He attributed malnutrition to poverty, negative social and practices such as vecultural getarianism and macrobiotic diets, the failure of the food industry to fortify foods adequately, lack of education, lack

of motivation and the lack of nutrition education. "The American public is eating a strange diet," Briggs said, adding that Americans eat more sugar, pure fat and wheat flour than their entire intake of other foods.

He said the American diet annually includes 102 pounds of sugar per capita, 53 pounds of fats such as salad oil, 100 pounds of white flour, 14 pounds of corn sugar and 7 pounds of white rice-a total of 276 pounds.
