# White House Denounces Smith's Defiance Of Wage Freeze Order

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)-Gov. Preston Smith instructed state officials Thursday to give teachers and state employes their scheduled pay raises Sept. 1 and was quickly denounced by the White House.

Smith declared he was openly defying President Nixon's wageprice freeze as interpreted by the president's cost of living

Presidential Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler issued an administration statement shortly after Nixon landed in Dallas Thursday afternoon to address the National Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

"It appears that the governor of Texas, for motivations of which only he is aware, is seeking to single out a group of Texans for preferential treatment. We don't think any Texan wants that, particularly at a

time when all the nation is banding together to defeat inflation and at a time when many Americans are being requested to make temporary sacrifices for the good of all," the administration statement said Ziegler declared he thought

Texasn would "be as disappoint-

ed in the governor's proclamation as all the nation is." "It's hard to believe that the governor would put himself in a position to deliberately flout the wage-price freeze, which was imposed to cure a basic problem in this country—inflation—

He told all state agency heads to comply with the general ppropriations bill which takes effect Sept. 1 and includes a 6.8

per cent pay hike for the 62,000 rank and file state employes at a cost of \$20 million.

The bill raises Smith's pay from \$55,000 to \$58,500 a year. Smith also told state officials to obey the state education code, which provides automatic pay raises for school teachers,

Nixon's cost of living council, headed by Treasury Secretary John Connally, whom Smith succeeded as Texas governor in 1969, ruled Thursday that the 90day wage-price freeze applied to state employes' salaries. Connally and Smith are long-

time political enemies. The council also said teachers could not receive pay raises under contracts taking effect after

The Texas State Teachers Association estimates half the state's 130,000 teachers had contracts starting before that date.

Estimated cost of all teacher raises is \$40 million in state and local funds over the year starting Sept. 1.

"As governor of the State of Texas, I accept full responsibil? ity for the actions taken by all state agency heads pursuant to this proclamaion," Smih said, this proclamation," Smith said,

Federal law provides a penalty of \$5,000 for each violation of a wage-price freeze ordered by the president.

Smith said no agency head who complies with his proclamation would be liable.

"Far more important to Texas than merely freezing wages is the question of whether the president of the United States has authority to overrule our Texas laws. If he does have the authority in this case, we are going to be in serious trouble in the future when any president can undo in one sentence the laws of our state," Smith said in a statement accompanying his proclamation.

"This flagrant violation of Texas law and the constitution must be challenged, and that is exactly what I am doing. I am refusing to obey the President's order to scrap our appropriations bill, which was signed into law months ago ....

"Texas is going to obey the laws of the 62nd Legislature. Raises will go to teacher and state employes as scheduled."

One alternative under study. he said, is setting up a suspense account into which each employe's raise would be placed during the freeze.

"If at a later time the (wage freeze) order was declared invalid, then the amount due each employe could be delivered after the usual payroll deductions," Martin said, "If it is held at some later date that the monies could not be paid to the respective employes after the lifting of the freeqe, then the funds would be available and subject to disposition by the legisla-
