# Hard Water Sailors Need Sport Safety

NEW YORK (NEA) — High speed thrill seekers are quickly joining the fleet of hard water sailors.

Groovy birds know just where the winter sports action is, whether it be on the slopes or frozen lakes. And if you prefer raw excitement, board an iceboat and clip along at speeds of 100 miles an hour and more. Wind booms through the shrouds and the scream of razor-sharp runners, makes you feel like a giant seagull.

Regardless of the sport, skiing

or hard water sailing, you are vulnerable to winter's hazards. Wind and glare can be hard on the eyes, skin and hair.

Eye protection belongs at the top of your check list. Recommended are large, rubber-rimmed goggles with polarized green lenses, either plastic or safety glass. Amber or yellow lenses are good alternatives for stormy or overcast weather because they bring out shadows and improve your visual definition.

Your head and neck area should be completely protected from icy winds that can cause

frostbite in minutes at high speeds. Full-face crash helmets are important for ice-boating. So are inexpensive Navy surplus masks which have only eye, nose and mouth slits, and overlap completely from head to chest so that no skin is exposed.

Skin protection should include a heavy cream-type make-up foundation, applied more heavily around the mouth and eyes. Apply suntan lotion during breaks in the action and use waterproof mascara and cream-based lipsticks. Apply lipstick often to prevent chapping. A

good heavy-duty night cream will help replace moisture lost by a day in the wind and glare.

Your frosty weather kit should also include a few personal comfort items, such as hand lotion, tissues, a headache remedy, antiseptic and a plastic bottle of eye lotion.

Clothing should keep you warm even after long hours on a frozen lake or slope. Start with thermal underwear and wear relatively loose-fitting garments to allow good circulation. Be sure to overlap breaks where gloves join jacket and trousers join boots.

An easy hair style that can quickly fluff up after hours of fun is important. Experiment and find an easy to keep hairdo if you plan to join the sporty crew this winter.

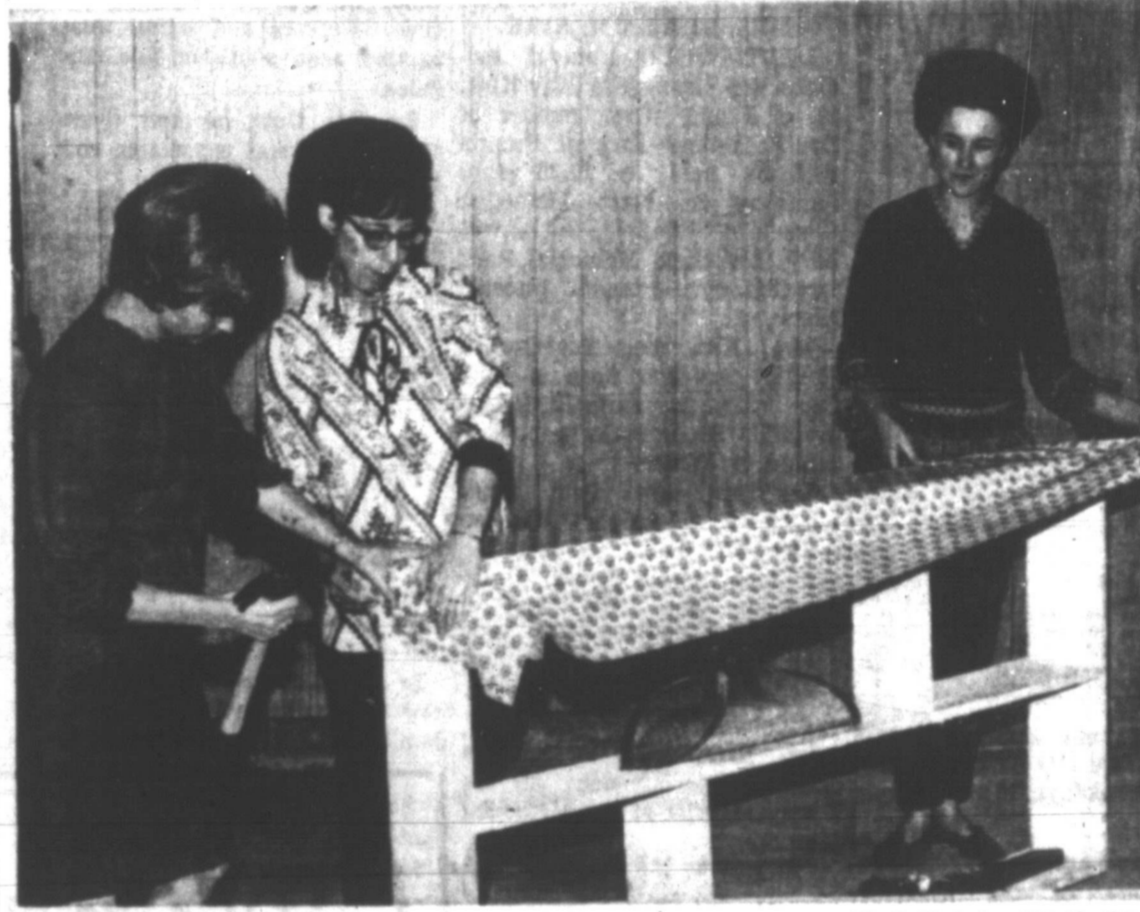

### Lady Bird Schedules 6,000 Mile Trip as First Lady

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson will take a four-day, 6,000 mile excursion to New Orleans, Cape Kennedy, Denver, and northern California Nov. 22-25 in a final swing as a traveling First Lady.

Her journey, labeled "This Is Our Country," will spotlight advances in education, the arts, space, health, urban renewal and conservation — programs promoted by President Johnson.

The cross-country trip, which will include several foreign journalists in the traveling party, begins with a visit to an oath-taking ceremony for new American citizens in Washington.

Then she will fly to New Orleans with members of the National Council on the Arts to attend an opening of a repertory theater, a project partially financed by the council. She also will visit Xavier University for a firsthand look at its educational programs, including the teacher corps.

At Cape Kennedy, Mrs. Johnson will be personally briefed on the moon voyage, given a go-ahead by the space agency Tuesday, to take place around Christmas time. She will tour the launch area and meet

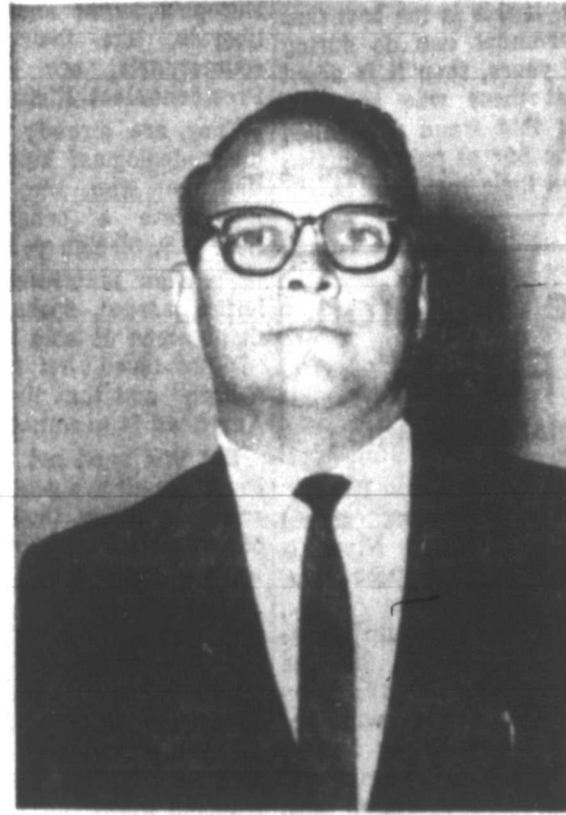

# The Weekly Message Of Inspiration



### GROWING A DWARF TREE

Four hundred years ago a gardener set a young pine in one inch of soil in a shallow dish. As the tree grew he trimmed each root and cut the branches back. When he died, his son tended the tree and so on down through nineteen generations.

This tree never outgrew its shallow dish. Today it stands in the Kura-hara gardens in Toyko, a patriarch twenty inches high, much alive with a twisted top three feet across.

Several hundred years old and only twenty inches high! A wonderful job has been done in making a tree miss its destiny! This little tree shouts a warning to us because the mind and soul can be cut back as a tree is cut back and made into a dwarf. If the generous impulses of the soul are cut back and never allowed to grow as they might, a spiritual dwarf will be the result.

John Galsworthy in the Forsyte Saga records one of the ingrown Forsytes commenting proudly on his grandson. "What a bright boy he is, he fondly says, "to give a plugged sixpence to the beggar!" There was a little soul cut back to a dwarf!

The same is true when religious responses are "cut back." God speaks to a child as surely as He spoke to Samuel in the temple. When the child's responses are minimized and cut back, and other things are given greater importance, it's like cutting back the branches and roots of a tree. The child asks for bread and is given the stone of material things, social advancement, or popularity — and thus the lime of Byron applies: "This should have been a noble creature."

Don't dwarf your life by neglecting eternal things. Bring your family to church this week. Learn what it means to "... come into the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, and unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ." Ephesians 4:13





# Amnesty Announced to Turn In and Register Weapons

Carl R. Booth, chief special investigator of the Treasury Department's alcohol and tobacco tax division for this area, today announced an amnesty through Dec. 1 for all persons having weapons that fall under the National Firearms Act or the Gun Control Act of 1968.

Weapons coming under these laws have to be registered with the Federal government, Booth explained, or their possession carries a fine up to \$10,000 or imprisonment up to ten years, or both.

Booth emphasized that all firearms need not be registered, only those covered by Federal law. Weapons that must be registered are:

What is commonly called a

"sawed-off shotgun." This is a shotgun having a barrel less than 18 inches in length or a weapon made from a shotgun if it has an overall length of less than 26 inches regardless of how long the barrel is.

A rifle having a barrel less than 16 inches in length or a weapon made from a rifle if it has an overall length of less than 26 inches regardless of how long the barrel is.

What is commonly called a "submachine gun" or "machine gun." This can best be defined as a firearm that will shoot more than one shot with a single pull of the trigger.

What is commonly referred to as a "silencer." This is any type of device designed to muffle or silence the firing of

a gun.

Booth added that another group of weapons carries the somewhat misleading name of "any other weapon." The easiest way to describe this group is to say "any weapon other than a shotgun, rifle, pistol, or revolver."

It includes, but is not limited to, cane guns, umbrella guns, cigarette lighter guns, knives that shoot bullets, and an almost endless list of weapons designed to look like almost anything other than a firearm.

One group of weapons new to Federal regulation are called "destructive devices" and include all types of bombs, mines, rockets, bazookas, grenades, mortars, guns with a bore larger than 50 caliber, and any ammunition to fit any of these devices. Booth added that shotguns can have barrels over one-half inch in diameter.

Booth stated that from now through Dec. 1, his office will register, at no charge, any of these illegal weapons.

Anyone who suspects that he may have such a firearm should contact Alcohol and Tobacco Tax, Room 218-C, Federal Office Bldg., Lubbock, Texas, or call Area Code 806, PO 5-8541, Ext. 317 for information.

Booth emphasized the persons registering their illegal weapons before Dec. 1 will not be Federally prosecuted.

Booth warned that anyone having an illegal weapon should register it now because, after Dec. 1, persons found with such weapons will be prosecuted.

## Efforts in Progress to Provide Free Breakfasts

AUSTIN (UPI) — Free breakfasts will be offered to 700,000 Texas school children if state officials can convince federal officials to provide funds and local school districts to accept them.

Charles Hicks, Texas education agency school lunch director, has said state officials are seeking approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to use an extra \$500,000 for breakfast programs.

Federal officials last week announced approval of \$3 million extra allocation for Texas schools' lunch and breakfast programs.

Hicks said state officials now are awaiting an okay on their proposal for dividing up the \$3,070,886.

**Would Extend Program**

State officials want \$500,000 to extend the free breakfast program to 250 schools.

Hicks said 100,000 youngsters in 48 schools got the free breakfasts in October.

Students who can afford to pay are charged 10 to 15 cents.

Hicks said the two-year-old program has been "very successful" in most Texas schools where it has been tried.

But the program takes a while to set up and state officials are worried about getting local districts to apply for and use the extra federal money during the present school year.

**Whose Is Eligible**

Hicks said any school with a large number of students "from areas with poor economic conditions" is eligible for the breakfast funds.

The children get milk, fruit or juice and bread, rolls or cereal each morning. Eggs, meat, or peanut butter are to be served "as often as practicable," Hicks said.

## The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI)—As if there weren't enough issues dividing the nation already, this week yet another controversy arose.

The point of contention is whether members of Congress should reside in the District of Columbia or out in the suburbs that infest nearby Virginia and Maryland.

Calling attention to the fact that "the district is a direct responsibility of Congress," three House members wrote letters urging their newly elected colleagues to settle in Washington.

That view was promptly challenged by Rep. Joel T. Broyhill, R-Va., who represents one of the suburban areas. He assured the freshman lawgivers "you need not live in the District of Columbia in order to perform your constitutional obligations to it."

Broyhill is technically correct. There is nothing in the Constitution that says a congressman must have courage enough to live in the U.S. Capital.

But I find myself on the side of those who believe senators and representatives should domicile themselves in the District.

One of my reasons is personal. I happen to live in the suburbs myself and I am not especially keen about having the neighborhood become overrun with congressmen.

Beyond that, there is a moral or ethical question that can be stated as follows:

Is it fair for a congressman to have a hand in enacting the laws that govern the District if he is unwilling to share the hardships that such laws might create?

A friend of mine who has a home in the city describes congressmen who dwell in the suburbs as the "Viet Congress."

"Members of the Viet Congress infiltrate into the District during the day and hit it with a few sneaky tricks, such as holding up funds for the subway until they have enough bridges and freeways to commute on," he complained.

"Then, when darkness falls, they withdraw back into the Demilitarized Zone."

I said, "Well, you'll have to agree with Broyhill that there is an 'unfortunate law and order situation' in the District."

"That's true," my friend said. "I takes a lot of guts to live in Washington. But the element of risk adds zest to life. Who wants to live forever?"

"Congressmen do," I said. "If they get killed they lose their seniority."

The Sahara sun boiled down on a gaily decked tent from which the president of Mali, Modibo Keita, spoke above the loud complaints of camels tethered alongside a new macadam airstrip.

This was Mali in the first flush of independence from France. Already, the desert sand was beginning to drift over the new runway.

And this was Timbuctu, "where the camel meets the canoe," linked now by a new Malinese airline with Bamako, the capital, 400 miles away.

Keita, more than six feet tall, imposing in his white robes, tough under a gracious exterior and a socialist in the African manner, became Mali's first president after a short-lived federation with Senegal in which he served as premier.

But Keita, after receiving aid from both East and West including the United States, was swinging close to the Red Chinese. A slogan in Bamako declared: "All the peoples of the world ardently love Chairman Mao."

With the Malinese economy slipping badly, it was too much for young officers in the Malinese army. This week, Keita fell to a bloodless coup.

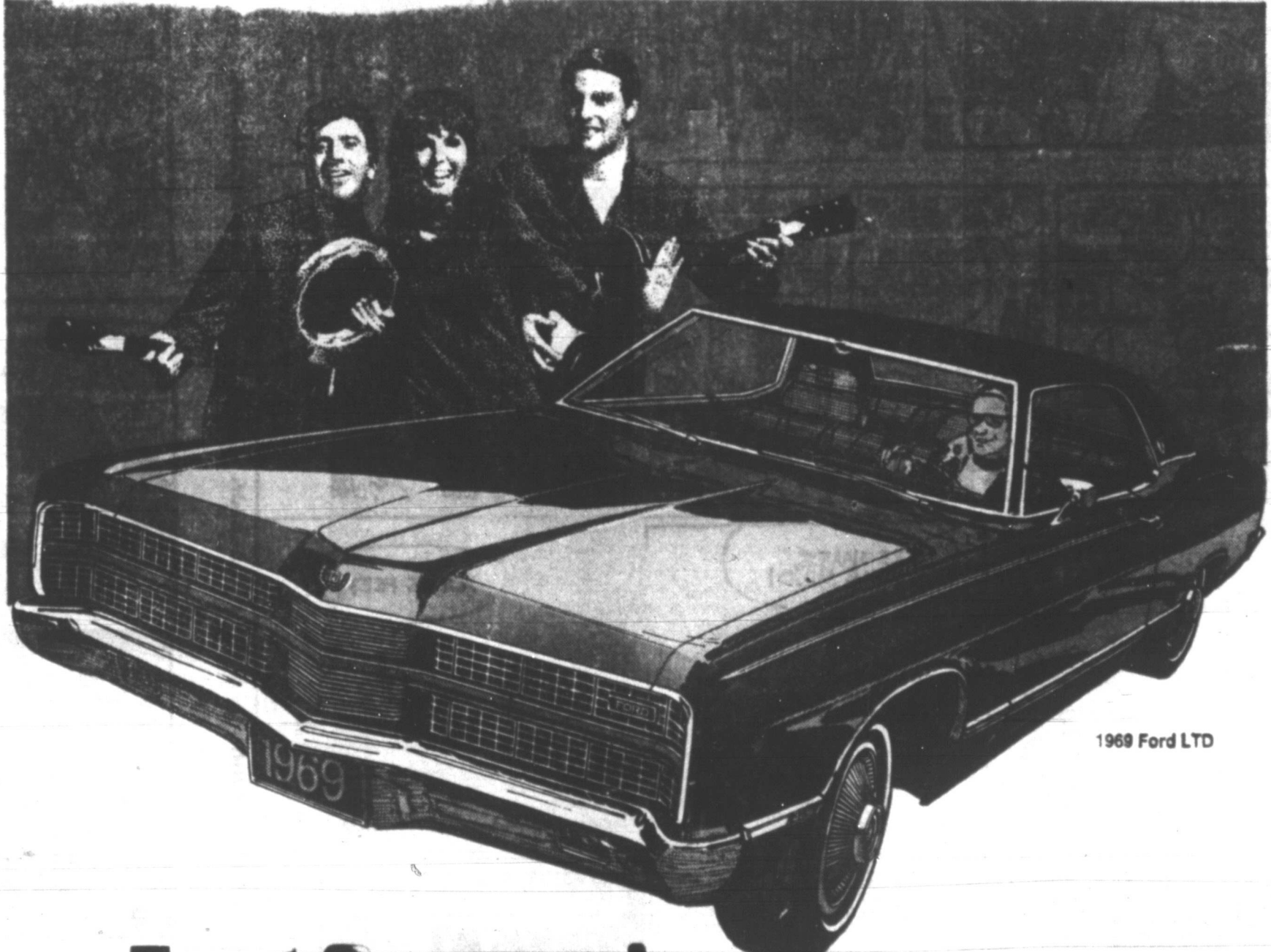

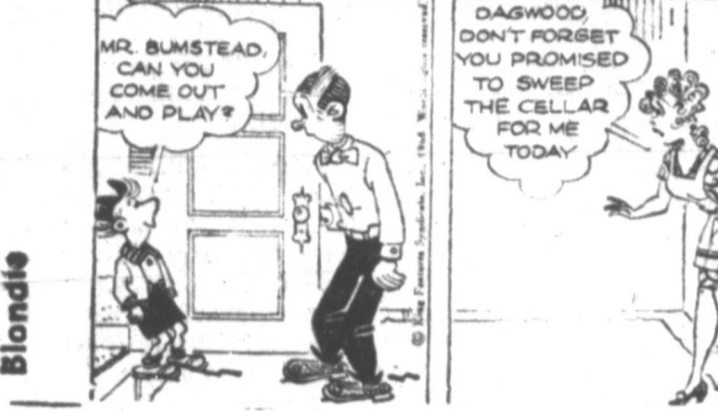

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — John Wayne spat on the soundstage floor, snapped his suspenders and bellowed: "Hell yes, I feel good. Why shouldn't I?"

Four years ago big Duke had part of a lung removed, the result of cancer.

But to listen to him holler, you'd think he had four lungs. Maybe more.

"Yeah," he said, "I quit smoking. But I chew tobacco now. That can't hurt me."

Wayne had recently returned from more than 10 weeks on location in the high altitude country of Colorado where he is starring as Rooster Cogburn in "True Grit."

The role requires Wayne to dash around on horseback, climb boulder-strewn mountains and carry co-star Kim Darby around like a sack of cement on his broad shoulders. At 61 years of age that's a lot of action for a guy with two normal lungs.

"I was huffing and puffing up there at 7,000 feet and higher," Wayne roared in his usual speaking voice. "I was hunting for air in a couple of those scenes."

"But I would have had a tough time breathing with two lungs."

Until now Wayne has limited himself to the white hat hero in westerns for a grenade-throwing marine, fearless warship officer or bayonet-charging dogface.

In "True Grit" he wears a scraggy wig, an eye patch, a wardrobe that looks as if it should be burned to preserve minimum sanitary regulations.

As Cogburn, Wayne is a hard-drinking reprobate with no virtues whatever except that he is dead game, full of bluster and blessed with the temperament of Zsa Zsa Gabor denied a cream cheese and pumpernickel sandwich.

It suits the big guy beautifully.

### Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President-elect Richard M. Nixon will be deluding himself if he counts on more than a brief honeymoon with Congress. Despite the honeyed talk of a series of slugfests

between the Republican in the White House and the Democratic-controlled 91st Congress—and not necessarily along party lines.

Nixon's pet project for gbetos—tax incentives to industry to locate in the slums and to

train slum dwellers for jobs—is finding few takers of either party among lawmakers.

Black capitalism, another Nixon favorite, will need considerable salesmanship to convince key congressmen of the need for a new government lending agency.

Nixon will find some strong opposition in Congress to any more to sharply increase defense spending to attain his much talked about clear military superiority over Russia.

If he plans to starve some of the Great Society spending programs in juggling government priorities, as he promised, Nixon may get involved in more of a fight than he bargained.

And on the income surcharge, he can expect a fight. If he asks for extension of the 10 per cent increase beyond June 30 when it is scheduled to expire, Democrats will remind him of his campaign pledge to let the surtax die.

In all squabbles that develop

(no new president has had a prolonged honeymoon with Congress) Nixon will have in Spiro T. Agnew an untried and inexperienced vice president to deal with the Senate.

The last five vice presidents have been products of the Senate—Hubert H. Humphrey, Lyndon B. Johnson, Nixon, Alben W. Barkley and Harry S. Truman. They knew the temperament of the men they had to deal with. Each, to varying degrees of effectiveness, served

as the Senate eyes and ears for the president, and not infrequently as a mediator of disputes.

Agnew will be a stranger until he has won his own place in the Senate establishment. Until that time comes, Nixon will have to depend upon the minority leader, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, for his main prop in the Senate. Dirksen is ready for the role.
