





Personal Income In New Increase

WASHINGTON Personal income of Americans again registered a sharp rise in August, pushing the annual rate to \$694.2 billion—\$60 billion higher than the rate at the same time in 1967.

The Commerce Department said reports the August gain was more than \$5 billion, figured on an annual basis. It was the fourth consecutive month that the rate rose by about \$5 billion.

The report listed an August payroll rise of \$3.5 billion which followed rises of \$3 billion in July and more than \$4 billion in each of the two preceding



Economic development, not religion, divides high and low birth rate nations. Developed countries, regardless of religion, tend toward low birth levels, underdeveloped toward high.

Dallas Baptist Pastor Fighting For 'Open Door' Policy in Church

By PAUL K, HARRAL DALLAS (UPI)-When W. A. Criswell was a small boy he slugged another child who tried to insult him by calling him a "little Bible reader."

As pastor of the 15,000 member First Baptist Church of Dallas and president of the Southern Baptist Convention today, he is still a fighter.

From the pulpit he fights for what he thinks is right. Under his leadership the First Baptist Church has shrugged off the usual curse of a downtown location to grow into a dedicated, family-centered church. It is also the largest Eaptist Church in the world.

Developments have been rapid in recent months for the church. Birthday No. 100 It celebrated its 100th an-

niversary, burned its mortgages and immediately launched a massive building program.

It heard its pastor give the reasons he decided to allow his name be placed in nomination for president of the SBC.

And it heard him declare the church one of "the open door"open to anyone, regardless of his color, who wanted to worship or join.



"Are ye able . . . " Matt. 20:22


Prodded by a fond mother James and John asked for the place in the kingdom. Their demand was quite in accordance with the spirit of the time — and all times. The desire for distinction is no uncommon trait. It is as natural as human nature. The lesson Jesus must teach them was that selfseeking, like many other natural thing, had no place in his kingdom.

He says in effect: True greatness in the kingdom is not to be attained by favoritism or political wire pulling. If you want to be great be a servant; if you wish to be a first be a slave. Here is a complete set of values which was brought into life. "Are ye able?" he asks, "to drink of the cup that I shall drink of?" They answer stoutly, "We are able." But Jesus' "Ye know not what ye ask" tells us that they were like children speaking of things beyond their grasp.

"Are ye able?" It is a practical question. How far are we able to live up to the best we know? How often are we able to give the soft answer which turneth away from wrath? How far are we able to carry on in the path of duty though there be never a word of praise from a living soul? How far can we motivate our lives by "Whosoever shall be chief among you, let him be your servant?" What kind of performance do we put on when we are critized justly or unjustly.

How staunchly would we be able to stand up under persecution? A little pinch of incense on Caesar's alter? Or Luther's "Here I stand,, I can do no other?"

It is questions like these which point us to the Master's word. "To sit on my right hand, and on my left, is not mine to give, it shall be given to them for whom it is prepared . . ." The prepared are those who are "able."
