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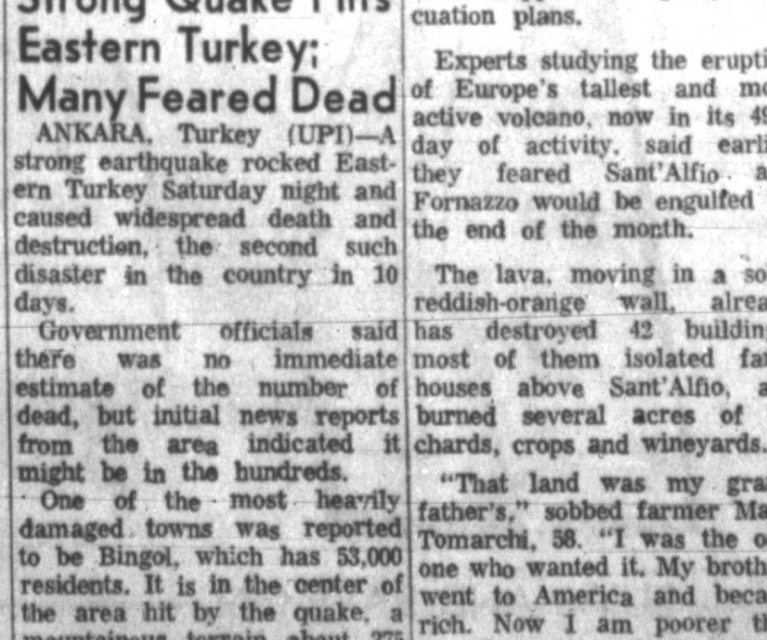

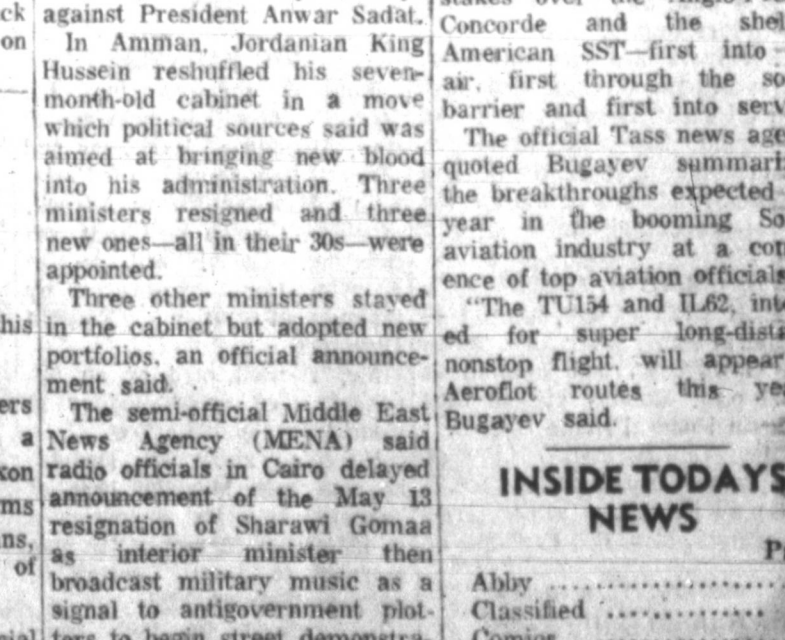

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—When 1971 sedans bump into fixed barriers at speeds of 15 miles per hour, the average repair bill is \$1,114. Give or take a dent in the power ash tray.

Yet this is "the speed at which football players regularly collide, usually without damage," a safety expert recently told the Senate Commerce Committee.

If you examine it carefully, you will find that comparison fraught with significance. The committee, however, seems to have missed the point, alas.

The committee went right on talking about new federal standards for automobile bumpers. Which obviously is the wrong approach to the problem.

If the government is really serious about making cars less vulnerable, it should forget about bumpers and require the auto industry to equip the new models along the following lines:

DETROIT—The Impact Motor Company introduced its 1973 models today, including a new crash-resistant sedan called the "Huffmobile" in honor of former middle linebacker Sam Huff.

The Huffmobile features a number of safety innovations designed to protect it from damage during moving contact

with other vehicles, such as blitzing a grocery cart in the supermarket parking lot.

In the most noticeable change, the conventional engine hood has been replaced by a large football helmet, with a face guard where the radiator grille used to be.

Over the front wheels, where fenders normally would appear, the Huffmobile has a huge pair of shoulder pads.

Radical changes also have been made in the rear of the car, with hip pads substituted for the back bumper. An outstretched set of thigh pads extends along the sides.

Along with these styling alterations, impact also announced an important personnel change. The company's chief engineer has been replaced by an equipment manager.

Edsel Impact II, president of the firm, said impact dealers around the country are updating their service departments by firing mechanics and hiring trainers.

"The Huffmobile underwent extensive test track trials, including 15 m.p.h. collisions with the 'Pearsome Foursome' of the Los Angeles Rams," he said. "It came through undamaged."

Median Income

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Census Bureau says American families earned a record median income of \$9,870 last year, but in actual buying power the dollar lost ground for the first time in nine years.

The bureau reported Thursday that a survey of 50,000 families indicated median income increased \$440 from 1959. But because of inflation, the bureau said, the purchasing power of \$9,870 was only \$9,867 in "constant dollars"—dollars that have been adjusted for cost of living changes.

In another report Thursday, the Commerce Department said Americans, their government and their businesses were in debt by a record of \$8.8 trillion by the end of 1970.

The business debt accounted for \$955 billion, or 52 per cent. Government debt was \$483 billion, or 26 per cent. Private debts by individuals amounted to \$402 billion, of which \$127 billion was in home mortgages.

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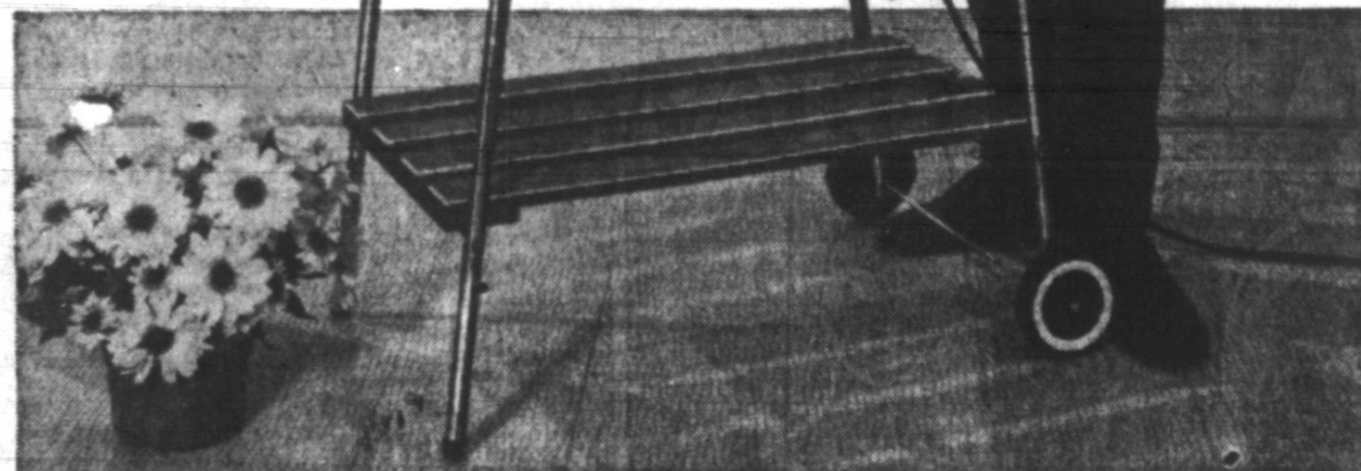

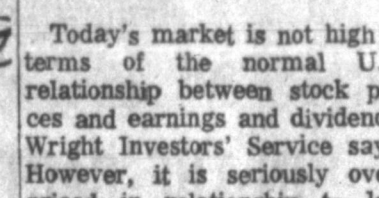

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two unusual features have marked the stock market recovery thus far this year: the absence of the individual investor and the concentration of investment in a relatively small number of major companies, Dean Witter & Co. observes. In view of this, the firm believes the market will continue upward, but "with emphasis on secondary companies with concept stories or turnaround prospects."

Today's market is not high in terms of the normal U.S. relationship between stock prices and earnings and dividends, Wright Investors' Service says. However, it is seriously overpriced in relationship to last year's extremes of interest rates and bond yields, which now threaten to return, the firm believes.

The monetary crisis is temporarily depressing the market, but over the long run the problem invites a flow from cash into equities according to the Indicator Digest. Regard the current correction as a natural process—correcting the technical excesses and putting stocks on a more solid footing for the rest of the bull move, the firm recommends.

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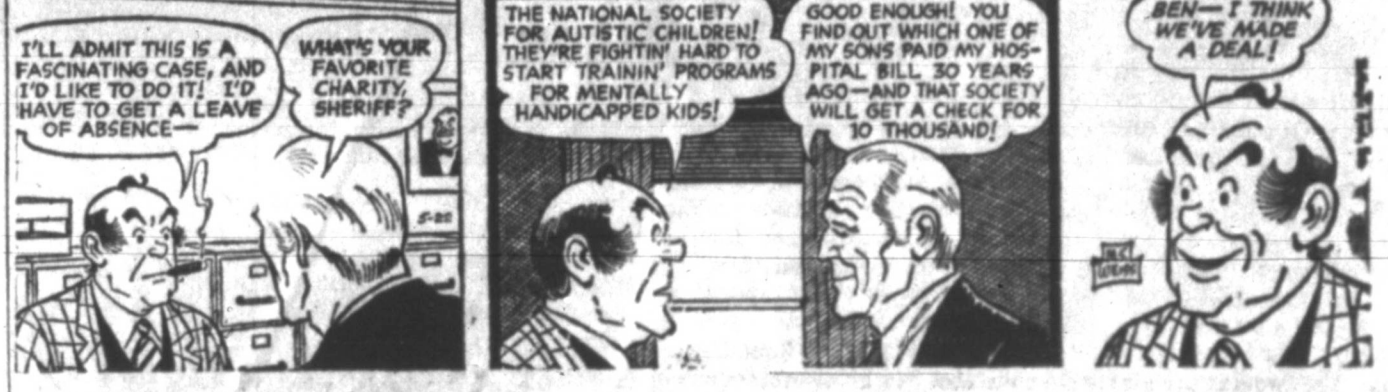

AAA Announces \$15,000 Cash Tourney In Texas

Houston, Tex.—The American Anglers Association announced a National Bass Fishing Tournament to be held on Lake Livingston, Texas, July 17-18.

The contest will offer a cash prize of \$15,000 plus trophies and numerous merchandise awards to anglers who weigh in the heaviest stringers of bass (large mouth, Kentucky-spotted, small mouth) during the two day event. Grand prize for the largest single bass weighed in will be a popular 1971 model Bass Boat and trailer and the fish will be mounted free by taxidermist Don Hawkins of Beaumont.

At the AAA National Headquarters in Houston, President Bob Stewart stressed that "Family participation" will be encouraged in this and all future AAA events. He stated, "something will be had for all at this national fish-off. Just because some women don't like to fish doesn't mean they should stay home, either. Bingo and supervised competitive games will be held on the tournament grounds for the ladies and children. Trophies and merchandise will be awarded."

Stewart, known for his interest in ecology and pollution

problems, will also hold a "pack-rat" contest and award trophies to children weighing in the heaviest amount of trash picked up at the tournament site.

Participation in the tournament, hailed as the '1971 Lake Livingston National Invitational' is by invitation only and open to members of the American Anglers Association over 16 years of age. AAA is a nationwide network of sport and fun fishermen dedicated to the preservation and advancement of the angling art. Association membership is open to any interested fisherman regardless of sex or race.

This national event will be the fifth major event sponsored by AAA in the past fifteen months, however it will be the first major tournament since AAA changed hands and moved its headquarters to Houston. The changeover took place during the 1971 Lone Star National, also held at Lake Livingston in March of this year. Reorganization plans call for six major competitive events each year with a minimum cash purse of \$15,000.

In July, two tournament divisions will be available for entry; the individual event, which is directed primarily at professional tournament fishermen, and the Two-Man Team division which calls for a much lesser entry fee and is popular among local and occasional weekend anglers. Prizes will be awarded beginning with \$2000 cash for first place in the individual division and ranging to \$100 cash for thirtieth place.

Two Controversial Items To Be Discussed In NFL

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two of the most controversial items of the 1970 season—the double foul rule in the first Kansas City-Oakland game and the possibility of a coin flip to decide a playoff spot—will be on the agenda this week when the National Football League holds its annual spring meeting.

Both items were tabled when the NFL held its winter meetings in Palm Beach, Fla. in March for consideration at this spring meeting.

The 26 NFL owners will meet from Tuesday through Friday after the 26 coaches gather on Monday. The 13 coaches from each conference will also hold mass press conferences, the AFC coaches on Monday afternoon and the NFC coaches Tuesday morning.

A change in the double foul rule has been discussed ever since the first Kansas City-Oakland game last fall when Len Dawson scrambled for a first down in the final minute and Ben Davidson clobbered him after the quarterback was tackled and was charged with an unnecessary roughness penalty.

However, Otis Taylor of Kansas City was enraged by Davidson's foul and went after him to start a brawl that resulted in an off-setting penalties call against both Davidson and Taylor and wiped out Dawson's first down.

Millions of fans were reminded of the play last week when it was shown during the Oakland Raider highlights on the NFL films' weekly show. Kansas City was forced to kick after it lost the first down and Oakland rallied one of George Flandia's last-second field goals to tie the game 17-17. If Dawson's first down had stood, Kansas City probably would have run out the clock to gain a 17-14 victory.

The NFL office stood behind referee Bob Finley on the off-setting penalty call, claiming he had called it according to the rules although there was much confusion in the way he handled the situation.

Crappie Fishing Here As Summer Is Starting

To an "uneducated" listener the statement that "you'd better not horse ol' paper-mouth or he'll get away" is a lot of nonsense. But avid crappie fishermen all over the country will know what's being said: The thin tissue making up a crappie's mouth requires dexterity and ease when landing the fish.

Crappie are one of the most plentiful game fish found in lakes and streams throughout America, and — happily — they're also rated tops as table fare. Of interest to anglers is some on-the-water research by fishing experts indicating that the next few weeks could provide the best crappie fishing of the year.

Biologists have shown that the last few weeks of spring and the first week or so of summer is an excellent crappie fishing time. This period comes just before the crappie spawning season, when fishing success will dip until cool weather arrives in fall.

During the pre-spawning period crappie tend to concentrate near the mouths of small creeks and streams, along banks with overhanging trees (feeding on insects falling into the water), and generally in areas where the water is undisturbed by wind action.

Most experienced crappie fishermen use a boat. Rigging two or three cane poles with minnows (less than two inches long, and lightly hooked through the skin behind the dorsal fin), they set the bobbers so the baits will be at different levels beneath the surface. Then they slowly work along shore and around rock points, seeking underwater debris that provides shelter, and generally staying within 50 feet of shore.

Fly fishermen can have a lot of fun fishing for crappie with both dry and wet flies. For surface fishing, the experts recommend using tactics similar to those employed for trout. Dry flies normally used for other panfish are suitable. Wet flies should imitate minnows. Best periods of day for fly fishing are early morning and from dusk to sunset.

Another thing to remember is that when crappie are actively feeding on the surface, you will usually be able to see them.

The juco transfers are footballers Kenneth Lipkins, Bill Trisciani and Ray Keasey. Mel Shivers, another football player, became scholastically ineligible because of poor grades.

Lipkins ended spring drills as a starting safety man. Trisciani and Keasey were reserve linemen. Shivers was a defensive back last fall, but switched to split receiver this spring. He had no playing time.

The NCAA just made clear a ruling on junior college transfers which had been on the books for some time. That judgement affected athletes and colleges throughout the nation.
