## Czech Liberals Lead Presidium Re-Organization

PRAGUE (UPI)—Alexander Dubcek, the Czechoslovak Communist Party leader, and his liberal supporters have maneuvered their way to control of a new, expanded 21-member Presidium which had been formed under Kremlin pressure to return pro-Moscow conservatives to power, Czechoslovak Communist Party sources said today.

Dubcek himself spoke only words of cooperation and warning to the Czechoslovak people. He told them in a lengthy communique from the special Central Committee meeting that the price of complete troop withdrawal would include total end to harassment of occupying forces.

But the sources disclosed today that the 24-hour weekend session created an expanded, 21-man Presidium with at least 11 liberal Dubcek supporters. Of the five Communists ousted from the original 11-man body, four were hard-line Stalinists, they said.

The new lineup had the 11 liberals facing only two staunch conservatives, with the remaining eight members divided between "neutrals" and men whose political leanings are unknown.

The conservatives were Vasil Bilak, Dubcek's archrival, and a Kremlin confidante, and Jan Piller.

Strongest surprise for some observers was that two of the four Stalinists dropped from membership were powerful friends of Moscow—Oldrich Svestka, who was also removed as editor of the Communist party newspaper Rude Pravo; and Drahomir Kolder, a man the Soviets once hoped would join Bilak in a puppet government. ## 'Extra Care' Program Given In Local School

"They're just children with special problems," said Mrs. Stan Friend, teacher and administrator of the Satellite Day Care school program.

The program is offered to children who need extra and special care to develop their learning abilities, Mrs. Friend said. The classes are conducted at First Presbyterian church the year around, but follows the public schools' timetable for holidays.

The local class is administered by the Amarillo State Center for Human Development. It is sponsored locally by the Gray County Association for Retarded Children.

Children in the program are ages three to 10, Mrs. Friend said. Currently seven students are in the program, with two more due to start this month.

Placement of children in the program is done on an individual basis, Mrs. Friend noted. Two main steps are usually followed.

First, the child's parents call and inquire about the program and the possibility of enrollment.

Then, the child is seen by a psychologist and a social worker. The decision on whether or not the child is accepted for enrollment is made in Amarillo by H. Russell White, director of the State Center.

Mrs. Friend and her assistants attempt to aid the children on three basic points necessary for increased learning ability and adjustment:

Muscle and motor development, to develop coordination and improve the physical well-being of the child;

Social adjustment, to enable the children to get along with others their age and with other people; and

School readiness, to follow commands, to sit for an extended length of time, to develop concepts of numbers and words and to develop recognition of self.

"We approach all these things in the attitude of fun and games," Mrs. Friend explained.

At the beginning of each class, held from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday, the children play and get acquainted with each other, Mrs. Friend said.

Then, they work on school readiness, which includes vocabulary exercises, listening to

## Leader In Africa May Be Ousted

BRAZZAVILLE (UPI) — President Alphonse Massamba-Debat apparently had been stripped of his powers today by the army-controlled government, diplomatic sources said.

One diplomatic source reported the 47-year-old president of the former French Congo was being held by the army which originally overthrew him in a bloodless coup Aug. 3 and reinstated him a day later when it realized it could not rule the country without him.

The diplomatic sources noted that Massamba-Debat has not made any of his regular broadcasts over the official government radio since last Friday when armed clashes broke out between the army and Cuban-trained youths who support Massamba-Debat.

The army overran a camp housing 300 of the youths and their Cuban advisers Saturday night, but Massamba-Debat has remained silent and out of sight.

## 14 Are Charged With Murder

# US Racial Violence Continues

A white man and a Negro were killed near Berea, Ky., Sunday night in a gunfight between members of the National States Rights party and three carloads of blacks. Fourteen persons, including the head of the party, were charged with murder.

Police said the shooting broke out after a meeting of the States Rights party ended in an abandoned car lot just outside Berea. Police said three carloads of Negroes drove by and fired at the 20 white men in the lot, killing Elza Rucker, 28, Lexington, Ky.

The whites raced to their cars and chased the Negroes, police said, and about 50 shots were fired. George Boggs, 32, a Negro from Berea, was killed in the chase. Three other persons were slightly wounded by stray bullets.

Police arrested Connie Lynch, leader of the States Rights party, and seven other white men; and six Negro men. All were charged with murder. A shakedown of both groups and every car passing through Berea, an eastern Kentucky town of 4,300, turned up a large amount of firearms and ammunition police said.

Violence also broke out during the weekend in St. Paul, Minn.; New York City; Middletown, Conn.; and Newport News, Va.

In Newport News, a Negro man was killed and a policeman badly beaten early Sunday when the officer attempted to arrest a Negro woman for drunkenness in a theater. Police said the woman resisted and a crowd of Negroes beat the policeman, who dropped his gun. A Negro man shot at the policeman with the gun, but was killed by another officer, police said.

An off-duty New York transit patrolman was killed and two housing guards seriously wounded Sunday in a shooting at a housing project in Harlem.

Two persons were arrested in Middletown Sunday when police broke up a march by Negroes protesting the closing of a dance.

St. Paul had its second successive night of violence Saturday when three policemen were wounded by gunfire and 10 persons were arrested.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, recuperating from his seventh serious heart attack, is enjoying light reading and spending part of the time in a semi-sitting position.

Doctors at Walter Reed Army Medical Center said Sunday the 77-year-old general was resting comfortably, occasionally reading from a western novel, and visiting with his wife, Mamie.

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (UPI)—A small plane which vanished without a trace more than five years ago on a flight from Salt Lake City, Utah, to Denver has been discovered in a mountain canyon, officials confirmed Sunday.

The plane carried four persons. Remains of bodies were found in the single-engine plane.

Texas led the nation in Labor Day weekend violence early Monday as at least 3 persons had died in the state's highways.

Another 19 persons had died as a result of homicides, fires, drownings and other causes to lift Texas' violent death toll to at least 49 since the Labor Day weekend started at 6 p.m. Friday.

## 2 Deaths Mar Local Holiday

The Labor Day weekend holiday death toll in Pampa stood at two today with the death this morning of a 59-year-old man from gunshot wounds.

Albert Reece Bourland of 1015 E. Fisher was pronounced dead on arrival at Highland General Hospital at 8:15 a.m. following the shotgun wounding at his home.

A coroner's ruling in the cause of death is pending.

The death followed an incident Sunday morning in which two-year-old Harry James Coulter Jr. of 628 S. Somerville was struck by a car and dragged to the street near 537 or 538 Elm when he was struck by an auto driven by Mrs. Willsona Britt, 58, of 505 Maple. The accident appeared to be unavoidable, investigating officers said.

The child was dragged 3 of a mile before the car was stopped in the 800 block of S. Gray according to police. They said Miss Joe Anne Wallace, 16, of 503 Wilks, stopped the car and told Mrs. Britt the child was under it. Miss Wallace then went to a nearby church where the pastor called police.

Justice of the Peace E. L. Anderson pronounced the child dead at the scene.

A Pampa resident for 17 Mr. A Pampa resident for 17 years, Mr. Bourland was a production engineer for Mobil Oil Co. where he has been employed for 35 years.

Born Feb. 11, 1909 in Quail, he was married to Marguerite Meeh at White Deer on Oct. 15, 1937.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Joe, of Houston; one daughter, Mrs. Jackie Carroll of Panhandle; four brothers, Fred and Ralph, both Quail, Jimmy of McCreia Michocacan, Mexico, and George of Guam; and two sisters, Mrs. D. R. Davis of Port Arthur and Mrs. Carl C. Baldwin of Lamesa.

## Da Nang Shelled

SAIGON (UPI) — The Communists today shelled the heart of Da Nang, South Vietnam's second largest city, for the first time in the war, U.S. spokesmen said.

At least 26 Vietnamese civilians and one South Vietnamese soldier died in the 45-minute barrage that started at 1:50 a.m., the war communique said. Thirty-one 122mm rockets, six feet long and weighing 100 pounds, slammed into the city.

Pressing their current wave of rocket and mortar attacks on major population centers, the guerrilla gunners fired at least eight more rockets into six allied military installations on the outskirts of town, UPI correspondent David Lamb said from Da Nang.

Civilians Wounded  
Another 40 civilians and three South Vietnamese soldiers were wounded in the attacks. Since February of 1967, the Viet Cong have shelled military bases and

## 100,000 Homeless In Devastated Villages

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Government rescue teams today reported more than 20,000 persons dead in two earthquakes in the nation's worst earthquake disaster.

The teams dispatched to the area by plane said more than 50,000 persons had been injured in the quake Saturday and Sunday.

A stunned, sobbing army of more than 100,000 homeless stumbled among the rubble dust and shattered wooden poles that had been their homes in more than 100 towns and villages devastated by the quakes.

Government officials in Tehran confirmed the casualty totals. They said they were awaiting further dispatches through disrupted communications before issuing a formal overall announcement on the toll.

Higher Toll  
The toll of dead, injured and homeless far surpassed that of the nation's last major killer quake which killed 12,000 persons just six years ago.

Worst hit in the weekend quakes was the village of Kakhk which together with another settlement, Dashbayaz, lost more than 6,000 killed out of a population of 8,000, officials said.

An additional 2,000 residents were known to have been killed in the township of Ferdows, hit badly Saturday and then razed by Sunday's second shock wave, responsible sources said.

The Red Lion and Sun Society, Iran's Red Cross, reported 8,222 bodies recovered and 2,962 persons seriously injured in towns near the Soviet-Afghan border hit by the first quake at mid-afternoon Saturday.

Fear Famine, Disease  
Sunday's tremor came as soldiers in combat gear raced against time to stem further deaths from famine, pestilence and the severe cold of the region's nights.

Many of the devastated villages had no communications. No running water, no sanitary facilities. Both quakes centered (See 20,000, Page 3)

She had saved her baby-sitting money to make the trip and had waited a long time in anticipation. But after the asthma attack she thought the visit was not to be.

When the people of HemisFair heard about Mary Jane, they decided to bring the world's fair to her.

Girls from the Korean, Canadian, Arkansas, Italian, Mexican and Belgian pavilions brought presents to the hospital.

Eddie Brillantes, co-owner of the Casa San Miguel restaurant, representing the Philippines, placed a necklace of seeds around the girl's neck and handed her a steaming plate of his country's finest delicacies.

Dick Mac Diarmid, the Irish tenor from the Golden Garter Saloon, pinned an official Golden Garter sheriff's badge on Mary Jane. She was made an official Arkansas Traveler by Glenda Brown of the Arkansas pavilion.

As the people flocked into her room with their gifts, Mary Jane smiled, her eyes glistening with tears.

"This is just too much," she said.

Sunday night Mary Jane was surrounded by costume jewelry, dolls in native costumes and miniature boots from Yugoslavia, a geisha doll from Japan, gold costume jewelry from Spain, coins from Germany, a handcrafted wallet from the Philippines, a leather coin purse from Morocco, a silver necklace from Hong Kong, dolls from Formosa and numerous (See HEMISFAIR, Page 3)

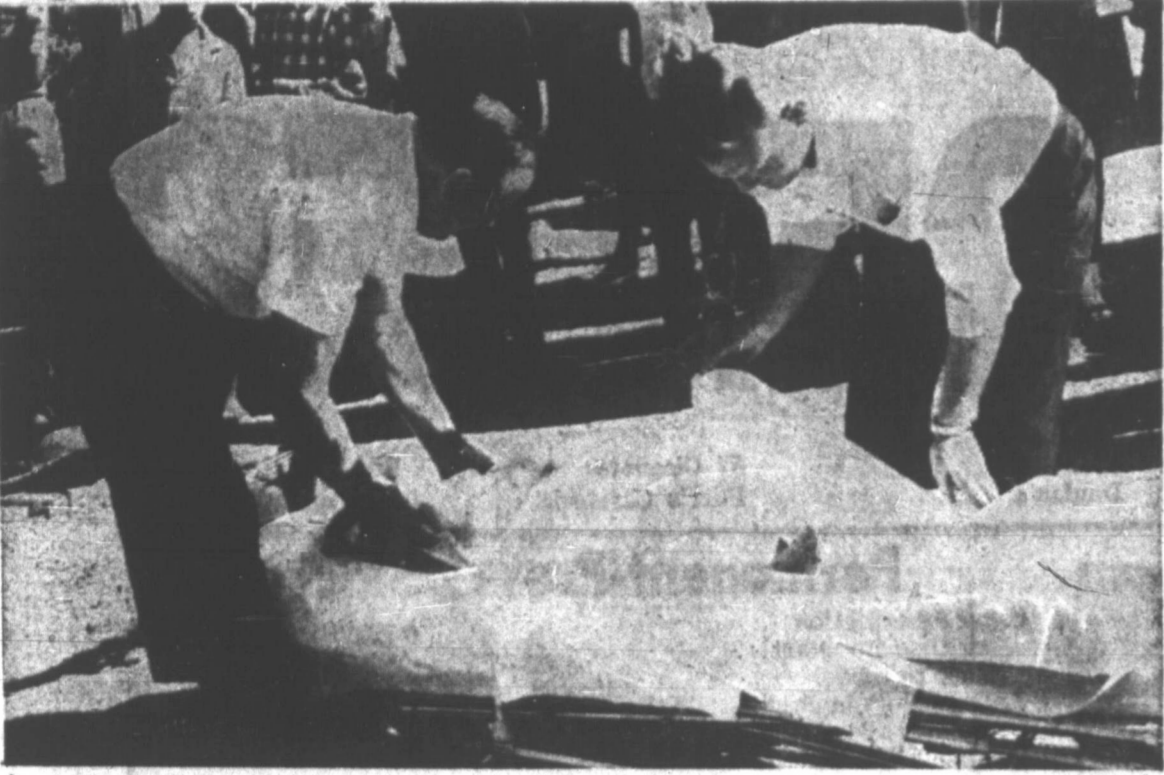

LONDON (UPI)—Liberal Czechoslovak Communist leader Alexander Dubcek has been warned by the Soviets that he is on "probation." He will be ousted if he fails to carry out the Kremlin's dictate to the letter, diplomatic sources said today.  
The Russians allowed Dubcek to return to Prague with the firm understanding he will stick to the Moscow terms and will make Czechoslovaks bow to them.  
But Moscow continues to distrust him and others of his key backers in the government and party leadership and would push him out of power at the first sign that he is wavering, the sources said.  
Having gone to the length of outright military invasion of Czechoslovakia, the Kremlin leaders will have no compunction about taking any or all measures they consider necessary to make Moscow's hard line prevail in Prague, the authoritative diplomatic infor-

ants said.  
A major party purge was expected to be urged by the Soviets within Czechoslovakia in the next few weeks.  
Moscow has already charged Czechoslovak Communist party members have joined the "counter revolutionaries" and are out to split the party and to undermine its ability to act.  
Diplomatic sources said it

souds, recognizing and using colors, and so on. Games are often incorporated into the lessons.  
"We want the child to get a sense of accomplishment," he Mrs. Friend said, "with things he can do and does well."  
Thus, the program attempts to build a series of accomplishments, one on top of another. In this way, success is stressed and encouraged not failure.  
School is held the year around because "children tend to lose so much more over the summer." In the Satellite program, the children participate in field trips and other outside activities, Mrs. Friend said.  
In the past few months, the youngsters involved in the program have visited the downtown area, parks, the fire station, the post office, pet shops and grocery and drug stores.  
This type of activity helps the children to learn to get around, the improve socially and to get acquainted with the community, Mrs. Friend explained.  
Mrs. Friend receives a lot of help from volunteer workers. During the summer, six girls helped with the classes at least three hours each week. Although a girls did no actual teaching, they read stories, cut out materials, organized games and just listened to the children.

The Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda neglected to include any comment on composition of the new presidium in its daily dispatch from Prague. Moscow's immediate reaction was unknown.  
No hint of triumph or impudence could be detected from the communique describing the work of the special Central Committee meeting, which also brought 80 new members into the over-all Central Committee. Sources said they were mostly party functionaries who would follow whatever orders they received.  
Dubcek instead told his people the terms of a Soviet troop withdrawal, which would take place in three stages, is quiet obedience and cooperation on their part.  
He also ticked off a list of "necessary" acts of discipline that reverse major points of the liberalization process he started last January—press censorship, legal suppression of non-Communist political groups and economic reliance upon Moscow.

Exactly what kind of an attack was expected was not disclosed by U.S. military officials. Saigon has been preparing for another Communist offensive for several weeks.  
Moments after the attack on Da Nang began, U.S. planes swept aloft despite heavy clouds and dropped flares which bathed the city of 230,000 in an eerie red glow—a precaution against a follow-up ground attack.  
The shelling followed two successive nights of Communist rocket barrages into Pleiku, biggest city in the Central Highlands, and coincided with the shelling of Tam Ky, a provincial capital about 50 miles down the coast from Da Nang.

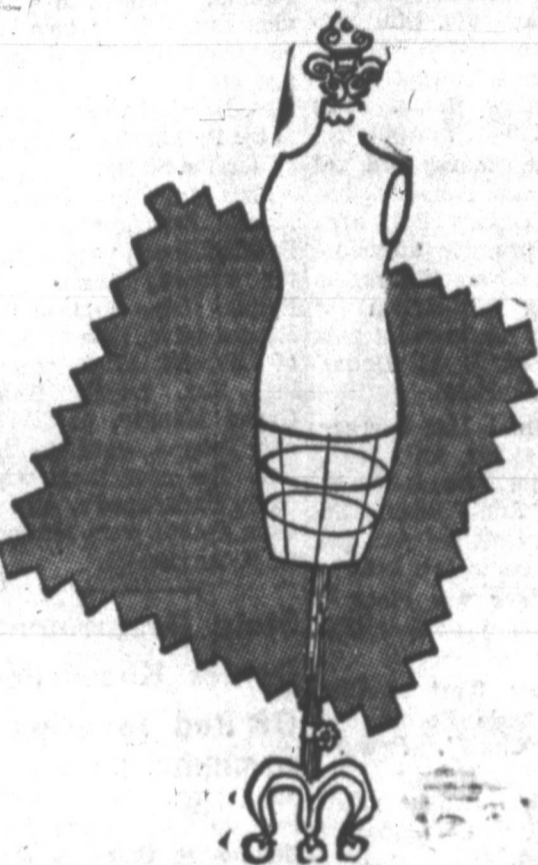

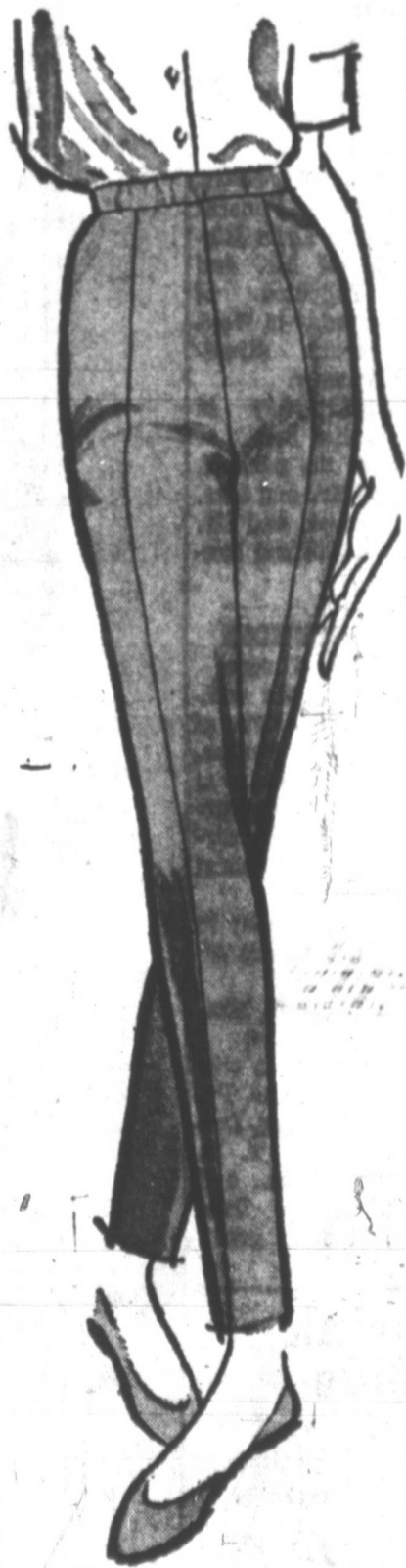

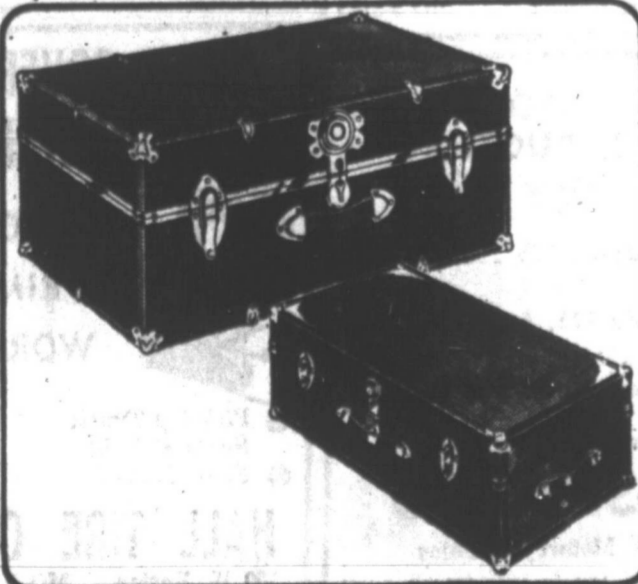

## Heart Patient Is Now 'Salesman' For Transplants

HOUSTON (UPI) — Everett C. Thomas, a Houston trust consultant, who won worldwide attention as a pioneer U.S. heart transplant patient, is keeping his promise of three months ago to become a heart transplant salesman.

The tall, balding Thomas, 47, a former Phoenix, Ariz., accountant, received the heart of a 15-year-old housewife and suicide victim on May 3.

In sharp contrast to a life of restless nights, burning inhalation and weakness, Thomas, tanned from a summer of relaxation, today has a captivating sales pitch and is living proof of the relatively experimental operation he is trying to sell. Thomas told the Houston Jaycees recently that he "had to gain academic abilities because I couldn't run up and down hills," so was graduated from college when he was 28.

**Before Operation**  
Relating a history of heart problems, Thomas led up to events preceding the transplant operations, which gave him the longest post surgery life of any U.S. transplant patient.

"My cardiologist indicated in a letter that calcification might be found," when open heart surgery was performed to replace his damaged valves, he said. "He said I would have two alternatives. They could sew me back up or try a transplant. "I have this strange philosophy. I had no idea this thing could fail," said Thomas. "Is it my heart?" I asked my wife when I awoke. (after the transplant). "well, it is now," she said. "After the operation, 'everybody gets this feeling, like they could whip the world. 'Feels like a million dollars' is an expression already overused, but it is such a change. The memory of

pain disappears... and they (transplant patients) soon realize they have to slow down.

**Weekly Checkups**  
"I am going to the hospital about once a week now," Thomas said, continuing with a slightly detailed description of his medication.

Presidents of the Houston will become the transplant capital of the world, Thomas included a torrent of praise for Dr. Denton Cooley, St. Luke's Hospital and the heart transplant team, as well as his employer, Medical Center National Bank. "The concept of a living organ bank... at the bank of information," is now a possibility, he explained. "It would record an individual's next skin, blood and tissue type by location. The concept is a tremendous one, and it would give donors a place to record this tremendous desire (to give)," Thomas said.

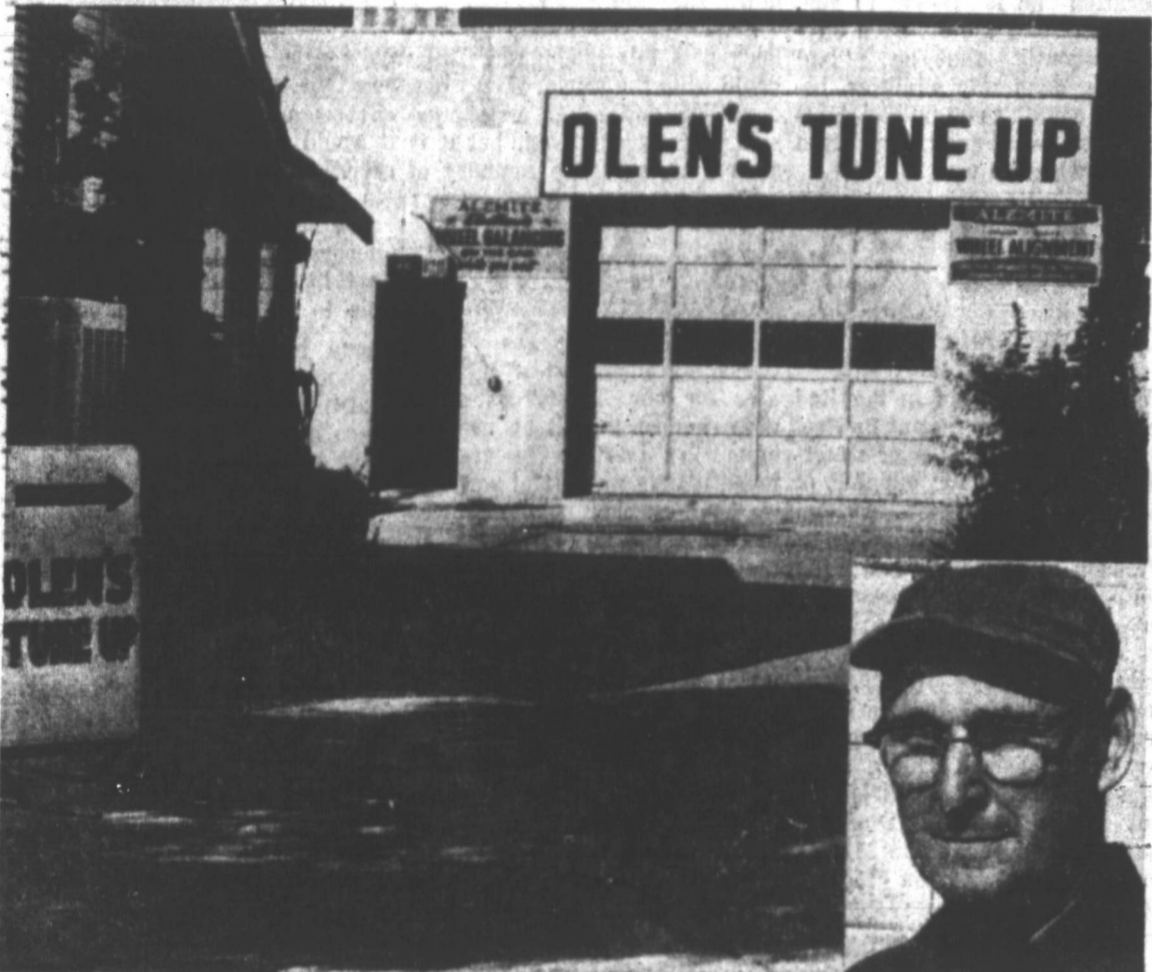

## Some Changes Are Seen In Future Heart Transplants For The Young

HOUSTON (UPI) — Dr. Denton A. Cooley reports that the Houston heart transplant team will attempt another operation in the future similar to the one performed on Maria Giannaris, 5, who died Aug. 25.

But he said there would be some slight changes made after study of the recent case.

Cooley, interrupting a Mexican vacation for the second time, told a news conference the chief change would be the use of anti-rejection drugs preceding the operation by a few days or a week and giving a heavier dosage after the operation.

He said all indications pointed to rejection as the cause of death in the child. She was the team's ninth heart transplant patient.

Cooley said surgeons, hospital administrators and other specialists conferred Wednesday afternoon on the girl's case. She died seven days and 18 hours after receiving the heart of an 11-year-old Lafayette Ind., boy.

"It's possible that children have stronger rejection capabilities," Cooley said. "We do know they have more lymphoid tissue in the body."

He said the girl's death "was a surprise to us that the heart stopped so quickly." But he said it did not daunt his faith in such operations.

"We believe that cardiac transplantation can be successful in children and undoubtedly will be successful."

### Medders Family Remembers Days Of 'Big Parties' On Their Farm

MUENSTER, Tex. (UPI)—Ernest and Margaret Medders are quietly spending the summer in seedy splendor on a monthly income that totals just about what they used to spend on a backyard barbecue when their credit was good. "They certainly are not living too high on the hog," John L. Sullivan, one of their lawyers, said today. Their income totals about \$360 a month from Social Security for a circulatory ailment that prevents Medders from working and what they can pick up by renting out the land of Colonial Acres, their farm. The Medders are the couple who borrowed nearly \$2 million from the Poor Sisters of St. Francis of the Perpetual Adoration at Mishawaka, Ind. The Poor Sisters thought the Medders would more than repay the loan when he won a suit to be declared an heir to the Spindletop Oil Field. **Lose Suit**

Medders failed to win the suit and when the Poor Sisters heard about it they stopped the loans. The Medders turned to banks, which also eventually decided they were poor risks. Before the bubble burst in February, 1967, they had put Muenster on the map with fabulous parties for the cream of Texas Society in their \$50,000 "party barn." The Medders, with their four children, live in a \$129,000 house on the 185 acres of their Colonial Acres farm. Their other farms were sold to help satisfy their creditors. But Federal Referee in Bankruptcy Joe D. Hufstutler ruled last February that they could keep Colonial Acres as a "homestead," along with one Cadillac and a pickup truck. Sullivan and Jack Gray, partners in a Denton law firm, have been defending the Medders since they got into trouble. The lawyers discourage the Medders from talking to reporters. **Isolate Couple** "We have been trying to keep them as isolated as possible until we get all their court cases cleaned up," Sullivan said. Colonial Acres is not kept nearly as neat as it used to be. "They have tried not to let it go to the dogs, but they do have help the way they use to," Sullivan said. Eugene Riggs, Mrs. Medders' son by former marriage, is taking care of other people's estate on Colonial Acres. Riggs lives across the road from the Medders' mansion. Mrs. Medders' four children—Ernest Medders—Frank, Sara, Mary and Cathy—have spent the summer at home. Cathy is supposed to attend Texas Woman's University this fall. Sarah and Mary will go to school in Muenster.

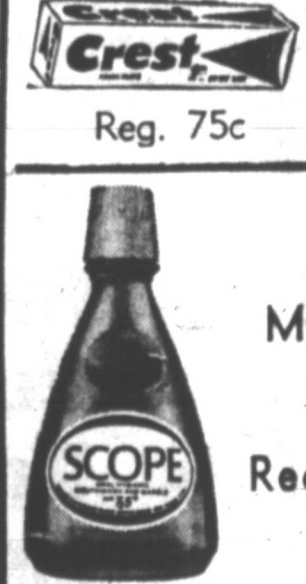

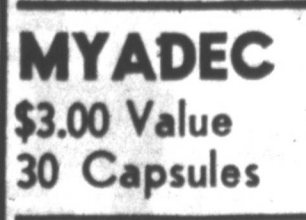

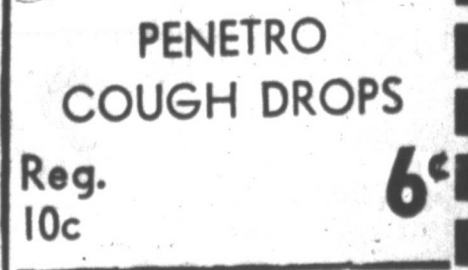

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# Highlights and Sidelights From the State Capitol

AUSTIN, Texas — Traditionally Austin has been the headquarters site for Texas campaigns of presidential candidates. But George Wallace's official campaign headquarters (American Independent Party) now is located 49 miles to the south, in New Braunfels.

It was moved from the capital city to within 30 minutes' drive of the office of the party's state chairman, Bard Logan of San Antonio. This move is significant—especially to those 600,000 Texans who are expected to vote for Wallace in November.

When the state executive committee of the American Party decided to replace Miss Jane Sumner of Austin with Jack Zenger of New Braunfels; named Sam Rains of Austin as treasurer, replacing Mrs. Margaret Bacon of Austin; and removed Mrs. Jewell Lemons of San Antonio from the committee, charges of "Birch-ism" were hurled. Miss Sumner ran for Congress on Republican ticket in 1966 and Mrs. Bacon had served as secretary to Liberal democrat Franklin Spears of San Antonio during Spears' 1966 bid for State Attorney Gen-

eral.

"It's not the Birch people that are causing the trouble," Chairman Logan says. "It's the anti-Birch people. They were all looking for Birchers when they were getting signatures to get Wallace on the ballot. Now that the job has been done, they seem to want to fight."

Logan said he didn't think the internecine battle would harm Wallace's Texas campaign, and Mrs. Bacon said she still intends to work for votes for Alabama's former Governor.

Wallace will be in the state Sept. 16 to speak at a \$25-a-plate fund-raising dinner in Dallas on the eve of the American party's Sept. 17 state convention there. He's also scheduled to speak to the convention.

**GUBERNATORIAL CAMPAIGNS HEAT UP**—LT. Gov. Preston Smith's announcement that he would not go to the National Democratic Convention in Chicago because he would rather use that time to get better acquainted with delegates to the State Democratic Convention, to be held in Austin Sept. 17, came as something of a surprise.

Put it's not the first time Smith instinctively has steered clear of battles within the party—as the Chicago scene was sure to be. He has gained some wide-spread and rather unexpected support from liberal Texas Democrats because he refused to go with Gov. John Connally, then Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Speaker Ben Barnes to head off a migrant workers' march to Austin two years ago.

Smith, however, says he is serious about wanting to meet and talk to state convention delegates because he wants to command the convention. The September state convention is known as the "governor's convention." It will be interesting to see who wins control

—the man who is governor now or the man who is the Democratic nominee.

There's no doubt among Republicans that the star of their state convention in Fort Worth on Sept. 17 will be GOP gubernatorial candidate Paul Eggers. Eggers is running a hard race against Smith.

**CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION RECOMMENDATIONS** — While Texas Democrats are taking a stormy role in nominating a presidential candidate in Chicago, a potentially historic event will be unfolding on the home front.

In a three-day Austin meeting this week, State Constitutional Revision Commission is wrapping up its final recommendations for a new Texas constitution.

Sub-committees completed their year-long studies last month.

Fireworks were anticipated on these proposals:

Four year terms for governors and all other statewide officials who now have two year terms (Recommendation would prohibit direct succession to a second term by the governor).

Constitutional change that would also give the governor power to remove and replace appointees to boards and commissions.

A requirement that state senate closed-door sessions on appointments by the governor be abolished.

Authority for the legislature to instruct courts as to how they will handle appeals from state administrative agency actions.

Provisions for county home rule and optional plans for consolidation of political subdivisions and functions within a county.

Appointment of Supreme Court and Court of Appeals judges by the governor from a nominating commission slate of three.

Easier access to courts for taxpayers protesting assessments.

Recommendations agreed on by the revision commission must go to the legislature next year. Legislature then can submit all or any part of the recommendations to the voters—or reject them entirely.

Aside from its recommendations of minor controversial nature, commission has made a good-faith effort to tighten and streamline the constitution and chop out long-recognized dead wood.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Connally reappointed three members of the Pan American College Board of Regents to terms expiring in 1973. They are Lou Hassel of Houston, Leonel Garza of Brownsville, and McAllen Attorney Morris Atlas.

Then the Governor named Dan Eddy of Dallas to the Good Neighbor Commission to serve out the term of the late Walter McBee of Dallas. Eddy, a Salvation Army official, has been credited with establishing the Salvation Army in Mexico, and served there previously as Army Field representative.

House Speaker Barnes named these committees:

To study election laws — Reps. Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi, James D. Cole of Greenville, Russell Cummings of Houston, Rayford Price of Palestine

and J. W. Srouf of Dallas.

To study recreational water safety — Reps. Ben Atwell of Dallas, J. D. Weidon of Port

Arthur, Gerhardt A. Schulle of San Marcos, Bill T. Sanson of Houston and Leroy Wieling of Portland.

To assist in a study to determine the feasibility of creating a Texas stock exchange — Reps. David Finney of Fort Worth, Don Caviness of Austin and Dick McKissack of Dallas.

C. R. Baskin will be new acting chief engineer of the Texas

Water Development Board, succeeding John J. Vandertulp who is joining the International Boundary and Water Commission in El Paso as principal engineer.

Texas Department of Mental Health-Mental Retardation has transferred Wichita Falls State Hospital Superintendent Dr. Wilford Segerson to that post at Austin State Hospital.

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

DEAR POLLY — Several articles have been printed recently advising baby sitters on their duties, but none that I have read gave advice for the sitter's safety. Baby sitters, either day or night, should be warned not to let anyone in the house "to use the telephone." Keep all doors locked. Inspect the basement before taking the job. Never accompany any workman to the basement if alone in the house. Always see that the door leading to the basement is kept locked and bolted.

DEAR POLLY — Mine is the simplest of Pointers and costs practically nothing. Tie a rubber band on each side of the top part of your wire coat hangers to keep filmy blouses and

wide-necked dresses from slipping off.

DEAR POLLY — I am answering the lady who had a ball point pen in her husband's shirt pocket go through a batch of washing. I had a similar experience with a red ball point pen going through the washing of colored clothes. I was laundering a new dress for the first time and it received most of the damage. There was a red spot about the size of a football across the front. A friend told me to put the dress in a pan, pour rubbing alcohol over the spot and keep squeezing it through the dress, changing the alcohol until all of the spot came out. I did that, rewashed it and the dress looks like new. Alcohol can be used to spot remove ball point ink from shirts, too.

DEAR GIRLS—Inks vary so... and often several things have to be tried before one works—even to using color remover. De-natured alcohol is also recommended for use on ball point ink spots. No matter what you try, first experiment on an inconspicuous spot or another piece of the same material to which you have applied the same ink. Sometimes just bleaching will remove ink from white shirts.

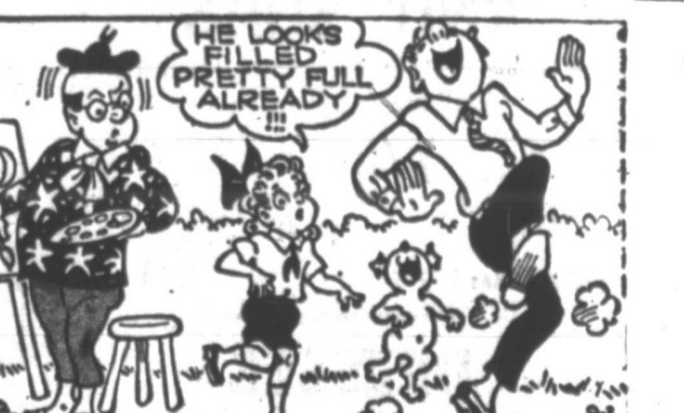

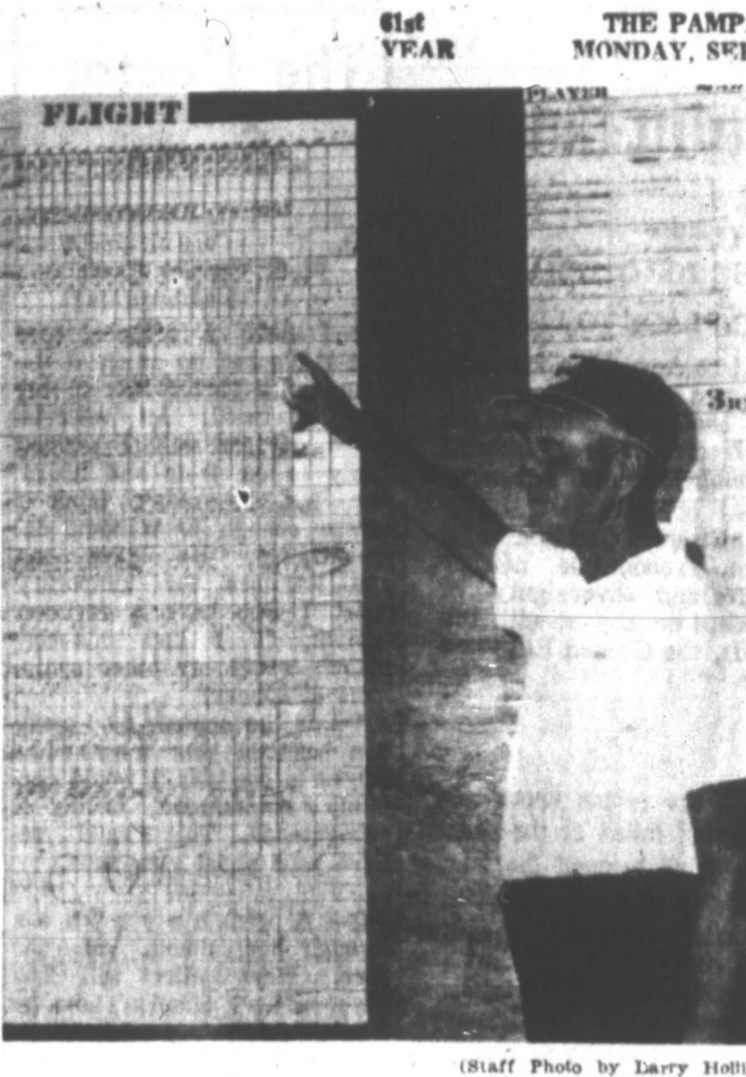

## Employers Are 'Fed Up' With Second-Rate Secretaries

NEW YORK (UPI)—Take a letter, Miss Jones. There are some 2.5 million of you in the nation's offices. You're the secretaries and stenographers without which business and industry, no matter what the size, would not operate. And more of you are needed.

But the employer is getting fed up with second-rate secretaries, no matter how great the shortage of women with your particular skills. And some of the really efficient secretaries also are fed up with the price the inefficient ones are making them pay in prestige, respect and recognition.

**Repeated Complaints**  
Among the repeated complaints are these: Time wasted in the ladies' room, can't spell, clock watching, unnecessary interruption of brain-storming boss, acting the prima donna, ineptness on the telephone, lack of interest in the job, but plenty of interest in the men.

Now before the 2.5 million of you, good or bad, haul off and clobber me, Miss Jones, let it be said these are views from management's suite, not mine. They were compiled by

Patricia van Olinda, a former secretary with a book publishing company. Miss van Olinda, schooled at Allegheny College and Hofstra University, asked "What wrong with secretaries?" of bosses, secretarial supervisor, employment agencies and personnel experts. Her findings are in the current Today's Secretary, a publication for the white collar girl. Miss van Olinda is its managing editor.

**Not Dedicated**  
Listen to the words of an executive secretary in a suburban public school system who's been supervising a secretarial staff for more than 10 years: "Present day secretaries have no sense of dedication or responsibility. Inefficiency is shruggled off; they don't seem to care if they make an error... and they don't have any thought of giving an honest day's work for an honest day's pay."

Or, how about this chastening from an executive with a national temporary office help company: "The big problem with secretaries is a lack of flexibility... secretaries are prima donnas—they're afraid to get their hands dirty."

## Commission Would Okay Texas Taxpayers' Appeals To The Courts

AUSTIN (UPI)—Texas taxpayers who think they have received an unfair tax assessment should have the right to appeal their cases in the courts, a commission revising the state constitution has decided.

The commission, which completed its discussions of the "new" constitution Wednesday, included a section in the state's tax laws "to guarantee to taxpayers the legal right to relief from an unjust and unfair tax assessment."

"Because court review is precluded in most cases, the door is open to abuse of the power of taxation," the report on the new section commented. "By and large the near-absolute power of local tax officials is not abused, but who would say there should not be a legal remedy when it is abused?" To obtain relief in tax cases under the present law, the taxpayer must prove that instances of "fraud and illegality" have occurred, the report said. "The typical aggrieved taxpayer who can establish nothing more than excessive, unequal valuation has no legal right to relief." The commission added an amendment that the taxpayer who contests his assessment and appeals to court must still pay his taxes while the suit is being determined. If he wins his suit, the court will return the excess amount to him with 6 per cent interest from the date of payment.
