BODY FAILS TO WAIT FOR WORD FROM HITLER

(Copyright, 1936, By The Associated Press) LONDON, March 24—The League of Nations council, without waiting to hear directly from Reichsfuehrer Hitler, voted today to adjourn without taking further action on Germany's violation of the Locarno treaty.

The council members decided they would reassemble at Geneva whenever their president, Stanley M. Bruce of Australia, called them to meet.

In the meantime, Great Britain, France, Belgium, and Italy—the co-signers and guarantors of the Locarno pact—are to continue negotiations with Germany.

An authoritative source said France was disappointed by Great Britain's attitude toward Germany and consequently sought adjournment of the league body.

The council was called into session here to consider Germany's violation of the Locarno treaty through remilitarizing the Rhineland and now awaits Reichsfuehrer Hitler's answer to proposals for smoothing out the critical situation resulting.

It was stated that the French are disappointed because Great Britain considers the proposal exactly that and not an ultimatum, as the French prefer.

The feasibility of proposing that the council adjourn was discussed privately today by Joseph Paul-Boncour, the French minister without portfolio with Maxim Litvinoff, foreign commissar of Russia, and Nicholas Titulescu, foreign minister of Rumania.

The council itself met in private session shortly after their conference while Joachim von Ribbentrop, Hitler's special ambassador, flew from Berlin bringing Hitler's answer.

Two other factors complicated the situation, in addition to the lack of official word from Hitler at the time the council met privately.

First, Premier Mussolini had not yet replied with either a ratification or a rejection of the plan for settling the Rhineland situation.

Second, word from Paris said France had flatly refused to consider any counter-proposals by Hitler.

Members of the chamber of deputies cheered today when Gen. Giuseppe Valle, under-secretary of aviation, told them that the Italian air fleet was in a position to sweep the Mediterranean.

He said that Italy's bombing planes, each carrying 3,300 pounds of bombs, could cover every section of the Mediterranean and that the present air strength was well on the way to being doubled. He did not, however, reveal the present strength.

General Valle asserted that Italy had completed her reserve stocks of fuel and oil for her air fleet and could meet any war contingencies. "No point in the Mediterranean," he declared, "can escape our control."

Six men will make up the jury. Women do not serve on Florida juries.

The three defendants are C. A. Brown, suspended Tampa police sergeant; John P. Bridges, suspended patrolman; and C. W. Carlisle, former special officer and city employee.

They are charged with kidnaping E. F. Poulton, who was abducted at the door of police headquarters last November along with Shoemaker and S. D. Rogers. Poulton, Shoemaker and Rogers, unemployed labor organizers, were spirited away and flogged, tarred and feathered, and Shoemaker died nine days afterward.

In all, there are 11 defendants in the series of cases.
