Three-Judge Panel Throws Texas School Financing Into Turmoil SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - a three-judge

federal panel shook the sugar plums out of the Christmas tree for taxpayers in Texas, and perhaps the nation, Friday when it ruled in favor of parents seeking removal of public schools from dependence on property taxes.

The unanimous ruling said Texas' school financing system, based largely on property taxes, violates the federal and state Constitutions.

The Texas suit was filed July 30, 1968, by 15 Mexican-American parents and children in San Antonio's Edgewood Independent School

Roughly, Texas school districts-separate taxing entities-levy taxes on property in the district to finance education in the area. The state comes in on a per pupil basis with funds based on tax collections the district has made. Thus, poor districts, where property evaluations are low, get less money than the more affluent districts.

Most educators and government officials estimated that the ruling eventually would raise taxes for support of schools. But in Dallas, Dr. Nolan Estes, superintendent of schools, said the decision probably would bring a reduction in tax levies for his big school district.

The judges agreed that the method was unfair to pupils in low income areas. "The state may adopt any financial scheme desired," the panel ruled. "so long as the variations in wealth among the governmentally chosen districts do not affect the spending for the education of any child."

The federal panel gave Texas two years to restructure its school financing system and said if the state solons failed to act, the court "will take such further steps as may be necessary to implement both the purpose and the spirit of this

The reaction was immediate and widespread

Sarah Carey in Washington, assistant director of the Lawyers Committee of Civil Rights Under Law, said the ruling would pave way for a quick decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to set school financing standards throughout the country. Her committee has coordinated similar suits throughout the country.

The judges dismissed a Texas contention that the court should be bound by an earlier U.S. Supreme Court ruling that allowed a similar school financing system in Illinois.

But the panel said that in Illinois the plaintiffs asked court approval of a specific method of doing away with the inequity while in Texas the suit did not seek such a requirement.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Pat Bailey argued that the plaintiffs sought "socialized education," but the court dismissed the plea as "indicative of the character of the defendants' other arguments." Defendants were the Texas Board of Education and Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar of

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes of Texas, a candidate for governor, was quick to say that he was concerned that loss of local financing would mean loss of local control over education.

But around the country, most educators apparently welcomed the ruling.

Wilson Riles, California superintendent of schools, said, "The courts are giving the legislators a prod to do what they should have done

Dr. John Letson, superintendent in Atlanta, Ga., told newsmen: "This comes as no surprise to me. I find no disagreement in the finding that some other means of raising money should be found. Property taxes are no longer an equitable way to get the money."

Dr. Thomas Curtin, Massachusetts' deputy commissioner of education, observed, "In Massachusetts, it is a fact of life that we depend

on the property tax to finance public education, and we obviously have inequities resulting from

The federal court ruling in Texas on Friday followed a similar ruling, basically the same, by the California State Supreme Court.

Sen. Oscar Mauzy, Dallas Democrat usually labeled as liberal, said he was sure the U.S. Supreme Court would uphold the three-judge federal panel

A top state official in Texas asked that his name not be used said the ruling virtually guaranteed that the Texas Legislature would enact a personal and corporate income tax law.

A member of the state school board, Herbert O. Willborn of Amarillo, was concerned that the ruling "could lead ultimately to nationalization of all public scools."

Some other school officials unhappy with the decision, said the ruling meant "sameness" for school districts and "the same level of medicrity" for all the schools.

Seoul Hotel Fire Kills 75 Persons

SEOUL, (AP) - At least 75 persons are dead and dozens unaccounted for after a 12hour Christmas Day fire gutted a plush 22-story tourist hotel on one of Seoul's busiest streets

Rescue workers continued to search through smoldering debris in the Taeyonkak Hotel. where 203 guests were believed to have spent Christmas Eve.

Among the hotel guests were nine Americans whose fate is not known.

In addition to the hotel guests, there may have been 300 more people inside the hotel when it caught fire shortly after 10 a.m. Saturday, including 235 hotel employes and employes of 28 business firms which maintained offices in the building.

Police said 102 persons were being treated at five hospitals. but there was no way of knowing how many escaped the fire unhurt

Among the hospitalized was Minister Sydney Sien-yung Yu of the Nationalist Chinese Embassy here, who was rescued nearly two hours after he was trapped by blames and smoke in his 11th-floor room.

He was reported in serious condition but out of danger.

At least 25 bodies were found by rescue workers who had gone as high as the 10th floor before midnight. Lee Kwangtaik, Korean consulgeneral in Los Angeles, was listed among the dead.

Police investigators tentatively decided that the fire started from an explosion of a propane gas burner in the hotel's second-floor coffee The flames quickly spread

to the third and fourth floors, crippling the elevators and putting stairways out of use. according to witnesses. Thirty-one persons died

For Pampa school officials only the timing of the 3-judge U.S. District court decision on The Texas system of public school financing and property taxes was unexpected. A contest in this area was considered a foregone conclusion since a recent California decision opened Pandora's box

The federal court sitting in San Antonio, found the Texas system of financing schools violates both the federal and state constitutions.

"There is just no way to anticipate the effect locally." Pampa School Board President Warren Hasse said Saturday afternoon. "We can only wait for evaluation of the legal scope of the decision by the various agencies in Texas problem.

'My first thinking on the matter," Hasse added, "Is tolook at those states already under similar court decisions and see what they have done

and how they have fared." This brings a state income tax into focus but not into open discussion as yet. Jack L. Hart, Midland, secretary of a five - member committee named during the last session of the legislation to study property tax assessing and collection. Pointed out that property tax itself "- has not been found unconstitutional. It's the way that it's administered with regard to school taxes."

Hart, a Midland attorney, said late Friday that his committee had deliberately avoided making any recommendations on equalizing property taxation for school purposes until the courts acted on Texas'

He said that even now the committee will take no action without legislative direction, but stands ready to help if nec-

"This committee is charged with reforming and revising the property tax at all levels, not just schools," Hart said. He added, however, that

"this committee is prepared to do whatever necessary if the state wants to continue to use the property tax (for school funding) to do the research, to draft the necessary legislation to rehabilitate (the property tax) sufficiently to pass mus-

Hart said there is almost no way to avoid trying to make the property tax a constitutional means of raising school funds, "because the property tax right now for school districts raises over \$600 million a year. It's a big chunk of money that's got to come from some place.

A bill in the last legislature, which passed the Senate but died in the House, would have raised the state's minimum foundation payment from its present 80 per cent to 100 per

But, Hart noted, the court decision in San Antonio refers to all educational expenditures, and the minimum foundation program provides only part of Texas'

South Ahead Of North In School Integration

In the wake of this reversal of the historic pattern, Northern and Western communities are becoming the targets of a growing pattern of court actions and enforcement proceedings that were formerly directed almost solely at the 16

Southern and border states. This has brought strife and tension to some cities outside the South, much of it focused on the one activity that most alarms parents: busing.

Anxiety over busing is behind a major effort by its foes to win congressional approval for a Constitutional amendment that would ban busing to achieve integration—an issue many belive will be a major one in the coming national election campaign.

What is the school integration picture right now? Figures from the Department of Health, Eduction and Welfare show unmistakable patterns.

Federal Hike In School Aid Is Considered

WASHINGTON (AP) - A major increase in federal school aid and new taxes to finance it are under active consideration by the administration, says Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Elliot L. Richardson. Several difficult questions,

such as how to raise the revenue and how to help parochial schools, remain to be resolved before a final decision is made whether to go ahead, Richardson says. However, he does not rule

out the possibility President Nixon might make a general commitment to the idea of increased school aid and higher taxes in his state of the Union address Jan. 20, leaving the details to be announced later. Whether Nixon proposes it

or not, the issue is certain to be raised next year in Congress. Several Democrats have introduced bills calling for a substantial increase in federal aid to elementary and secondary education and hope to get a bill before the House by March.

Richardson was one of four members of Nixon's Cabinet who outlined the administration's 1972 plans

black schools increase Yet, according to HEW figures, blacks in all-black schools increased in districts in New York City, Detroit, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Boston, Newark, Kansas City and Buffalo, N.Y.

Busing has gone quietly in some Northern communities this year such as Sought Holland, Ill., and Oxnard and Riverside in California, to name a few. But elsewhere there has been uproar. However, white parents op-

posed to busing are discovering that the 17 years since the high court ordered an end to separate schools for whites and blacks have seen the development of all but invincible legal battering rams. And these weapons are now being turned on segregation in the North.

So the parents are turning their efforts in another direction-to Congress-and are pressuring their congressmen to approve a Constitutional amendment to ban busing.

"There is no doubt that the idea of school integration has exploded like a bomb in the North this year," said J. Stanley Pottinger who heads an enforcement agency of HEW, the Office of Civil Rights. "The pity is that the North had 10 years of opportunity for gradual change. That change did not come gradually; now comes the reality.

"And the whole syndromepanic, resistance, anger, delay-is moving North," Pottinger said.

The President said he had instructed officials to hold busing to the minimum required by law.



Lovett Memorial Library in Pampa is among eight public libraries in the 25-county area surrounding Amarillo that have qualified for membership in the library system to be organized early in 1972 under the 1969 Texas Library Systems Act administered by the Texas State library. A grant of about \$2.200 will be made to the Amarillo - headquartered system.

The libraries are among 168 in the state that met criteria for membership, Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. announced. Ten systems will be organized.

Amarillo Public Library will serve as the Major Resource Center and under the state legislation will have specified coordinating responsibilities for implementing the act.



U Thant Leaves U.N. Post After Serving Ten Years

Associated Press Writer UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. AP) - Rarely has a high international figure wound up his career on such a wave of popularity as U Thant has enjoyed during his final months as secretary-general of the United Nations:

The Burmese teacherjournalist is returning to private life this week after 10 years in the job Trygve Lie once called the most mpossible in the world.

As he steps down at 62, U.N. diplomats have nothing but good to say of him. He has the confidence and esteem of small and large countries alike without regard to ideology.

He occasionally has angered member countries by blunt pronouncement, and was briefly at odds with the Soviet Union and the United States. Lyndon B. Johnson depicted Thant as meddling in the Vietnam war, and spoke out strongly against him for withdrawing the U.N. Emergency Force from Egypt in 1967

Thant managed, however. to serve longer than either of

his predecessors. Lie and Dag his mind on questions of war Hammarskjold. He came and peace. under extreme pressure to stay on for a third five-year

temporary extension. Hammarskjold had unusually high prestige and many considered him irreplaceable, but neither he nor Lie was able to maintain the support of all the big powers for most of their terms

'term, or at least for a

as Thant has done Lie and Hammarskjold ran into trouble with the Soviet Union. Lie finally resigned in 1953. Hammarskjold died in an African plane crash in 1961 while the Russians were trying to replace him with a three-man committee-the socalled troika plan.

Thant was little known outside U.N. circles when he was chosen acting secretary. general Nov. 3, 1961. There was widespread doubt that he or anybody else could survive the Soviet attack on the office.

But the troika idea was soon forgotten and Thant stayed on to become a world personality. He reluctantly took a second term in 1966. after laying down a condition that he be permitted to speak

Thant's refusal to accept a third term was based mainly on his conviction that no individual was indispensible and that he had served long enough. He also was physically exhausted. His recent ulcer attack came after he had made his decision, but it served to convince the final doubters that he would not accept re-election.

What does he have that his predecessors lacked?

Diplomats who have observed him over the years say it is a combination of a disarming personality and underrated diplomatic skills.

Thant had stepped on many toes but his sincerity was generally accepted. His major objective was to serve as a bridge between the Soviet Union and the West. In this he succeeded where his predecessors failed. The

Soviet Union would not communicate with either Lie and Hammarskjold during their final months.

One example was Thant's intervention in the Cuban missile crisis of 1962. He served as a channel for messages between President John F. Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev ending the threat of a naval confrontation. Both men took note of Thant's role and thanked him.

Thant took office in the midst of major U.N. operations. He found himselfsuddenly commanding a U.N. force of nearly 20,000 troops in the Congo and 6.000 more inthe Middle East. The worldorganization was near bankruptcy as a result of these costly operations.

He took the initiative in getting the General Assembly to approve a \$200 million bond issue to meet payroll costs. In doing so he defied the Soviet Union. He also began pushing to liquidate the U.N. operation in the Congo. This was finally accomplished in 1964



Cancer Bill Signed By President Nixon

By GAYLORD SHAW Associated Presss Writer WASHINGTON (AP) -President Nixon signed today legislation launching a \$1 6billion federal crusade to conquer cancer.

He said it is the start of an oprecedented effort to eliminate a long shadow of fear that darkens every corner of

the earth. At a ceremony in the White House State Dining Room. Nixon affixed his signature to the National Cancer Act and said the bill, "perhaps more than any legislation I have signed ... can mean new hope and comfort in the vers ahead for millions of people in this country and around the

The measure mandates the 34-year-old National Cancer Institute to increase research efforts into the causes of and cures for cancer.

It also gives the institute direct access to the White House in getting support for the

The legislation also establishes a 23-member National Cancer Advisory Board and a three-member president's cancer panel which will report to the White House on execution of the program.

Nixon used the occasion to announce the appointment of Benno C Schmidt, a New York businessman, to serve as chairman of the panel. Schmidt, managing partner in I. H. Whitney & Co. and director of several other corporations, had been chairman of the national panel of consultants on the conguest of cancer.

The Texas Board of Water Development has opened an area office at the Amarillo Air Force Base. Gene Couch. James Eddy, and Dan Muller are staffing the office. These Water Development Board Staff Members are currently engaged in the inventory of all active major wells (those which pump over 105 gallons per minute) which are irrigation, municipal or industrial in use in Carson, Gray, and Armstrong counties. Additional counties on the Caprock are to be inventoried later.

The inventory work will consist of collecting and compiling all old records pertaining to the wells; matching of all records pertaining to each, active well; mapping the wells in the field with sketches showing access and distances; and assignment of State well numbers to all definitely located active wells according to the Board's State-wide well numbering system. All past and present information on each inventoried well will be placed on a form (well schedule) for the usage of the Board, the Water District, and the general public. Some water levels and well yields will be measured where additional data of this type is needed

The Water Development Board memebers will begin field work upon completion of the preparatory work and as soon as the fields are dry

enough to allow access to their station wagon vehicles

The Texas Board of Water Development held its monthly meeting on December 16 and immediately discovered that it had more on the agenda than it "could say grace over". A portion of the agenda was postponed until the January 18, 1972 meeting Included in this postponement was consideration of the new Water Development rules on financial programs. In recent weeks, copies of the proposed new rules had been mailed out to water men over the State. By the time of the Board Meeting on December 16, a large number of responses had been received. The Board decided to review the new rules and the responses. before taking action toward

adopting them. A recent meeting between staff members of the Texas Board of Water Development and self-appointed environmentalists only served to whet the appetite of the environmentalists. Few results and much confusion resulted. A number of the environmentalists have apparently set themselves up as dictators and spent most of the meeting period shouting down everything proposed by Harry Burleigh and members of his staff. Executive Director Burleigh finally told the environmentalists that the Water Development Board is not "promoting" the Texas Water Plan or other water projects. He reminded them

to carry out its statutory duties, and that it operates under law and will carry out those obligations despite opposition. He promised that he and his staff would apply their professional abilities to the utmost to give Texas a water program that the State could be proud of. He caustically told them that "when a lady turns a tap, or a plant manager turns a valve, or an irrigator turns a head, if water is not forthcoming. anywhere in Texas, then the agency has failed"

Burleigh also came to the defense of the irrigation farmers of the High Plains. One of the self-appointed environmentalists had made wild accusations about the waste of water by irrigators. Burleigh is well acquainted with irrigation practices and has watched the progress made by irrigators in installing thousands of tail-water recovery systems. He rejected these charges in unmistakable terms.

Another sore point with several of the environmentalists was the use of water at all by irrigators.



Nixon Has Held More Summit Talks Than Any Other American President

By WILLIAM L. RYAN AP Special Correspondent bloom It would be no surprise if Richard M. Nixon's 1971 managers came up with a campaign song entitled: "In the Good Old Summit Time.

As President he has sum assimited more than any other and American chief executive. probably more than any other world leader in history. This is an era of summitry by leaders around the world, but the President by campaign time should be in a position to claim the championship.

As a breed, diplomats tend to dislike and distrust wi summitry, feeling that madiplomacy should be handled by diplomats. Long ago an English diplomat named Sir -Harold Nicholson looked down -- his aristocratic nose and found summitry to be in the familiarity-breeds-contempt category. He felt it "arouses public expectation, leads to misunderstanding and creates confusion.

"There is," sniffed Sir Harold. "nothing more damaging to precision in international relations than friendliness be-1ween the contracting parties.

To people who hold such yiews, summit meetings are occasions for florid toasts, exchanges of expensive gifts. premeeting optimism, wordy but noncommital communiques. All that could raise too much popular hope or pose the threat of miscalculation: the Cuba missile crisis came after Nikita Khrushchev met John F. Kennedy and evidently misjudged

Others see advantages in summits, arguing they can break down barriers and stimulate dialogue. Top leaders can try to know each other. A president or a prime minister has authority and can reach decisions without referral home for review. debate and perhaps bureaucratic paralysis.

President Kennedy summited some, but seemed chary of toplevel meetings. President Lyndon Johnson used the summit technique sparingly.

Economists Expect Temporary Inflation Surge

After claiming success for trimming the rate of inflation during the wage-price-rent freeze, the Nixon administration is now bracing for a temporary surge in the cost of living

President Nixon's economic advisers say they fully expect the inflation surge to take place as the nation's economy moves through the transition from freeze to thaw.

The nation will get its first glimpse of how extensive the inflation acceleration is when the Consumer Price Index for December is released next

Although Nixon's economists say the price stepup should be temporary. they are worried about the length and size of the surge. fearing it could lead the nation back into an inflationary psychology

East Pakistani Refugees To Go **Back Home Soon**

NEW DELHI (AP) - The long walk home to an independent Bangla Desh will begin next week for 10 million East Pakistani Refugees and it is hoped that within two months there will be none left in India, a senior government

official said Thursday. 'We want to empty all the camps in India within a month or two," said the highly placed official, who asked not to be quoted by name.

U.N. officials, who have helped coordinate a massive relief program for the refugees since last March, confirmed that discussions already had begun with the Indian government on repatriation of the refugees following the defeat of the Pakistani army in East

Pakistan. A spokesman for the West Bengal government in Calcutta said the target date for beginning the repatriation was Jan. 1, but officials in New Delhi expressed hope the date might be advanced by a



NEW YORK (AP) - "The Great American Dream Machine," public broadcasting's weekly combination variety and actuality program was the brightest spot on the television channels Wednesday night, largely by default. The three major networks spent most of the evening repeating programs. a pre-Christmas tradition. It is pleasant to have

'Dream Machine" around since it is one of the few entertainment programs which dares to experiment. Sometimes the brave attempts don't come off well-particularly when the object is satire. Wednesday was one of those nights.

About half the program seemed to be shooting toward satire but none of the segments got off the ground. 

Two elements of special interest in this verse are, first the tense of the Greek verb phaino in the first clause and second, the meaning of katalambano, the Greek verb in the closing clause

The light. John writes. shines in the darkness. The Greek tense is present. The light is shining in the darkness, or, as in The New English Bible. "the darkness has never quenched it.

Is the Apostle John simply telling us that the darkness has not perceived the light or that the light keeps shining despite every effort of

"The light shines on in the dark, and the darkness has never quenched it." Even here and now. God is at work in your life and mine, miserable sinners though we were. justifying us by his grace and sanctifying us by his power. Christ in you, the hope of glory (Col. 1:27). He answers our prayers, he promises strength sufficient in our weakness, and he pledges to conform us at last to his glorious image.

People In The News

FLORENCE, Ariz. (AP) -Winnie Ruth Judd, the trunk murderess of the 1930s, is a free woman.

Mrs. Judd, now 67, was quickly whisked away from the Arizona State Prison Wednesday by members of her family and presumably was taken to California where she will serve out her parole.

The Arizona Board of Pardons and Paroles voted unanimously last month to parole Mrs. Judd, who was returned to prison two years ago following her seventh and final escape from corrections authorities. She had been free for about seven years.

Mrs. Judd, convicted nearly 40 years ago on charges that she chopped up the bodies of two companions and shipped them in a trunk to Los Angeles, will live with and work for Dr. and Mrs. John Blemer of Danville, Calif.

NYACK, N.Y. (AP) - Actress Helen Hayes has lost to burlgars the famous emeralds her late husband. Charles MacArthur, gave her to make up for a time he had given her only peanuts.

When MacArthur gave her two peanuts, he said he wished they were emeralds. Word of

that remark got around so MacArthur purchased the emeralds in India during World War II.

In disclosing what was taken in Sunday's burglary. police reported Wednesday that a gold pin shaped like a heart with the number 18 on it also was missing. Miss Hayes said the pin had been given to her late daughter. Mary MacArthur, on her 18th birthday. The daughter died here in 1949 at the age of 19, three days after being stricken with polio.

SHANNON, Ireland (AP) -Thomas Hayden, a defendent in the Chicago 7 riot trial, has been identified as the 30yearold American who has been refused permission to enter Ireland.

Immigration authorities said Wednesday that Hayden. reportedly en route to Northern Ireland, was detained immediately after he landed here and was ordered

returned to New York. Hayden was convicted of crossing state lines to incite riots in Chicago at the time of the 1968 Democratic National Convention. He is free on appeal bond.

Oil Operators Seeking Formula On Explorations

By MAX B. SKELTON **AP Oil Writer**

HOUSTON (AP) Independent oil operators are continuing their search for a formula that would allow more of them to participate in offshore oil and gas explorations.

The Office of Emergency Preparedness also has considered the matter. An OEP report has noted, however, that "it is heartening" that independents were major participants in two of the three tracts which drew the highest per acre bids in the Louisiana offshore lease sale last December

An independent Petroleum Association of America report was sent to 30 operating offshore companies seeking suggestions and comments. Nineteen companies replied.

Major items involved the unlimited liability regulation imposed after the Santa Barbara oil spill of 1969, the current popular 5,000-acre parcel size, and the bonus bid method used for such sales.

From 1954 through last December's sale, the federal government received more than \$4.3 billion in bonus bids

The OEP report said a leasing policy which does not turn so heavily on large advance bonuses would provide the independent more opportunity to participate offshore.





DALLAS (AP) - It will be just as intense but compared to 1969 it won't be as immense- that's the New Year's Day collision between the once-beaten Penn State Nittany Lions and the twicedefeated Texas Longhorns in the 36th annual Cotton Bowl

Two years ago it would have been a match for the national championship.

Texas had whipped Arkansas 15-14 in the final game of the regular season on national television and President Nixon trooped to the locker room to crown the Longhorns national champions.

Penn State raised cane, led by fiery Coach Joe Paterno. However, the Nittany Lions turned down a Cotton Bowl invitation for the delights of the Orange Bowl where they defeated Kansas 15-14.

Texas made the national title unanimous with a 21-17. victory over Notre Dame-the first Irish bowl appearance in 45 years.

The stakes aren't as high this time but the desire is still

We feel this is the biggest game we've ever been involved in, says Paterno. Texas is a glamor school to us in the East

Record Game Ends With Chief Defeat

KANSAS CITY (AP) - to the 35, then Larry Csonka 40 seconds of sudden-death overtime gave the Miami Dolphins a 27-24 American Football Conference playoff victory over Kansas City Saturday in the longest game in pro football history.

over the crowd of 50,374 as Griese set to position the Dolphins for another attempt by Yepremian. First, it was Klick into the line for two, then Csonka for four and then back to Kiick, who was held to no gain but left the ball squarely in front of the uprights.

It also left the Chiefs with the distinction of having played in pro football's two longest games. In 1962, as the Dallas Texans, they defeated the Houston Oilers after 17:54 of overtime on a 25-yard field goal by Tommy Brooker to win the American Football League championship.

This one exceeded that and became only the fourth overtime game in pro football history. The only two others ever played came in 1958 when the Baltimore Colts defeated the New York Giants for the NFL championship, and in 1965 when Green Bay beat Baltimore 13-10 for the NFL's Western Conference championship.

11---Sideslipping

By ROBEL STRAUBHAAR Director, Crested Butte (Colo.) Ski School

As fundamental as the snowplow is to skiing, so is the sideslip. Sideslipping is moving sideways down the hill with your skis parallel to the hill. You can go either straight down or slightly forward or backward.

Stand with your skis parallel and across the slope. For your first try at sideslipping, simply stand between your poles on a packed slope and release the edges by flat-tening your skis. Step up and repeat this exercise. Do it a number of times facing in both directions on the hill.

Now try without the support of your poles. As you skid sideways, the upper part of your body should face the direction of travel down hill. This position will give you more balance. The edges can be released either by an up or down motion; what we merely want is to unweight the skis to decrease the resistance. Once skidding or sideslipping, simply edge your skis with a down motion and a pushing of your




knees toward the hill and you are again in a traverse

To practice sideslipping the slope should be packed and fairly steep. The upper body is always facing the direction of travel.



Your Health

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb-I recently

went to give a pint of blood at a local hospital but was told I would be unable to give because my hematocrit was too low. It was 39 and their minimum acceptable figure was 41. Just what does this mean? What is the hematocrit? Is it serious for it to be lower than normal? Does it signify anything wrong?

Dear Reader - The hematocrit is one way of measuring how many red blood cells you have or as a check on the presence of anemia.

The blood is composed of fluid (plasma) with cells suspended in it. Most of the cells are the red blood cells to transport oxygen. The hematocrit is the per cent of the blood volume that is made up of the cells. A tube of blood is centrifuged and the red cells settle to the bottom. The volume in per cent of the red blood cells is read off the tube. Usually about 47 per cent of the blood valume in men and a little less in women is from the cells

A value that is too low would suggest the presence of an anemia and would warrant further testing. Or you could have accumulated excess water, which seems unlikely. If you have some bleeding, such as from hemorrhoids or an ulcer, it could cause this. It does deserve checking to see if the first reading was correct or not and, if it is, additional studies to find out what the problem really is

Dear Dr. Lamb-I have had an anemia problem for years. I would like to have your opinion of the treatment of anemia (not pernicious).

I have been getting crude liver shots for over 15 years. There is a difference of opinion whether I am getting any iron in this treatment or whether I get iron in the B-12 if taken. I have tried iron pills off and on and they make me constipated and ill. I am older than 70 and quite active. I have always felt I needed crude liver shots, that I felt better having them.

Dear Reader -If you are getting liver shots or B-12 shots for an anemia, you are being treated for pernicious anemia (one manifestation of B-12 deficiency). That would be likely in your age group. If you don't have pernicious anemia, there is little reason for you to be getting crude liver shots or B-12 shots.

Most doctors prefer their patients to take B-12 shots as opposed to crude liver because there are some people who become intolerant to the crude liver shots. The B-12 in the liver is what makes it work. There should be very little

reason or you to need iron unless you have a poor diet.~ Women after the menopause need no more iron than men and that isn't very much, unless they are bleeding from some location. You might review your diet and see if you are getting enough foods that contain iron.

Mr. Nixon's Coup In Dollar Crisis

By RAY CROMLEY

WASHINGTON (NEA). President Nixon, not noted for finesse, may have managed a psychological coup in the dollar crisis. His strategy can now be outlined in some detail.

First, Mr. Nixon and his advisers believed they had to shock West Europe, Japan and Canada into action. They believed long, slow conferences would not succeed

Mr. Nixon was convinced that direct devaluation of the dollar would not succeed and that such action would be followed by a rash of counter devaluations by countries determined to hold their trade advantages. With such a demonstration of U.S. "weakness," there could have continued a slow but steady run on U.S. gold.

Devaluation in terms of gold would have enriched France. the Soviet Union and certain other countries which had been most uncooperative and encouraged further foreign dollar-gold manipulation and speculation in the years

Mr. Nixon solved this dilemma by floating the dollar and going off gold.

The President was almost certain the importance of the American market was such that the countries of the world would have no choice but to cooperate once they saw the United States meant business.

To make it even more attractive for foreign governments to cooperate with his proposals, Mr. Nixon levied a 10 per cent surtax, making it crystal clear that retaliation meant a continuation of that tax and cooperation meant the tax would be dropped.

Up to this point, U.S. Treasury Secretary John Connally had acted very tough indeed. To the principal trading nations, Connally had said, upvalue your currencies, get ready to cut unfair barriers to U.S. goods.

Mr. Nixon then waited while outraged governments around the world demanded that the United States devalue. When Mr. Nixon did not move (but Connally gave hints), the other nations talked a little more quietly and asked that the United States go halfway.

Now the interesting thing is that the setup left the President with an ace in the hole - several aces

Devaluing the dollar somewhat was now a concession, a good turn for which Mr. Nixon could request

counter - concessions Some countries, in return, could now be expected to raise the value of their currencies. Others, like France, could be expected to promise not to

devalue. Yet devaluation of the dollar, in major part, had already been accomplished, smoothly, by the action of the money exchanges.

Mr. Nixon's next ace was gold, or rather the absence of any relationship of the dollar to gold. Since the United States had announced the

dollar would no longer be tied to the metal, what difference that the price of gold would go up in terms of the dollar? The government was not henceforth going to convert dollars for gold. So formal devaluation no longer had its old disadvantages.

The program had one other advantage for election year 1972. The deliberate uncertainty connected with the Nixon announcements created some great confusion in government and trading circles abroad. Development of new arrangements for exporting to the United States lagged in some principal countries, especially in those with which the United States has an extremely unfavorable trade balance.

These delays should bring an additional, though temporary, shift in the balance of trade in U.S. favor in 1972. The shift may not be great enough to make the balance look good. It could be worse than in 1971, in fact, for commerce takes time to turn around. But trade, nevertheless, will be considerably better than it would have been had it not been for this uncertainty in those countries which export heavily to us.





A dollar is worth only what somebody will pay for it. It used to be worth 1/35th of an ounce of gold. If the price of gold is raised—as it has been to \$38 an ounce—the dollar is worth less.

When a higher official value is set for a currency, it's worth more. "Revalued" currencies would buy more dollars than they have in the past.



A currency whose value has been declared to be for it. The German mark is an example. Value of change from transaction to transaction.



When the total of all money leaving the U.S. (in payments, investments, travel, etc.) is higher than what the U.S. is taking in from all sources, there's a balance of payments deficit.



When governments set the prices at which their currencies can be exchanged for others. Unlike floating currencies, the prices are fixed-but may have to be changed anyway.



Similar to a bank account. but on a national basis. Reserves are a nation's holdings of foreign currencies, gold, etc.



When this happens, the practice of stating a currency's value in terms of gold ends. The U.S. would like to do this, and peg the value to some artificial standard, or to other currencies.

Food Magnate Gives \$4 Million To Trust Fund

DALLAS (AP) - The family of snack food magnate G. C. Morton presented the Dallas Community Chest Trust Fund Thursday with the entire assets of his and his wife's charitable foundation-valued at nearly

\$4 million. Mrs. Morton and her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Van C. Ellis, made the presentation in the form of 100,000 shares of General Foods stock, which traded earlier this week on the New York Stock Exchange at \$39.50 per share.

"We think this is what Mr. Morton would have wanted," said Ellis.

The gift is the largest in the history of the Trust Fund, the assests of which are now more than \$10 million.

Morton began as a fry cook. then built a small potato chip business into a snack food empire. General Foods bought and later sold Morton Foods.

Not Too Much Quality In This Year's Race For Movie Oscars

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - It's that time of year when film reviewers go bleary-eyed and movie publicists start fattening their expense accounts. It's Oscar time.

Dec. 31 is the deadline for entries in the annual awards of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. Inevitably, the last two weeks of the year bring a flood of previews, premieres, special screenings and visits to Hollywood by stars and directors who have made the Oscar hopefuls.

Christmas may be the season to be jolly, but for the film trade it marks the beginning of campaigns to win Oscars-and hence extra millions at the box office. Already movie ads carry the special message: "Attention Academy members: Your card will admit you and a guest to any performance Sunday through Thursday.

What kind of a race is it? Alas, not a very strong one. The year 1971 won't be registered as vintage for film quality. With exceptions like "Fiddler on the Roof" and "Nicholas and Alexandra." most of the film product have been "little" pictures, reflecting the penny-pinching needs of

the current economy. Some of the little pictures. notably "The Last Picture Show." have produced quality. But many were too drab or sexcharged, or both.






