By JOHN CUNNIFF AP Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP) - This is an excellent time to buy issues of new stocks, says Milton Fisher. Some sound companies with good prospects are offering their shares. The potential

for big profits exists. But beware. A sound foundation in the new issue market oft e n deteriorates suddenly, catching the naive, the greedy and the fools in quicksand. The public's only protection is itself, says Fisher, and sometimes it ign't protection enough.

An investor banker, Fisher is author of a successful book that picked holes in the commonly accepted notion that small investors must deal only in stocks listed on the big exchanges.

Nonsense, he said in the book, "How to Make Big Money in the Over The Counter Market." Investments are under your nose if you look, he said. Why invest in a big company whose growth is behind it and about which you know little when you can invest in a local company with its future ahead

Said Fisher: "Only the public can reject the junk. Let the issuer and the underwriter eat the garbage. They'll get the message."

How do you reject the junk? By studying the prospectus, which Fisher claims really isn't as formidable as it appears. He gives this advice.

1. Pay particular attention, of course, to the statement of earnings paragraphs. The company must list its five-year financial record, or from its founding if less than five. What are the earnings per share?

2. Determine the price-earnings ratio, or the number of times earnings the stock is selling for. If a new issue comes out at 50 or 100 times earnings and you know you can get seasoned companies at 15 times,

you've had your warning. 3. Study the paragraphs on "dilution." Be mighty skeptical of a new issue in which the insider's value per share was one cent and the stock is being offered to the public at \$5 a

The incredible performance concerned the Yugoslavs. Only a year ago or so President Tito was being called every bad name in the Chinese Communist lexicon. Tito was the worst of all possible revisionists, a traitor to Marxism-Leninism.

Not so any more. A Yugoslav delegation got super-red carpet treatment in Peking this month. Flags were everywhere. Slogans emblazoned on walls upheld the independence of nations. Speeches recounted in terms of glory how in recent times "Yugoslav people have withstood foreign pressure."

There was only one foreign pressure and it was Soviet, But there was more to annoy the Russians. Before the Yugoslav visit, Peking was host to a Romanian delegation headed by the top Romanian Communist. Nicolae Ceausescu.

On that occasion the talk was about the rights of small nations, too, Premier Chou En-lai noted that "medium and small countries ... are uniting to oppose the hegemony of the su-perpowers and defend their national interests and state sovereignty." There are only two superpowers, and one of them, the United States, hasn't been bothering either Romania or

All month, too, visitors from little Communist Albania, the striden-voiced European ally of Red China in the cold war with Moscow, had been bustling all over the People's Republica getting VIP treatment,

A glance at the map shows that Romania, Yugoslavia and Albania together make up a unified and fairly sizable chunk of southeast Europe, stretching rom the Black Sea and Soviet ntiers to the Adriatic

Beginning October 1, 1972, sales of all nonreturnable beer and soft drink cans and bottles will be prohibited in Oregon. Also banned are cans opened by pulling rings in their tops.

The recently passed law will require customers to pay a deposit on all beer and soft drink containers, in most cases five cents. But all other types of containers, including milk, whisky and wine bottles, are exempted.

The legislation has been hailed as a "landmark" and as a resounding victory for conservationists. It will be at least a couple of years, however, before anyone will really know how much a victory it was, if






