follows. In the fields of fashion. art, political science, social theory, philosophy and scientific thought Paris ranks as a world leader and dwarfs the other cities of France.

This has led Parisians to look down on the rest of their countrymen and to regard themselves as a species apart. This, in addition to the rural French suspicion of whatever is happening in their capital, has compounded the social and political problems that a French government must solve if it is to govern this often ungovernable nation.

In 1944 the third largest French port, Cherbourg, was liberated from the Nazis by the allies.

In 1918 the United States began operation of the "Berlin Airlift" to bypass soviet blockading of the western sector of the divided German city.
