Crowds Gather at JFK Gravesite on Anniversary

ARLINGTON, Va. (UPI)-The tourists now crowd where the Irish Pipers played their farewell dirge; the sightseeing buses now travel the route of

the funeral cortege. Since the assassination of John F. Kennedy, his gravesite in Arlington National Cemetery has become a standard tourist attraction around the nation's

One-half hour before the gates

opened to the public on this, the fifth amniversary of his death, the last surviving Kennedy brother paid his respects at the last resting places of his two brothers.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, accompanied by his wife, Joan, and six of the Kennedy family children, arrived at the cemetery at 7:28 a.m. After spending 15 minutes at the graves, the 36-year-old Massachusetts senator came down the hill and told newsmen, "L appreciate your understanding in letting us go up there."

About 12 persons were waiting to enter when the gates opened, including a group of three which placed a large wreath at the late President's grave. "Hail to the Chief." it said. It was a bright, crisp day at the cemetery as the tourists began

In Georgetown, a noon merely to see the grave; a few memorial Mass was arranged at Holy Trinity Catholic Church, and many Washington dignitaries were expected to attend.

President Johnson commissioned his Army aide, Col. Hugh Robinson, to lay a wreath at the Kennedy grave on his behalf at 11 a.m.

For the most part, it was the tourists who walked up the to the site-some to take snapshots; a number to kneel in a moment of respectful prayer.

An estimated 24 million persons have visited the Kennedy grave since Nov. 25, 1963, when his interment climaxed four days of national mourning. On an ordinary day, they number up to 10.000. In the first

year after Kennedy's death,

7,700,000 visitors were counted.

The number fell off to slightly more than 4 million the following year. In the past three years an estimated 3 million have come to the grave annually,

The site lying midway between Curtis-Lee mansion and the Lincoln Memorial across the Potomac was completed earlier this year.

An honor guard from the detail assigned to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier stands watch. The eternal flame flick-

ers in the November wind. The small white picket fence surrounding the temporary gravesite of previous years has been replaced by a fieldstone wall inscribed with seven quotations from Kennedy's 1961 inaugural address.

Richest Nations Lend France Needed Funds

BONN (UPI) - The world's richest trading nations agreed today to lend France \$3 billion to try to save the franc that faces imminent devaluation. It was a stopgap measure that eased but did not end the world monetary

West German Finance Minister Franz-Josef Strauss said West Germany had refused to revalue the mark, now pegged at 25 cents, and he did not announce devaluation of the franc as expected. In Paris is was generally believed the franc would be devalued by 10 per cent Saturday.

GROWING A DWARF TREE

Rev. Albert Maggard, Pastor First Pentecostal Holiness Church

Four hundred years ago a gardener set a young pine in one inch of soil in a shallow dish. As the tree grew he trimmed each root and cut the brances back. When he died, his son tended the tree and so on down through nineteen generations.

This tree never outgrew its shallow dish. Today it stands in the Kuhara gardens in Toyko, a patriarch twenty inches high, much alive with a twisted top three feet across.

Several hundred years old and only twenty inches high! A wonderful job has been done in making a tree miss its destiny! This little tree shouts a warning to us bacause the mind and soul can be cut back as a tree is cut back and made into a dwarf. If the generous impulses of the soul are cut back and never allowed to grow as they might, a spiritual dwarf will be the result.

John Galsworthy in the Forsyte Saga records one of the ingrown Forsytes commenting proudly on his grandson, "What a bright boy he is, he foundly says, "to give a plugged sixpence to the beggar!" There was a little soul cut back to a dwarf!

The same is true when religious responses are "cut back." God speaks to a child as surely as He spoke to Samuel in the temple. When the child's responses are minimized and cut back, and other things are given greater importance, it's like cutting back the branches and roots of a tree. The child asks for bread and is given the stone of material things, social advancement, or popularity - and thus the lime of Byron applies: "This should have been a noble creature."

Don't dwarf your life by neglecting eternal things. Bring your family to church this week. Learn what it means to " . . . come into the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, and unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." Ephesians

gentlemen, I want to tax your familial pemphigus, recurrent herpetiform dermatitis repens, Mr. Bass - Great grief! Has bullous Darier's disease of dyskeratosis bullosa hereditaria. Few persons have the fortitude to tangle with a disease that has such an imposing set of titles but those who have can console themselves that it is not serious. It is characterized by mildly itching blisters on the neck, armpits and arms. It's hereditary and usually clears up spontaneously, only to return at intervals. There is no effective treatment.

Q-I am 30 years old and after the birth of my last child have developed spider veins on both my thighs. What causes them? I have heard that they can be removed with an electric needle. Would a general surgeon or a skin specialist do this A-Spider veins are com-

monly associated with aging and with pregnancy. Heredity may also be a factor. If you would rather have them removed with an electric needle than cover them with a masking cosmetic, you should consult a skin specialist. You should, however, be prepared to find new crops developing from time to time.
