PARIS (UP) - U. S. Ambassador W, Averell Harriman urged Hanoi to give the people of South Vietnam the right to decide their future for themselves. He got nowhere and the talks once again floundered in total disagreement.

"Self-determination" has been one of the key points in North Vietnam's proposals for ending the Vietnam War. Harriman accepted the challenge today but asked if North Vietnam really meant the South Vietnamese could settle things "free from coercion




DRAFT QUOTA CUT -Texas draft quota for June has been reduced by nearly a third, says Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

State quota of 1,416 men has been trimmed to 961 on the basis of a new order by Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national draft director. National quo ta, all for the Army, was reduced from 29,500 to 20,000 at the direction of the Department of Defense.

Call for July is expected to be only 15,000, meaning a Texas share of 700 to 750. May call was increased 4.3 per cent late last month (to 2,233) order to provide some manpower for the Marine Corps, at well as the Army.

Draft boards will forward 8. 000 men to examining and entrance stations next month for pre-induction physical and mental examinations. May total is 9,000.
