# Nixon May Act To Halt Strike

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Nixon moved Wednesday toward quick use of a back-to-work court order following the breakdown of talks in the Atlantic-Gulf Coast dock strike.

Because of what the White House called a "dim possibility of timely settlement," Nixon reconvened the same special board that last month recommended the order that sent striking West Coast dock workers back for a 90-day cooling-off period under the Taft-Hartley Act.

The President will decide whether to seek a similar order in the Atlantic-Gulf strike after receiving the board's report, probably Thursday.

J. Curtis Counts, the federal government's chief labor mediator, said Tuesday the Atlantic-Gulf talks in Miami, Fla., were deadlocked over money, and that Taft-Hartley action by Nixon was likely.

The strike has idled 45,000 longshoremen and 30,000 members of other unions in ports from Maine to Texas.

# Agreement SALISBURY, Rhodesia

(AP) - Britain and Rhodesia came to terms Wednesday for the African nation's return to the Commonwealth from a six-year rebellion designed to keep the white minority in power.

A joint announcement said British Foreign Secretary Sir Alec Douglas-Home and Prime Minister Ian Smith of Rhodesia will announce the content of the agreement today in addresses to their respective parliaments.

The terms were reported to sanction Rhodesia's independence as a republic and concede political and economic advantages to the country's five million blacks.

There was speculation the agreement also would contain some pledge for movement toward majority rule while continuing for the time being the system run by Rhodesia's 250,000 whites.

It was Britain's demand that Rhodesia grant majority rule which led the eastern African territory to declare its independence Nov. 11, 1965. Six years of pressure. including economic blockade, failed to buckle the white government.

News of the settlement generated an unofficial holiday across Rhodesia. Most Rhodesians of both races seemed glad to see an end to their country's isolation.

The English-Rhodesian deal is likely to be criticized by militant blacks, however. They demanded nothing less than "oneman, one-vote" and no independence whatsoever until a black majority government was in power.

America will observe Thanksgiving Day with family gatherings, football, parades and the traditional turkey and trimmings. And in many places it also will be a day of good deeds.

Organizations and individuals across the nation will open their doors to the orphaned, elderly and needy who might otherwise have no place to go.

In some places, the sharing will be a bit offbeat: a people's picnic in a Dallas park; pumpkin pie for passing truck drivers at a Chicago Skyway toll booth on the Illinois-Indiana lines

In New York State. 30 orphans from the St. Agnes Home for Boys at Sparkill, N.Y., again will be bused to West Point to spend the day with a group of cadets. The boys, age 6 to 16, will eat in the academy mess hall, see the sights and then view a movie.

The program, which is funded by the cadet corps, was started last year by Jack Buttine, a senior cadet from Oyster Bay, N.Y.

As it has for years, the Salvation Army will serve thousands of free dinners at its facilities in cities throughout the country.

In Seattle, Wash., the Council of Churches provided 11,000 sixpound turkey quarters for distribution to the needy.

Several governors and their wives will be dinner hosts for groups of senior citizens. Maine Gov. Kenneth Curtis and his wife, for instance, have invited 100 elderly people to dine at the Capitol in Augusta. Residents of poverty areas in Kentucky will get more than 175 cases of canned goods Thursday, the result of a drive organized by Brother Maurice Mercier of the LaSalette Shrine in Attleboro, Mass. In Dallas, Tex., more than 1,500 persons are expected to turn up at Lee Park for a free turkey feast. Sponsors say the event is "for anyone who needs a place to eat Thanksgiving dinner or doesn't want to eat alone." The food was contributed by local businessmen.

## **President Nixon Picks New Economic Advisor**

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Nixon disclosed Wednesday that his new No. 1 economic adviser will be Dr. Herbert Stein, a longtime foe of government controls who helped draft the wage-price freeze and was the chief architect of Phase 2.

Stein will succeed Dr. Paul W. McCracken on Jan. 1 as chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, the White House announced

The new chairman, acclaimed by McCracken as a "brilliant economist of international reputation," is considered a middle-roader in economic theory. No major shift in economic policy is foreseen; Stein and McCracken have run the council in tandem with Stein in the role of vice chairman.

When the Phase 2 program was unveiled, the 55-yearold Stein said it had a "fighting chance to succeed." He had been one of the hand-

ful of top Nixon aides who drafted the wage-price freeze at Camp David, Md., in mid-

August, and he headed the presidential task force which recommended the Phase 2 apparatus now in operation.

# **Activist And Peace Groups Plan '72 Election Challenge**

DALLAS (AP) - Activist and peace groups from throughout the nation met here Wednesday to decide whether they should challenge **Republicans and Democrats** in next year's presidential election.

During a four-day convention, the self-described Coalition, which calls itself a populistoriented fourth political party, may also name its candidates for president and vice president, write a platform and name a shadow cabinet

"There are two schools of thought on whether we should nominate candidates at this time." explained C.T. Weber, co-chairman of the California Peace and Freedom party. one of 12 such groups attending the convention.

One wants to wait and see what happens at the Democratic National Texas. Delegates who did

convention next summer, he said, while the other favors picking a candidate as soon as possible so as to get him on the vallot in 26 states. This issue will be decided Saturday Possible candidates being



(AP) - A South Vietnamese war orphan, an abandoned waif in Calcutta and a former street urchin in Sao Paulo, Brazil, will sleep under shelter with full stomachs tonight. thanks to a taxi driver in Chicago, a schoolteacher in Los Angeles and a banker in Atlanta.


The cabbie, the teacher and the banker are part of a rapidly growing army of concerned Americans responding to the desperate plight of hundreds of thousands of deprived children throughout the non-Communist world.

Without this army, millions of children over the past three décades might have perished from disease or starvation or become permanent physical or emotional cripples.

Fighting Fires In Manila Tough In Hot Season

MANILA (AP) - What do you do if your ninth floor office or apartment in Manila catches fire? You get out and pray for rain.

The Greater Manila area it's a little bigger than Chicago - has about 80 fire trucks, but only one has an extension ladder that reaches eight floors. Another truck has 65-foot ladder, good for six floors. They are the longest extension ladders in the Philippines.

Add to this notoriously poor water distribution system in which a hydrant's flow under the tropical sun often is only a

trickle, and the conditions are spitting out of the above \$15 million. right for millions of pesos in fire losses annually. The big damage comes during the Philippines' four month long hot season.

There are approximately 100 buildings in the city with more than eight floors, about 20 of them hotels and many others combination residential-commercial buildings. The last big fire of the most

recent hot season illustrates the city's fire-fighting problems.

Fire periodically devastates shantytowns set up by squatters, but Manila Fire chief Federico Garcia said the city's major losses - human and financial - generally occur in the high-rise buildings.

"There's not even a law that staircases must be enclosed." Garcia said. "But we're not approving blueprints for buildings that don't enclose them. Anything to stop the fires and save lives.

"We need new equipment, but we don't have the money to buy it. We need more men, but we don't have the money to pay them."

To serve the city of 1.5 million inhabitants, Garcia's force has 60 officers and 390 firemen, whose monthly salaries begin at about \$45. Jobs are tight, and he said he has no trouble finding men to ride the city's outdated trucks, some of which still use hand-cranked sirens. Suburban companies have fewer men for another 2 million people.

JERUSALEM (NEA) Criticism over what's being done to Jerusalem started right here in Israel. It was sparked by the publication last year of a master plan for the city's development and by a conclave of international experts in architecture and city planning gathered by Mayor Teddy Kollek.

At the time, the Israeli press was running lenghty critiques of the new construction going on in the former Jordanian sector of the city and on the Jewish city fathers' intentions for other parts of the municipal area.

One of the most trenchant critics of the 1967 post-war rush to build was Amos Elon. author of the best-seller "The Israelis: Founders and Sons." Elon contended that Israel was applying outmoded tactics-that times have changed and that it no longer necessary that Jews actually be living in a place for Israel to claim sovereignty over it. Other Israeli critics voiced fears that insufficient attenti was being devoted to Jeru lem's historic landscape and unique architectural qualities.

While non-Israeli parties-among them the Jordanians, British and the Vatican-raised protests on political, aesthetic and religious grounds, Israel's assure that it will remain internal debate was still Israeli unresolved when a group of

the incredible pace at which new apartment houses, streets and roads are being completed.

She notes that a third of Jerusalem's newlyweds can't stay in the city because of the lack of suitable accommodations. She added that slum clearance is urgent and apartments must be readied for the "thousand of immigrants' coming to Jerusalem.

"Progress, development and time and each generation brings a change in the city." he says. "We don't have in mind to keep Jerusalem as a fossilized museum to be looked at. It is a living, viable city, which will develop. However, we are extremely careful to maintain the historic heritage, to conserve monuments, to keep its special character.

Mrs. Eshel went on to say that two of every three new apartments being built in Jerusalem are going up on the former Israeli side of the one-time armistice line. As for the 2,000 new flats in the pre-war Jordanian sector, she contended that these were all constructed on empty lots and that no Arab houses were demolished and thus no Arab was evicted to make room for them

Mrs. Eshel pointed out that a start has been made in new housing for Jerusalem Arabs, with the first series of 30 apartments now available at \$25,000 per unit.

New World Commerce Plan Asked By LOUIS NEVIN

Associated Press Writer LONDON (AP) — Assailing artificial trade barriers, a special envoy of President Nixon said Tuesday night they were erected by the European Common Market and other economic groups for selfish ends. He called for cooperation in building a new world commerce system.

"The U.S. administration is determined to find a better deal for American farmtrade," the envoy, William E b erle, said. "It is determined to find ways to rationalize the chaotic conditions of the world market which result from nationalistic decisions which are often economically senseless decisions."

Eberle is the President's special representative for trade negotiations. He spoke to the British Trade Policy Research Center on the eve of tariff talks in the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade—GATT—in Geneva.

"Unless something is done in agriculture, we simply cannot make further progress in improving our economic relations," Eberle declared. "In fact, unless something is done soon, our relations are likely to get worse."

He appealed to his audience of British bankers and businessmen to work for greater cooperation on a worldwide scale when Britain becomes a member of the European Common Market, now set for Jan. 1, 1973.

The special envoy also had harsh words for the four members of the European Free Trade Association — EFTA who are not joining the Common Market with Britain. The four are Austria, Portugal, Sweden and Switzerland.

In the eyes of American business people, these countries want to have their cake and eat it too." Eberle said. They want the pleasures of free trade in industry but only with Europe. They do not want to pay the political costs of full membership.

liberalize nontariff barriers or agricultural policies against the rest of the world as payment for solution of their industrial tariff problem."

Eberle called for immediate negotiations on a world scale to draft a pact for "acrossthe board elimination of substantially all industrial tariffs

These talks should also serve to draft rules on nontariff barriers to trade, services and investment, a gree on specific commitments to open world markets for agricultural goods and rationalize national farm policies, and grant tariff preferences to developing countries, he added.

Eberle also criticized the British system of granting trade preferences to countries within the Commonwealth. He said Washington has objected to the system since before-World War II.

For years, he said, the American administration has been trying to convince its trading partners that the world system needed repair.

The answer has been that Europe was busy, and Japan wasn't ready.

Eberle also referred to the international crisis unleashed with the President's new economic policy of Aug. 15.

The basic problems, he said, had been building up for a considerable period before the 1971 breakdown of the trade and monetary system Many of these problems will remain after the short-term actions have been normalized. The current economic crisis did not occur overnight. The forces which led to it have been building up for many years.

The trouble was that "the international trading system and the international monetary system have failed to adapt rapidly enough to changing circumstances," he asserted.

He added that America's partners had for years demanded action to end the continuing U.S. balance of payments deficit. But "when we finally acted, no one liked what we did."

For years, he said. America had ben a good creditor when Europe was in debt.

It is now time for Europe to act as a good creditor, because America is now a debtor, "he continued.



# **5 High-Ranking Army Officers** Facing Demotions, Reprimands

#### By ROBERT A. DOBKIN **AP Military Writer**

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WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon confirmed Tuesday demotions or reprimands are planned for five high-ranking Army officers as a result of the bloody North Vietnamese attack on U.S. Fire Base Mary Ann last March. Thirty-three Americans were killed and 76 wounded in the surprise assault

Spokesman Jerry W. Friedheim acknowledged only that letters of intent to take administrative action" were sent to five individuals Nov. 8.

Although Friedheim refused to identify them or discuss details, sources said the five include Maj. Gen. James L. Baldwin, former commander of the Americal Division. It was learned that

Secretary of the Army Robert F. Froehlke, has decided to reprimand Baldwin-a procedure which usually forecloses any further promotions.

The others, including two colonels, a lieutenant colonel and a major, face either reprimand, demotion or both, All

regarding the punishment, assault which does not require trial by courtmartial.

The sources said a lengthy investigation of the March 28 enemy sapper attack holds Baldwin, as division commander, responsible for "failure to insure that adequate defense measures were taken" around the hilltop outpost. Similar complaints are lodged against the other four, one of whom also is accused of dereliction, the

## **Russ Said In Favor Of 'Big Bang' By LOUIS NEVIN**

ASSOCIATED PRESS LONDON (AP) -The Soviet Union now believes in launching an instant and massive strike with nuclear or chemical weapons in any European war, according to a British military analyst.

He says the Soviets have abandoned the policy of gradual escalation in favor of a quick "Big bang" approach. John Erickson, professor of higher defense studies at Edinburg University, gave this assessment in a report published by the Royal United Services Institute. Erickson is considered an

expert on Soviet affairs. He has made many trips to the

Soviet Union and is said to be personally acquainted with some of Russia's top generals and strategists.

The new Soviet mailitary doctrine, he said in his report "Soviet Military Power," is clearly shown in the Red Army's massive war games held in Central Europe.

The 1967 games, he said, were based almost entirely on conventional weapons but the 1970 exercises were based on a mixture of conventional and nuclear weapons.

"Cardinal importance." he wrote, "is attached to the initial strike" and surprise is considered all important. The Soviets now are capable

the initial mass nuclear He adds: "The crucial nature of this first strike,

subsequent evolution of 'the battle' would certainly impel the Soviet command to commit an appreciable proportion of their available warheads-probably as much as 40 per cent (assuming also that this in the contest of a 'major' land battle in Europe projected for some 10 days).



## How It Came About

Do your children-do you-know the origin of the day we call "Thanksgiving." the significance of events surrounding that origin, and their relation to the position we find ourselves in Today? If, after reading what follows, your answer is "no." then. just possibly, you may be inclined to ask "Why?"

It was on Nov. 21 (Nov. 11. according to the old style calendar) in the year 1620. that a band of "pilgrims" moored "their bark" and founded Plymouth Colony in the New World.

The term 'pilgrims' was given to the band by Governor Bradford, the first political leader of the colony, in recognition that this particular group of individuals were on a pilgrimage in search of a place where they might live and worship in a manner not acceptable to the throne and Church of England.

Before landing, the record shows, the members of the expedition met aboard their 'bark," the Mayflower, and drew up and signed the 'Mayflower Compact.' which provided that the colony-soon to be established would function according to majority rule and would set up a working model of a commune in the New World.

Explorations were carried out by members of the party and a general debarkation did not take place until Dec. 21

All houses, stores, and goods were to be held "incommon" with each person serving the "good of all" and with private peoperty reduced to personal clothing and individual belongings lacking the character of economic (productive) goods.

Construction of the first "common house" was started on Christmas Day. 1620. It was followed by the erection of other buildings of similar character. All stores were held jointly and distributed on the basis of "need.

The winter of 1620-21 was a hard one but few. if any, of the colonists exerted themselves to the utmost since their requirements were met, at first, out of the commonstore Half of the pilgrims perished that and the following year. and still the threat of death itself didn't seem sufficient to bestir the colony itself didn't seem sufficient to bestir the colony

In the spring of 1623.

Governor Bradford decided to abandon the communal idea Instead he assigned (today we would call it deeded) plots

of land to each family. informing them that if they wanted anything to eat they would . have to produce it themselves.

The change in the outlook of the pilgrim settlement was almost instantaneous, if we may rely on Bradford's diary. Now the men went forth to work with a will And the women, who before would not think of field labor, now toiled with their husbands, and so did the children.

The result was that when the fall harvest time came, a great abundance of food stuffs rewarded the pilgrims-individually Arrangements with the Indians, peacefully made, had brought variety to the diet and a kind of security against Indian forays.

To celebrate the occasion, a period of thanksgiving was set aside and a feast day arranged. And that is the day we celebrate today in commemoration of the occasion-the day and occasion when our forefathers, starving, turned from socialism to private enterprise, from collectivism ot family and individuality.

The tendency, increasingly over the years, has been for us to mark this day apart as one of feasting without remembering that Thanksgiving commemorates one of the first rejections of socialism on these shores. (American history, before it was diluted into "social studies," showed that Jamestown expérienced almost identical difficulties with its socialistic beginning and resorted to the same solution.)

Americans are prone to be meterialists and to give praise for the material goodies they obtain; but, certainly, the fact of a bountiful harvest in a given instance is not more important than the recognition of the virtues of private ownership and management that made that bountiful harvest possible. It is the latter that should merit our thanks on this day, more than the former


