Food Chains Move To Halt Price Spiral

WASHINGTON (AP) - A day after Treasury Secretary John B. Connally talked with leading chain-store executives about the high cost of food, three supermarket chains moved to stop the spiral.

Grand Union and Winn-Dixie put freezes on current prices Thursday. Safeway Stores, Inc., cut beef prices in its 246 stores in Maryland. Virginia. Pennsylvania. Delaware and the District of Columbia.

Grand Union froze fresh meat and poultry prices for 30 days in its 500-plus stores in the East, and Winn-Dixie, with 871 stores in the Southeast, froze all food prices through April.

The Agriculture Department, meanwhile, announced that the prices paid to farmers for beef on the hoof dropped 20 cents per hundredweight in the month ending March 15. A record high of \$32.60 per hundred pounds of beef was set last month. It fell to \$32.40 in the latest price period.

The decline, though slight, was the first since last sum-

Safeway said it lowered its meat prices as a result of the drop in prices paid for cattle.

Russel G. Allen Dies Of Stroke In Austin

Russel G. Allen, 71, first Southwest Division manager of Cabot Corp. in Pampa, died yesterday afternoon in Austin following a stroke suffered at his home there Wednesday The body was scheduled to

arrive in Pampa this afternoon and will lie in state at the Duenkel Funeral Home until time for the funeral services at 11 a.m. Monday in St. Matthews Episcopal church with the Rev. Sam B. Hulsey rector, officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery

Mr. Allen, who was born in Crawfordsville, Ind., Oct. 4, 1901, finished prep school at Cornwall-on-Hudson, N.Y. and was graduated in 1923 from Haverford College, Haverford, Pa.

He first joined Cabot in Breckenridge, Texas, 1925, was transferred to the company's gasoline plant operation in Salem, W. Va., and reassigned to Pampa in 1927

As one of the pioneers for Cabot, his service as Southwest Division manager from the Pampa headquarters gained him a reputation which Cabot officials from Boston to the Southwest referred to as the "Allen Era" of company expansion and progress.

Mr. Allen became general manager for the Southwest Division in 1930 and held that post until 1943 when he was transferred to Cabot's main offices in Boston as an executive vice president and director in charge of production and sales for Godfrey L. Cabot, Inc., and its various subsidiaries.

Old Billboards To Disappear On Highways

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) -Roadside eyesores such as diplapidated billboards and rusting junkyards should disappear as a result of a bill passed by the legislature. which reluctantly caved in to federal financial pressure.

The major part of the highway beautification work may not take place for several years, however, as the federal government's lead in financing has been slow.

The first things to come down, maybe within a month. will be old signs which no one is paying to maintain.

The legislative action Thursday night makes Texas the 39th state to comply with the federal Highway Beautification Act of 1965.

It was adopted by the House, 114-31, after several members protested that the federal government was erasing another

area of free enterprise. The Senate passed it 28-2. and one of the dissenters, Sen. W. E. "Pete" Snelson of Midland, said, 'This bill will do more to kill small communities than anything

we have done in a long time. He said the rural communities' "only hope to survive was to place signs on the interstate proclaiming their virtues in hopes that they might interest some of the motorists to stop in their

The proposal was one of two items Gov. Preston Smith instructed the special session to consider. He said it would cost Texas \$24 million in federal highway funds if the state did not enact such a bill by May 6.

State House, Senate Adopt Rules **Restricting Conference Committees**

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - It was hard not to find a "reformer" Thursday night in the scandalrocked Texas Legislature.

The House, hardest hit by the 1971 stock scandal, voted 138-5 for rules to dethrone some of the old lions of that chamber and weaken the speaker's power.

Both the House and the Senate adopted joint rules restricting conference committees, which often have forced lawmakers to vote blind on complex issues

Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine, who was elected speaker Tuesday on a reform platform, negotiated and compromised to get his reforms through.

Price and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes joined hands to push the joint rules-something Barnes has advocated since 1965-to passage



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SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) -Antiwar activist Leslie Bacon has been ordered to appear in federal court here May 5 to answer perjury charges in connection with the bombing of the U.S. Capitol last year.

A perjury indictment made public Wednesday by U.S. Atty. Stan Pitkin charges Miss Bacon lied when she told a federal jury here last spring she had not been inside the Capitol hours before a bomb exploded in a men's room in the Senate wing Feb. 28, 1971.

Miss Bacon was arrested by FBI agents on a material witness warrant in Washington. D.C. last April 27. A federal judge there ordered her brought to Seattle under \$100,-000 bond to testify before the grand jury investigating the Capitol bombing.




(AP)-The 400-year-old Wye Oak has a clean bill of health after a checkup by Earl L. Yingling, state roadside tree supervisor.

Home Life Bears On School Grades

By DON OAKLEY

Depending upon one's political, ideological and-or racial prejudices, President Nixon has either actied in a statesmanlike manner or has once again bowed to political expendiency by asking Congress to halt further

court-ordered school busing. Now a new report bearing on the controversy, actually a reanalysis of an old one, has been dropped into the midst of the fray. It seems to provide ammunition for both sides.


It was back in 1966 that something called the Coleman Report, named after its director, James Coleman of John Hopkins University, came up with a much-disputed conclusion that:

Schools bring little influence to bear on a child's achievement that is independent of his background and general social context; this...means that the inequalities imposed on children by their home, neighborhood and peer environment are carried along to become the inequalities with which they confront life at the end of

A group of Harvard University researchers. supported by a Carnegie Corporation grant, have reexamined the data. Their conclusions, edited by statistician Frederick Mosteller and former presidential aide Daniel P. Moynihan, have been published as a new Random House book, "On Equality of Educational Opportunity.'

According to Education U.S.A. newsletter, the re-examination does not confirm all of the findings of the Coleman Report but upholds its general conclusions. If anything, says one of the researchers, the original report underestimated the importance of family factors on school achievement and overestimated the effect of school factors.

On the question of integration, the reanalysis confirms the original finding that the achievement of black students placed in an integrated setting improves only slightly Specifically, it suggests that



the verbal ability of black students in mostly white classes would be increased about two-thirds of a grade level, still leaving 12th -grade blacks about 3.3 years behind white students.

The basic problem, the Harvard report stresses, is the socioeconomic condition of black families.

"... neither school upgrading nor integration will close the black-white achievement gap" if the socioeconomic gap is ignored. Thus programs which stress financial aid to disadvantaged blacks may be just as important, if not more so, than integration.

Those who don't like this conclusion will counter that the black-white socioeconomic gap is largely a product of past inequalities in education, which themselves were largely products of racially determined housing patterns-both of wheih inequalities busing is intended to help overcome

As for the President's proposal to channel more money into the black schools, they can point to another finding of the Harvard report. This states that the least promising approach to equality of educational opportunity for poor children is to increase school expenditures, since there is "little evidence" that this has an "appreciable effect on

achievement scores. As with other profound social problems, the nation may eventually have to adopt a compromise approach that will not be wholly satisfactory

to anyone. This would mean busing in those cases where wisdom determines that busing is the most practical route to educational equality, and a concentration on upgrading depressed-area schools in those cases where the human costs of busing are greater than the hoped-for benefits.

But where, in the emotionally supercharged atmosphere that now prevails. are we to find the wisdom?

SOVIET WEAPONS IN SPACE?

The Soviets are making rapid military advances in space, according to a report recently released by the Senate Aeronautical and Space Sciences Committee. "Soviet Space Programs, 1966-70," prepared by the scientific experts of the Library of Congress, details Soviet advances in satellite

weaponry. In 1970, for example, the remains of the Soviet Cosmos 316 satellite fell to earth in the United States. The metal pieces were thicker and heavier than that usually used for satellites. Our scientists and technicians concluded that the wreckage closely

resembled that of a bomb. The report also points out that the Soviets are almost certainly continuing to develop two kinds of space weapons. One is the fractional orbital bombardment system (FOBS), which could launch warheads at the U.S. The other is the "inspector-destructor" satellite, which can intercept and destroy other satellites in

Dr. Charles Sheldon, chief of the Library of Congress' Science Policy Research Division, stated in the report: The Soviet Union has worked at the game of making the United States look as bad as possible in doing what is necessary in space defense. while keeping its own freedom of action in this regard as

complete as possible." The U.S., on the other hand, has abandoned its "Saint" program for satellite inspection of other satellites. thus making it impossible for us to know for sure how many weapons the Soviets are

orbiting. Dr. Sheldon, on the basis of the available evidence. concludes that Soviet space experiments are "leading toward stationing of a nuclear deterrent force in orbit for a sustained period."

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb-I am suffering from rheumatoid spondylitis. I am a male, 30 years old, and have been suffering with this for almost two years. I am in constant discomfort. I thought this affliction was always of the bone joints, but I experience a lot of muscular soreness, especially through the shoulders. My spine hurts the entire length, reaching my left hip joint. The pain in the spine is most evident when I arch my back or twist the body trunk. I do exercises and this seems to keep me limber, but overexercising will make me

feel worse in the long run. The physician has me on medication and this seems to help the inflammed hot feeling in my back but it tends to make me constantly tired and without energy. He says he will put me on cortisone if I want to try it, but hasn't pushed the medication, and I

haven't tried it. Will you please explain what this arthritis is and what methods are available for treatment. Am I doomed at this early age to a life of constand discomfort and possible stiffening of my back?

Dear Reader-Rheumatoid spondylitis is a form of rheumatoid arthritis of the spine. It most often affects young males and frequently begins in the latter teens. The initial complaints often involve back pain, perhaps less severe than what you are now experiencing and often there is no X ray evidence of disease and most of the laboratory tests used in diagnosing arthritis may be

negative. With normal laboratory, X ray or physical findings in young, apparently healthy men, it is easy to understand why these victims are often accused of malingering when they first complain of their illness. Since this strikes the age of group that is commonly involved in military duty, it is a persistent problem in the armed services. It is difficult to tell whether back pain is due to anxiety, emotional stress and other factors, or whether it is really the beginning of rheumatoid spondylitis.

Later X ray changes are seen in the joints between the sacral portion of the lower spine and the iliac portion of the pelvis bone, hence it is referrred to as sacroiliac

It can and does cause trouble along the entire spine. At first the pain may be restricted to the low back and the hip, but as time goes on it is common for it to involve the rest of the spine all the way to the neck. It also will affect the joints where the ribs join the spine. Pain in the shoulders of the type you complain of is a common feature of the

arthritis.

Inside Washington

State Department Seeks UN Aid Increase By ROBERT'S. ALLEN

WASHINGTON-There seems to be a surprising gap in communications between the White House and the State Department.
President Nixon announced

in his budget message several months ago that the U.S. share of United Nations funds would be cut from 31 per cent to 25 per cent. Throughout the UN's existence the U.S. has always contributed the most money.

The President's declaration, coming on the heels of the ouster of Nationalist China and other provocative actions, evoked wide bipartisan Congressional approval.

But somehow the State Department didn't get his message—or ignored it!

Instead of slashing U.S. payments to the UN by at least 6 per cent, the department is blandly proposing to hike them by some \$22 million-from \$112.058 million last year to \$134.658 million

This startling disclosure came to light when members of the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee in charge of the State Department's budget dug into the voluminous and bureaucratically complicated document. To their astonishment they uncovered a series of increases for the UN instead of the President's promised decreases.

Among these larger amounts were

Boosting the direct payment to the United Nations to \$63.998 million from \$56.312 million; World Health Organization to \$26.342 million from \$23.741 million; Food and Agriculture Organization to \$12.151 million from \$10.083 million: Organization of American States to \$20.768 million from \$18.780 million; and the International Atomic Energy Agency to \$4.883 million instead of \$3.977

In 1970, this country's share of these funds amounted to \$105 million, so the proposed State Department increases actually mean an overall jump of \$28 million.

Secretary Rogers and other department officials have been making various arguments in defense of these increases in the closed-door hearings the subcommittee is conducting on the controversial budget. What their rhetoric all gets down to is the contention that higher costs and expanded demands require more money.

As far as can be ascertained, they are saying nothing about other UN members bearing a bigger share of the financial load. But that point is being

forcefully raised by committeemen-notably Chairman Wayne Hays, D.-Ohio, who is voicing sharp skepticism about the department's budget and its glaring disregard of the President's publicly avowed policy of cutting U.S. payments to the UN.

Hays, asked by this columnist if budget-paring is in prospect, replied emphatically, "You can say that definitely is my intention. If the committee will support me, this budget will be a lot leaner and more realistic when we get through with it." Time will tell.

One thing is certain: if the subcommittee doesn't wield the axe, a vigorous effort ot do that will be made in the form of paring amendments when the budget comes before the full House later on.

Big Spender
In preparation for such a possible floor fight a number of significant facts has been assembled on the immense amount of money the United States has poured into the United Nations since it was launched in June 1945

In those 27 years the U.S. has given the international organization and its affiliated agencies and programs the huge total of \$4.1 billion.

That is approximately 40 per cent of all the money contributed by UN members—now totalling 131.

That still isn't the whole story-vast as it is.

The U.S. also purchased more than \$141 million of United Nations bonds-65 per cent of which are interest free, the balance paying only 2 per cent interest. It costs the Treasury Department an average of around 6 per cent

to borrow money.

collectively pay less than this country's contributions in one year. But all UN members have the same voting rights; all have one vote regardless of how little put in-or don't put in at all. Some of them are in that

category. They are heavily in arrears. According to the latest available authoritative figures, as of last November. 86 UN member nations were in arrears \$186.867 million.

And leading this shocking list were Russia owing \$86.864 million, France \$21.789 million, and the East European Soviet satellites in default \$32.731 million.

Article 19 of the UN charter specifically states that any member country in "serious arrears" shall be denied its vote in the General Assembly.

This provision has never been invoked-and probably never will be with the Communist, African and Asian blocs controlling the United Nations.

Most of those countries are on the arrears list.

But the State Department is determinedly insisting that U.S. taxpayers continue to shell out an ever-larger amount to keep the UN solvent-so it can slap this country around as it suits the purpose of the grossly defaulting domineering blocs-notable among them India, whose self-righteous and sanctimonious prime minister is currently so petulantly carping about the U.S. and so ardently enthusiastic about Russia.

There are other countries on the UN default list which are no better!

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

CAIAPHAS

Most serious of His opponents were the leaders of the Jewish church. Jesus confronted an entrenched and callous religious community. They opposed change, lived the letter but not the spirit of the law, and employed violence and intrigue to protect their authority. The popularity of Jesus attracted the concern and alarm of Caiaphas, high priest of Jerusalem and leader of the Sanhedrin, (which was the Supreme Court of 70 who later tried Jesus.)

Caiaphas charged Jesus with two crimes: That He was churning up the population in civil discord and that He was guilty of blasphemy. He chose the weapons of patriotism and religion to stir sentiment against Jesus. With false witnesses and political pressure, he succeeded in bringing Jesus to the Cross, though the final verdict was passed by Pilate.

Caiaphas continued as an enemy of the church, arresting the apostles and flogging them for their witness to the Resurrection. Yet the faith grew and the followers increased, much to the consternation of Caiaphas and his cronies.
