Czechs Demonstrate Against Reform Loss

PRAGUE (UPI) — College students across the nation occupied their classroom buildings today in protest against the Czechoslovak Communist party abandoning its reform program under Soviet invasion pressure. The students voted for a three-day occupation of Prague's ancient Charles University a few hours after being briefed on the outcome of a vital party central committee meeting that ended Sunday. Students in Brno followed suit. Campus strikes already were in progress in Olomouc and at the agricultural college in Suchdol, near Prague. Although the main points of the central committee's decisions were not immediately made public, early indications were that many of the ambitious reforms begun in April were formally abandoned. Among the reforms either eliminated or watered down were expected to be press freedom, travel freedom, the use of factory workers councils and measures for making the party's internal politics more Democratic. Actions that were immediately announced by the party included the creation of a powerful "executive committee" made up of eight top leaders who will have wide powers to make "urgent" decisions and to oversee the crucial program of placing party functionaries in key jobs. The student strike organizers listed 10 demands, covering

most of the lost reforms, which they said must be met. The 10-point protest said nothing about the Soviet Union. But the final item showed disapproval for the Aug. 21 invasion of Czechoslovakia by Soviet-led forces of the Warsaw Pact. "In the field of foreign policy, there can be no participation in actions which are at variance with the feelings of the Czechoslovak people, the U.N. charter and the U.N. declaration of human rights," it said.

Western Reds Demand Greater Policy Influence

BUDAPEST (UPI)—Western Communist parties who will need years to recover political losses suffered when the Russians invaded Czechoslovakia are demanding greater influence over Moscow's foreign policy decisions. The nonruling Communist parties complain they were given no warning in advance that Soviet, Polish, East German, Hungarian and Bulgarian military intervention was being planned to reverse the reforms that broke out in Czechoslovakia after the downfall of Stalinist dictator Antonin Novotny in January. Since the invasion Aug. 21, the western parties add, they have been given too little explanation. In sum, they say, their struggle against "imperialism" has lost credibility because their spiritual leader violated Czechoslovak national sovereignty.

The issue is being fought out here this week in a session of the 58-nation preparatory conference established to lay the groundwork for an eventual summit gathering of all the world's Communist party leaders. Sources close to the conference say the nonruling parties are complaining that Moscow ignored their interests when it invaded Czechoslovakia, and that it could possibly have chosen some other method of dealing with the problem. The Russians reply that overriding consideration had to be given to the possibility that the Communist party was losing control in Czechoslovakia, and that counterrevolutionary elements were on the verge of removing that country from the "Socialist camp."

U.S. Still Firm on Having Saigon to Attend Talks

Thieu May Announce Formal Acceptance

PARIS (UPI) — The United States has firmly cautioned South Vietnam it is not prepared to scuttle its secret agreements with Hanoi and equally firmly asked Saigon to come to the conference table, allied diplomats reported today. Saigon has balked at attending any meeting at which the Viet Cong wouldn't attend as an equal and has proposed that the South Vietnamese government replace the United States as leader of the Western delegation. The diplomats said Washington told Saigon it could not constitutionally accept taking a backseat at the table. The disclosure coincided with a new wave of unofficial reports President Nguyen Van Thieu would reshuffle his cabinet to strengthen his own position before announcing a formal acceptance of the standing invitation and attend the talks. Reports in Saigon said Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky probably would lead the Saigon delegation. Diplomats generally said they agreed. With fresh assurance from Washington that the Viet Cong's presence at the conference table does not mean recognition of the guerrillas, South Vietnam was expected to change its mind and send negotiators to the talks here, the diplomats said. The diplomats cited as further evidence that the talks may soon open the journey here by Le Duc Tho, the North Vietnamese Communist party politburo member who is regarded as the real power in the Hanoi delegation. Tho stopped in Moscow Sunday night after an earlier layover in Peking on his trip back here from Hanoi. Each of his previous journeys to Paris has signalled progress in the diplomatic effort to end the Vietnam war. His first trip led to secret U.S.-North Vietnamese contacts on arranging talks. His second visit led to the Nov. 1 U.S. halt in bombing North Vietnam and the invitation for the South Vietnamese and their arch foe, the Hanoi-backed Viet Cong guerrillas, to enter the talks. The Viet Cong delegates were here. Saigon has boycotted the talks, saying it cannot come until it gets assurance the Viet Cong will not be an equal delegation but merely part of the Hanoi talk team. The United States has said that will be the case. Thieu, in his interview, gave the Communist side of the dispute, that the Viet Cong will be a separate delegation. "We have had no agreement with the United States on a two-party-of-your-side-our-side formula. We have agreed with the United States on the holding of a four-party conference. . . . "In due time, it will be a four-party conference to discuss a peaceful settlement of the Vietnam problem." Thieu said. However, diplomatic sources said the U.S.-backed "your side-our side" loose arrangement probably will be used in order to get the talks going. TRADING 'HIGHLY NERVOUS'

De Gaulle Awaits Reaction As Franc Faces Devaluation

PARIS (UPI)—The French franc wobbled in Europe's money markets today. Bankers awaited word on how President Charles de Gaulle with American and allied aid will act to save his currency from possible devaluation. Trading in francs in Western European capitals ranged from calm to highly nervous. In Brussels, financial sources said Belgian banks have stopped all private trading in francs. In Lisbon, two major banks refused today to buy the French currency. Bankers looked to Basel where U.S., British, West German, Japanese and other capitalist banking powers this morning ended a weeklong crisis conference on the franc. There was unofficial word the West Germans, this continent's richest nation, might loan De Gaulle \$1.1 billion to save the franc. Other reports said the French rejected the offer because the Germans wanted some political payment in return. The superpower bankers announced no decision. A spokesman said only, "if there is to be a credit for France of the kind given to Britain in the past it is up to the French and not us to make the announcement." No French announcement was expected before De Gaulle's prime minister makes a scheduled nationwide broadcast tonight. In the money markets—where speculators tend to sell weak

currency and buy strong money—French banking sources said the Paris foreign exchange market trading in francs was "very stable." In London, the often weak British pound rose on the market and little trading was done in francs. In West Germany and Switzerland, some banks put limits on the amount of francs that they would buy. But in other capitals, such as Copenhagen, franc trading was generally normal despite last week's massive selling of the French currency. In Paris, a spokesman for the American Chase Manhattan Bank said, "I would say people are sitting on their hands waiting for an announcement tonight by the Premier." In Brussels, bank sources said quotations on selling and buying francs has been halted. They reported some panic, several banks hiring taxis and autos to carry their francs over the border to France where—in case of devaluation—the French banknotes will retain their face value. A major Brussels travel agency said it had "strict" orders not to buy or sell francs. In Italy, however, Rome banks today handled the French currency in normal fashion when doors opened. In Paris financiers watched to see if the franc continued to be dumped on the currency markets and if Frenchmen grabbed for more gold on the bullion market. In Basel, Switzerland, slipping through hotel kitchens in a vain attempt to escape attention, banking chiefs of the United States, West Germany, Britain, Japan and other nations met and discussed how to aid the franc as they did the dollar and the pound in the past year. **Message To People** Premier Maurice Couve de Murville was scheduled to make a national broadcast tonight. He was expected to announce save-the-franc austerity measures, hints of which were leaked to Paris newspapers over the weekend. It was all very embarrassing for De Gaulle. Banking sources said he had the gold and reserves in government vaults to withstand the run on the franc. But political observers said it was an ordeal for the president (See DE GAULLE, Page 3)

New Flu Vaccine To Be Made For Hong Kong Type

ATLANTA (UPI)—A vaccine will be available later this month against the new Hong Kong strain of flu, the National Communicable Disease Center (NCDC) reported. Dr. David J. Spencer, director of the center, said Sunday a major drug company is expected to announce within a few days availability of the drug. He said the chronically ill and elderly will be encouraged first to be vaccinated against the new strain flu, first discovered in the United States last September. He said the two groups are the most vulnerable to complications resulting from flu attacks. Spencer said about seven drug companies have been working on a drug to fight the disease since the first sizeable outbreak in the United States in Needles, Calif., where more than 200 students were stricken. He said unconfirmed reports of the flu have also been received from Colorado and New Jersey.

Nixon Renewing Administration Transition Plans

MIAMI (UPI)—After a quiet, restful weekend, President-elect Richard M. Nixon renewed his talent search today in discussions with the manager of his future White House staff. Others talks were aimed at bringing into the Nixon administration one of the president-elect's key campaign aides, Communications Director Herbert Klein. In a nationwide television interview Sunday, Klein said he had been offered a policymaking post, but added that he had not yet decided to accept. Klein, on leave from the San Diego Union where he was editor, said if he decided to reject the post, he would return to "private enterprise." He declined to discuss the offer in detail. Nixon, who spent most of the weekend alone in a rented house on nearby Key Biscayne, began "transition" discussions today with several of the aides he brought with him from New York, including H.R. Haldeman, his assistant in charge of White House management. Klein said Nixon's first chore as president would be to win over the confidence of the nation "through a very personalized leadership." He said it was "premature" to discuss possible members in the Nixon cabinet, but did say "Negroes will have a big role" and be chosen on the basis of their qualifications. There will be no quota system, he said.

Communist Troops Cross DMZ Despite Agreements at Talks

SAIGON (UPI)—A South Vietnamese general today said North Vietnamese troops are driving across the border Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) despite Paris talk arrangements. Allied forces 100 miles south of the frontier killed 282 Communists and slashed a terror spree in the city of Da Nang in weekend battling. In Da Nang, Lt. Gen. Hoang Xuan Lam, South Vietnamese commander of his nation's five northern provinces, told UPI correspondent Perry Young the North Vietnamese are pushing south over the DMZ in company-sized units. "Now that we've stopped the bombing (of North Vietnam), they are still operating in the southern side," the general said. He called it Hanoi's "winter campaign plan." According to diplomats in Paris, Hanoi had agreed to de-escalate its war machine in the DMZ in order to get Paris settlement talks underway. But in the past 48 hours, Lam said, the Communists had shelled or launched ground attacks against 45 cities or military camps in the northern provinces, most of them around Da Nang or to the south. **Attack Marine Camp**

The Communists sent a 15-round mortar barrage into a U.S. Marine supply camp north of Da Nang today and attacked South Korean soldiers guarding a village on its southern doorstep. Battlefield reports said the South Koreans drove off the Reds in hand-to-hand combat, killing 18. Seven Koreans died and two were wounded in the fighting east of Dien Ban, 16 miles south of Da Nang. Dien Ban was the focal point of two battles Sunday in which Lam's South Vietnamese forces reported killing 233 Communists. They took "light" losses in one battle and suffered eight killed and 32 wounded in the second. The battling followed a Viet Cong threat to turn Da Nang itself into a battlefield. Before dawn Sunday, Communists attacked a police station and bombed a bridge, a police outpost and a Buddhist school inside the city. Four South Vietnamese policemen were

Tornadoes, Snow Hit the Nation, More Forecast

A large storm system, which already has covered Duluth, Minn., with 1 1/2 feet of snow, headed eastward today, threatening to add to the snow woes of New England. A collision of cold air and warm air systems in the Deep South spawned destructive tornadoes across parts of Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia, injuring at least 14 persons. The U.S. Weather Bureau issued heavy snow warnings of three to four inches in advance of the storm system which moved across northern Michigan before dawn. Half a foot already was on the ground in the upper Peninsula, but the snowfall was not expected to be as heavy as that which fell on Duluth. Travelers warnings were in effect for the northeast from upstate New York across to Maine, covering an area where heavy snows last week created havoc even at ski resorts which opened early. Cold rain and drizzle mixed with the snow to create slick roads all across the northern border from the Dakotas to New England. Below the snow line, rain fell across the Ohio Valley and mid-Atlantic states, in the Southeast and in the Deep South where it hampered efforts to clean up following Sunday's tornadoes. Two inches of rain fell within a six-hour period at Birmingham, Ala., about 50 miles north of Clanton in Chilton County where nine of the 14 injuries were reported. Two twisters caused relatively light damage in Hebron and Raleigh, Miss., and uprooted trees and a house trailer were the only damage done by a tornado that struck Athens, Ga. The South's twisters were caused in part by an invasion of Arctic air which pierced the middle of the country and met the warm Gulf air over the Southeast. The Arctic invasion bore overnight temperatures as low as the 3 below zero reading reported at Hauru Mont.

For the fifth consecutive year, Pampa High School's yearbook, The Harvester, has won the Medalist award presented by Columbia Scholastic Press Association of New York, according to Miss Elizabeth Hurley, publications advisor. No more than 10 per cent of the yearbooks entered in the national judging may win this award. Judges awarded the Harvester 924 out of a possible 1,000 points, and judged the book on its design, theme, coverage, photography, advertising and creativity. The winning yearbook, the 1968 edition, was edited by Vickie Elsheimer, Sherrell Land, a senior and co-editor this year, was associate editor last year.

Theft in Postal System

The extent of the crime wave which has swept over the Nation's Capital was dramatically pointed up last week when a Republican Congressman disclosed that one of the country's largest cathedrals has been the victim of mail thefts amounting to some \$25,000.

The above is an exact quote from an article entitled "Brown Asks Congress to Investigate Charity Mail Theft Scandal in Capital" in the Oct. 21, 1968 issue of the Republican Congressional Committee Newsletter. Intended, one must assume, to point up the disgraceful condition of the Post Office Department under a democratic administration and, thus, garner votes for the Republicans in the recent election, the article, from which we shall quote at greater length, is especially appropriate now that the shoe is on the other foot and responsibility for the patronage ridden, deficit accumulating postal bureaucracy rests squarely in the Republican lap.

At the same time, the Republican newsletter article continued, "a check disclosed that other churches and charitable institutions in the Washington area have been hit by thefts of contributions and other donations, mainly from the mails."

Thus, to the other ill plaguing the POD must be added stealing, apparently on a widespread and organized scale. We continue to quote from the article:

Rep. Clarence J. Brown of Ohio, who blew the whistle on mail thefts... pledged an investigation after the 91st Congress convenes... which would give this matter the urgent attention it deserves.

charities, and Korean Relief, Inc. None could give a precise estimate of the amounts stolen, although the Rev. Paul Melveren, director of Missionhurst, said there have been thefts every week for the past two or three years. Rev. Melveren said he believed that every charitable organization in Washington has the same problem.

William Vita, managing director of Korean Relief, Inc., said his organization has been suffering losses from its mail for the past two years. He said one Main Post Office employee was caught with \$139 on her person, all intended for Korean Relief. Cathedral officials said missing money was found in the locker of a postal employe, but that the employe has thus far never served a day in jail.

Pointing up the contemptuous attitude of bureaucrats entrenched in positions of power, the article said, "Congressman Brown said the Very Reverend Francis Sayre, Dean of the Cathedral, expressed his alarm in a letter to the postmaster general in 1967 but received no reply. Another letter, mailed in April of this year, received only a 'typical bureaucratic perfunctory reply,' Brown said."

Emphasizing the widespread prevalence of theft in the POD, the newsletter concluded, "On one occasion, postal inspectors 'seeded' the mail with 50 National Cathedral contribution envelopes in a single night. Only one came through to the Church. Meanwhile, the thefts continued."

As it seems to us, here is a good place for the victorious Republicans to begin making good on some of their campaign promises to clean up the government. Nothing short of a total dismantling of the corruption riddled POD and turning over of the mail carrying function to consumer-oriented private enterprise will suffice.

Dispelling Myths Of '68 Election

Every election quickly gives birth to myths and misconceptions—some accidental and some contrived—and they are already appearing in the wake of the 1968 results.

From some sources in Richard Nixon's camp has come the very simple thesis that President Johnson's Vietnam bombing halt announcement of Oct. 31, just five days before the election, drew up tight what otherwise would have been a substantial victory for Nixon over President Humphrey. On the basis of still incomplete voting breakdowns, the thesis seems to apply plausibly only to California. Even fairly late state polls showed Humphrey far behind. The Vietnam issue cut big in the state and the halt could have helped to draw the vote to its 48-45 per cent edge for Nixon.

The issue also cuts heavily in New York, but Nixon managers privately were conceding that state to Humphrey even before the halt and the vice president's 50-44 margin hardly suggests the move as decisive.

In the other major states, the available evidence indicates that Humphrey was on a strong comeback surge long before the bombing halt, and that what was happening was simply a reassertion of previously proven Democratic party strength in the great core cities.

For instance, Humphrey piled up a vote advantage in Philadelphia which was nearly 100,000 greater than Nixon's best appraisers had expected. (A telephone check late Saturday, Nov. 2, two days after the bombing halt decision, disclosed the Nixon men still were counting on a limited Humphrey edge in Philadelphia.)

Postelection checks reveal that much of the added margin, not foreseen by the Nixon camp, came from a huge black voter turnout spurred by COPE, labor's political arm. Though black voting in the North was somewhat erratic, evidence is that it tended to be much heavier in many cities than the GOP anticipated.

WASHINGTON — Vice President Hubert Humphrey and his top campaign lieutenants are seriously deliberating establishing a "government in exile."

Predicated on the late Adlai Stevenson's concept of a National Democratic Advisory Council that was set up following his 1956 defeat, the new plan would have a three-fold purpose:

(1) Formulate policy and programs on major domestic and foreign issues and problems; (2) promote conciliation and unity among the party's bitterly discordant and dissident elements; (3) function as an aggressive "watchdog" on the Nixon Administration, issuing critical analyses, studies and other partisan tracts.

As discussed by Humphrey and his advisers, the council's membership would cover a wide spectrum. Included would be congressional leaders, cabinet members, state and local officials, businessmen, laborites, economists, educators, scientists.

Still undecided is the size of the panel and its chairman. It's possible Humphrey may take over as head. If that is deemed inadvisable, two other likely prospects are Sens. Edmund Muskie, his running mate, and Fred Harris, Okla., co-chairman of Humphrey's pre-convention campaign.

QUESTION: Those who say "government protects us from greedy capitalists" cite the Food and Drug Administration's ban on sale of thalidomide as an example. Germany and England have no FDA, but the drug was withdrawn from there in (approximately) December 1961 or January 1962 by its capitalist sellers. Was the FDA ban prompt, or bureaucratically slow?

ANSWER: It would appear from the statement that the government agency was not so great a protector of the people as it would have them believe. Perhaps the reason the FDA was so dilatory in halting the drug believed to be harmful was that the agency was so busy attempting to prevent people from purchasing therapeutic dosages of vitamins and minerals, which the agency admitted were not harmful, but which it had contended are not effective.

It should be pointed out that the Food and Drug Administration originally was created as an agency to check the purity of food and drug items. While it obviously failed to protect the public in its basic function, it has been typical of bureaucracy in seeking and gaining expanded power to check whether products are effective. This certainly invades the right of the individual to make his own determination of the value of a product.

Spanish towns such as Los Santos allow strolling couples to "touch hands," nothing more. East German soldiers have a new, officially prescribed code of conduct. Locker pinups are now taboo. Further, "A soldier in the East German People's Army should kiss the back of a woman's hand only, that his intentions may not be misunderstood. Respect for a girl should be so great that one does not try to extort that which is not given willingly."

This evidence of a renaissance of the "old morality" in the Old World provides an interesting comparison with the so-called "new morality" in the United States. The New York County Bar Assn. urges that "adultery and homosexuality should no longer be considered crimes."

A Boston University philosophy professor says "the old arguments for chastity before marriage are outmoded." A New York City specialist in public health says, "One-in-five U.S. brides is pregnant on her wedding day."

London designers display the "nude top" to match the almost-nude bottom. Communists in Russia, following the Bolshevik Revolution, practiced the freest of free love. Now they—the Russians—are reverting to respect for women, self-discipline and recognition of the sanctity of marriage. These qualities they recognize as necessary to national strength.

Meanwhile, however, they are seeking to weaken us by subverting morality in the United States. I am not one who blames an international conspiracy for all our home-front immorality. But we do know that admitted Communists in the United States are encouraging the worship of filth.

Communist publications are filled with obscenity urging American youths to public licentiousness, urging them to reject the "morality of the establishment," to disrobe in public and display themselves and reject the "archaic formality of marriage" and "express themselves" through the use of drugs.

War Fever Is Rising In Mideast

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (NEA)— It will be a grave error for the United States and NATO to take lightly President Tito's warning that "the danger of war is very near" in the Middle East.

While the peace negotiations in the United Nations proceed at snail's pace, war fever rises steadily in the Arab countries and Israel.

The Yugoslav leader, hardly an alarmist, is one statesman who understands President Nasser of the United Arab Republic and is aware of the long-range plans of his Russian patrons.

Because of Tito's long friendship with Nasser, Yugoslavia broke diplomatic relations with Israel after the June, 1967, war. However, relations between the two leaders of the so-called unaligned nations reached freezing point when Nasser, who is now surrounded by some 5,000 Soviet military advisers, technicians and secret agents, approved Russia's invasion of Czechoslovakia.

Tito realized belatedly that Moscow was using the UAR as a base for aggression in the Mediterranean. That directly threatens Yugoslavia's security. As the Yugoslavs see it, the Stalinist hardliners, who now chart the course of Russian foreign policy are no longer interested in peace in an area where they can exploit friction to their imperialist advantage.

They are not yet ready to sanction the resumption of full-scale hostilities between the Arabs and Israel. But Moscow is employing every diplomatic trick to hinder a peace settlement in the hope that continuing unrest in the Middle East will strengthen the pro-Russian elements in the Arab countries.

To bolster Russian influence in the region, the Kremlin recently dispatched Nuritdin Mukhtidinov as ambassador to Syria. Ostensibly a Moslem, Mukhtidinov is a top Soviet official who is an old hand at fomenting "wars of national liberation." He will operate jointly with Khalid Bagdash, Russia's veteran agent in the Middle East, who is believed to be the real political boss of Syria.

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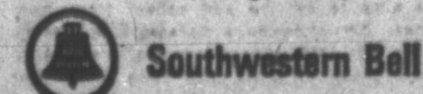
