After three failures, the Senate for only the eighth time in history Monday voted 65 to 32 to invoke cloture, thus limiting debate and clearing the way for voting on the rights measure. Under the cloture rule, each senator gets one hour to speak on the compromise and the more than 80 amendments that have been filed.

But despite the victory over the filibuster by exactly the two-thirds vote needed the measure still faced an uphill

U.S. Makes Gesture To Hanoi Commies

Attempt Made To Return Crew

SAIGON (UPI) - The United States is attempting to return three captured North Vietnamese seamen to Hanol as a goodwill gesture for the Communist release last month of three American pilots, American officials said today.

They said if successful, they hoped the return would pave the way for the release of more U.S. pilots shot down and captured on bombing missions over the North.



Terrain Little Changed Big Bend National Park, in southwest Texas, is bounded on three sides by a southward swing of the Rio Grande. Its mountainous terrain has been little changed by the inroads of civilization. Some of the nearest towns are an hours drive away. Edward C. Fritz, of Dallas, who takes an active interest in conservation, said the biggest change in the park has been in the Rio Grande, a wild ricer flowing through Big Bend now drained by power and irrigation needs of civilization.

Padre Island, also a national park, is preserved off the southern coast of Texas, from the Gulf seashore inward in an almost original wilderness state.

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



The Doctor

It is always a puzzle to tell whether a child with respiratory symptoms has a cold or an allergy, Dr. M. B. Marks at the University of Miami has made a study of the signs peculiar to respiratory allergies in children. One, which he calls the allergic shiner, develops after about a year of allergic rhinitis. Dark circles suddenly appear under the eyes without any apparent cause. They are, however, due to swelling of the nasal mucous membranes interfering with the normal venous drainage from the eyelids.
