

End To Death Penalty Sought In Federal Cases

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark, quoting George Bernard Shaw that "murder and capital punishment are not opposites that cancel one another but similars that breed their kind," has urged Congress to abolish the death penalty for federal crimes.

Clark thus put the Johnson administration squarely behind a bill by Sen. Phillips A. Hart, D-Mich.

The bill specifies the death sentence may not be imposed nor any offense punishable under federal law. It also provides that anyone under death sentence in a federal crime at time of enactment of the bill would have his sentence reduced to life imprisonment.

Clark, testifying before a Senate subcommittee said: "In the midst of anxiety and fear, complexity and doubt, perhaps our greatest need is reverence for life, mere life: Our lives, the lives of others, all life . . ."

"A humane and generous concern for every individual, for his safety, his health and his fulfillment will do more to soothe the savage heart than the fear of self-inflicted death which chiefly serves to remind us how close we remain to the jungle."

The attorney general said extensive studies have showed that the death penalty does not deter crime.

Most states still have capital punishment for some crimes, Clark noted, but said it has been rarely used in recent years. In 1935 there were 199 executions while there was only one in 1966 and two last year.

The Present-Day West Just 'Ain't What It Used To Be'

The West just ain't what it used to be.

The old Longhorn cow fattened when there was grass, gaunted down when the pasture was gone. She fought off the screw-worm fly, heeled her own bruises, rubbed shedding hair off on rock, stubby oak or mesquite. She shed her ticks and escaped heel flies as best she could.

But today, the five-way corral gate, the squeeze chute, the stable-bred sire have just about retired the roper, the cutting horse and many other methods of cow business.

Even some of the smaller ranches have begun using jeeps and light planes or helicopters to round up the stock and hunt for strays.

Less Wandering
For the most part, though, animals show little tendency to wander, with their heavy bodies and short legs, the balanced rations before them winter and summer, medicated rubbing posts and insecticide oils to keep flies and insects off, water and medicated salt always in easy reach.

Today's cattleman must have a great many tools and skills at his command.

He is veterinarian, scientist, nutritionist, chemist and agronomist, among other pursuits.

The beef industry as a whole, and the cattle producer in particular, has experienced rapid and revolutionary changes. So much so that an old cowpuncher, upon seeing "freeze branding" at the Yellowhouse Ranch not long ago, blurted out: "Law me, that calf didn't even beller. Old Colonel Good-night and C. C. Slaughter would turn over in their graves if they saw this! It smells like a hospital around here!"

Dry Ice Used
Identifying cattle with "cold"

or "freeze" branding is but one of many new techniques. The principle is that a mixture of dry ice and denatured alcohol is used to cool copper branding irons to about minus 75 degrees centigrade.

The iron is placed on an electric-clipped square area on the animal's side, kept there 15 to 40 seconds timed by a stop watch, thus freezing the hide solid and destroying the pigmentation in the hair-follicle. When the hair grows back it is white and forms a readable brand on dark cattle. For light cattle a chemical additive can produce a black brand.

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Refugees Doubt That They Will Ever Return To Cuba

HOUSTON (UPI) — Especially among the young, there is a growing feeling with Cuban refugees in Texas that there is little to go back home for, a transplanted Cuban said today.

The more than 3,000 Cuban citizens who have moved to Texas since Fidel Castro's 1958 revolution had a hard time for a while, but most are beginning to take root in Texas. The younger generation among them feels generally it should forget about returning to the "old country."

"I'd figure about 60 per cent of the Cubans here wouldn't go back," said 23-year-old Amaro Taibo. "Most of us, especially the young, have taken U.S. citizenship. I wouldn't go back. Right now I am learning my trade in this country."

To return to Cuba now, Taibo said, "would be like starting all over again, just like when we came here. The country would not be the same."

They have encountered almost no discrimination problems in Texas, although Americans had a tendency to suspect the unfamiliar culture of the Cubans, they said.

"At first it was pretty hard because people didn't know us and they didn't know our culture," said Taibo, a recent graduate from the University of Houston. "As you make the jump to the middle class you make new friends and are more accepted."

He said people in Texas have been particularly receptive.

Friendly in South

"The people here in the South, in Texas and Houston, are more friendly than in the North—in the sense that people up north are more reserved," Taibo said.

But the young college graduate is not completely representative of the Cubans in the state. Jorge's 155-family Cuban Association is designed to perpetuate a kind of national spirit within the refugee population.

"It is a social organization. We have parties and dancing and play dominoes. We play many games. Above all, we speak in Cuban—you know what I mean," Jorge said. "We celebrate the Cuban holiday—the independence day and the start of the Spanish War."

Center for Refugees

Houston has become the undisputed center in Texas for refugees from the Western Hemisphere's only Communist nation, boasting a Cuban national population of about 4,000.

Virtually all have been able to find jobs in the new land, despite the language barrier.

"Almost all of the Cubans have found jobs here and are working," said Jorge Jorge, president of the Houston Cuban Association. "Many are finding new jobs—different from those they had in Cuba. Sometimes they have too much trouble with the language."

Jorge, trained in Cuba as an accountant, now works for a Houston blueprinting company.

"As a sideline, I deal in insurance," he said.

No Discrimination

Man Almost Executed To Get \$20,000

AUSTIN (UPI)—The state of Texas in its next budget is setting aside \$20,000 to pay a man it almost executed in 1927 for a crime he did not commit.

Anastacio Vargas was convicted in 1925 of the murder of Mrs. Gabriel Garza in San Antonio. He was sentenced to be executed, but in 1927, only four days away from his execution, Gov. Dan Moody commuted the sentence to life in prison.

On Oct. 21, 1929, when Lt. Gov. Barry Miller was acting governor for a day, he issued full pardons to a number of convicts, including Vargas.

Vargas brought suit against the state almost 40 years later, contending he had been wrongfully imprisoned for almost four years.

The State Supreme Court upheld his suit, awarding him \$20,000 for "physical and mental pain and suffering" on the grounds he was "almost executed for a murder he did not commit."

The state legislature put the \$20,000 in the 1969 appropriation bill now pending in a special session of the legislature.

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Negro Veterans Say Rioting Does Harm

NEW YORK (UPI)—Despite what black extremists would have you believe, Negro veterans are not coming home from Vietnam to lead riots in the

streets of American cities this summer.

A small minority might. Others say their personal circumstances at the time of a riot would determine whether they would participate.

The general feeling among black veterans and Negroes interviewed by UPI correspondents across the country, is that expressed by John McReynolds of Montgomery, Ala., a veteran of 13 months in Vietnam:

More Harm

"Rioting has done more harm than good. You don't prove anything with rioting."

This year, approximately 41,000 Negroes will be discharged from the armed forces. Between 5,000 and 15,000 of them will have served on the battlefields of Vietnam. Uppermost in the minds of most of them is the desire to share in the riches of America through work—either in good paying jobs that offer a future or in school which leads to good jobs.

"The guy getting separated from the service today," said veterans affairs coordinator in Harlem and a veteran himself, "is in my office tomorrow looking for a job or trying to get into school."

The homecoming for the Negro GI is critical. Many of them have lived with death for a year or more in the service of their country. Many have been decorated by that country. Now, they expect to have a full share in their country's wealth.

But too often still they come home to what Urban League Director Whitney M. Young Jr. called "an America that in a y choose to ignore their sacrifices, new skills, and proven ability; a society that continues to subject them and their families to discrimination."

Don (Joey) Williams, 21, of Memphis, a medic who was decorated in Vietnam for valor, was so sure he was going to get a job as a nurse's aide or medical technician at the Memphis Veterans Hospital that "I was even making plans to spend the money." A year later he was still unemployed.

Not Appreciated

Jesse J. Parker, 22, of Pittsburgh won a Distinguished Service Cross, the Army's second highest award for bravery, for ignoring enemy fire three times to rescue wounded comrades. When he got home he found that "people didn't seem to appreciate my efforts in Vietnam. Most said, 'so what,' when they learned I had been overseas."

Lawrence Joel, 39, of Fort Bragg, N.C., the only living Negro Medal of Honor winner in the Vietnam war, stayed in the Army because he felt a Negro "couldn't make it really big" in civilian life.

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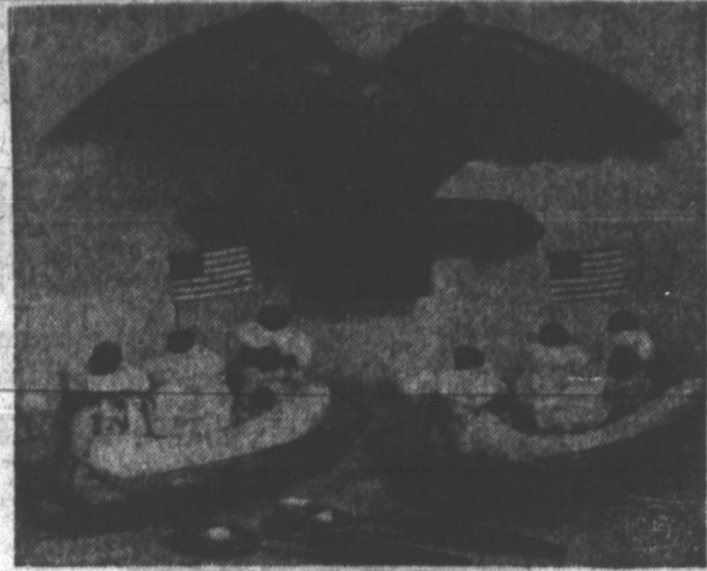

If yours is one of the millions of American families planning a July 4th cookout party, these barbecue kabobs basted with special sauce will interest you.

They consist of little spears of fresh mushrooms, tomato wedges, green pepper squares and meat balls basted with a tangy-sweet sauce and flavored by charcoal cooking.

The meat balls are bound with rolled oats and stay especially juicy, and are formed around stuffed green olives hidden at their centers for surprise flavor.

BARBECUE KABOBS
Barbecue Sauce:
1 cup steak house flavor catsup
¼ cup firmly packed brown

sugar
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Meat Balls:
1½ lb. ground beef
¾ cup rolled oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
1 egg
3 tablespoons barbecue sauce
1½ teaspoons onion salt
18 medium-sized stuffed olives
12 medium-sized fresh mushrooms
1 large green pepper, cut in 12 pieces
1 medium-sized tomato, cut in 6 wedges

For barbecue sauce, thoroughly combine all ingredients. For meat balls, combine all ingredients except olives. Shape meat mixture around olives to form 18 meat balls. Alternate meat balls, mushrooms and green pepper pieces on six 12-inch metal skewers. (To be sure meat balls stay on skewers, thread through the olive in the center.) Brush kabobs with barbecue sauce.

RED, WHITE AND BLUE BANANA SPLITS
Vanilla ice cream
Ripe bananas
Raspberry Sauce
Blueberry Sauce
Whipped cream
Maraschino cherries.
Allow 3 generous scoops ice

cream and 1 banana for each split. Prepare sauces in advance and refrigerate. Have bananas at room temperature. Peel and slice in half lengthwise. Place on dish with three scoops of ice cream. Spoon Raspberry Sauce over one scoop of ice cream and Blueberry Sauce over another. Cap with a fluffy topping of whipped cream. Crown with a red cherry. Decorate with a tiny flag.

Blueberry Sauce:
Mix about ½-cup light corn syrup with 1½ cups fresh, slightly crushed blueberries. Chill. Makes about 2 cups sauce.

Raspberry Sauce:
Mix 2 teaspoons cornstarch, 1 tablespoon water, ½-cup light corn syrup, ½-cup currant jelly and 1 cup fresh or frozen (thawed) raspberries. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture comes to a full boil. Boil 1 to 2 minutes or until somewhat thickened and clear. Remove from heat. Strain. Cool slightly. Makes 1½ cups.

Casual Entertainers Try Sardine Salads

Here are two delicious cold service ideas, each one using Norway sardines to add a taste spark. Either dish makes a welcome and easy addition to 4th of July casual entertaining.

Individual Smorgasbord: Arrange in the center of a dinner plate a small portion of potato salad in a cluster of lettuce leaves, surrounded by Virginia ham curls, sliced salami, tangy Norway sardines on a bed of pimento, quartered hard-cooked egg, ripe olives, sweet gherkins, stuffed olives and radish rosettes.

To prepare stuffed tomato: Cut the top off a chilled tomato and scoop out the pulp; place 1 tablespoon of mayonnaise in tomato and add pieces of sardines. Season to taste.

NORWAY SARDINE ROSEBUD SALAD
1 (3½-oz.) can Norway 1 can small beets
¼ cup French dressing
3 tablespoons sour cream
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
1 tablespoon lemon juice

½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 medium-sized apple, peeled, diced.

1 cup chopped celery
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 hard-boiled egg
1 head of lettuce, chopped
METHOD: Put the beets in a small bowl and pour the French dressing over them. Marinate in the refrigerator for about 2 hours. In a separate bowl, combine the sour cream, mayonnaise, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Peel and dice the apple; put immediately into the sour cream mixture to prevent discoloration. Add the celery, onion and flaked Norway sardines. On each salad-plate place 4 marinated beets on a bed of chopped lettuce. Spoon the sardine salad in center. Garnish with a slice of hard-cooked egg topped with a thin slice of stuffed olive. Chill before serving. Four servings.

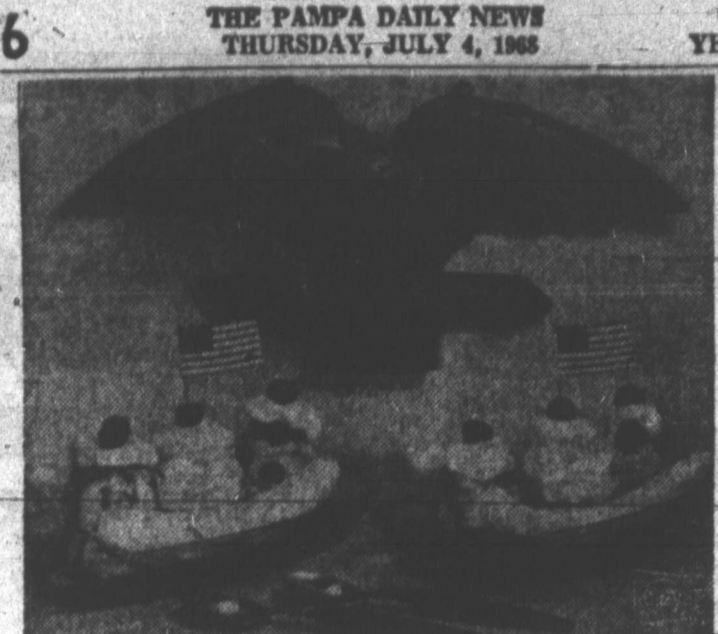

Some Openings Are Available In State Guard Here

John Radcliff of 736 Bradley Drive, commanding officer of the local unit of the Texas State Guard, has announced that openings are available in the unit. Radcliff, who holds the rank of captain, explained that the purpose of the organization was to supplement activities of the Texas National Guard in the event that it is called to active duty.
He explained that the Texas State Guard was not subject to call into Federal service but took the place of the Texas National Guard if it is.
The State Guard trains entirely for use during an emergency or disaster of a civil nature, Radcliff said, and receives no combat training. The basic organization of the State Guard is that of military police, he added.
Meetings are held once a month, although members receive no pay. State Guard members receive pay only if the Texas National Guard is mobilized and they become the state militia. They then are paid on the same basis as active duty National Guardsmen.
Veterans may enlist in the State Guard with the highest rank they held while in the service. Preference is given to ex-service members between the ages of 35 and 55, though age limits are 17 to 60. A limited number of young men subject to draft are accepted for purposes of pre-induction training, Radcliff said.
