





"The construction of 21,000 feet of parallel terraces on my farm has been one of the best investments I have made", says Amos Harris, Gray County farmer.

Harris is a member of the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District, He strongly believes in conserving the soil and water resources for the present and future and to help do this installed probably the first system of parallel terraces in Texas. Harris said, "I noticed that therte was some erosion taking place on my farm and decided to terrace it in 1953. I was not interested in the conventional type terrace which curves up or down following the contour of the land creating a bunch of point rows. I wanted my terraces to be the same distance apart which would facilitate farming

In monetary terms: \$1.975 billion in capital costs has already been expended.
