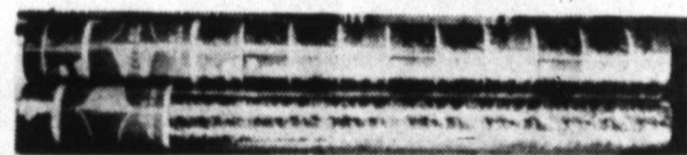

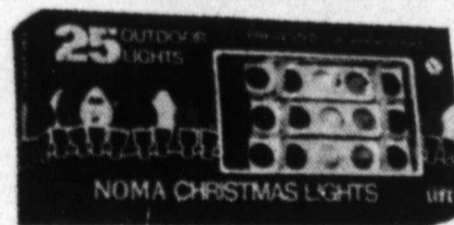

There Is No Blackout On State Official News

There's no blackout on official news in Austin but it gets dim now and then.

The "open door" policies promised by high state officials generally begin to weaken the longer they are in office—particularly if they do not plan to seek re-election.

Mid-Cities Area Becomes Major Tourist Attraction

ARLINGTON, Tex. (AP) — The so-called mid-cities area between Dallas and Fort Worth is being transformed into a major tourist attraction for both cities.

Cow pastures and empty lots are being converted to amusement parks and stadiums, which some observers estimate should bring in more than \$100 million annually in another decade or less.

The past three months saw the opening of Texas Stadium in Irving as home of the Dallas Cowboys, and the refurbishing of Turnpike Stadium as home of the incoming Washington Senators. At the same time owners of the Southwest Historical Wax Museum, now located in the State Fair Park

Seven Seas, a marine park owned by the city of Arlington itself, is expected to draw another 700,000 tourist dollars.

City officials are studying the possibility of building an aboveground tramway system linking Six Flags, Seven Seas and Turnpike Stadium

Dallas-Fort Worth Bus Transit System

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Transit System, which operates a fleet of 440 buses, is expected to bid to become the prime contractor for a regional ground transportation system linking Dallas and Fort Worth with the regional airport now building between the two cities.

Ben Tonick, operations assistant and active in a regional mass transit study under way, projected a

possible \$12 million to \$15 million cost of the initial system of busses and terminals.

Tonick said a consulting firm now is under a \$115,000 contract with the transit system to study the proposal.

"There is no way between now and July of 1973 when the airport is scheduled to open to have anything but buses," said Tonick.

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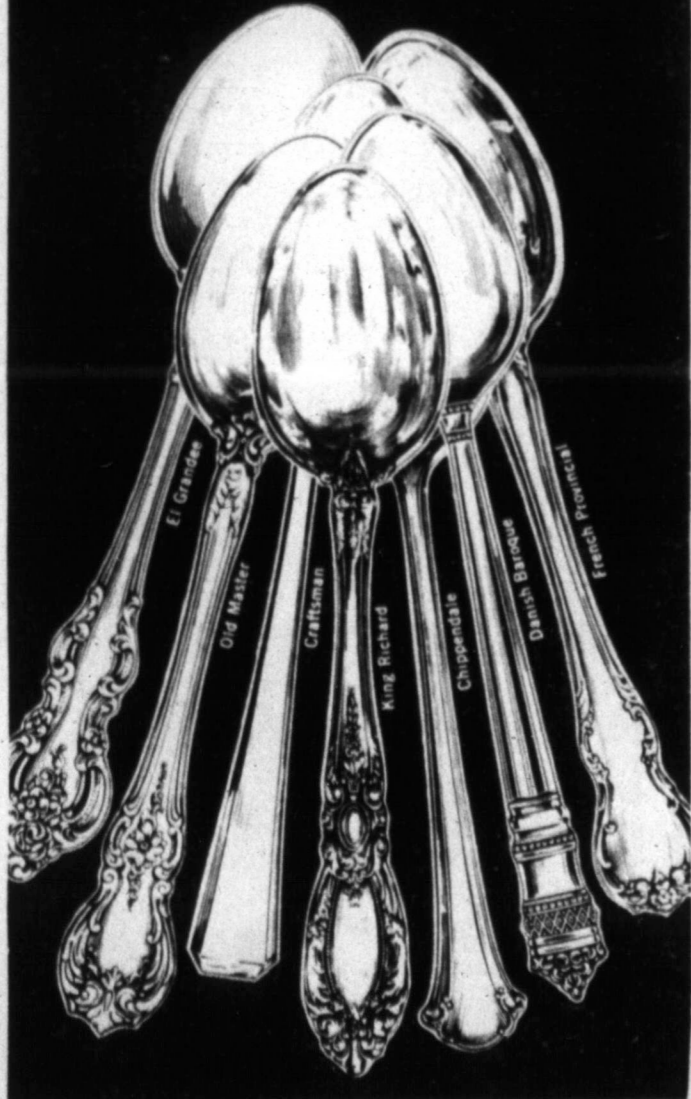

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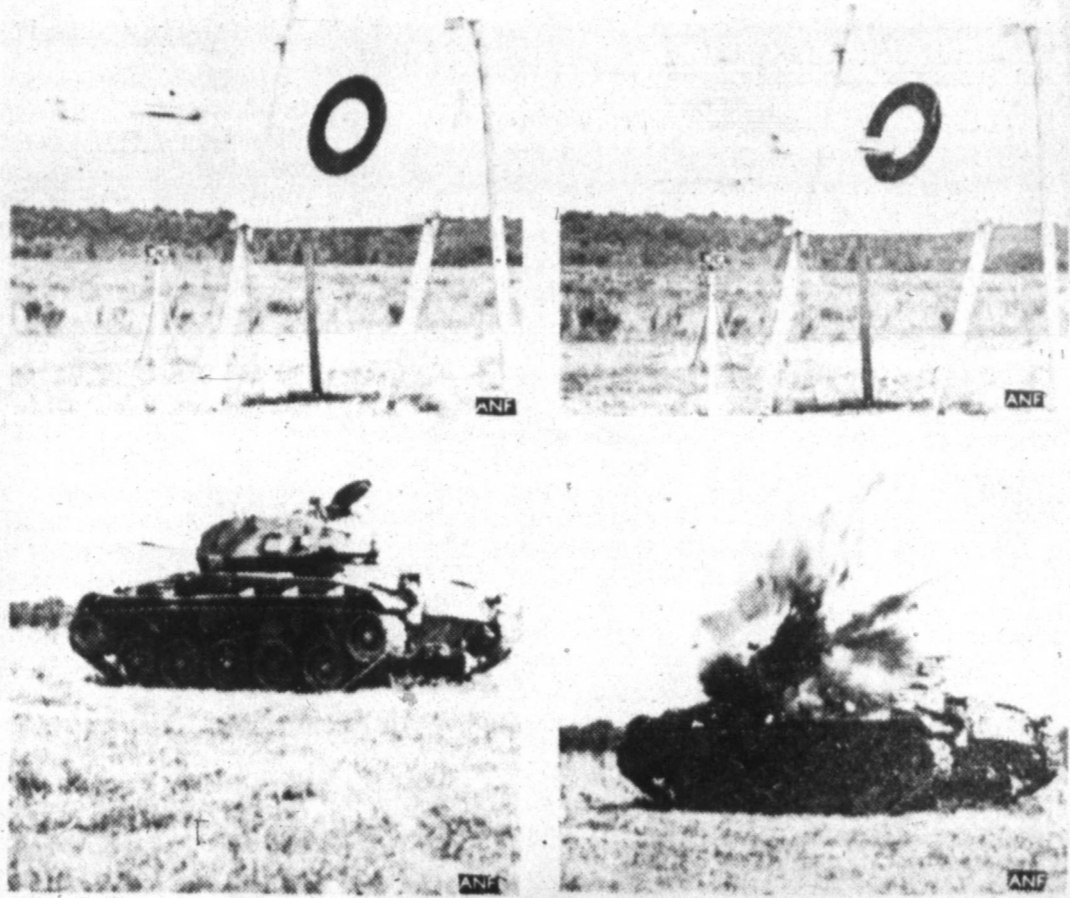

Right To Waive Jury Indictment Is Upheld

AUSTIN (AP) — A new state law permitting accused persons to waive their right to a grand jury indictment before standing trial in non-death penalty cases has been upheld by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

The 1971 legislature passed the law, permitting cases to go to trial on "informations" filed by district attorneys if the defendants waived their indictment rights.

Both the Texas and United States constitutions provide the right to have one's case brought before a grand jury to decide whether it merits a full-scale trial.

The test of the new law came in the case of James Richard King, who was assessed two years imprisonment on charges he received a stolen credit card. King waived the grand jury right.

King's lawyer contended the Dallas court which tried him

lacked jurisdiction because a grand jury had not acted on the case.

But the appeals court's presiding judge, John F. Onion, said the U.S. Supreme Court has held an accused person can waive his grand jury rights if he lives in a state that provides for trial upon a district attorney's "information."

Onion said it would be difficult to conclude that the U.S. constitutional right to a grand jury could be waived but the state constitutional right could not.

The court also upheld a Fort Worth murder conviction, rejecting a contention that the trial court was not legally in existence. The court affirmed the 200-year prison sentence assessed Sam Maldonado in the April 18, 1970 shooting death of Tom Fabila.

Maldonado was tried in Criminal District Court No. 4 of Tarrant County, one of

several new courts authorized in the second called session of the 1969 legislature.

Maldonado's lawyers claimed the court was not legally created because Gov. Preston Smith had not included a courts bill in his call for the session.

The appeals court said it would henceforth adopt the Texas Supreme Court's doctrine—long used in civil cases—that courts have no right to consider the circumstances of a bill's passage.

"We will not look behind the engrossed bill to see if the governor issued a proclamation including the subject matter of enacted legislation," Judge Leon Douglas wrote.

In a third case, the court said photographs showing blood spots were not automatically barred from submission to a jury in a murder case.

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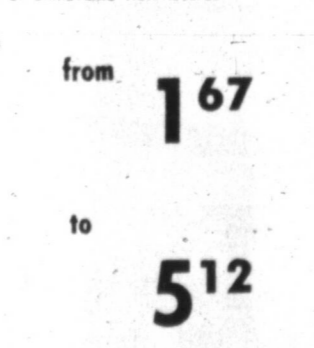

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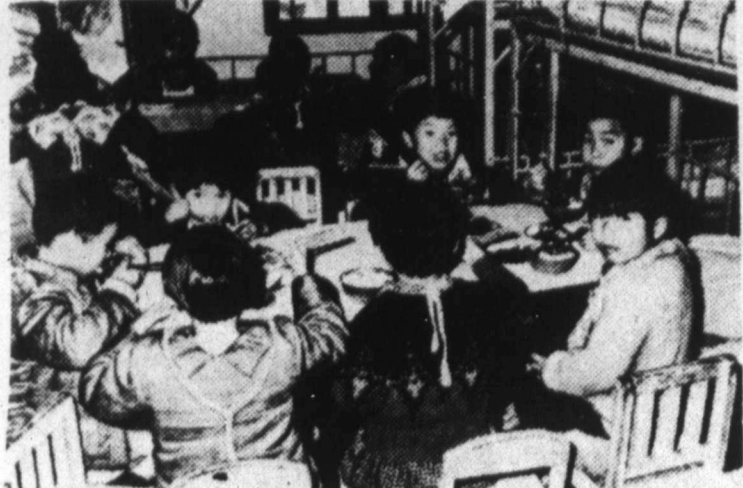
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Concerned Americans Help World's Deprived Children

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A South Vietnamese war orphan, an abandoned waif in Calcutta and a former street urchin in Sao Paulo, Brazil, will sleep under shelter with full stomachs tonight, thanks to a taxi driver in Chicago, a schoolteacher in Los Angeles and a banker in Atlanta.

The cabbie, the teacher and the banker are part of a rapidly growing army of concerned Americans responding to the desperate plight of hundreds of thousands of deprived children throughout the non-Communist world.

Without this army, millions of children over the past three decades might have perished from disease or starvation or become permanent physical or emotional cripples.

Instead, they symbolize a modern-day response to that ancient biblical injunction, "Suffer little children to come unto Me."

Such is the phrase chiseled into the cornerstone of the headquarters here of Christian Children's Fund, Inc., oldest of the international relief agencies dedicated to rescuing children the world over from the sludge of poverty, pestilence and despair.

Like their counterparts, Save the Children Federation, Foster Parents, Inc., Children, Inc. and others, CCF has compiled a notable record of accomplishment

since its founding by the Dr. J. Calvitt Clarke, an American missionary to China, in 1938.

Since the first bleeding infant was unstrapped from its dead mother's back following a Japanese air raid near Peiping in 1938 and later cared for in a CCF orphanage, more than a million children have benefitted from the organization's assistance.

In 1970 alone, some 115,000 children received help in over 850 CCF-owned homes or affiliated projects in 59 countries. More than \$15 million, virtually all from individual contributions and bequests, funded the program, compared to a budget of little more than \$10,000 in 1938-39.

"Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we're able to continually expand," said Dr. Edmund W. Janss, Methodist minister and associate executive director of CCF.

"But, unfortunately, the need seems to escalate out of proportion to our ability to cope with it," he said. "For every child we can save, there are a hundred more who remain doomed."

It was CCF that originated the "Foster parent" approach to world wide children's relief, a formula now used successfully by most similar organizations.

Under this plan, monthly contributions of \$12 or more from individuals and organizations are earmarked for aid to a specific child. The donor is supplied a picture and a biography of the recipient

Fighting Fires In Manila Tough In Hot Season

MANILA (AP) — What do you do if your ninth floor office or apartment in Manila catches fire? You get out and pray for rain.

The Greater Manila area — it's a little bigger than Chicago — has about 80 fire trucks, but only one has an extension ladder that reaches eight floors. Another truck has a 65-foot ladder, good for six floors. They are the longest extension ladders in the Philippines.

Add to this notoriously poor water distribution system in which a hydrant's flow under the tropical sun often is only a

trickle, and the conditions are right for millions of pesos in fire losses annually. The big damage comes during the Philippines' four month long hot season.

There are approximately 100 buildings in the city with more than eight floors, about 20 of them hotels and many others a combination residential-commercial buildings.

The last big fire of the most recent hot season illustrates the city's fire-fighting problems.

It was a quiet Sunday afternoon, and flames began

spitting out of the seventh-floor windows of a 13-story insurance building in Makati, the city's wealthiest suburb. The blaze was eating through the eighth floor when fire units arrived.

One ladder went up and a Filipino fireman scampered to its top. His hose, made impotent by low pressure, trained a stream on the sixth floor where it made office records soggy but did little else. The top seven floors were destroyed within eight hours.

During the first six months of 1971, which included the hot season, fire cost Manilans

above \$15 million. Twenty-nine persons were killed and scores injured.

Fire periodically devastates shantytowns set up by squatters, but Manila Fire chief Federico Garcia said the city's major losses — human and financial — generally occur in the high-rise buildings.

"There's not even a law that staircases must be enclosed," Garcia said. "But we're not approving blueprints for buildings that don't enclose them. Anything to stop the fires and save lives."

"We need new equipment, but we don't have the money to buy it. We need more men, but we don't have the money to pay them."

To serve the city of 1.5 million inhabitants, Garcia's force has 60 officers and 390 firemen, whose monthly salaries begin at about \$45. Jobs are tight, and he said he has no trouble finding men to ride the city's outdated trucks, some of which still use hand-cranked sirens. Suburban companies have fewer men for another 2 million people.

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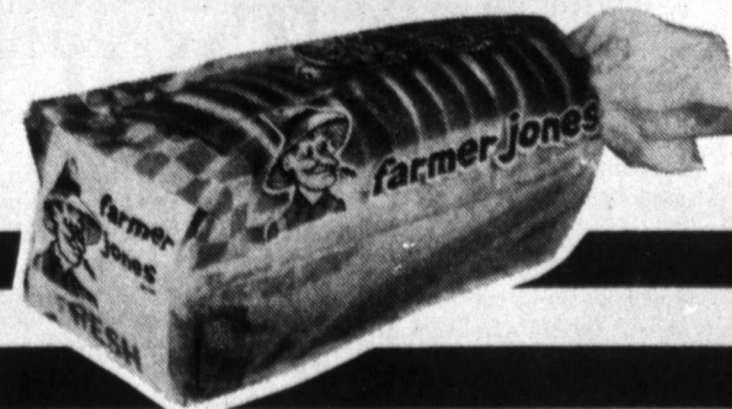

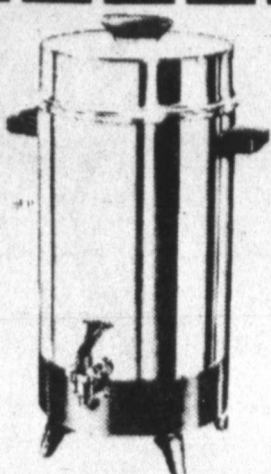

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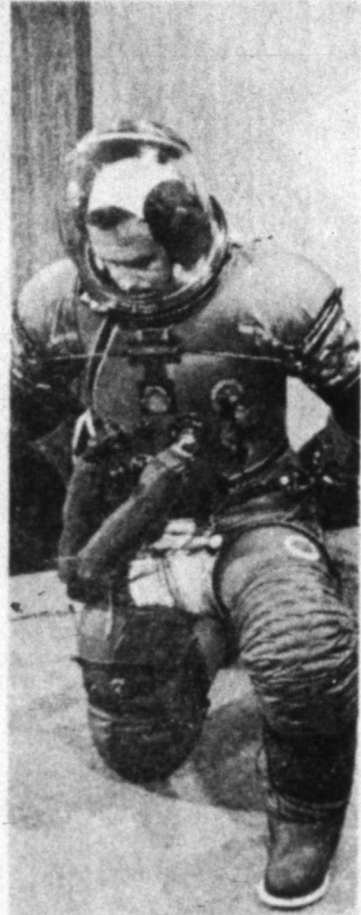

Jerusalem Urban Renewal Stirs Protests

JERUSALEM (NEA) — Criticism over what's being done to Jerusalem started right here in Israel. It was sparked by the publication last year of a master plan for the city's development and by a conclave of international experts in architecture and city planning gathered by Mayor Teddy Kollek.

At the time, the Israeli press was running lengthy critiques of the new construction going on in the former Jordanian sector of the city and on the Jewish city fathers' intentions for other parts of the municipal area.

One of the most trenchant critics of the 1967 post-war rush to build was Amos Elon, author of the best-seller "The Israelis: Founders and Sons." Elon contended that Israel was applying outmoded tactics—that times have changed and that it no longer necessary that Jews actually be living in a place for Israel to claim sovereignty over it. Other Israeli critics voiced fears that insufficient attention was being devoted to Jerusalem's historic landscape and unique architectural qualities.

While non-Israeli parties—among them the Jordanians, British and the Vatican—raised protests on political, aesthetic and religious grounds, Israel's internal debate was still unresolved when a group of Hebrew University students brought things to a head by planting saplings on a site earmarked for a big hotel. They charged it would ruin the skyline.

Then the real uproar was kicked off by a seemingly blithe, though far from innocuous, remark made by Minister of Housing Ze'ev Sherf. He declared at a press luncheon that he didn't care how Jerusalem would look after the year 2000 because he didn't expect to be around then to see it. But, he went on, he is determined to provide dwelling units for 100,000 more Jews in the city and to make sure that Jerusalem can have a Jewish majority sufficient to assure that it will remain Israeli.

The blunt statement disturbed even many influential Israelis. They were particularly concerned over the ministry's plans to develop Nebi Samwil, the hilltop overlooking Jerusalem where

the Prophet Samuel is believed to have been laid to rest. The debate soon spilled over into the former Jordanian sector of the city, where Anwar Nusseibeh, a former official in King Hussein's government said, "I think that this architecture on this terrain, as a result of the new building projects, is gradually being swamped...it's being dwarfed...it's becoming more of a city, say like Manhattan. This is not what we want."

But Jerusalem's Israeli administration is convinced that the new housing and other urban development are dictated by pressing social, rather than political needs.

An aide to Kollek, Mrs. Tamar Eshel, cites these considerations in defending

the incredible pace at which new apartment houses, streets and roads are being completed.

She notes that a third of Jerusalem's newlyweds can't stay in the city because of the lack of suitable accommodations. She added that slum clearance is urgent and apartments must be readied for the "thousand of immigrants" coming to Jerusalem.

"Progress, development and time and each generation brings a change in the city," he says. "We don't have in mind to keep Jerusalem as a fossilized museum to be looked at. It is a living, viable city, which will develop. However, we are extremely careful to maintain the historic heritage, to conserve monuments, to keep its special character."

Mrs. Eshel went on to say that two of every three new apartments being built in Jerusalem are going up on the former Israeli side of the one-time armistice line. As for the 2,000 new flats in the pre-war Jordanian sector, she contended that these were all constructed on empty lots and that no Arab houses were demolished and thus no Arab was evicted to make room for them.

Mrs. Eshel pointed out that a start has been made in new housing for Jerusalem Arabs, with the first series of 30 apartments now available at \$25,000 per unit.

Her clinching argument had to do with the Jewish-owned land abandoned in the 1948 war with Jordan. She cites suburban Neve Yaakov as an example.

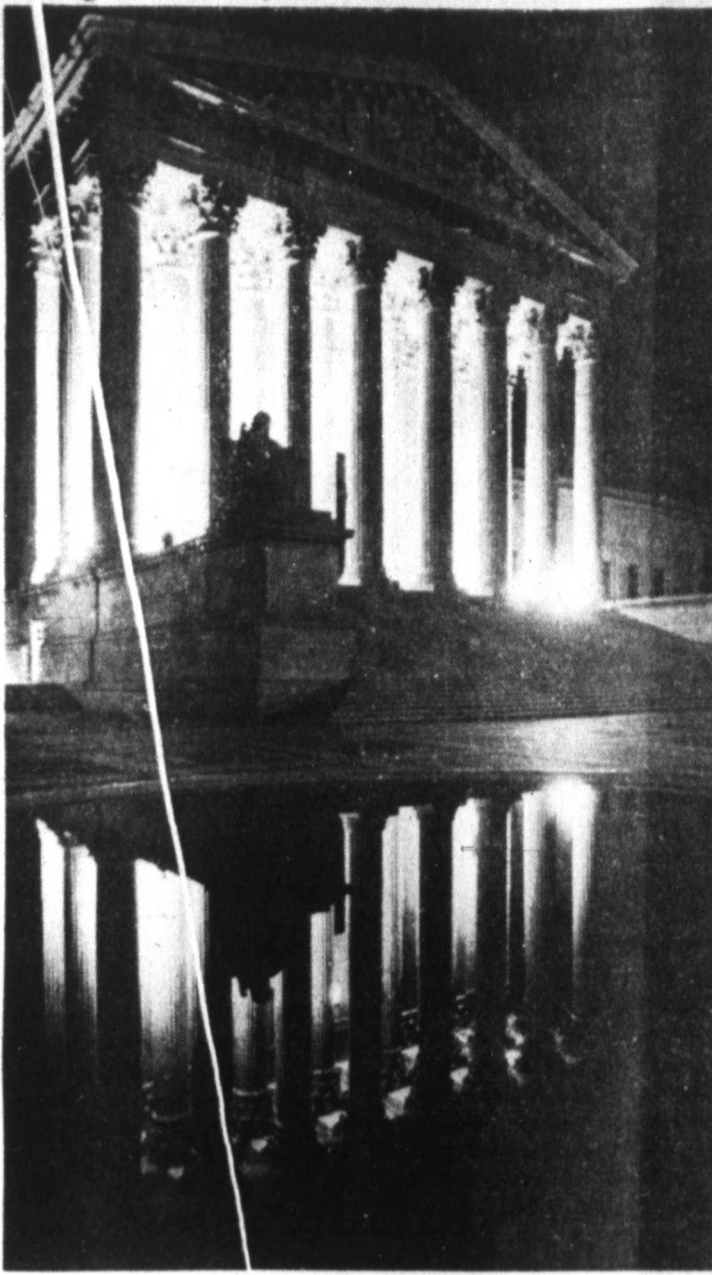
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SERENE CENTER of a political tempest over the filling of two vacant seats, the Supreme Court building is reflected in the waters of a fountain.

Bullock Says He Won't Quit Job

AUSTIN (AP) — The state's chief elections officer says there is dissension in the Texas Republican party and they are trying to blame it on the Democrats.
"I have no intention of resigning," said Secretary of State Bob Bullock in answer to a demand Monday from state GOP chairman George Willeford and the vice chairman, Mrs. Malcolm Milburn, that Bullock be removed because, they said, he is biased for Gov. Preston Smith, who appointed him.
"I think they are just upset because a couple of times I have caught their hands in the cookie jar, so to speak, and some of their rank and file members are not happy with them," Bullock said.
"I was the one who called their hand when they made that ridiculous offer of a \$5,000 reward for the defeat of certain democrats House Speaker Gus Mutscher and

Rep. W.S. Healy. That was patently illegal and they had to back down on it. Then I also called Willeford's hand when he tried to mislead the rank and file of the party into believing that the code of ethics bill was the sole product of Democrats in the last legislature. I pointed out that nine of the 10 Republicans in the House voted for it and the other one was absent."
Bullock said there has not been a secretary of state in the last 20 years that was not partisan in the sense that he was a supporter of someone but that does not mean his office is partisan.
Bullock, who as secretary of state is the chief elections officer of the state, said he would assure Texas Republicans "and anybody else or any candidate that they will receive the same treatment in my office as anybody else, no matter what party they belong to, besides my actions at all times are subject to the scrutiny of the court."

Nationwide Manhunt For Escapee Launched

MIDLAND, Tex. (AP) — A nationwide hunt was on Tuesday for an escaped prisoner whose upper arm bears the tattooed legend, "Born To Lose." But right now he is a winner.
At least it looked that way. He slipped out of the Midland County jail about 11 a.m. Sunday and his escape wasn't discovered for 30 hours.
Sheriff Ed Darnell said he doesn't have any idea of where the escapee, Clarence Eugene Francis, 30, may have headed.

He might still be considered an inmate had it not been for an unusual set of circumstances. The neighboring Ector County Sheriff's Department called Midland to ask if Francis was out on bond.
An Ector department spokesman said the department had picked up a man who said he had drunk a beer with Francis Sunday night.
Sheriff's personnel checked records and found Francis was supposed to be in jail and searched the jail to see if he was there. Francis was not.
About two hours after receiving the query from Ector County, an all-point bulletin was issued for a pickup on Francis, Darnell said.

Life Sentence For Area Man Assessed

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals said Tuesday in upholding an Amarillo murder conviction that photographs showing blood spots should not automatically be barred from consideration in court.
The appeals court affirmed the conviction and life sentence assessed Favis Clay Martin in the Feb. 21, 1970 slaying of his ex-wife, June.
The court said Mrs. Martin got custody of the couple's son in divorce proceedings and moved to Arizona. Martin later brought his son back and kidnaping charges were filed, the court said. Favis told his former wife to come get the boy in Texas.
When Mrs. Martin, a daughter by a previous marriage and a friend showed up at Martin's house, they went in the kitchen for coffee. Then, the court said, Favis pulled a pistol and Mrs. Martin ran out of the room. But he caught her, held her up against the wall and fired four shots at her. She collapsed in the driveway.

Darnell said he does not know how Francis escaped, but he is trying to find out. He said he believes the man left during or after church services in the jail Sunday morning. It is believed he left about 11 a.m. Darnell said.
Francis apparently slipped through a tank door which may have been unlocked for the church services or which Francis may have worked loose, the sheriff said.
"Darnell said, 'This door has been worked loose before.'
A steel door leading to a short hallway to the elevator often is not kept locked, the sheriff said. It is thought that Francis slipped down this hallway to the elevator, Darnell said.
No daily prisoner count is made at the jail, said the sheriff. "We don't have to do that," he said.
"We know how many prisoners we have up there. There were 20 men in one tank and 17 in the other. When a man leaves, we cross him off our list, but we don't count heads," Darnell said.

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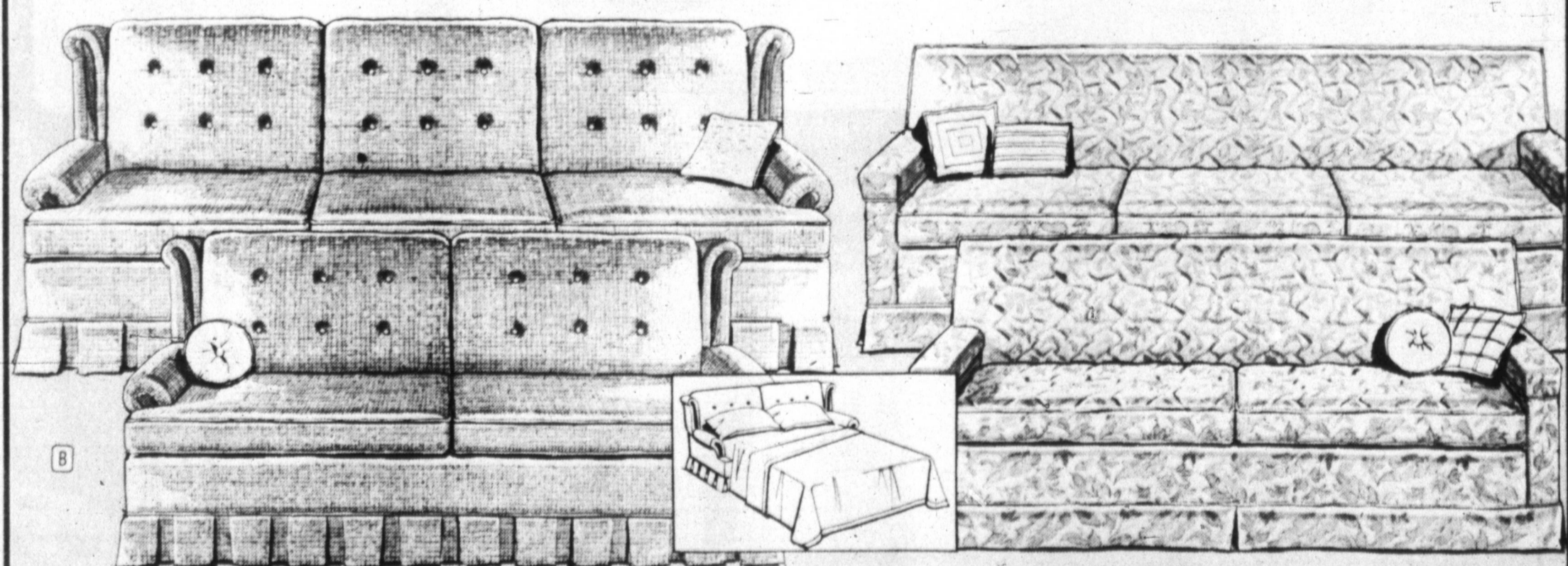
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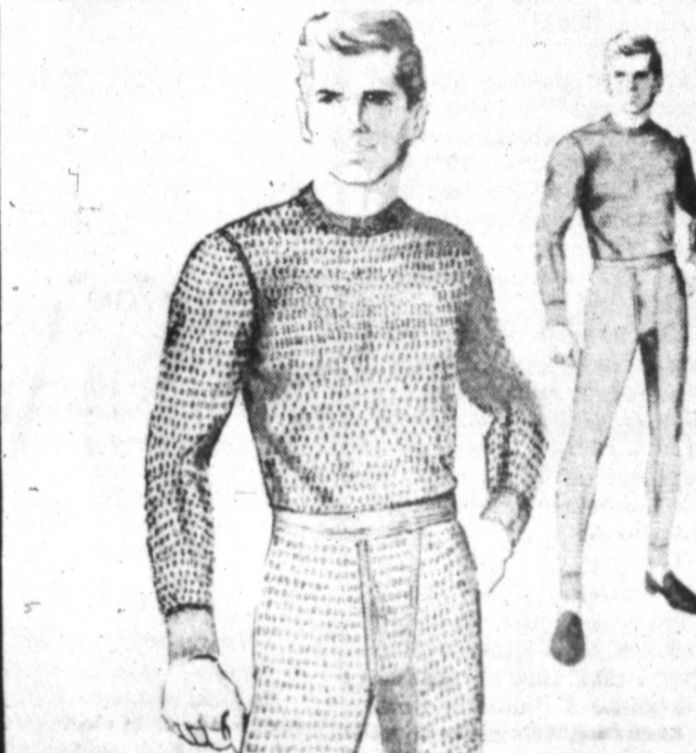
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New World Commerce Plan Asked

LONDON (AP) — Assailing artificial trade barriers, a special envoy of President Nixon said Tuesday night they were erected by the European Common Market and other economic groups for selfish ends. He called for cooperation in building a new world commerce system.

"The U.S. administration is determined to find a better deal for American farm trade," the envoy, William Eberle, said. "It is determined to find ways to rationalize the chaotic conditions of the world market which result from nationalistic decisions which are often economically senseless decisions."

Eberle is the President's special representative for trade negotiations. He spoke to the British Trade Policy Research Center on the eve of tariff talks in the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade—GATT—in Geneva.

"Unless something is done in agriculture, we simply cannot make further progress in improving our economic relations," Eberle declared. "In fact, unless something is done soon, our relations are likely to get worse."

He appealed to his audience of British bankers and businessmen to work for greater cooperation on a worldwide scale when Britain becomes a member of the European Common Market, now set for Jan. 1, 1973.

The special envoy also had harsh words for the four members of the European Free Trade Association—EFTA—who are not joining the Common Market with Britain. The four are Austria, Portugal, Sweden and Switzerland.

"In the eyes of American business people, these countries want to have their cake and eat it too," Eberle said. "They want the pleasures of free trade in industry but only with Europe. They do not want to pay the political costs of full membership."

They do not want to liberalize nontariff barriers or agricultural policies against the rest of the world as payment for solution of their industrial tariff problem." Eberle called for immediate negotiations on a world scale to draft a pact for "across-the-board elimination of substantially all industrial tariffs."

These talks should also serve to draft rules on nontariff barriers to trade, services and investment, agree on specific commitments to open world markets for agricultural goods and rationalize national farm policies, and grant tariff preferences to developing countries, he added.

Eberle also criticized the British system of granting trade preferences to countries within the Commonwealth. He said Washington has objected to the system since before World War II.

For years, he said, the American administration has been trying to convince its trading partners that the world system needed repair.

"The answer has been that Europe was busy, and Japan wasn't ready."

Eberle also referred to the international crisis unleashed with the President's new economic policy of Aug. 15.

The basic problems, he said, "had been building up for a considerable period before the 1971 breakdown of the trade and monetary system. Many of these problems will remain after the short-term actions have been normalized. The current economic crisis did not occur overnight. The forces which led to it have been building up for many years."

The trouble was that "the international trading system and the international monetary system have failed to adapt rapidly enough to changing circumstances," he asserted.

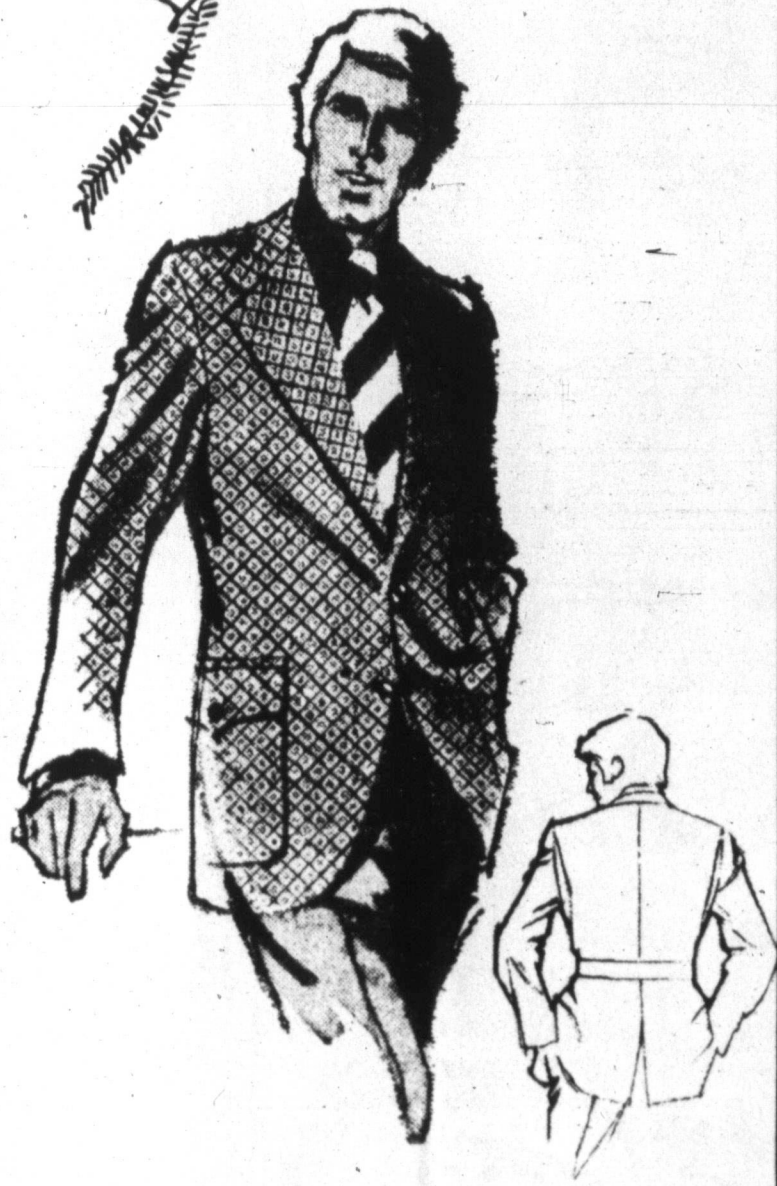
He added that America's partners had for years demanded action to end the continuing U.S. balance of payments deficit. But "when we finally acted, no one liked what we did."

For years, he said, America had been a good creditor when Europe was in debt.

"It is now time for Europe to act as a good creditor, because America is now a debtor," he continued. "America now needs Europe to take a role of responsibility for the global economic system commensurate with its currency strength."

U.S. Air Force Seeks Prior Service Vets

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Court Nominees To Face U.S. Senate Floor Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday unanimously approved the Supreme Court nomination of Lewis F. Powell Jr., and endorsed that of William H. Rehnquist by a vote of 12 to 4.

President Nixon's nominees for the two court seats that have been vacant since early September now will be brought up for confirmation in the Senate but not until the later part of next week at the earliest.

Republican leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania said he has "no doubt in the world" that both nominations will be confirmed although Rehnquist will be opposed from the floor.

Powell, 64, is a wealthy Richmond, Va. lawyer and former president of the American Bar Association. Rehnquist, 47, formerly a lawyer in Phoenix, Ariz., is a top aide to Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell.

Nixon, in announcing their nominations on Oct. 21, described them as judicial conservatives.

The four committee members who voted against Rehnquist's nomination were

Sens. Birch Bayh, D-Ind.; Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.; Philip A. Hart, D-Mich.; and John V. Tunney, D-Calif.

However, a fifth member of the committee's liberal Democratic bloc, Sen. Quentin Burdick of North Dakota, voted with the majority.

Bayh said in a statement that Rehnquist's record "reveals a dangerous hostility to the great principles of equal justice for all people and individual freedom under the Bill of Rights."

Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., the committee chairman, said "the liberals have tried to build a case against Mr. Rehnquist, but they have failed utterly."

Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, called on "all senators who believe in human rights" to vote against Rehnquist.

At the committee's hearings, Mitchell testified against Rehnquist's confirmation on behalf of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights. A witness for the AFL-CIO also opposed him.

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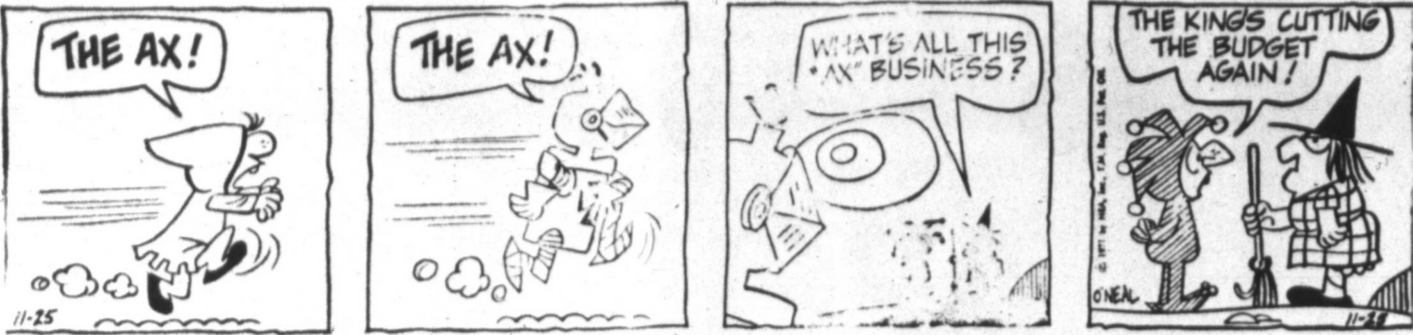

5 High-Ranking Army Officers Facing Demotions, Reprimands

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon confirmed Tuesday demotions or reprimands are planned for five high-ranking Army officers as a result of the bloody North Vietnamese attack on U.S. Fire Base Mary Ann last March. Thirty-three Americans were killed and 76 wounded in the surprise assault.

Spokesman Jerry W. Friedheim acknowledged only that "letters of intent to take administrative action" were sent to five individuals Nov. 8.

Although Friedheim refused to identify them or discuss details, sources said the five include Maj. Gen. James L. Baldwin, former commander of the Americal Division.

It was learned that Secretary of the Army Robert F. Froehke has decided to reprimand Baldwin in a procedure which usually forecloses any further promotions.

The others, including two colonels, a lieutenant colonel and a major, face either reprimand, demotion or both. All five were given 60 days to present evidence that could

change the secretary's mind regarding the punishment, which does not require trial by courtmartial.

The sources said a lengthy investigation of the March 28 enemy sapper attack holds Baldwin, as division commander, responsible for "failure to insure that adequate defense measures were taken" around the hilltop outpost. Similar complaints are lodged against the other four, one of whom also is accused of dereliction, the sources said.

In the night attack on Fire Base Mary Ann, a battalion headquarters of the American's 196th Infantry Brigade 25 miles west of Chu Lai, enemy sappers crawled through the barbed wire and grenaded bunkers manned by 400 GIs.

The North Vietnamese suffered few losses, but left 109 Americans killed or wounded—the heaviest toll at a U.S. fire base during the Vietnam war.

After the attack some officers and enlisted men claimed the base's defenses were lax and the troops were

not prepared for an enemy assault.

Froehke's action is based on the recommendation of Gen. William C. Westmoreland, Army chief of staff, following investigations. The sources said Westmoreland recommended that Baldwin be reprimanded and demoted to brigadier general. But Froehke, the sources said, overruled Westmoreland and decided that a reprimand would be sufficient.

Baldwin, 50, a native of Omaha, Neb., was destined for further promotion until he was relieved of command of the Americal Division last and reassigned to a Pentagon desk job to await the outcome of the investigation.

The other officers facing punishment are Col. Alphas R. Clark of Ft. Jackson, S.C.; former Americal chief of staff; Col. William Hathaway of Portsmouth, Va., former 196th Infantry Brigade commander; Lt. Col. William P. Doyle of Pittsburgh, former battalion commander with the 196th; and Doyle's operations officer at the time of the attack, Maj. Stanley J.

Wisniewski of Sugar Notch, Pa.

Earlier this year similar administrative punishment was carried out against another former Americal commander, Maj. Gen. Samuel W. Koster and his former assistant, Brig. Gen. George H. Young Jr. Both were accused of failing to properly investigate the 1968 My Lai massacre.

Russ Said In Favor Of 'Big Bang' Approach

LONDON (AP) — The Soviet Union now believes in launching an instant and massive strike with nuclear or chemical weapons in any European war, according to a British military analyst.

He says the Soviets have abandoned the policy of gradual escalation in favor of a quick "big bang" approach.

John Erickson, professor of higher defense studies at Edinburg University, gave this assessment in a report published by the Royal United Services Institute.

Erickson is considered an expert on Soviet affairs. He has made many trips to the

Soviet Union and is said to be personally acquainted with some of Russia's top generals and strategists.

The new Soviet military doctrine, he said in his report "Soviet Military Power," is clearly shown in the Red Army's massive war games held in Central Europe.

The 1967 games, he said, were based almost entirely on conventional weapons but the 1970 exercises were based on a mixture of conventional and nuclear weapons.

"Cardinal importance," he wrote, "is attached to the initial strike" and surprise is considered all important.

The Soviets now are capable of advancing by as much as 70 miles a day. They have a highly developed airlift capacity.

During the 1970 war games, 8,000 parachute troops and 160 vehicles were dropped in a space of 22 minutes.

Erickson said Moscow has 630 medium range ballistic missiles targeted on Western Europe. These missiles can be armed with either nuclear or nerve gas warheads.

"Soviet commentary on the 'nuclear battlefield,' Erickson says, "lays great stress on the depth and destructiveness of the initial mass nuclear strike."

He adds: "The crucial nature of this first strike, which is vital to the subsequent evolution of the battle" would certainly impel the Soviet command to commit an appreciable proportion of their available warheads—probably as much as 40 per cent (assuming also that this in the context of a "major" land battle in Europe projected for some 10 days).

The Russians, he says, are far more rigorous in their training than western forces, especially in training their troops for nuclear combat.

"Exercises conducted over 'radio-active terrain' are made rather more grimly realistic by the use of real isotopes," he said.



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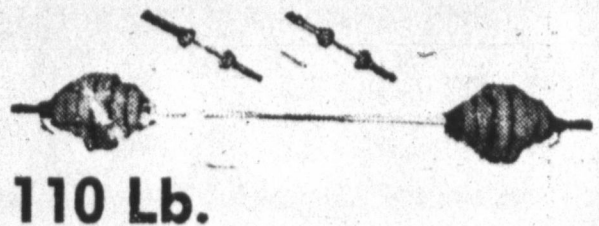


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
