

Hale Cites Ample Reason For Challenge Against Lt. Gov. Smith

AMARILLO — "There is ample reason to challenge Lt. Gov. Preston Smith's approach to government," Seiden Hale of Amarillo said today.

Hale is the 18th Congressional District coordinator for Paul Eggers, Republican candidate for governor.

"Mr. Smith describes himself as an 'ultra-conservative' who will vote for Hubert Humphrey. Judging his record, this means he won't do anything to change the national Democrats or correct what is wrong with state government in Austin.

"Certainly Mr. Smith has repeatedly failed to work for reform or economy.

"He is the lone remaining major supporter of the conference committee system that works against taxpayers.

"Under this system only 10 people, five selected personally by the lieutenant governor, meet behind closed doors to decide where and how public money is spent.

"In June this small group added millions of dollars to the appropriations bill in special little projects. Mr. Smith refuses to change this method. One result is the October sales tax increase that is necessary to help pay for the big appropriations bill.

"Mr. Smith also cast a tie-breaking vote against an economy commission that would have saved taxpayers money

and didn't call for reform when corruption was uncovered in the regulation of liquor.

"Texas needs the two-party system this year to help insure that these expensive and unwise practices don't continue.

"Gov. Ronald Reagan summed it up when he was in Borger recently. He was talking about why Texans should elect Paul Eggers, and he said 'our side has not had a chance at bat to prove we mean it when we talk about economy and reform.'" Hale said.

Brown Hits Price In Tour Of Panhandle

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following comments are excerpts from talks made by Dick Brown of Hartley, Democratic Party candidate for Congress, 18th District, during a tour in the Panhandle last week which included Pampa.

"It is good of you to come out to visit with us for a little while. . . and I hope to have the opportunity to visit with you more at length before the election. However, as you know, the 18th Congressional District is a Texas-sized one and I have to rely on you and the people like you to get our message across to your communities. You've given us a warm welcome and I want to thank all of those who arranged for our visit.

"We're leaving with you some information about what you can expect from me as a Congressman, but I want to leave with you a few thoughts about what you've had for the past two years. I want to talk a little about what we don't need in the role of a Congressman.

"One thing you have had is a lot of mail from Washington, letters which said things like 'I know you are concerned about crime. . . or Vietnam. . . or inflation, and I want you to know that I am participating in legislation aimed at solutions'. . . but you haven't gotten any information as to how or in what way he's doing something about it. And what is more, you get all this vital in-

formation by mail that travels free. . . free that is to the Congressman, but not free to the taxpayers who pick up the postal deficit. . . And I think it interesting to note that this vital information, printed in the same form, turns out to be a handout, passed out at meetings and political rallies as campaign for election material. I call for legal interpretation of the postal regulations concerning this imposition upon taxpayers.

"Now, when I am elected, you can't expect this useless information, because I am not going to use your money to keep up three offices staffed by 11 people to write a lot of stuff to remind you of my name.

"If I don't do anything during the next two years to make you realize that you do have a Congressman working for you, without me having to remind you all the time, then you ought not to send me back when I ask for re-election. I want you to see results, not read excuses. I want to be able to tell you that our district is included in water studies, not write you letters explaining (if there is an explanation) of why we are not.

We don't need a Congressman who will join a bunch of boys with a negative attitude, and vote against everything that comes up. We don't need a Congressman who will fly off for a three-day tour to Vietnam and then come home to the role of war expert, to insult the news media whose casualty list substantially out number the

Congressmen killed in action. We don't need a Congressman who will vote against a desalting plant in California which would help the water shortage problem in that area. We do not need a Congressman who will write to the Texas House of Representatives asking that certain counties be eliminated from his district because he did not run very well there. . . we don't need a Congressman who will describe the position to which you elected him as 'something that sure beats rounding-up cattle in a blizzard' and who complains that the marble floors of Congress makes his knees hurt. We don't need a Congressman, especially from the 18th Congressional District, who says he would cut government expense by saving on water and soil conservation. I want to go to Congress as your voice. . . I want to say what needs to be said for you. I want to fight for you, not against you. I want to see things happening. . . industry coming in with new jobs. . . educational opportunities opening up in our country. . . I want to see air bases used for something, not closed up to rot and ruin. I want to see tourists discovering the beauties that we know exist in this area and spending their vacation dollars with us. I want to see just law be enforced so our wives and children won't have to be afraid to walk on our streets. I want an end to Vietnam. . . but I want an end that is honorable and one which will not jeopardize the freedom of any nation. Now, please note that I have not just said I believe in these things, although I do. I have said that I want them. . . which means I am going to work for them.

"My opponent has called the farmer the forgotten man. . . I want him remembered by the raising of farm prices, not with empty sympathy. . . or tongue-in-cheek representation on the all important agriculture committees. . . or even with little notes about how much my wife and kids like living in Washington. . .

"Ever so often, people get disgruntled or annoyed and because they don't know what else to do, they register a protest vote that is long on protest and short on reason. . . or they simply don't vote at all. And, if there is one thing I would impress upon you today, it is that nothing has ever been improved or solved by simply saying nothing. If either of these things happened and there was a general upheaval, the state of Texas would suffer greatly. For the first time in over 50 years, Texas is going to suffer loss of power and influence, regardless of how the November election turns out. With this in view, we simply can't afford to lose the strong committee chairman like George Mahon, Bob Poage, Tiger Teague. . . strong committeemen like Jim Wright, Earle Cabell, and Graham Purcell must not be replaced with non-Texans who combined haven't a tenth of the interest in Texas that even one of these men possesses, and I don't believe for a moment that the 18th Congressional District is going to deprive themselves of representation which can and will work with these Texans for Texas. . . just to keep in office a man who elected by a fluke. . . if the Republicans had any idea that Walter Rogers would have stepped down. . . they would have chosen a qualified man, a George Bush type.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Early prime time, which used to have the reputation of being the children's hour of television, can hardly lay claim to that function any more.

One reason is that sponsors learned that high ratings for children too young to have real buying power are strictly window dressing in network competition.

At any rate, consider—day by day—the first hour of prime time on three commercial networks this season:

On Mondays, there is "The Avengers," a sophisticated British spy series. And there is "Gunsmoke," whose excellent reputation results in part from its adult characterizations.

There is also "I Dream of Jeannie," which can pass as pretty much kid stuff. And there is "Rowan and Martin's Laugh-in," which cuts through various age groups but is very raucy and suggestive for small fry.

Jerry Lewis Appeals
On Tuesday, "The Mod Squad" is an action-packed series about youths that work undercover for the police, and appeals basically to mature youngsters and adults. "Lancer" is a western. And the Jerry Lewis show probably is the most definitely oriented of the three toward children.

Wednesdays offer "The Virginian," another western, and "Here Come the Brides," a frontier adventure-comedy about women imported to a logging settlement lacking in wives and other females. There is also "Daktari," a very popular children's entry.

Thursdays have "Daniel Boone," a frontier piece that has always had pull with the young audience, and "Blondie," which should appeal to children with its comic strip flavor. There are also "The Flying Nun" and "The Ugly Girl in Town," which concerns a young man who dresses in female clothing much of the time when he is mistaken for a famous model in London. The idea is that it's the only way he can afford to stay in England.

On Fridays, there is "The High Chaparral," a rugged western. Opposite this is "The Wild Wild West," which is also hardly kid-stuff, unless you're talking about quality. And there is "Operation: Entertainment," a variety show that visits servicemen in bases around the nation.

On Saturdays, youngsters can choose among "Adam-12," a police show; "Get Smart"; The Jackie Gleason series, "The Newlywed Game" and "The Dating Game."

Sundays, the children do have a field day. They can watch the Walt Disney hour, or "Gentle Ben," or the new science-fiction series aimed at them, "Land of the Giants." And for those a little older, there are also the Ed Sullivan Show and "The FBI."

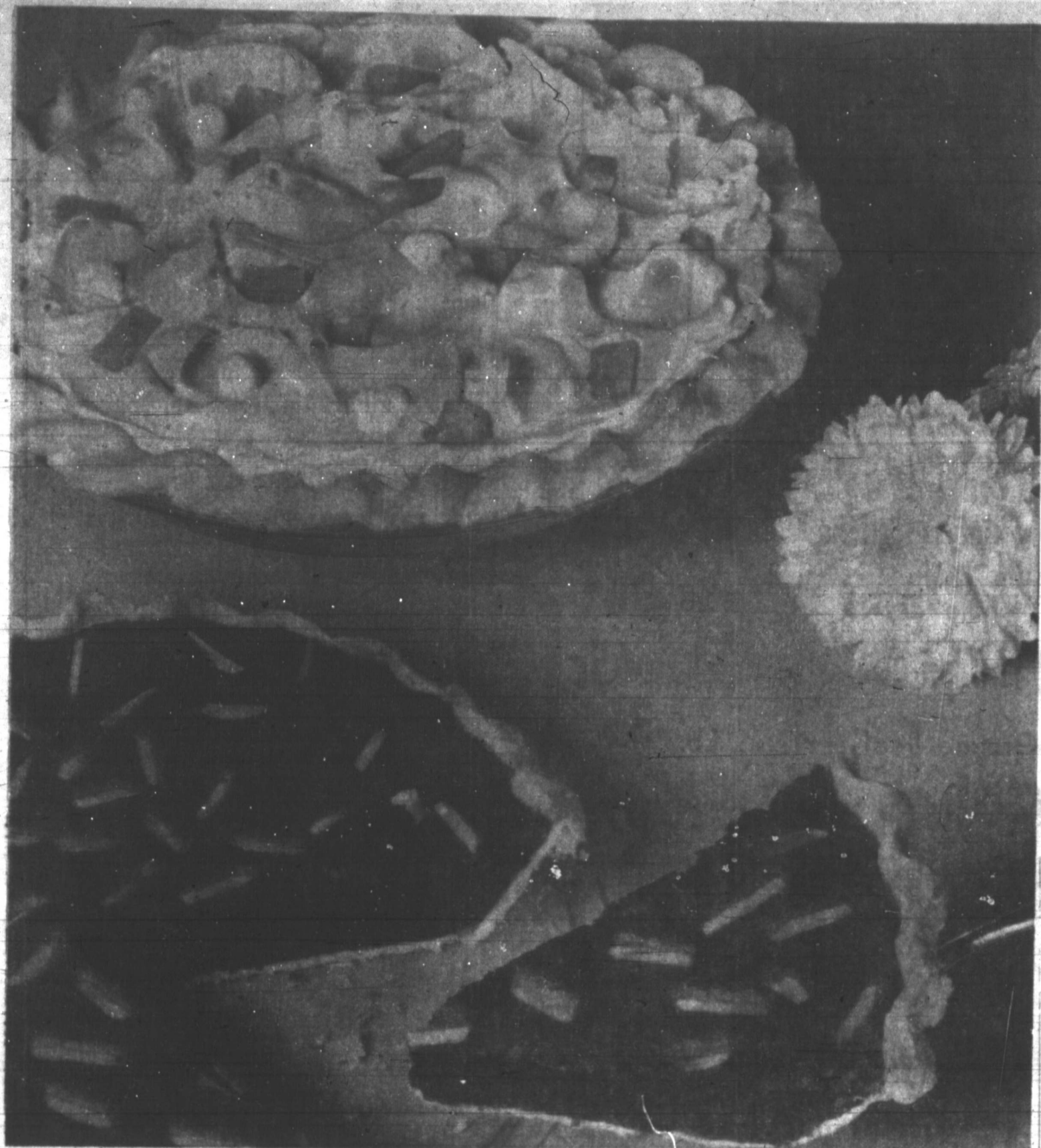

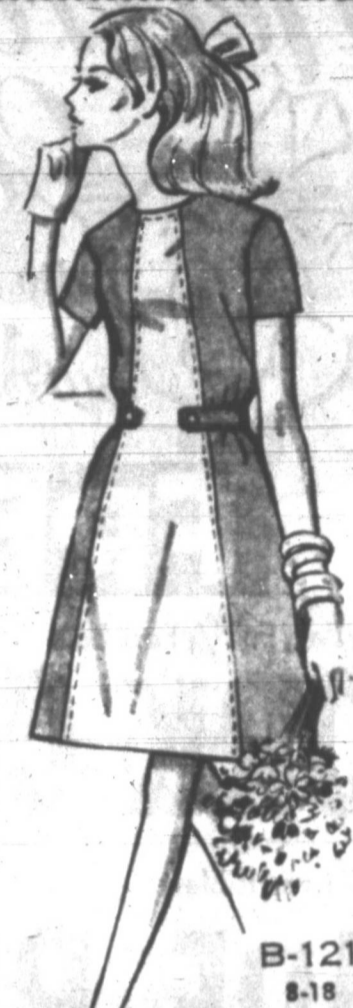

Refreshments were served to the 45 members present. Those attending from Pampa were Mrs. Bernice Keen, Mrs. Pearl



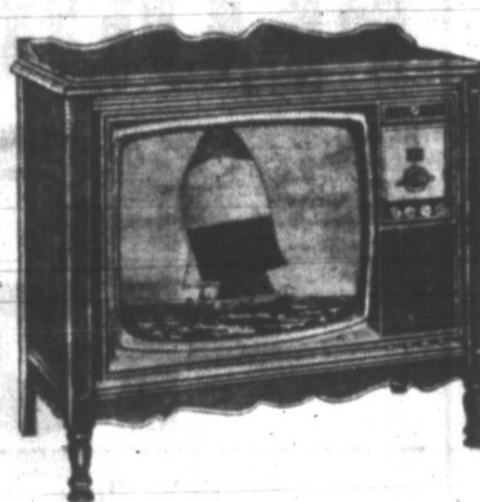

It's A Three-Man Race In Texas

By DAVID ANDERSON
AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Supporters of George Wallace, possibly one million strong, are making a close three-man race of what otherwise might be a runaway for Richard M. Nixon in Texas. A recent statewide poll gave

Wallace 25 per cent of the Texas vote. Retiring Democratic Gov. John B. Connally estimates Wallace's current strength at about 30 per cent. There are four million registered voters and about three million are expected to vote.

In a two-man race, Nixon would be a heavy favorite to beat Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey in Texas by about 55-45.

But because of Wallace's surprising strength, neither the Humphrey nor Nixon camp

expects to get a clear majority. Any of the three conceivably could win the state's 25 electoral votes, but top Democrats concede Nixon is a slight favorite at the moment.

Protest Votes
Wallace is strong in many normally Democratic areas. Particularly among farmers

and union members. But Connally and others call these "protest votes" that would go to Nixon if Wallace were not in the race. Nixon strategists in Texas are mapping a careful campaign to take votes away from Wallace and give them to Nixon. John Hurd of Laredo, Nixon's

state campaign chairman, said a polling organization has been commissioned to "find out who the Wallace supporters are, whom they supported in the past, and what we can do to get them."

He indicated Republicans will try to convince these people that voting for Wallace is futile. "About 30 per cent of the Wallace people are hard core," Hurd said. "The other 70 per cent range from weak leaners to heavy leaners. These are the

people who will respond to what I call the 'don't waste your vote' approach."

Wallace Defections
Connally said he expects Nixon to get most of the Wallace defections, but thinks a big Democratic turnout could still give Humphrey the state with perhaps 40 per cent of the vote. Wallace's Texas organization is run largely by members of the John Birch Society. The state chairman of Wall-

ace's American Party, Bard A. Logan of San Antonio, is a member of the society and said about 15 of the other 30 executive committee members also are Birches.

Republicans in Texas are united and well-financed. GOP Sen. John Tower is a key Nixon supporter. Humphrey's Texas campaign got organized only last week

and both the conservative and liberal wings of the Democratic Party remain unenthused. Humphrey's name was scarcely mentioned at the 1968 Democratic convention last month. Connally and other conservatives so far have declined to campaign actively for the vice president.

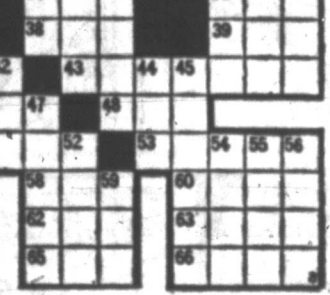
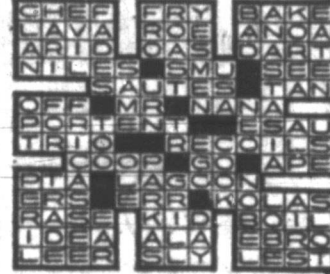

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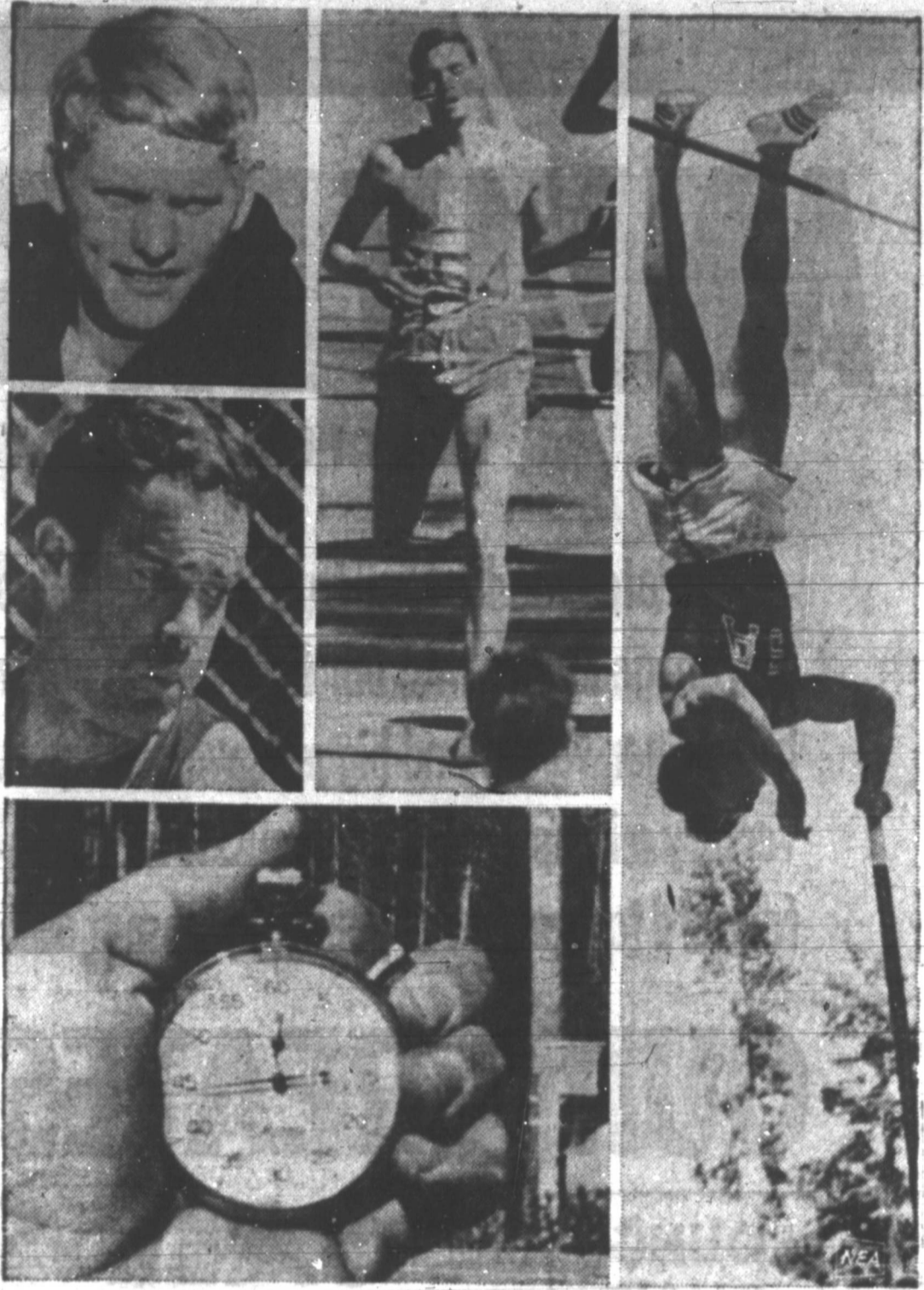

So it was for four innings, Gibson fanned eight of the 13 batters he faced and McLain stranded Tim McCarver on third after the Cardinal catcher tripled with one out in the second, and Lou Brock after the St. Louis leftfielder advanced to the same base on a stolen base and wild throw with two out in the third.

But in the bottom of the fourth, McLain lost his control and walked Roger Maris and McCarver. Detroit Manager Mayo Smith shuffled to the mound and told McLain he was rushing and to slow down.

McLain threw what he called a good inside pitch to Mike Shannon and the St. Louis third baseman lined it into left field for a single. Maris scored and McCarver and Shannon took third and second when Willie Horton bobbled the ball in the outfield.

Brock Homers

Then Julian Javier singled in two more runs. In the bottom of the seventh, Brock hit a two-out, 3-2 pitch by Tiger reliever Pat Dobson 400 feet into the bleachers and that was that.

Going into the ninth Gibson had 14 strikeouts, one less than the record set by Sandy Koufax when he opened the 1963 World Series by fanning nine.

Other offensive backs include quarterback Mart Hanna, 150, and wingback John Williams, 165. Linemen include ends Jerry Sisemore, 225, Dale Mouser, 180, and Dwayne Cox, 155, tackles Chuck Youngblood, 180, and Tommy Simmons, 190, and guards Danny Davis, 180, and Terry Blake, 165.

White Deer, McLean To Vie Friday

Disappointing White Deer, still trying for its first win after three outings, will tangle with McLean Friday in one of the top tilts in area Class A football.

The Bucks, co-holder of the District 1-A title with Gruver, have been defeated by Silverton (21-20), Clarendon (23-0) and Panhandle (28-0).

McLean, a District 2-4A team, has won over Lefors (22-6), and Boys Ranch (30-14) and lost to Shamrock (27-6).

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'68 Olympic Games In Jeopardy

By MIKE HUGHES MEXICO CITY (UPI)—The 1968 Olympic Games, scheduled to begin next week, were placed in jeopardy again today as new student riots continued to rock the host city.

Although Olympic rules do not specify anything about civil disorders preceding the games, one high ranking International Olympic Committee official said: "One would be right to assume the games are in jeopardy of being canceled."

At least nine persons were killed and 10 wounded Wednesday night as Mexican army troops opened fire with machineguns on 10,000 marching students in a bloody battle that covered 20 city blocks.

By midnight, six hours after the fighting began, the army was moving tanks into the battle area to shield troops and police from holdout snipers on the rooftops.

Visitors to the Olympic city quote a rule which said the games would be canceled if there were civil disorder 40 days before the games.

IOC sources, while not wanting to get involved in local politics, pointed out the organizing committee has a duty to guarantee the safety of visiting athletes and officials.

The nine man IOC Executive Committee is currently in session. It is quite possible they'll recommend the cancellation of the games to the full congress which meets Oct. 7, just one week before the games open.

IOC President Avery Brundage of Chicago, Ill., was unavailable for comment.

With about half of the 8,000 athletes expected already installed in the Olympic Village, not to mention several hundred foreign newsmen, officials obviously will be reluctant to call off the games, but they may be forced to do so.

The organizing committee has spent \$150 million in preparing for the games. They expect to recoup no more than \$50 million, so the games really are a prestige show for Mexico and Latin America. It is the first time the games have been held in a Latin American country.

Texas Leading National Grid Stats

NEW YORK (UPI) — Texas collegians are setting the pace in all three statistical columns this week in the national collegiate football figures.

Brooks Dawson of Texas-El Paso, Chuck Hixson of SMU and Eugene Morris of West Texas State rank 1-2-4 in total offense with 734, 695 and 544 yards, respectively, but Hixson has played only two games, the others three.

Hixson leads in passing with 64 completions in 117 attempts for 700 yards, while Dawson is No. 2 with 58 of 128 for 845 yards and North Texas' Steve Kamsey is 10th with 33-61-395.

Morris is the top ground gainer with 544 yards rushing. Houston's Paul Gipson is sixth with 288 yards and Morris' teammate, Duane Thomas, is eighth with 277 yards.
