Through the years since partition of India and Pakistan no other nation has supplied aid to Pakistan in the amounts contributed by the United States. Before the outbreak of the current conflict on March 25, U.S. aid was running at about \$200 million a year.

Yet it is a part of the history of deteriorating relations with Pakistan that even that aid was suspect, intended, according to some rightwing Pakistani politicians, to contribute to Pakistan's partition.

End Of 62nd Legislature Session Marks Start Of Political Race

AUSTIN (UPI) — When the 62nd session of the Texas legislature ends at midnight Monday the race will start for positions on the 1972 election ballot.

For the first time in more than a century, every elective position in the state except for one United States Senate seat now held by Sen. Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr., will be open.

The infighting already has been spirited, and has been one of the underlying components of the current legislative session. Because of legislative and congressional redistricting, all political offices of the state will expire at the end of 1972 and literally dozens of officeholders are covetously eyeing higher offices even now.

After Governorship
One of the virtual certainties is that Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes will be running for governor next year. He is expected to make that fact official late in June by his formal announcement.

The direction that Barnes takes will have a lot to do with other potential candidates. For instance, Uvalde rancher and banker Dolph Briscoe, who has been running for governor virtually since he was one of half a dozen to lose to Gov. Preston Smith in 1968, may not want to take on Barnes if the lieutenant governor gets in the governor's race.

LOVE BIRD
HUCKNALL, England (UPI) —Oswald the Ostrich has passed his metal detector test. He does not, as feared, have a stomach full of scrap metal. But he does have a broken heart.

Zoo officials called on army experts to run a sensitive mine detector over him when he developed a stomach upset soon after his girl friend, Emily, died last week.

But after a 20-minute examination Wednesday, Oswald was pronounced free of metal. Then zoo officials decided Oswald was actually love sick.

"We will get a female ostrich as soon as possible," said Martin Lacey, zoo director.

But former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough is felt by some to be a virtual sure candidate even with Barnes in that race. Yarborough supporters have been pressuring him to run for governor constantly since he was ousted last year by Bentsen.

Would Lack Funds
Yarborough, however, probably would have a hard time raising sufficient funds to wage a major campaign necessary to make a good showing. And the fact that he will be 69 years old next year and Barnes will only be 34 likely would be another big obstacle for him.

Then, there still is Gov. Smith. The governor still maintains publicly that he is planning to run for a third term, but the fact that his name was linked in January with the statewide insurance stock scandal would be a hard blow to his chances for re-election.

Thus it appears at this point that it probably will be Barnes

versus Yarborough in the Democratic primary next spring, with the winner being opposed in the general election by Sen. Henry Grover, R-Houston.

Grover Has Announced
Grover already has announced he plans to seek the Republican nomination for governor next year. And so far, none has come forward in that party to challenge him.

Wholesale turnovers appear likely in the Texas House and Senate next year, with a number of current members running for Congress or statewide office, and others just plain quitting or meeting defeat at the polls.

Astute political observers are predicting that the record tax bill passed this session, combined with the unrest among voters over the involvement of a number of other high state officials in the National Bankers Life Insurance Co. stock scandal, will see quite a few of them defeated at the polls.

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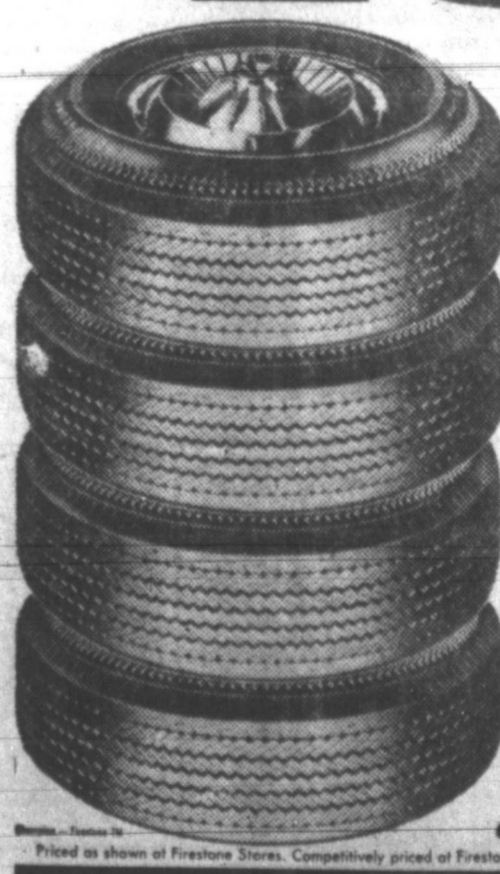
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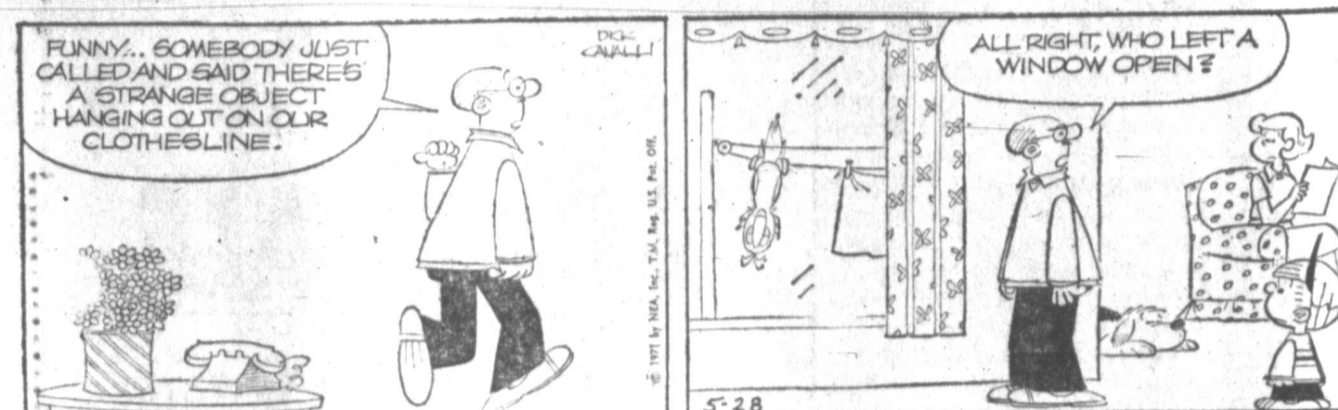
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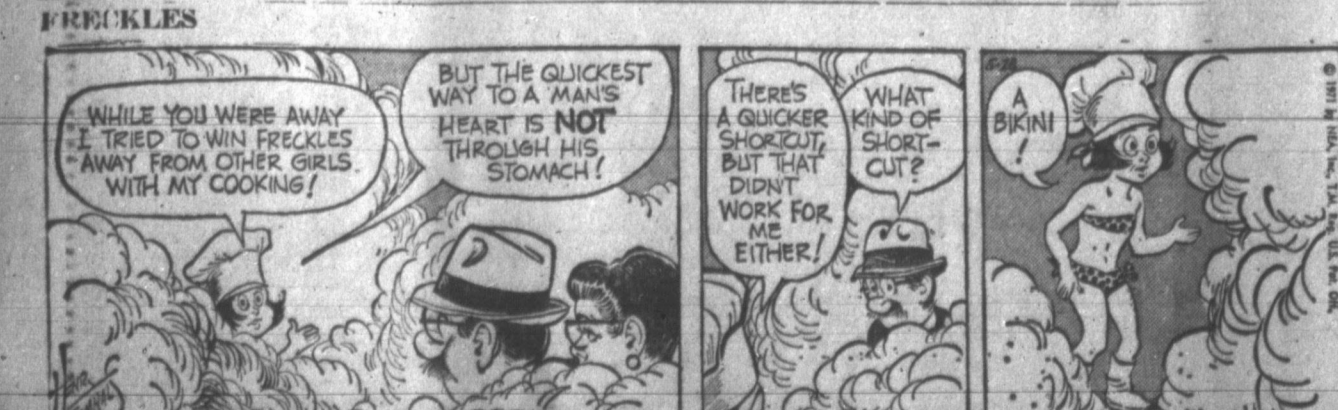

38 Americans Killed In Viet Last Week

SAIGON (UPI)—Communist troops last week killed 38 American servicemen and wounded 92 others, the lowest casualty toll suffered by U.S. forces since the second week of the year, military spokesmen said today.

Officers said, however, that not all the names of 30 Americans killed and 50 wounded in a pair of Communist rocket attacks last Friday were included in the weekly casualty report issued by the U.S. command today.

Servicemen are not listed until their families have been notified, spokesmen said, and names of many of the 80 casualties suffered last Friday will be held until next week's report.

Spokesmen said the 130 casualties reported last week were the lowest since the week ending Jan. 9, when 27 Americans were killed and 83 wounded.

Last week's death toll, the highest in three weeks, boosted the number of Americans killed in action in the Vietnam war to 45,183, spokesmen said. Another 299,434 U.S. troops had been wounded in action between Jan. 1, 1961, and last Saturday, the spokesmen said.

South Vietnamese headquarters reported that casualties suffered by government troops rose sharply last week, with 476 men killed and 1,015 wounded in battlefield action.

Drouth Conditions In Some Areas Continue To Intensify

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UPI)—Normally expected statewide May rains have been insufficient and time is fast running out. Some good rains in spots and showers over much wider areas have helped but in the missed areas the drought conditions continue to intensify, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said today.

A few spots in the eastern third of the state have adequate soil moisture for crop and pasture growth but adjoining counties are still short on moisture, the service said.

Low temperatures and high winds continue to hamper the growth of crops already up and slow germination of recently planted crops. This combination of weather conditions is also credited with causing seedling disease problems, especially in

western and northwestern sections of the state. Yields in North Central Texas are expected to be low. Pastures and ranges in the drier areas of the state, and this includes a lot of country, continue to furnish little to on grazing. Hay supplies are gone in some areas and very limited in most. Livestock culling is continuing and marketings in South Texas were reported as heavy

and increasing. The condition of livestock ranges from poor to good depending on the rainfall received over the past several weeks. Feeding is continuing in the drier sections of the state. Ground soaking and tank filling rains are needed over much of the state. The only exceptions being in the more favored sections.
