

Congress Anxious To Curb A 'Scourge Of Lawlessness'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The staggering year-by-year proliferation in crime has been called the major domestic problem facing the nation and one of the most crucial issues in this election year.

Agghast at the mounting toll of murders, rapes, and robberies, the wave of violence in the ghettos, and the power of crime cartels, Congress is eager to crack down.

The most ambitious effort to curb what Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., calls "this scourge of lawlessness" is a four-part omnibus anticrime bill now under consideration by the Senate.

Actually, the package contains four major bills. A couple of them might not pass or would be vetoed on their own. Linked together, all stand a better chance of survival.

Major Provisions
The major provisions are the Johnson administration's "safe streets" act, a two-year, \$400 million program to improve local law enforcement; a southern-inspired attempt to

overturn Supreme Court decisions in the field of criminal law; broad authority to wiretap in the investigation of major crimes; and a ban on the mail order sale of handguns.

The package is riddled with controversy—disputes over provisions within each section as well as strong disagreement over which sections should be killed and which should be retained.

President Johnson has written Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield endorsing the "safe streets" act and has repeatedly demanded a stronger gun bill. But he asked the Senate not to saddle the bill "with provisions raising grave constitutional questions"—as do both the other sections.

On the other hand, Richard M. Nixon, running for the Republican presidential nomination, said it would be a "tragic

mistake" not to adopt the hunting state senators are pitted against bi-partisan urban area lawmakers on gun controls.

The senate probably will complete action by the end of the week. After that the bill must be returned to the House or to conference.

The House, acting first, last year approved a \$50 million one-year authorization for the "safe streets" act but did not consider the other parts of the Senate package.

Fragments Alliances
The measure has fragmented long-standing Senate alliances and party allegiance.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Thomson & McKinnon says that despite the lower market a "strong speculative undercurrent" is evident. The analyst says the market appears vulnerable to more correction on the near term and adds that a dip in the Dow Jones industrial average to the 870-880 area should provide an opportunity to evaluate the quality of underlying support.

Hayden, Stone Inc. says a late May-early June setback carrying the Dow Jones industrials to the 880 level can be envisioned, with both individual investors and the market in general turning a little more cautious. Still, the company says, barring a serious breakdown in the Vietnam talks in Paris or some other sharply bearish factor, the odds are in favor of a further advance starting within the next few weeks.

Oppenheimer, Newberg & Neu attributes the current weakness of the stock market to the apparent lack of progress in the Paris talks and the delay in Congress in "putting our fiscal house in order." The company says such a situation may continue for a while until "more encouraging" news can spark a real recovery, possibly bringing the market to much higher levels.

Pampa may never have produced a Mickey Mantle of baseball but its summer youth programs has already sent two outstanding players into professional baseball.

The National league follows the official rules of major league baseball. This is also true of the American league. The main difference between a National league contest and a high school baseball game is in the length of the bases. On a regulation high school diamond, it is 90 feet between the base paths. On a National league diamond, it is 60 feet between bases.

Girls Invited To Register For Softball

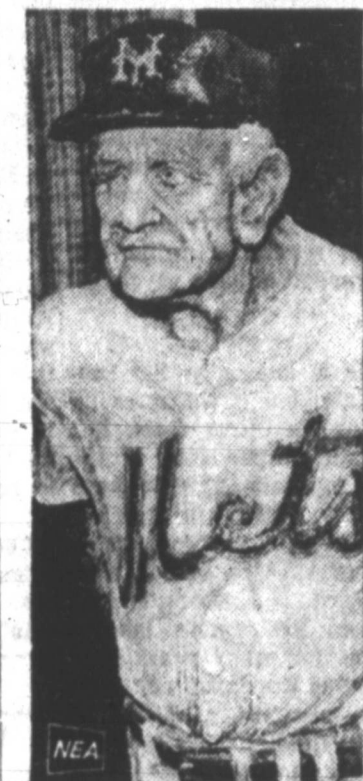

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capitol

AUSTIN — State legislators will return to Austin on June 4. This time to complete the budget-writing chore they put off last year... and to pass a new \$125,000,000 tax bill.

Indications are strong that the bulk of the funds will come through the sales tax route. Gov. John Connally told reporters he is "fairly certain" he will suggest raising the two per cent sales tax rate to three per cent, then refund the increase to the cities on the basis of their 1960 populations. This would replace the present local option city sales levies adopted by 267 cities since last September.

Proposal would provide incorporated cities with \$125,000 a year overall in state aid. State would gain \$35,000,000 to \$40,000,000 from the increased rate due to sales in unincorporated areas. Other recommendations expected in Connally's sales tax package include: removing of some sales tax exemptions; taxing of services like laundry and haircuts; and increasing the auto sales tax rate to three per cent.

Gov. Connally also stated he might suggest a liquor-by-the-drink bill as part of the tax program. Legislative sources say he will suggest local option authority to sell liquor in small, one-drink-size bottles under stiff state tax and strict regulation.

Connally told reporters that overall revision of the liquor laws also may be proposed. He intends to submit no other business until financial necessities are handled.

He expressed confidence that the budget and tax bill can be passed within the 30-day limit.

If lawmakers vote the same way their constituents did on the liquor-by-the-drink referendum (May 4) the governor may have a chance with the small bottles bill. At least 22 of the 150 state representatives and 17 of the 31 senators live in districts which voted for mixed drinks, with varying enthusiasm.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas law banning mass picketing in labor disputes withstood another State Supreme Court test when lower court rulings in favor of the statute were affirmed. High court agreed with intermediate Fourth Court of Civil Appeals, however, that the display of Mexican strike banners in a Laredo dispute should not be enjoined.

Question of whether voter registration applications must be submitted individually has been taken to the Texas Supreme Court.

High court said Texas statute which allows unlimited damages to survivors cannot be applied to fatal accidents involving Texans in other states.

An Abilene man should get a full trial on his \$185,000 malpractice suit against two doctors, Supreme Court held.

Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for wealthy Mair J. Schepps, who received a seven-year prison sentence on a charge of counterfeiting tax stamps.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a district court decision denying a \$98,626 sales tax refund to a New York firm which claimed it received notice of deficiency more than three years after the date taxes were due.

DRAFT QUOTA CUT — Texas draft quota for June has been reduced by nearly a third, says Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

State quota of 1,416 men has been trimmed to 961 on the basis of a new order by Lt. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national draft director. National quota, all for the Army, was reduced from 29,500 to 20,000 at the direction of the Department of Defense.

Call for July is expected to be only 15,000, meaning a Texas share of 700 to 750. May call was increased 4.3 per cent late last month (to 2,233) in order to provide some manpower for the Marine Corps, as well as the Army.

Draft boards will forward 8,000 men to examining and entrance stations next month for pre-induction physical and mental examinations. May total is 9,000.

SPEIR HEADS DPS — Texas Public Safety Commission officially designated one-time high school principal Wilson E. (Pat) Speir as acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir succeeds the late Col.

Homer Garrison, who headed the DPS for nearly 30 years. He had been Garrison's top assistant for six years.

Speir is a veteran of more than a quarter century of service with the state police. He was born and attended schools at Gilmer, graduated at East Texas State College in Commerce and was principal of Harmony High School for a year.

PARK SITES ADDED — Parks and Wildlife Commission has accepted 85 acres of land containing four early military posts which played important roles in the development of Texas.

Sites include Fort Leaton near Presidio, Fort McKavett near Menard, Fort Lancaster near Ozona and Fort Richardson near Jacksboro.

PWC Chairman Will Odom says the sites will be added to the state park system and facilities will be restored and preserved as an historical heritage for future Texans.

Odom also announced that a \$14,275 federal grant has been approved for development of recreational facilities at Fort Griffin State Park 15 miles

north of Albany. PWC will match the federal grant for a 503-acre park.

POLICE TRAINING SCHOOL — House Speaker Ben Barnes says he will ask Gov. Connally to include in the special legislative session agenda a bill to create a state-wide police training school to be called the "Homer Garrison Jr. Law Enforcement Academy."

Barnes believes the school is needed and "would be a fitting memorial to the late Homer Garrison who did so much to build a fine state police system."

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — School boards can order a trustee election recount if the candidate was defeated by less than five per cent of the votes cast even though a district court will order a recount under a different law (as in Starr County case), says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

In another recent opinion, Martin said that Bee County commissioners must provide for competitive bids on the purchase of a new electronic voting system that costs more

than \$2,000. ALLOWABLE REDUCED AGAIN — Texas Railroad Commission slashed the state-wide oil allowable for the third month in a row.

June factor was set at 45.2 per cent of potential, permitting top production of 3,485,366 barrels a day. This compares with 3,512,874 barrels during May when 45.7 per cent market demand factor applied.

Major crude oil buyers submitted written nominations to purchase 3,025,126 barrels a day during June, a decrease of 46,143 from May. This was slightly more than forecast for June demand as submitted by the Bureau of Mines.

SHORT SPORTS Railroad Commission placed a production limit in the East Texas field on an old order permitting transfer of oil allowable from one well to another. Some 3,866 Texas anglers were cited last year for failure to have a \$2.15 fishing license, reports the Parks and Wildlife Department, and were subject to fines ranging from \$10 to \$100.

State Securities Board issued permits to 74 corporations to

sell \$105,800,000 worth of securities last month — a gain of \$61,000,000 over April, 1967. Texas streamflow varied

from deficient in West Texas to excessive in East Texas during April, according to the Water Control Board.

Communists Gain In Italian Parliament

ROME (UPI) — Italy's ruling coalition government won slight gains but will face the strongest bloc of Communist-led opposition in Parliament in 20 years; official election returns showed today.

The coalition of Christian Democrats, Socialists and Republicans won 55.6 per cent of the vote for the Chamber of Deputies and gained seven more seats than it had when Parliament was dissolved. The coalition wound up with 55.8 per cent of the Senate voting and three new seats.

However, the Communist party and the pro-Chinese Proletarian Socialists, who are expected to unite in Parliament voting to provide the leftist opposition to Premier Aldo Moro's new government, rolled up 31.4 per cent of the Chamber vote and 30 per cent in the Senate.

The Communist newspaper, L'Unita proclaimed "Victory" today in a red-ink banner headline that covered half the front page.

The Communist vote was 26.9 per cent for the Chamber of Deputies, an increase of only a

half a per cent from the 1963 voting. But the newly formed Proletarian Socialists won 4.5 per cent to give the pro-Marxists parties a formidable opposition voice against the coalition.

The coalition of Christian Democrats, Socialists and Republicans won 55.6 per cent of the vote in Italy's Chamber of Deputies and a 55.8 per cent majority in the Senate.

The elections, which were held Sunday and Monday, returned the government of Premier Aldo Moro to power.

However, the Communist party and the pro-Chinese Proletarian Socialists, rolled up 31.4 per cent of the Chamber vote and won 30 per cent in the Senate. Political observers had predicted the Communists would lose ground from the 25 per cent they won in 1963.
