



GOP Governors Gather For Talks

- Republican governors convened today to talk about government and politics in hopes of enlarging their role-and their depleted ranks-in the 1972 election campaign.

Seventeen of the 21 GOP state governors were on hand for the two-day conference at this sprawling resort, with Vice President Spiro T. Agnew in the featured opening-day role. Agnew addresses the governors late today. Sen. Robert J. Dole of Kan-

sas. Republican national chairman, was to have appeared too. But his speech was postponed because of scheduled Senate action on an amendment seeking public financing of the 1972 presidential campaign.

Gov. William G. Milliken of Michigan, vice chairman of the GOP Governors' Association, disclosed that he already had sent to Dole the outline of what he termed "an

FRENCHLICK, Ind. (AP) active and dynamic" campaign by the governors

next year Milliken is due to be elected conference chairman Friday. Gov. Linwood Holton of Virginia was reported the likely choice to succeed him as vice chairman. That would put Holton in line to become chairman for 1973.

Milliken said the governors agreed that aggressive statehouse campaigns in 1972 could be helpful to President Nixon as well as to the cause of electing more GOP governors. Republicans have seen their

gubernatorial holdings decline from a peak of 32 states after the 1968 elections. Nineteen states will elect

governors next year; 11 of them now governed by Democrats. Major topics due for dis-

cussion at conference business sessions today and Friday were welfare reform and Nixon's current economic programs.

Health Mobard To Name Sites For Set-ups

AUSTIN (AP) - The State Board of Mental Health is expected Saturday to name sites for new institutions in El Paso and the Dallas-Fort Worth

Board members have visited several Dallas-Fort Worth area towns as possible sites for a state school for the mentally retarded.

Communities offering sites included Fort Worth, Ennis, Hillsboro. Cleburne. Waxahachie, and Mineral

The El Paso facility will offer care and treatment for the mentally ill and mentally retarded. Programs underway at three institutions will be incorporated into the. El Paso facility, said state mental health Commissioner David Wade

He described it as a "land mar installation" and said it would be modeled after the Amarillo and Beaumont centers for human development and the Rio Grande State Center for Mental Health.

At Amarillo and Beaumont, pupils are at the center only from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. They remain at home at night and on the weekends

The 1971 legislature appropriated \$100,000 to start the El Paso unit and \$50,000 to design the proposed new school in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Plans call for the school to care for up to 1,000 pupils.

The Denton school, which serves that area, is operating maximum size, forcing applicants to wait for a place. mental health officials said.

Hands And Feet Bound 75, who died Wednesday Highland General Hospital. Girl Of Galveston Dead

TEXAS CITY, Tex. (AP) -The partially-nude body of a 15year-old Galveston girl her hands and feet tied with fishing twine - was found floating Wednesday in Turner's Bayou near here. Investigators said she had

been shot in the neck and head.

She was the second such victim since last July Police said they are intensifying their search for a

companion who disappeared with her Monday night. The body, nude from the waist down, was tentatively identified as Maria Johnson, a pupil at Ball High School in Galveston

Her missing companion is Debbie Ackerman, also 15, of Galveston

Police said Miss Johnson's body was badly deteriorated but identification was made through her blouse, an old photograph and her general description.

Last July, Brenda Jones, 14, was found floating in Galveston Bay near Pelican Island. She was nude. She had been shot and her hands and feet bound. A slip was stuffed in her mouth.

Art Therapy Used In Pioneer Project

AMARILLO -Art as a therapeutic tool, rather than for art's sake, is being used in a pioneering project at the Northwest Texas Hospital

Psychiatric Pavilion Students and faculty of the West Texas State University art department are "lending their hands' in the once-a-week art therapy program involving a pilot group of 15 adolescent and young adult patients at the

Dr. Temple Elliott, clinical psychologist and director of the adolescent and young adult program at the Pavilion, says the project is in no way diagnostic of the patient's ills. but is being implemented for its therapeutic value only.

"Although in some circles uninhibited artistic expression is considered beneficial to the patient, we feel we can better understand the results of art therapy by drawing upon the expertise of the WTSU art students and faculty to provided patients with a basic structure for expression to provide more positive ends," says Larry DeFever.

DeFever, director of special therapy at the Pavilion adds. The therapy is not retrospective but concerned with what is going on right

Although the Pavilion has offered a varied program in occupational therapy for some time, the art therapy is a "first" here, he says.

So far the project has been an "unqualified success," DeFever adds.

While some patients might be concerned with the actual doing, caring little for the outcome of the final product. others might be more directed to achieving a good end product and the feeling of pride and accomplishment that goes with it.

Still others are primarily concerned with the support and encouragement they get from the students and faculty of the art department, Mrs. Seals says.

Dr. Emilio Cabellero, head of the WTSU art department. sees the project not only of great value for the patients but for participating students as well.

"Here is a chance for art students to implement their knowledge in an experience that is eminently relevant to this day and time," he says. "This experience gives

students a greater insight into the value of art for human beings and helps them see that art is a natural function of life conducive to the creative health of the individual," Dr Caballero adds

Judge Dee C. Blythe, Clovis, was presented the Judicial Merit Award by the New Mexico Bar Association at the recent annual meeting at Albuquerque. This is considered a signal honor since there are 28 district jurists in the state, many with much seniority

Judge Blythe was selected for the award on the basis of his general background, his courtroom procedures and the business-like administration of the office. It was noted that he had the heaviest civil case load of any one-judge district, that he had all the administrative duties of many multi-judge bailiwicks...that he had fewer active civil cases pending over a 24-month period and his case appeals and reversals were half the statewide average.

The nomination of Judge Blythe read: "We do sincerely and seriously suggest that if there were more judges of the caliber and industry of Judge Blythe that many criticisms of the administration of justice could be eliminated." 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battlefield deaths in Vietnam over the past five week have dropped to the lowest level in six years, and now are far outpaced by the number of GIs dying from accidents and disease

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Combat deaths have averaged only six a week since Oct. 9 compared to an average of 21 a week from what the Pentagon classifies as nonhostile causes. The biggest killer is aircraft accidents.

The collision of two U.S. helicopters Monday and the crash of another Sunday after mechanical failure, killed four GIs and wounded five others.

Last week's casualty toll. announced Thursday in Saigon, showed eight Americans killed in action. Nonhostile deaths numbered

Although they exceed battlefield casualties. nonhostile deaths this year also have dropped to the lowest level in six years. The rate, which increased each year as the number of U.S. troops in Vietnam increased, has dropped each year as more and more troops were

This year, nonhostile deaths averaged 19 a week. compared to 35 in 1970 and a Vietnam war peak of 40 in 1969. In 1969 there were 543,400 Americans in the war zone: 188,000 remain today

A Pentagon official said a certain number of nonhostile deaths is inevitable

"There's not much you can do with aviation accidents," the official said. "The safety maintenance program is as effective as possible and every unit stresses safety.'

Since the war began, 45,594 Americans have been killed in action. Another 9,912 have died from nonhostile causes. So far, the toll this year is 1,345 in combat and 845 from other

The Pentagon lists nonhostile deaths under 17 different categories.

Following aircraft accidents, which have claimed 2.789 lives, the next biggest killer has been miscellaneous accidents such as electrocution or falling down a flight of steps. These accounted for 2.149 fatalities. Pentagon figures show 945

Mayor Yorty To Run For Demo Nomination

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Mayor Sam Yorty has become the second declared candidate for the Democratic Presidential nomination. saying his campaign will appeal to party members dissatisfied with "left-wing Democratic leaders" as well as President Nixon.

In joining the race with Sen. George S. McGovern of South Dakota, Yorty said he would enter the New Hampshire primary next year.

"We have no intention of trying to raise huge sums of money necessary to enter all of the primaries," he told a news conference Tuesday. The California primary will climax our campaign. Other states may be added as the ampaign progresses.

The 62-year-old three-term Washington, D.C.

mayor said his political soundings in New Hampshire have encouraged him.

Yorty's backers say the mayor will be appealing to the moderate-to-conservative side of the Democratic spectrum. Yorty is a longtime hawk on Vietnam and in that respect stands close to only one other declared or potential candidate, Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington.

Jackson was in Los Angeles Tuesday and he said Yorty's entrance "wouldn't affect me any more than (Alabama Gov. George) Wallace going in some place ... I'll fight it on my own." Jackson wouldn't say whether he'll run, but he said he'll hold a political news conference Friday in

Toying With Statistics

Seven hundred thousand accidents a year caused by

toys! True of false?

You read figures like that in the news. In June, 1970, the-National Commission on product Safety in fact issued a report containing that figure. That study is titled "Product and Injury Indentification.

After it was published, an industrial group known as Toy Manufacturers Association of America (TMA) made an extensive study of the study. TMA learned that the '700,000' statistic was derived from information supplied by the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare (HEW). According to this information, the department estimated annual injuries from accidents involving consumer products at 20 million for the year 1968. Of these, toys were listed at 700.000

However, when TMA movined where HEW got its figures, the department mitted that the statistics were not based on actual nationwide counts. Instead. they were calculated with an unknown degree of error. In fact, the safety commission's own statement included this precaution: "It should be clearly understood that these estimates are not based on actual counts or surveys of the whole United States Thus these estimates have an unknown error attached Thus, we cannot say how right or wrong we may be. As noted above the estimates presented have much to be

Indeed as TMA proceeded n its investigation, it learned that no information was available as to the real cause of any injury leading to the estimates (In this point the safety commission stated 'The statistical estimates given are those injuries associated with consumer products and are not necessarily caused by the consumer product. In many injuries there may be a combination of circumstances which results in the injury. thus, no one factor can be called the cause. The present state of the art and available studies limits our knowledge about the precise involvement of a consumer product. In sports, for example, a consumer product is used. The actual injury may not be associated with the product. however

In contrast to the HEW percentage, it happened that the Food and Drug Administration had compiled records of actual injuries from 130 hospitals across the country. A study of 216,286 cases showed that toys were involved in less than one per cent. Using that specific data. TMA looked at three children who were treated for accidents connected in some way with stuffed animals. One was listed as having been injured in a fall, one as having his skin cut or pierced, and one as having been hit. PRAYER IN SCHOOLS

At times our government seems insensitive to the wishes of the people. Yet concerted citizen action can still bring constructive

results. For eight years the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee had refused to allow the Constitutional amendment permitting voluntary prayer in public schools to reach the floor of the House for a vote. With his opposition unshakable, the amendment could be dislodged from the committee only if a majority of House members signed a discharge petition, a

maneuver rarely successful. But many citizens believed that our government should not be "neutral" toward religion because they knew that neutrality would ultimately become hostility. They believed that children and teachers should be able, in their schools, to publicly

profess a belief in God. People all over the country wrote thousands of letters to Congressmen in support of the Amendment, A Prayer Campaign Committee, headed by Mrs. Ben Ruhlin of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, was formed. The Committee placed ads in many newspapers. Clergymen of all denominations supported the.

When the discharge petition finally received the required 218 signatures, this was a victory for "grass roots" effort. It showed that Congressmen will still heed the wishes of the people when enough are willing to make the effort to communicate their views.

The battle for voluntary school prayer is far from won, however. The amendment must still be approved by the full House, by the Senate, and by the states. Everyone who believes that our nation should do homage to God in its public life should continue the campaign for the adoption of the school prayer amendment.

be instructive in terms of what the nation needs to learn about itself and its misplaced values in dealing with crime and criminals.

The Good Neighbor

During the past ten years, approximately 650 law enforcement officers in this country have been killed in line of duty. During the same period, capital punishment has been virtually abolished. Every month, with exception reports are issued confirming what the public already knows that crime of all types, and particularly violent crime, is increasing alarmingly

Law enforcement officers are asked by society to provide protection, but the courts tie the hands of the police, making their job almost impossible and depressingly dangerous as well. Fanatics and militants roam the streets, often assaulting and even murdering police officers simply for the sport of it. In the past three years, 30 policemen have been murdered from ambush: 19 of these officers were killed last

year alone. It is a fair question to ask Who mourns the deaths of our police officers? The recent. prison rebellion at Attica, New York, resulted in the deaths of nine prison guards but already these nine are nearly forgotten men. The nation's leftwing news media and politicians mourn only the criminals who precipitated the riot. There is, indeed, a calculated campaign underway to discredit the constituted authority, and to build sympathy and demand leniency for the criminals on the perverse grounds that "society is to blame.

America is becoming a crime-oriented society because it is allowing itself to become an undisciplined society. Somewhere along the line, it became fashionable to argue that it is inhumane to punish criminals for their misdeeds. Capital punishment has been virtually abolished because politicians, including the ones on the bench, embraced the theory that capital punishment does not "deter" murderers and rapists. Yet, the most casual examination of crime statistics discloses that horrible crimes are on a constant upswing.

Maybe the death of William Thomas Land will serve to bring home to us the real thrust of criminality engulfing our land. What price, we may ask ourselves, should a criminal pay for killing another human being in cold blood? What disciplines should society impose to make certain that others; who may be contemplating a life of crime, realize that the price of criminal behavior is high?

As for police officers. society needs to understand that when our protectors are attacked, we are all attacked.

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb - I am 41 years old. My periods have stopped and my doctor told me have a fibroid tumor and must have a hysterectomy. Is there danger if I wait a few more months? Are all fibroid tumors malignant? People say all tumors are malignant I have had a pap test but it did not show anything. If I have a hysterectomy, does that mean my sex life must stop?

Dear Reader - First let's settle what a fibroid turnor is. This tumor is a mass made up of fibrouslike tissue that occurs in the uterus or womb. They can be small not causing any problem or very large The big ones, particularly, cause pressure on the bladder and cause frequency of urination. A fibroid tumor can also cause excess bleeding from the womb

Most true fibroid tumors are not cancer. The symptoms like the bleeding they may cause is the usual reason for their removal. Rarely, a tumor that a skilled gynecologist (specialist in women's diseases) thinks is a simple fibroid turns out to be something else. It certainly is not true that all tumors are malignant.

Small fibroids not causing problems may often be ignored. There are differences in opinion among doctors as to whether some fibroids should be removed and if the uterus must be taken out, a hysterectomy. Obviously, the more of these problems a doctor has seen the more likely he is to be correct in determining if a hysterectomy is necessary or not. It is a good idea to have an opinion from your regular family doctor and a gynecologist. If you live in a small community you may need to go to a larger city to get an opinion from a gynecologist. Most major clinics, hospitals or medical schools will have one.

Removing the uterus does not end a woman's sex life. A lot of a person's sex drive is related to mental attitudes. The main function of the uterus is to act as a baby carriage for the fetus. The ovaries are the chief source of female hormones and may or may not need to be removed. Replacement hornome therapy is possible if needed. All of the rest of female anatomy remains intact after a hysterectomy and fully functional.

A lot of women seem to think that a hysterectomy will stop their sex life but, in truth, for the woman who fears pregnancy, it removes her anxiety and may improve it. The uterus is not even the location of any nerve sensory fibers that contributes in any way to sexual stimulation or sexual response. It is not part of the vaginal vault and has nothing to do with a climax.



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

Business Mirror

NEW YORK (AP) - Since looking into 1972 is like trying to view Mars through a duststorm, the economists who regularly issue forecasts in November might spread more knowledge with a review

It would include these momentous events, the consequences of which while still not fully understood, certainly will never permit a full return to the old order:

-The rejection of traditional methods of restraining inflation and the acceptance of a controlled economy, not solely by those of socialistic bent but by conservative members of the business, political and intellectual communities.

-The sudden disposal, without a mutually acceptable alternative, of the international monetary system based on gold and the dollar as the basis for fixing relative rates. -A continuing attack on the

men, manners and methods of the once-hallowed securities exchanges, and the growing feeling that the traditional, monopolistic market place for securities, along with its fixed commissions, is anachronistic.

-The apparent alienation of a large part of the investing public, perhaps ending an era in which the number of investors grew fivefold in less

-The continued strength of

the consumer movement, not only in extreme and obvious ways, but in the growing sophistication with which individuals withhold or spend their discretionary income rather than submit to seller's pressures.

-The growing recognition that ecology is not just something to talk about but something to act upon, illustrated by the growing documentation of abuses and the increasing severity of federal regulations.

These are events of such magnitude that it is unlikely they will be duplicated in the coming year. It is enough, in fact, to hope that what has already happened can be digested before swallowing

Was anyone for example not surprised at the news of August 15, when a president who time after time had proclaimed his abhorence of federal intervention turned around and did that very thing? And it is unlikely that even

the best informed foreign monetary authorities were prepared for the sudden U.S. announcement of a sweeping, unilateral plan to correct imbalances in trade.

These were only beginnings of what are bound to result in important domestic and international economic shocks over the coming few years, but being a seismologist of the present is difficult enough without trying to measure the future too.

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

Pensioners Relieved Of

Records Nearly one million checks mailed November 1 by the Veterans Administration carried a welcome reminder to the recipients that they

Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, explained that PL 91-588, enacted last December, allows the VA Administrator to exempt from filing annual income questionnaires (IQ) those pensioners 72 years old and

The pensioners include veterans, widows, and parents receiving dependency and indemnity compensation

VA usually mails the IQ's to pensioners with their November 1st checks, officials said, but this year about half of the pensioners received

However, it was stressed that even though they wont have to file IQ's, these 72 year old pensioners still must continue to report changes in

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
