## Red Guerrillas Trapped And Killed In Bunkers

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. forces caught a guerrilla band on a main Communist route to Saigon and killed 23 of the Red troops in an eight-hour, two-act battle late Wednesday, military spokesmen said today.

American helicopter gunships spotted the Communists nestled in bunkers 32 miles northwest of Saigon, near the Cambodian border, and in a blaze of fire killed 10 U.S. foot soldiers swarmed in two hours later, scrambled through a heavy burst of machine gun and rocket fire and killed at least 13 more.

## Minor Changes Are All That Remain Before Final Okay

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The biggest housing bill in history nears congressional approval with only minor adjustments necessary to assure agreement on programs to help poorer Americans buy homes, find apartments and get riot insurance.

The House approved the multi-billion-dollar package Wednesday by a vote of 294-114, sending it to conference where small differences with the Senate-passed version will be reconciled.

## Still No Sign of Peace Two-Month Old Talks Dragging

PARIS (UPI)—Off to one side of the Vietnam war conference table Hanoi's Xuan Thuy and America's W. Averell Harriman share tea and some sympathy over the awful roar of Paris traffic.

Later Thuy and his 34 aides offer whiskey and statistics to newsmen, declaring the United States alone is to blame for no progress in the talks now two months old.

Harriman offers the newsmen no hard sell. Unlike Thuy, he talks of hope. After Wednesday's 12th session, Harriman said he notes "straws in the wind" that someday the talks will manage to do what they are supposed to do—cool down the war enough to permit a peace conference.

Behavior Predictable Diplomats had predicted the talks would be long and bumpy. Dealing with Communists at the conference table always has been. Harriman himself has been doing it for 40 years and has managed to pull out such plums as the U.S.-Soviet-British nuclear test ban treaty.

Last month Viet Cong terror squads daily bombarded Saigon with rockets and mortars. They hit few military targets and battered mostly civilians and their homes. Even U.N. Secretary General Thant, who dislikes talking sides, said he was appalled at the shelling.

## New Collective Bargaining List Set By OCAW

The oil bargaining committee of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union, headquartered in Denver, Colo., announced late yesterday the adoption of various collective bargaining policies.

Among the policies being submitted for ratification to the union's members and its affected petroleum and related industry groups are bonus vacation pay of time and a half of regular salary, two additional holidays—and a general wage increase.

If ratified by 75 per cent of the membership included in the oil bargaining program, the various policies will be mandatory on all oil bargaining units, according to Hager Patton, international representative of the OCAW in Pampa.

The committee has recommended 11 mandatory policy objectives. In addition, two optional objectives were recommended.

The mandatory policies submitted for adoption are:  
1. Extend agreements through Nov. 30, 1970.

2. No retrogression in agreement provisions; that is, all present provisions to be renewed or improved.

3. A general wage increase of 72 cents an hour over the period of agreement: 12 cents per hour effective Oct. 1, 1968; 32 cents, Jan. 1, 1969; and 28 cents Dec. 1, 1969.

4. Wage adjustment to craftsmen over and above the general wage increase: 15 cents per hour effective Jan. 1, 1969, and 10 cents, Dec. 1, 1969.

5. Company to pay full cost of an adequate hospital and surgical plan, effective Jan. 1, 1969.

6. Company to pay full cost of an adequate and competitive pension plan, effective Jan. 1, 1969.

7. Time and a half of regular pay as a vacation bonus, effective with the 1969 vacation.  
8. Improved shift differentials (See OCAW, Page 3)

## Available To Public School Budget Will Be Ready On Aug. 8

Pampa School Board today set 7:30 p. m. Aug. 29 as the official budget hearing date, but said a tentative budget will be available in the school business office for public review by Aug. 8.

Homer Craig, school business manager, stated today the district has collected 98.7 per cent of its taxes, which is a twentieth of one per cent increase in collections over last year.

In the 1967 tax roll adjustments, the final tax roll for this fiscal year's collections was \$1,810,915.88. The original tax assessment was \$1,813,062.90. From this figure adjustments in assessments added \$2,277.48 and subtracted \$4,424.50 for errors in assessment, firms going out of business and other changes, Craig said.

The board also approved personnel changes, including employment of Cranz Nichols as Pampa High School physics teacher. ## Government Bans Synthetic Marijuana

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government has issued regulations to make it illegal to make or sell synthetic marijuana, a liquid essence that gives an ordinary cigarette the effect of real marijuana.

Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark published an order in the Federal Register to include the substance, tetrahydrocannabinols (THC), under provisions of the drug abuse control amendments of 1965.

The order goes into effect in 60 days.

## Elusive Witness In Assassination Jailed in Memphis

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI)—Charles Q. Stevens, the elusive witness in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., is in police custody.

Stevens, accompanied by police officers, was spotted Wednesday in the upper corridors of Central Police Headquarters. He dropped from sight last month.

Stevens told police that seconds after the slaying he saw a man run from a rooming house from which the fatal shot was fired.

Stevens disappeared from his apartment June 17, the day a public drunkenness charge against him was dismissed. He reportedly has since been in protective custody.

## Debates Loom With Politics Warming Up

The McCarthy camp prepared another debate challenge today for Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, who was invited Wednesday to take on Richard M. Nixon if they end up as the major party presidential nominees.

Aides of the Minnesota senator passed word he will be undertaking a series of half-hour television talks between now and the Aug. 26 Democratic National Convention, and Humphrey will be invited to participate.

McCarthy has made similar offers in the past, but Humphrey declined on grounds he was saving his fire for the Republican nominee.

Nixon, who once quipped he was an Electoral College dropout in 1960 because he flunked debate, said Wednesday that against the advice of some friends and advisers he was declaring his willingness to debate Humphrey or whomever the Democrats nominate.

Nixon's 1960 televised debates with John F. Kennedy were a major factor in his defeat, Nixon and many other political pros believe.

Only one national vision debate has been held in the presidential campaigning this year. That was between McCarthy and Sen. Robert F. Kennedy shortly before the California primary and Kennedy's assassination, Kennedy was generally considered to have scored the most points in the encounter.

## Russia Agrees To Pull Out Troops

PRAGUE (UPI)—Official Czech sources said today the Soviets had agreed to withdraw more of their 18,500 troops in Czechoslovakia starting Saturday.

The announcement eased but did not end the crisis in relations between Russia and Czechoslovakia's more liberal Communist regime.

The crisis began June 1 when the Russians sent in troops to take part in Warsaw Pact military maneuvers at a time when the Kremlin was grumbling about the reforms in independent-minded Czechoslovakia. It became acute on June 30 when the games ended and many Russian troops stayed on.

At one time there were 27,000 Russian troops and 1,000 tanks here. After the first withdrawal 18,500 troops and 650 tanks remained, leading to Czech fears of some form of "occupation."

On Wednesday there were completely unconfirmed rumors more troops would arrive.

**Blackbirds Dive On Students At Wisconsin U.**

MADISON, Wis. (UPI)—The University of Wisconsin has a couple of blackbirds that make hawks look like doves.

The blackbirds, a male and female of the red-winged variety, jealously guard a nest near a bridge on the campus. Dozens of students and teachers have felt the sting of their beaks the past two weeks.

Anyone who tries to cross the bridge is a likely target. The birds batter him, usually on the head, with their beaks and wings.

"It's not common for these birds to do this," said Prof. Joseph J. Hickey of the UW wildlife ecology department. "And for two birds to do it is absolutely incredible. Either they have young in the nest or the young have left the nest and are nearby."

Hickey, who said he has probed many a nest without many repercussions, said that only once did a bird draw blood from him—a hawk.

"Even a hawk will just swoop at you, but hardly ever hit you with the beak," he said.

Hickey predicted the feathered fury would run its course soon because "the young usually only nest for two weeks."

However, one victim of the blackbird power hinted at another solution.

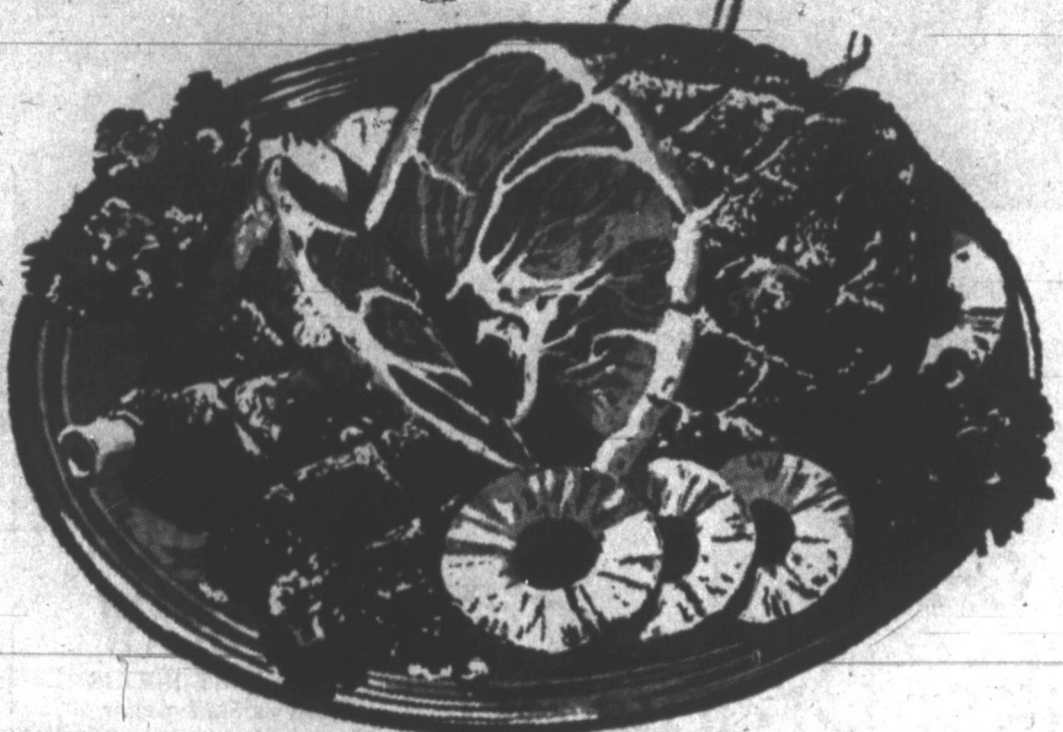
"If they get any wilder we will start having to think about blackbird pie," he said.

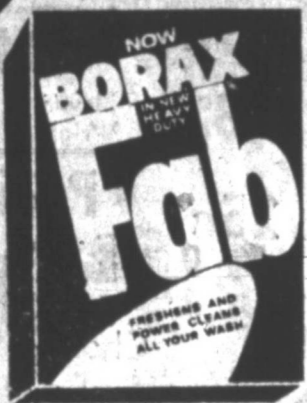

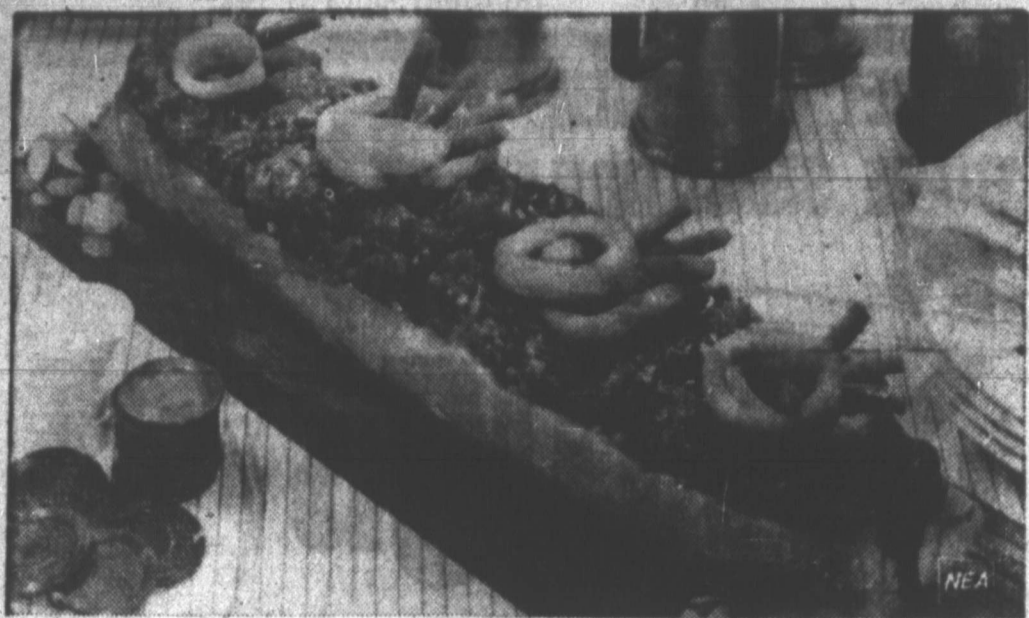

**POKER PARTY SPECIAL**  
1 can (1 lb.) cut green beans  
1 long loaf (about 16 inches) unsliced French bread  
1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
1 egg  
1-3 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped pimento  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1-3 cup catsup  
Onion rings, fresh or heated frozen French-fried.  
Drain beans, saving 1/4 cup liquid. Coarsely chop all but 1/2 cup beans. Split bread lengthwise into halves; store one-half for later use. Cut but 2 cups in cubes of soft center of bread. Toast cut side of bread and cubes in shallow pan in 425-degree oven.

Mix cut up beans, reserved liquid, the beef, egg, toasted bread cubes, onion, pimento, salt and garlic powder. Heap meat mixture evenly into bread; wrap bread in foil to cover crust but not meat. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 min-

utes (medium-rare) or 5 to 10 minutes longer for well-done.

To serve, remove foil; drizzle catsup in strip along length of meat; garnish with reserved beans and the onion rings. Cut into portions with shears, varying size to suit each appetite. **Makes 4 to 5 servings.**

## Trifles Spark Summer Dessert

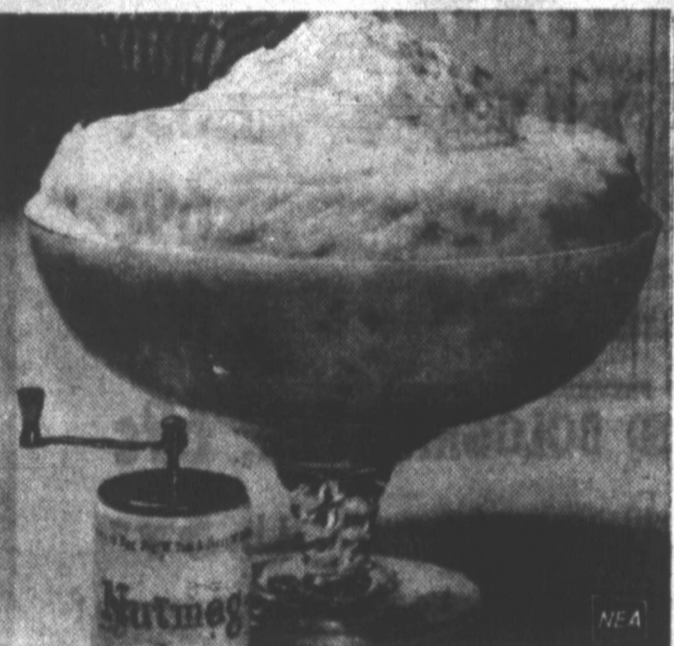
Trifles, of course, may not be really new things. They are more or less of the then type. But as there is lots of them, even in our now thinking, why not serve trifles on warm summer days—now and then?

This Spiced Yankee Trifle is a welcome summer dessert. It is made of sponge cake layers topped with jam and packaged vanilla pudding delicately spiced with nutmeg. Make it early in the day, leaving the whipped cream topping as a last-minute job. Sprinkle it very lightly with nutmeg just as you serve it.

vanilla pudding  
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
Ground nutmeg...

**SPICED YANKEE TRIFLE**  
2 (8-inch each) sponge cake layers  
1 cup strawberry or raspberry jam  
6 tablespoons cooking sherry  
2 packages (3 1/2-oz. each)

Split each cake layer in half. Spread each layer with part of the jam and sherry. Place in layers in glass 9-inch serving bowl. Make vanilla pudding; add nutmeg and pour over cake. Chill until ready to serve. Add sugar and vanilla to cream and beat until stiff. Mound on trifle. Garnish with nutmeg.

Q. What's the name of this cut of meat?  
A. Beef top loin steak.

Q. Where does it come from?  
How is it identified?

A. It comes from the loin area after the tenderloin has been removed. In other words, this is the top loin muscle. Sometimes these steaks contain a part of the backbone. At other times, retailers remove the bone and sell them boneless. Top loin steak is also known as a strip steak, or hotel, Kansas City, New York, sirloin strip or kay strip steak.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. Broiling, indoors or out. Broil on a grill or on the broiler rack in broiler pan of range. Total cooking time for cooking an inch thick sirloin strip steak is 15 minutes, but allow 20 minutes for medium. For a steak which is one and one-half inches thick, allow 25 minutes for rare and 30 minutes for medium. Thinner steaks (one inch thick) are placed on a rack two to three inches from heat while thicker steaks are placed further away, three to five inches. Keep broiling temperatures moderate. Season after broiling.

## July Sees Peak In Food Prices

July is still the peak price month for all food items combined, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

But, in general, retail prices of the food we all eat vary according to the month. April is the low price month for all fresh fruits and vegetables. June for fish. Beef and veal will cost less in January.

The bureau explains this by a leveling of the seasonal prices on chickens, dairy products, eggs, onions, tomatoes, apples, oranges, bananas and grapefruit.

In broiler production, as one example, large commercial units have stabilized the supply of chickens. Mass production has also lessened the price variations for eggs and dairy products.

In reverse, however, are prices of a few foods. Potatoes are outstanding. There was a widening of the price gap between seasonal highs and lows. This happened to some other foods also.

Pork prices still vary widely from season to season. Although July is still the peak month for all food items combined, modern production methods have stabilized price differences somewhat. For example, June prices no longer move up as much from May as previously.

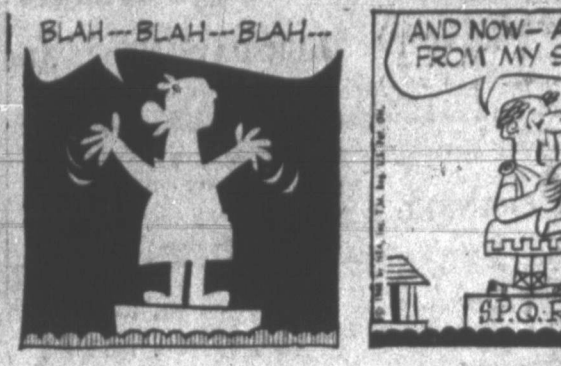

"These things happen in baseball," the 45-year-old ex-Marine remarked at his home at Prairie Village, Kan. "No one knows why. I have no

malice toward anyone. Baltimore treated me very well and I'm sorry I couldn't do the job for them."

Bauer said he had no future plans "at this time" but indications are he won't be out of the major leagues very long.

Before joining Baltimore as a coach in 1963 and taking over as manager in 1964, Bauer managed the old Kansas City Royals.

**Off The Top**

Each year, the caliber of play in the Optimist baseball program shows improvement.

Each year, the improved play of Babe Ruth baseball teams can be observed.

Each year, however, certain playing situations result in playing errors. These situations can be averted by advance planning. Time after time, two particular plays come up which can either make a team look like a polished ball club or a poor team.

Pampa played it right in the Plainview-Pampa baseball game on Tuesday night. A Plainview runner had passed third base and was halfway home when he realized he should have held onto third base. A throw from catcher Joe Foster to third baseman Freddy Harper was made and then Harper wisely held the ball and tagged the runner on a rundown play at home for the out. Only one throw was made.

The ideal situation is one throw which catches the runner returning to the previous base. Too many times, a series of throws are made and errors develop.

Another frequent mishap occurs on a popped up ball. There are many pop ups which one, two or even three infielders may catch. It should be the responsibility of the catcher who has a wide view over all the diamond to call out the infielder who is in the best position to make a catch.

Time after time, fly balls fall between two infielders when an "autorotative quarterback" in the person of the catcher could avert miscalculation.

The pitcher, incidentally, should never catch a high pop fly. There is danger of his being hurt by the catch and it is an unwritten rule in baseball

that fly balls are not to be caught by the pitcher.

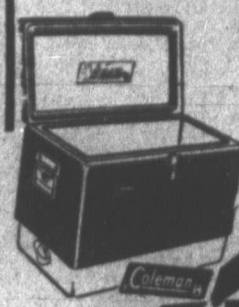

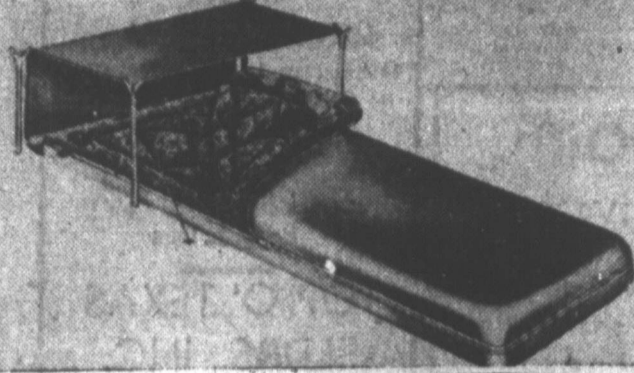
