VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) - Laos charged Saturday 30,000 North Vietnamese troops had launched a direct invasion and were overwhelming wide areas of the country in the long Communist drive to seize South Vietnam's neigh-



# Life Underwriter Calls For Strong Insurance Group

AUSTIN-W. J. (Jay) Poynor, Texas Association of Life Underwriters, today called on insurance men of Texas to 'effectively maintain a strong volunteer association dedicated to serving the insurance needs of Texas citizens."

Poynor issued his appeal following the recent U S Supreme Court decision which upheld the right of unions to attempt to organize some 100,000 commissioned agents who sell insur-

The national press reported March 7 that the Supreme Court cleared the way for unions to try and organize insurance salesmen. The National Labor Relations Boards noted that the ruling would also effect "countless other individuals who work on their own". Since 1947, persons who work on their own have been thought to be beyond the reach of the Labor Relations Act, which gives "employes" the right to organize.

Poynor commented, "With such a ruling now given the sanction of the law of the land, it is imperative that life underwriters of this country, and particularly in Texas, be impressed with the need to effectively maintain a strong volunteer association dedicated to grassroots operation can de-zation of the agency system as





There was another consideration. The President had been through a punishing week, on some days missing his usual afternoon rest and having to rush lunch — two practices frowned upon by his doctor and family.







The latest recommenda- there is little wind and when to use one-half pounds of the temperature will reach at least 75 degrees. Five gallons of water per acre is satisfactory with ground equipment. Careful calibration of your equipment to determine amount of total liquid being sprayed per acre is essential for good kills. The wheat is now in the

Green Bugs

proper stage for spraying. A delay to the boot stage is too late.

We have made numerous checks of different wheat fields and have green bugs in just a-bout every field. Most fields have a population large enough to explode on short notice and make spraying necessary. However, we saw very few fields that needed spraying now. We would advise all wheat farmers to keep a close look at your wheat and be ready to go into action on short notice. Methyl Parath on by aerial application is your best bet.


