## Morton Decision Not To Run Again **Heartens Demos**

By United Press International The prospective decision of Sen. Thruston E. Morton, R-Ky., not to seek re-election this year gave Democrats hope today for a comeback in Kentucky.

Morton, a top party official considered a likely prospect for Senate Republican leadership, all but announced he would not run late Thursday and scheduled a news conference today for a formal statement.

Democrats were shocked last fall when Republican Louie B. Nunn won the Kentucky State House, and they were anticipating a tough battle trying to unseat a Republican of Morton's stature in the senatorial elections this year.

Morton, 60, is one of the most influential national figures of his party. He served three House terms in the late 1940s. then became an assistant secretary of state in the first Eisenhower administration. He came to the Senate in 1956 and was reelected six years later. Campaign Topic


Mark 3.35 "For whosoever shall do the will of God, the same is my brother, and my sister, and mother." If you will study those words for a few moments you will find that Jesus has mentioned here three of the closest relationships in the human family, that of a mother, of a brother and of a sister. Yet, He made the statement that to have that sort of relationship with the Lord, the deciding factor would be whether or not you are doing the will of God. We can say then, on the strength of this statement by Christ, that the basis of real fellowship, of real kinship, with the Lord is to do His will.

Strangely enough, we hear very little said anymore about the will of God. If it is so important to our relationship with the Lord then it certainly is important for us to give it deep consideration.

There is one thing that we can mention as being the general will of God for everyone and that is salvation. In II Peter 3:9 we read: "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance."

The critical part of this matter of doing God's will is found in the seventh chapter of Matthew and verse twenty-one: "Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven." What was the test here? Whether or not the individual did the will of God!

Where do you stand in this matter? In verse 23 of Matt. 7, Jesus said, "I never knew you." They had not done the will of God.

On those dates, the Defense Department says two U.S. destroyers were attacked by North Vietnamese patrol boats. The incidents resulted in U.S. air strikes against North Vietnamese torpedo boat bases, and in a congressional resolution giving President Johnson broad authority to pursue the Vietnam War.

Made Public McNamara made public a 21-

page statement which he had given the committee Tuesday. Fulbright later charged McNamara's published account did not tell the whole story.

The Pentagon said McNamara ordered a security review team to go through the entire transcript "on an expedited basis." It said the transcript was received from the committee this morning.


