Religious Barriers

ATHENS (UPI) - Informed sources said Saturday religious barriers to the wedding of Jacqueline Kennedy and Aristotle Onassis apparently have been cleared. They said the marriage Sunday will be recognized as valid by both the Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox church.

There had been some confusion among laymen and churchmen over Onassis' divorce in Alabama eight years ago by his

first wife. As a Catholic, Mrs. Kennedy is bound by church law holding that marriage to a divorced person is "an adulterous union" rather than true Christian matrimony. Vatican legal experts said Friday she would be regarded as a "public sinner" in the eves of the church if the Greek Orthodox church did not recognize the Onassis divorce. On Saturday, a church spokesman said Mrs. Onassis obtained an ecclestical divorce (See RELIGIOUS, Page 3)




